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**ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION
of the
LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION**

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this body is the Louisiana Baptist Convention, hereinafter referred to as “Convention.”

ARTICLE II. DURATION

The duration of this Convention shall be in perpetuity.

ARTICLE III. NON-PROFIT CORPORATION

The Convention is a nonprofit corporation organized under the Louisiana Non-Profit Corporation Act, LSA-R.S. 12:201 et seq. and shall have all of the powers, duties, authorizations and responsibilities as provided therein. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Convention shall neither have nor exercise any power, nor engage directly or indirectly in any activity that would invalidate its status as an organization exempt from federal income tax and described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, or the corresponding provision or provisions of any subsequent United States Internal Revenue law or laws.

ARTICLE IV. PURPOSE

Section 1. The purpose of this Convention is to provide means through which Louisiana Baptist churches and members can cooperate in bringing persons to God throughout the world.

Section 2. The Convention will assist churches and associations in the Christ-appointed tasks: to worship God, to proclaim the Gospel, to teach, to nurture Christians, to establish and strengthen churches, and to minister in Christ’s name.

Section 3. This Convention desires to carry its programs forward in fraternal concert with other Baptist groups. This Convention will never exercise authority of any type over such groups.

Section 4. This Convention recognizes the Southern Baptist Convention as the primary instrument used by Baptists to further the cause of Christ on a worldwide basis. The Convention pledges its loyalty and support to the purposes served by the Southern Baptist Convention.

Section 5. This Convention will do all its work in accord with the principle that the Bible is the inspired, inerrant, and infallible Word of God, and is sufficient for all faith and practice, and is truth without any mixture of error in every area of which it speaks (Matthew 22:29).

ARTICLE V. REGISTERED OFFICE

The registered office of the Convention shall be located at 1250 MacArthur Drive, Alexandria, Louisiana. The location of the Convention may be changed by an affirmative vote of a two-thirds (2/3) majority of the messengers of the Convention present and voting.

ARTICLE VI. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. This Convention shall be composed of messengers who are members in good standing of Baptist churches cooperating¹ with the Convention.

Section 2. This Convention shall be organized on a non-stock basis having messengers as its only members.

Section 3. Any church which has taken action affirming, approving, or endorsing the practice of homosexuality shall not be considered as cooperating with this Convention. Such actions include but are not limited to the licensure or ordination of homosexuals, marriage or blessing of homosexual relationships, and endorsing homosexuality as an acceptable lifestyle.

Section 4. Each cooperating Baptist church having fifty (50) members, or less, shall be entitled to one (1) messenger; and an additional messenger for each additional fifty (50) members; however, no church shall be entitled to more than fifteen (15) messengers.

Section 5. Messengers shall be certified by their churches to the Convention, but the Convention shall be the final judge of the election and qualifications of its members.

Section 6. As an independent and sovereign Baptist group, the Convention reserves the right to determine in its bylaws or by resolution what constitutes a cooperating Baptist church.¹

ARTICLE VII. TRUSTEES

Section 1. The Convention's management is vested in its Board of Trustees for the execution of legal documents as required by law in effectuation of direction given by and only with the prior approval of the messengers. The Board of Trustees and the Convention shall only act at the direction of and with the prior approval of the messengers. The messengers may delegate authority to officers or committees who shall be accountable to the messengers as provided in the Convention's Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws. The Trustees shall have no authority or powers except those explicitly granted to them by these Articles of Incorporation or in the Convention's By-laws.

Section 2. The members of the Board of Trustees of the Convention shall be the Convention President, First Vice President, Second Vice President and the Secretary-Treasurer.

¹ Cooperating defined:

In order to qualify as a cooperating Baptist church, the church must be one that cooperates with the Convention monetarily giving through the Cooperative Program, and such qualification shall be in addition to any other aspects of cooperation that may be required by prior or future resolutions or bylaws. (Resolution of the messengers, LBC, 154th annual meeting, 11/13/01, amended 11/12/02)

ARTICLE VIII. OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Convention shall be a president, a first vice president and a second vice president. The office of secretary-treasurer shall be filled ex officio by the executive director of the Executive Board of the Convention.

Section 2. Officers shall be chosen annually from messengers in attendance at the Convention. Nominations shall be from the floor. Election shall be by ballot except when there is a single nominee for an office. In the latter case the president shall instruct the secretary to cast a unanimous ballot for the nominee.²

Section 3. Officers shall serve for one (1) year and hold office until their successors are elected and qualified; however, no officers may serve more than two (2) complete successive terms in the same office. Terms of office shall commence at final adjournment of the Convention in session at the time of their election and terminate at final adjournment of the succeeding regular session of the Convention. In case of death, disability of, or other cause making necessary the retirement of the president, the vice presidents shall succeed in order. The Executive Board shall determine when an office is vacant due to the disability of an incumbent.

Section 4. The president shall preside over all deliberations of the Convention and shall perform such other duties as may be customary to the position or as determined in the bylaws or by resolution, and shall, by his election, become an ex officio member of all Convention committees and boards. He shall continue as ex officio member of the Executive Board for one full year immediately following tenure as president of the Convention unless elected to fill a vacancy in the regular membership of the Executive Board.

Section 5. The vice presidents may, in the absence of the president or when requested by the president, preside over the Convention and shall perform such other duties as may be provided in the bylaws or resolutions or as requested by the president.

Section 6. The executive director shall keep accurate and faithful minutes of all sessions of the Convention. He shall cause these to be published in suitable form in the Annual of the Convention together with such other information as the Convention or the Executive Board of the Convention deems necessary and proper.

² Expectations of Louisiana Baptist Convention Officers

The Louisiana Baptist Convention has been blessed across the decades with men who have provided excellent leadership in their elected roles as convention officers. A number of qualities have characterized these leaders and form an example and a description of the kind of leaders Louisiana Baptists ought to seek in the future, especially for the highest offices:

1. A vital personal relationship with Jesus Christ that includes public and private devotions and holy living.
 2. A belief in the authority and inerrancy of the Bible and agreement with the Convention's confession of faith which is the Baptist Faith and Message 2000.
 3. A desire to see people come to faith in Christ, and an active participation in personal and congregational evangelism.
 4. A commitment to cooperative missions, especially mission endeavors of Louisiana and Southern Baptists as evidenced by strong congregational support of the Cooperative Program.
 5. A giftedness and experience in leadership that includes the ability to inspire confidence, build consensus, solve problems, and conduct the work of Louisiana Baptists in an orderly and effective manner.

ARTICLE IX. COMMITTEES AND BOARDS OF THE CONVENTION

Section 1. The plan of organization for standing committees and permanent boards of the Convention shall be as established in the bylaws of the Convention.

Section 2. Special committees shall serve for one (1) year or less as provided in the resolutions creating such committees.

Section 3. The members of all standing committees (except the Committee on Committees) and the permanent boards of the Convention shall be elected by the Convention. New members on all boards and committees who fill vacancies developing after annual Convention and before the month of May shall be elected by the Executive Board upon recommendation of the Convention Committee on Nominations or Committee on Committees.

Section 4. The president of the Convention shall appoint the members and the chairman and vice chairman of the Committee on Committees.

Section 5. Boards shall report annually to the Convention in the manner specified by the Executive Board of the Convention unless the Convention itself directs otherwise.

Section 6. Each committee and board of this Convention shall supply the executive director with an official copy of its charter or other legal evidence authorizing its establishment and a copy of its bylaws, as well as copies of the official minutes of their regular and special meetings. The executive director shall maintain these in such fashion that they are readily available to all Louisiana Baptists at the Convention offices of the Executive Board of the Convention.

ARTICLE X. THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE CONVENTION

Section 1. The Executive Board of the Convention shall serve as the Convention ad interim, as the Convention's principle advisory committee on total programs, and as the Convention's operating board for the Convention-sponsored general programs and programs not specifically assigned elsewhere.

Section 2. The Executive Board shall consist of one (1) member from each association having a minimum of seven churches with an aggregate church membership of at least one thousand, plus one (1) additional board member from each association having as many as ten thousand (10,000) church members, and an additional board member for each additional five thousand (5,000) church members of such associations; provided, however, that not more than seven (7) members from any one association shall serve simultaneously as members of the Executive Board.

Section 3. The terms of elected Executive Board members shall run for three (3) years. No member may serve continuously for more than two (2) complete successive terms. No member shall be eligible to serve another term until an interval equal to the number of years served shall have elapsed.

Section 4. The membership of any Executive Board member shall be declared vacant if he ceases to be affiliated with a church that is a member of the association from which he was elected.

Section 5. The Convention shall annually elect members to fill all vacancies on the Executive Board.

Section 6. The elected officers of the Executive Board of the Convention shall consist of a president and a vice president chosen annually by the membership of the Executive Board. They shall have the duties customarily associated with such positions. The board itself shall elect an executive director for an indefinite term. The executive director shall be ex officio member of the board and serve as its secretary.

Section 7. The Executive Board itself shall determine its time of meeting, organization and method of proceeding subject to these articles and the Convention's bylaws.

Section 8. The Executive Board of the Convention shall report annually to the Convention concerning the total Convention program, the operating programs entrusted to the board, and such other matters as the board deems necessary and proper.

Section 9. The Executive Board of the Convention shall recommend annually to the Convention the appropriation or allocation of undesignated financial resources of the Convention.

Section 10. The Executive Board of the Convention shall serve as the general corporate authority of this Convention. No activity supported by and subject to the will of this Convention shall seek incorporated status in Louisiana or elsewhere without the express approval of this Convention or the Executive Board of this Convention.

ARTICLE XI. THE DENOMINATIONAL PAPER

The Baptist Message shall be the official paper of this Convention.

ARTICLE XII. MEETINGS

Section 1. The Convention shall meet in regular session in the week following the second Sunday in November unless unusual circumstances should require a change. In such a case, date, time and place shall be determined by the Executive Board.

Section 2. Only the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention is authorized to call a special meeting of the Convention and only upon giving churches cooperating with the Convention at least thirty (30) days written notice of the date, place and time of said special meeting which meeting can only be held within the state of Louisiana.

ARTICLE XIII. INDEMNIFICATION

To the maximum extent permitted or required by LSA-R.S. 12:227 as it now exists or as it may be amended in the future, the Convention shall indemnify and advance expenses to persons indemnified in §227 for amounts such persons pay directly. The Convention shall not indemnify or advance expenses to such persons for any amount paid by a third party pursuant to a plan or contract of insurance.

ARTICLE XV. AGENT FOR SERVICE

The first agent for service of process for the Convention shall be Dr. David E. Hankins. The Board of Trustees may from time to time as it shall determine in its discretion change the agent for service of process for the Convention without the necessity of approval by the messengers.

ARTICLE XVI. CONSTRUCTION

All references in these Articles of Incorporation to statutes, regulations, or other sources of legal authority shall refer to the authorities cited, or their successors, as they may be amended from time to time.

ARTICLE XVII. AMENDMENTS

These articles may be amended at any annual session of the Convention, or at a special session convoked specifically for this purpose, by two-thirds of the messengers present and voting, provided:

Section 1. Proposed amendments originating on the floor of the Convention were submitted in writing at the previous session of the Convention, published in full in the Annual and referred to the Executive Board of the Convention for study and recommendation.

Section 2. Proposed amendments originating in the Executive Board of the Convention are published in full in two (2) successive issues of the *Baptist Message* at least one (1) month prior to the convening of the Convention.

BYLAWS
of the
LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION

ARTICLE I. PARLIAMENTARY LAW AND CUSTOM

Section 1. *Robert's Rules of Order* shall be recognized as the standard authority to guide the Convention on questions of parliamentary law and custom.

Section 2. One-fourth of the messengers enrolled shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business by the Convention. The minutes of the Convention shall indicate that a quorum was present for all business sessions.

Section 3. No persons addressing the Convention may speak more than twice on the same subject without unanimous consent.

Section 4. The president is charged at all times with the maintenance of decorum and order.

Section 5. All proposed resolutions coming before the Convention shall, prior to consideration by the Convention, be referred to the Committee on Resolutions without debate.

Section 6. All matters of business not scheduled on the agenda shall, prior to consideration by the Convention, be referred to the Committee on Order of Business without debate.

Section 7. The Convention shall express its official position only through its constitution, bylaws, and resolutions. The acceptance of a report shall not, in the absence of implementing resolutions, be construed as authorizing action by Convention committees, boards, and agencies.

**ARTICLE II. PERMANENT PLAN OF ORGANIZATION OF THE
CONVENTION AND ITS COMMITTEES AND BOARDS**

Permanent organization of the Convention shall be as follows:

1. Standing Committees:
 - (1) Committee on Committees
 - (2) Committee on Nominations
 - (3) Committee on Order of Business
 - (4) Committee on Credentials
 - (5) Committee on Resolutions
 - (6) Committee on Moral and Social Concerns
 - (7) Committee on Louisiana Baptist History
2. Boards of Trustees for:
 - (1) Louisiana College
 - (2) Louisiana Baptist Children's Home
 - (3) Louisiana Baptist Foundation
 - (4) *The Baptist Message*
3. Executive Board of the Convention

ARTICLE III. COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF COMMITTEES AND BOARDS

Section 1. The composition and duties of boards of trustees of agencies and institutions of this Convention shall be clearly set forth in the Convention resolutions authorizing their establishment and included subsequently in appropriate form in their respective corporate charters. All corporate charters and amendments thereto shall be expressly approved by the Convention or by the Executive Board of the Convention.

Section 2. The **Committee on Committees** shall be composed of nine (9) members one-third of whom shall be appointed each year by the president. This Committee shall nominate to the Convention the membership of all other committees of the Convention and shall nominate or appoint the membership of special committees as instructed by the Convention. The Committee shall also nominate for election the chairman and vice chairman of all Convention committees. Vacancies occurring during the year shall be filled by recommendation from this Committee to the Executive Board and may be approved by the Board in any of its regular or special meetings or by a mail poll of the Board.

Section 3. The **Committee on Nominations** shall be composed of fifteen (15) members. It shall nominate to the Convention all members of boards of the Convention, including the Executive Board of the Convention. Vacancies on boards occurring prior to the May Executive Board meeting shall be filled by recommendation from this Committee to the Executive Board. Vacancies occurring after the May meeting shall be left vacant until the Convention in November.

Section 4. The **Committee on Order of Business** shall be composed of seven (7) members and the person designated to plan the Convention music. It shall present to the opening session of the Convention for adoption a recommended agenda for the Convention sessions. The committee shall recommend to the Convention the preacher and music leader for the Convention meeting one year hence. The committee also may tentatively enlist Bible study leader and major speakers for Conventions scheduled up to three years in advance. The Committee shall be responsible for recommending to the Convention the host, the meeting hall or church, and the dates for the Convention meeting two years hence and, if feasible, for three years hence.

The Committee on Order of Business shall provide periods of time during the convention for the introduction of all matters requiring a vote not scheduled on the agenda, and, when introduced (unless the Convention then gives it unanimous consent for its immediate consideration) shall fix times for the consideration of the same. All such matters of business shall be introduced to the Convention during the time scheduled for Introduction of Business. No such matters of business may be introduced in the last session.

Section 5. The **Committee on Credentials** shall be composed of seven (7) members. It shall supervise the registration and accreditation of messengers to the Convention. It shall recommend action to the Convention concerning disputes as to status of persons as messengers.

Section 6. The **Committee on Resolutions** shall be composed of seven (7) members and three (3) ex officio members (including the Executive Board president) from the Executive Board of the Convention. The Committee shall be responsible for initiating, reviewing, commenting on, and recommending Convention action on all resolutions. In order to facilitate thorough consideration and to expedite the Committee's work, all proposed resolutions shall:

1. Be submitted to the Committee for review and consideration no more than ninety (90) days, but no later than fifteen (15) days, prior to the next LBC annual meeting.
2. Be addressed to the Committee on Resolutions in care of the Communications Team of the Louisiana Baptist Convention at its registered or e-mail address (electronic copies are preferred),
3. Be typewritten, titled, and dated,

4. Be accompanied by a letter from a church qualified to send a messenger to the annual meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention certifying that the person submitting the resolution is a member in good standing, and
5. Include complete contact information for both the person submitting it, and his or her church.

No person may submit more than three resolutions per year. The Committee on Resolutions shall prepare and submit to each annual meeting of the Convention only such resolutions the Committee recommends for adoption. Such resolutions may be based upon proposals received by the Committee or may originate with the Committee. Only resolutions recommended by the Committee may be considered by the Convention, except the Convention may, by a 2/3 vote, consider any other resolution properly submitted to the Committee.

Section 7. The **Committee on Moral and Social Concerns** shall be composed of fifteen members. The president of the Convention, the president of the Executive Board, and the editor of the *Baptist Message* shall be ex officio members. The Committee shall identify, study, provide information, and recommend actions on moral and social concerns which need to be of particular concern to Louisiana Baptists. The Committee shall also be authorized to speak publicly and/or conduct campaigns to influence the outcome of current issues on which the Executive Board or the Convention have taken an official position. The Committee may use resource persons and/or organizations in matters of common concern.

Section 8. The **Committee on Louisiana Baptist History** shall be composed of six (6) members and the officers of the Louisiana Baptist Historical Association serving ex officio. The Committee shall advise the Convention regarding historical material and encourage activities concerning the development of historical data about Louisiana Baptists and giving appropriate recognition of places figuring importantly in denominational history.

Section 9. The **Executive Director of the Executive Board of the Convention** shall serve ex officio as a member and as secretary of all standing committees of the Convention; however, he may be assisted in this task by members of the Executive Board staff.

Section 10. The **financial transactions** of all standing and special committees of the Convention shall be conducted only in accordance with policies and procedures established by the Executive Board of the Convention. The Executive Board shall retain exclusive authority over the custody and disbursement of all funds made available for expenses of committees of the Convention and the Convention itself.

Section 11. **Trustees of corporate boards** established under authority of the Convention shall be responsible for initiating charter amendments whenever such action is necessary to make charter provisions consistent with actions of the Convention.

Section 12. A **report of all meetings of boards** of the Convention shall be printed in *The Baptist Message* as soon as possible after the meeting with the understanding that specifics concerning financial conditions and personnel relations must often be confidential for the welfare of the institutions and their employees and may be reported in only general terms.

Section 13. **Baptist Faith and Message** adopted by the Convention on 11/12/02 (see page 25 for complete text).

ARTICLE IV. MEMBERSHIP OF COMMITTEES AND BOARDS

Section 1. The Convention affirms its adherence to the policy of **periodic rotation of the membership** of its committees and boards.

Section 2. The **terms of members of boards** shall be established as three (3) years. No member elected or appointed for a full term shall be eligible for more than two (2) complete successive terms on the same board. No member elected to serve as much as two (2) years of an

unexpired term of any board shall be eligible for more than one (1) successive full term of three (3) years on the same board. A member shall be ineligible to serve on that board until an interval equal to the number of years served on that board shall have elapsed. A person shall not serve in more than one elected or appointed position at a time, unless authorized by the constitution and bylaws. Upon the expiration of the term of any member of a board or committee, no person who is a member of the same church as the person whose term is expiring may serve on that same board or committee until one year following the expiration of the serving member's term. Membership on all boards and committees collectively shall in all cases be limited to no more than two (2) members from any church at any one time. Existing board or committee members who move to a church with two members currently serving on a board or committee shall be rendered ineligible to serve. No more than one member of the same church may serve on the same board or committee. The terms of members of committees shall be established as three (3) years. No member elected or appointed for a full term or elected to fill an unexpired term shall be eligible to succeed himself until an interval equal to the number of years served on that committee shall have elapsed.

Section 3. As far as practicable, one-third of the membership of each committee or board shall be elected annually.

Section 4. At least one-fourth of the membership of each board shall live outside the association in which the institution is located, and an effort shall be made to have representatives from various areas of the state.

Section 5. All persons regularly elected by the Convention to agencies and boards shall be elected or selected in any convention session except the last session.

Section 6. Each board of the Convention shall organize and elect its own officers under its own rules and regulations. The president of the Convention shall appoint the chairman and vice chairman of the Committee on Committees. That committee shall nominate the chairman and vice chairman of all committees that it nominates to the Convention. Each committee may elect for itself such other officers as it may need.

Section 7. The initial meeting of newly authorized committees shall be called together during or following the Convention by the chairman in conjunction with the secretary of the committee and at such meeting the necessary officers shall be elected.

Section 8. Newly elected members for the first time to standing committees and boards of the Convention shall not be eligible for office within their respective committees or boards prior to the conclusion of one year's service with the committee or board. Ex officio members of standing committees or permanent boards of the Convention shall not hold office on such committees or boards unless specifically authorized to do so by the constitution of the Convention or these bylaws.

Section 9. Officers of committees and boards of this Convention shall be elected annually.

Section 10. No salaried employee of this Convention and its boards and committees shall be eligible for election as a voting member of boards or committees of this Convention except as provided in the constitution of the Convention or these bylaws.

Section 11. Boards and committees of this Convention may appoint persons other than members to subcommittees and advisory committees provided such persons shall serve only in an advisory capacity and shall never be permitted to vote at meetings of the authorizing committee or board.

**ARTICLE V. INCLUSIONS OF THE CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS
OF THE CONVENTION AND THE BYLAWS OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD
IN THE ANNUAL OF THE CONVENTION**

The directory of the Convention shall include the constitution and bylaws of the Convention and the bylaws of the Executive Board of the Convention in each edition of the Convention's Annual.

ARTICLE VI. AVOIDANCE OF ILLEGAL ACTION

No action of the Convention shall be construed as authorizing its committees or boards to take any action that may be contrary to law.

ARTICLE VII. AMENDMENT OF BYLAWS

These bylaws may be amended at any regular session of the Convention by affirmative vote of two-thirds of the messengers present and voting. Amendments sponsored by the Executive Board shall be published in two (2) successive issues of the *Baptist Message* at least one (1) month in advance of the meeting of the Convention.

BUSINESS AND FINANCIAL PLAN
OF
LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION

I. Preliminary Provisions

Each agency and institution of the Convention shall submit to the Business and Finance Committee of the Executive Board (1) an itemized estimate of its receipts for the next fiscal year, and (2) an itemized estimate of its expenditures for the next fiscal year.

The Executive Board shall recommend to the Convention a budget based on an analysis of the aforementioned data, which budget shall include allocations to agencies and institutions. “Agencies” shall include the *Baptist Message*, Louisiana Baptist Foundation, and the Executive Board. “Institutions” shall include Louisiana Baptist Children’s Home, and Louisiana College.

The Budget and Financial Data Query Form shall include itemized estimates of receipts and expenditures for a three year period, past, present and projected, as indicated in the report form.

II. Fiscal Periods

Except where agreement otherwise is effected between an agency or institution and the Executive Board, the financial affairs of the Convention and all agencies or institutions owned, operated and controlled by the Louisiana Baptist Convention, shall be operated on the calendar year.

III. Disbursement of Monetary Funds

The executive director shall disburse all monies in accordance with the provisions of the Convention budget. Exceptions to this must have Convention approval.

Each agency or institution of the Convention is hereby instructed and ordered to keep all trust funds and/or designated gifts (for they are trust funds) sacred to the trust or the designation involved, and that they be kept separate from all other funds of such agency or institution.

Disbursement of Cooperative Program and Designated funds will be made immediately after closing of the books and in no event shall they be made later than the 10th of each month.

Inasmuch as each church is an autonomous body it has the inherent right, as is of course true with each individual, to make designations as desired. When a designated gift is received at the Baptist Building Business Office it shall be recorded and the gift will be forwarded forthwith to the designated object or person. An exception is that any gift received by any Louisiana Baptist Convention entity from a church that affirms, approves, or endorses homosexual behavior shall be returned to the donor. The acceptance and disbursement of any gifts shall not be construed as endorsement or agreement with the beliefs and practices of the donor.

Allocations for agencies and institutions of the Cooperative Program shall be determined on the basis of church gifts to the Cooperative Program and church designations the previous year and on the basis of needs and requirements of institutions and agencies as evaluated by the Business and Finance Committee and the Executive Board with recommended allocations to be voted by the Convention each year.

In the event that Cooperative Program receipts are less than the budget, distribution of funds to the respective agencies and institutions will be made on the basis of budget percentage of actual receipts.

IV. Special Solicitations

Any special campaigns for funds by an agency or institution owned, controlled, or supported by the Convention, must first secure the endorsement and approval of the Executive Board and the Convention. This is not to be construed as prohibiting any agency or institution from approaching individuals or corporations for gifts, it being understood that such approach to an individual or corporation is to be made only by personal contact or personal correspondence.

V. Capital Investments and Liabilities

Without the approval of the Convention or Executive Board, no liability or indebtedness exceeding \$100,000 or 2% of a Convention entity's annual operating budget (whichever is greater), shall be incurred by a Convention entity other than those that can be repaid from anticipated receipts for operating purposes and/or capital needs within a period of three years from the date such obligations were incurred. A report on all entity indebtedness shall be made to the Executive Board annually.

VI. Emergency Reserves

Each agency and institution of this Convention shall set up a reserve for contingencies to provide for deficits that may occur either through decreased receipts or through emergencies. The goal shall be that all agencies/institutions move immediately to accumulate funds in their operating reserve to 30 days operation within a long-term goal of at least three months.

VII. Financial Reports

Each agency and institution of the Convention shall close its books and accounts, and have them audited by a Certified Public Accountant as of the close of its fiscal year, and in turn shall forward two copies of its audit to the executive director as soon as available. These audits are to be studied by the Business and Finance Committee of the Executive Board, and shall include the following:

- 1) Balance Sheet
- 2) Analysis of surplus accounts
- 3) Income and expense
- 4) Classified list of investments by fund and type of investment
- 5) Receipts:
 - (a) Cooperative receipts
 - (b) Designated receipts
 - (c) Other income

Each agency and institution shall submit a report on the Budget and Financial Data form on or before June 1 of each year. A balance sheet of the financial condition after May 31 and prior to September 1 of the current year shall be submitted for publication in the current *Book of Reports* and Annual.

VIII. Handling of Funds

All persons who handle funds or securities for any agency or institution shall be adequately bonded. Discretion shall be exercised in the handling of all securities, deeds, notes and other valuable records (legal documents), and there must always be express authority from the proper source for such handling.

IX. Additional Agencies and Institutions

No new agency or institution shall be authorized by this Convention except after thorough study and presentation to the Convention for favorable action in two succeeding annual meetings.

X. Business Procedure

Each agency and institution of the Louisiana Baptist Convention as a normal operating policy shall refrain from entering any business transaction with a trustee or employee, or a business enterprise in which a trustee or employee has an interest. An exception to this policy may be made, at the discretion of the board of trustees, in any case wherein it appears that a commodity or service at the discretion of the board, is found to be in the best interest of the agency or institution. Competitive bids should be taken if practicable. In any case being considered for exception, the extent of the trustees' or employees' interest shall be disclosed to the entire board.

XI. Professional Services

The Executive Board at its discretion may employ an auditor to study the audited report with the auditors of the agencies and institutions in the light of Convention instructions.

The Executive Board at its discretion may employ an engineer or architect to study proposed capital projects or maintenance of present capital assets.

XII. Amendments

This Business and Financial Plan may be altered by two-thirds of the messengers present and voting at any time except during the last session (of the Convention), provided that recommended changes shall have been presented to the Executive Board and published in the *Baptist Message* at least one month in advance of the Convention.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation shall be THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, and under this name it shall have authority to sue and be sued; to have and to make a corporate seal; to own property both real and personal, and to receive the same by purchase, gift or any other process known to the law, to borrow money in its corporate name and to mortgage and hypothecate its property to secure the same, and generally to do, and to perform all acts necessary for the purposes for which it is created.

The corporate existence of this corporation shall be in perpetuity, unless sooner dissolved by a two-thirds vote of this corporation, which vote shall be taken not less than six months after receiving instructions to that effect in writing from the LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION.

ARTICLE II

The objects and purposes of this corporation shall be to foster Missions, at home and abroad, Christian Education and Benevolences, to promote and give direction to the work of the Louisiana Baptist Convention in these fields of service, through its several institutions and departments of service, necessary to the accomplishment of its objects and purposes, and to promote harmony of feeling and concert of action in adopting and carrying into operation such measures as may promote the Redeemer's Kingdom in Louisiana and in the regions beyond. It shall have power and authority to do all things necessary to carry out the objects and purposes for which it is organized."

ARTICLE III

The Executive Board shall consist of one (1) member from each association, having a minimum of seven churches with an aggregate church membership of at least one thousand, plus one (1) additional board member from each association having as many as ten thousand (10,000) church members, and an additional board member for each additional five thousand (5,000) church members of such associations; provided, however that not more than seven (7) members from any one association shall serve simultaneously as members of the Executive Board."

The terms of elected board members shall run for three (3) years. No member may serve continuously for more than two (2) complete successive terms. No member shall be eligible to serve another term until an interval equal to the number of years served shall have elapsed.

The membership of any board member shall be declared vacant if he ceases to be affiliated with a church that is a member of the association from which he was elected.

The Convention shall annually elect members to fill all vacancies in the board.

"The qualifications, term of office and criteria for selection of persons to serve as a member of the Executive Board of this corporation shall be in conformity with *Article X. The Executive Board of the Convention* contained in the Articles of Incorporation of the Louisiana Baptist Convention and *Article IV. Membership of Committees And Boards* contained in the Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention and any future amendments thereto. In addition to vacancies described in the Articles of Incorporation and By-laws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, the death or resignation of a member of the Executive Board shall automatically and immediately cause that office to become vacant without the necessity of any further action. Any other vacancy in the office of member of the Executive Board of this corporation for any reason deemed sufficient by the member shall only be declared by a two-thirds majority affirmative vote of the

messengers to the Louisiana Baptist Convention and only after the affirmative recommendation of the Convention Committee on Nominations has been published in the *BAPTIST MESSAGE* not less than twice in the thirty days immediately preceding the meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.”

ARTICLE IV

The elected officers of the Executive Board of the Convention shall consist of a president and a vice president chosen annually by the membership of the Executive Board. They shall have the duties customarily associated with such positions. The board itself shall elect an executive director for an indefinite term. The executive director shall be ex officio member of the board and serve as its secretary.

The first officers of this corporation shall be as follows to wit: George W. Bolton, President, H. A. Sumrell, Vice-President; H. H. Webb, Recording Secretary; W. N. Johnson, Corresponding Secretary; B. F. Thompson, Treasurer; and H. H. Webb, Auditor, who shall hold office until their successors are elected.

ARTICLE V

This corporation shall have the authority to adopt such rules and bylaws, not contrary to law, or the provisions of this charter, as it deems proper, and to appoint all necessary committees to carry out the purposes for which this corporation was organized.

ARTICLE VI

The domicile of this corporation shall be at Alexandria, Rapides Parish, Louisiana, and the service of all legal process shall be made at the domicile of the corporation, upon the President, or in his absence upon the Vice President, or in the absence of both of these, upon the Executive Director/Secretary, and otherwise according to law.

ARTICLE VII

This corporation shall not issue any stock certificates, and the private property of the members of this corporation shall not be held liable for any of the debts of the corporation, nor shall any mere formality in the drawing of this charter have the effect of rendering it null.

ARTICLE VIII

The Articles of Incorporation may only be amended with the approval of two-thirds majority of the Executive Board and the approval of two-thirds majority of the membership at the annual meeting, six months notice having been given prior to the annual convention to the President of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, and also notice of the proposed amendments having been published in the *Baptist Message* for three consecutive weeks preceding the annual meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE IX

This Corporation shall be organized on a non-stock membership basis. The sole member of this corporation shall be the Louisiana Baptist Convention, a nonprofit, Louisiana Corporation domiciled in Alexandria, Louisiana. Except as otherwise provided in these Articles of Incorporation.

ration or by applicable law requiring a greater number of votes other than a simple majority for approval of any action by the member, any matter requiring a vote of the member of this corporation shall be adopted by a majority of messengers who are present and voting as is provided by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Articles of Incorporation. Each messenger shall have one vote.”

ARTICLE X.

The annual meeting of the member of this corporation shall take place contemporaneously with the annual meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention without the necessity of giving notice to the member of said meeting. Any special meeting of the member of this corporation may only be called as provided in *Article XII Meetings* of the Louisiana Baptist Convention’s Articles of Incorporation and shall only be held at the same places, dates and times as the Louisiana Baptist Convention determines in accordance with its Articles of Incorporation and By-laws. Notice of any special meeting of the member of this corporation shall be published in the *BAPTIST MESSAGE* not less than twice in thirty days immediately preceding the meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.”

ARTICLE XI.

Before any dissolution or merger of this corporation, transfer or sale of substantially all of this corporation’s assets and/or the formation of other corporations, limited liability companies or other forms of doing business by this corporation may be implemented, the proposed action shall be approved by the member by a two-thirds affirmative vote of the messengers present and voting and only after the resolution authorizing the action has been published in the *BAPTIST MESSAGE* not less than twice in the thirty days immediately preceding the meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.”

BYLAWS
of the
EXECUTIVE BOARD
of the
LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION

ARTICLE I. GENERAL FUNCTIONS

Section 1. It is the function of the Executive Board to perform such duties and responsibilities as may be authorized by the Louisiana Baptist Convention, including serving as the Convention ad interim, serving as the Convention's principal adviser on total program, and administering programs entrusted to it by the Convention or not expressly assigned to another board or committee by the Convention. The Executive Board shall, by resolution, enumerate its specific duties and responsibilities under these general delegations of responsibility by the Convention.

Section 2. Duties and responsibilities of this board as set forth in the constitution and bylaws of the Convention shall be construed as incorporated in these bylaws. The board shall at no time authorize action contrary to instructions of the Convention.

**ARTICLE II. PERMANENT PLAN OF ORGANIZATION
OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD**

Section 1. The plan of organization of the Executive Board, its committees and staff, shall be as follows:

1. The elected officers of the Executive Board of the Convention shall consist of a president and a vice president chosen annually by the membership of the Executive Board at the Pre-Convention Board meeting. They shall have the duties customarily associated with such positions. The board itself shall elect an executive director for an indefinite time. The executive director shall be an ex officio member of the board and serve as its secretary.

2. Standing committees of the Executive Board

- (1) Nominating Committee
- (2) Administrative Committee
- (3) Business and Finance Committee
- (4) Executive Committee
- (5) Missions Support Committee
- (6) Properties Committee

3. Subsidiary of the Executive Board: Church Site Corporation

ARTICLE III. MEETINGS

Section 1. The Executive Board shall hold regular meetings in May, September, and immediately prior to the convening of the annual Convention. The May meeting shall be on the first Tuesday. The September meeting shall be on the last Tuesday. Should unusual circumstances require a change in the meeting dates, the Executive Committee may recommend such a change for approval by the board at a regular meeting or by means of a mail poll. The board may, by resolution, hold such other meetings as it deems necessary and desirable.

Section 2. The Executive Committee of the board may, for reasons that seem to it good and proper, call the board to special meetings.

Section 3. Fifty-one percent (51%) of the elected membership of the board shall constitute a quorum for the conduct of business. The minutes shall always indicate the presence of a quorum at the openings of any business session.

Section 4. Notification of or an explanation of absence from meetings of the board should be given by members to the chairman or secretary.

ARTICLE IV. COMPOSITION, DUTIES, AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1. Committees authorized in Article II of these bylaws shall be primarily advisory in nature. The Executive Board may, however, delegate responsibility to a committee to act in the name of the board for specifically defined purposes.

Section 2. Committee members shall serve for three year terms with one-third of the membership rotating annually.

Section 3. No member may serve on more than two (2) standing committees, except the Executive Committee, simultaneously.

Section 4. The president of the board shall be an ex officio member of all committees, subcommittees and advisory committees. He shall hold no elective committee position. A committee chairman shall also be an ex officio member of subcommittees and advisory committees created and authorized by and for the committee.

Section 5. The executive director of the board shall serve ex officio as a member and as secretary of each committee. He may, however, appoint assistant secretaries from the Executive Board staff to assist him in the discharge of secretarial duties.

Section 6. All standing committees, except the Executive Committee and the Nominating Committee, shall consist of fifteen (15) or more elected members subject to the discretion of the board.

Section 7. Each committee shall be responsible for reporting to the Executive Board at each regular board meeting and for formulating its respective portion of the board's annual report to the Convention.

Section 8. All committees shall be of equal status with each committee reporting directly to the Executive Board; however, this shall not be construed as barring the submission by the Administrative Committee of requests for unallocated funds directly to the Business and Finance Committee or forbidding in any way cooperation among committees on common problems.

Section 9. The committees, themselves, shall determine the time, place, and frequency of their meetings unless the Executive Board directs otherwise.

Section 10. The executive director will maintain minutes of all official meetings of the board and its committees. These shall be available at the Executive Offices of the Executive Board.

Section 11. Standing committees of this board are authorized to create and utilize such subcommittees or advisory committees as may be necessary to the proper performance of their duties. A list of all such subcommittees or advisory committees and their membership shall be submitted to, and included in, the official minutes of the Executive Board. Persons other than elected members of the Executive Board may be utilized by the committee to render qualified service as advisory, nonvoting members on subcommittees and advisory committees.

Section 12. The **Nominating Committee** shall consist of nine (9) members appointed by the president of the Executive Board. One-third of the committee shall be appointed annually, subsequent to the meeting of the Convention but prior to the September meeting of the Executive Board. The Nominating Committee shall recommend assignment of Executive Board members to other standing committees of the board and shall also recommend officers for these committees.

Section 13. The responsibilities of the **Business and Finance Committee** shall be to advise and assist the Executive Board in recommending both long-range and short-range goals for the Convention; in recommending the allocations of undesignated resources of the Convention to its

respective agencies and institutions; and in recommending and appraising the financial policies and practices of the Convention and of its agencies and institutions.

Section 14. The **Administrative Committee's** principal function shall be to advise and assist the Executive Board in carrying out the program assigned by the Convention to the board for administration. The committee shall recommend plans of organization and general policies to the Executive Board for approval and shall itself review and approve administrative policies and actions as appropriate. The executive director shall report to the Executive Board through this committee. In the event of a vacancy in this position, this committee shall be the channel through which a successor shall be recommended to the Executive Board. The committee shall review and approve the budget proposals of the executive director concerning Executive Board programs and shall recommend to the Business and Finance Committee any desired allocation of undesignated funds. The committee shall also serve the Executive Board by having cognizance of such administrative problems as the board itself may have, including financial and administrative matters relating to standing and special committees of the Convention.

Section 15. The **Missions Support Committee** shall review and approve funds for mission budget supplements, church loans, and special requests from missions for financial assistance.

Section 16. The **Properties Committee** shall study and recommend property acquisition, sale, or lease, study and recommend insurance coverage on properties owned or leased by Executive Board, and study and recommend major building project(s) or renovation.

Section 17. The **Executive Committee** shall consist of the President and Vice President of the Executive Board, who shall serve as chairman and vice chairman respectively of the Executive Committee, plus the chairmen of the other five standing committees of the board. The Executive Committee's sole responsibility shall be to advise and assist the Executive board in carrying out its function as the convention ad interim to the extent this function is specifically delegated by the Convention. The committee shall not in any instance serve as a substitute for, or insert its judgment in lieu of that of the other standing committees of the board; nor shall it review or appraise the work of the other committees unless expressly so directed by the Executive Board. The Executive Committee shall have the duty of conducting the Executive Director's Annual Performance Review and recommending any adjustment to the Executive Director's compensation and benefits.

Section 18. The Executive Board may by resolution define more specifically the duties and responsibilities of its committees; provided, however, that duties and responsibilities contained in these bylaws shall be changed only through amendment of these bylaws.

ARTICLE V. THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR-TREASURER

Section 1. The executive director shall serve as the chief executive officer of the staff of the Executive Board. He shall be responsible for providing executive direction and leadership to all programs assigned to the Executive Board. The Administrative Committee shall determine in writing the specific responsibilities of the executive director; however, the committee itself shall not assume any executive or administrative functions.

Section 2. The executive director shall serve as the principal professional adviser and principal staff assistant to the Executive Board and all of its committees. In performing this function, the executive director is expected and directed to utilize all talents available to the Convention to the end that the Executive Board may be provided with the best possible assistance and advice.

Section 3. The executive director shall approve the employment of all Executive Board personnel. The employment procedures shall be in accordance with policies of the Executive Board.

Section 4. The executive director shall maintain on a current basis a policy manual and an organization manual that reflect the principal policies of the Convention and its general plan of organization. The manuals shall also include the principal policies and general plan of the organization of the Executive Board.

Section 5. When the office of the Executive Director becomes vacant, a successor shall be

elected by the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention. The name of the successor shall be recommended to the Board by a Search Committee comprised of the members of the Executive Committee and the Nominating Committee of the Board. The Search Committee shall be convened by the President of the Board upon the vacancy in the office or upon the notice by the Executive Director to vacate the office. The Search Committee will elect its own chairman, and once convened, will serve until the election of an Executive Director. However, the Executive Board, with proper notice and a two-thirds affirmative vote, may fill the office of the Executive Director at any meeting of the board without a recommendation from the Search Committee.

ARTICLE VI. AMENDMENTS

These bylaws may be amended at any meeting of the Executive Board provided:

1. Committee-sponsored amendments are announced at the preceding meeting of the board or published in the *Baptist Message* at least one month in advance of the board meeting at which they are considered.
2. Amendments from the floor are proposed at one meeting and acted upon at the next meeting.
3. Amendments to carry must receive a two-thirds vote of those present and voting.

LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION CHURCH SITE PLAN

I. PREAMBLE

That Louisiana Baptist Convention has been involved with churches and associations in the starting of new churches since its organization in 1848. The leaders of the Convention have been aware for some time that there was a need for some organization that could act promptly and efficiently in the matter of acquiring new church sites for developing new churches and missions. Accordingly, the following plan has been developed after thorough and open discussions of the matter by related staff persons, appropriate committees and subcommittees of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board, qualified lay persons in the fields of real estate, business, finance, and new churches.

II. ORGANIZATION

Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation

The Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation is a wholly-owned, non-profit, subsidiary corporation of the Executive Board, Louisiana Baptist Convention.

Purpose

The purpose shall be to assist Louisiana churches, associations, and the Louisiana Baptist Convention in the acquisitions of church sites for new Louisiana Baptist churches. The Church Site Corporation may purchase, receive, and otherwise acquire real and personal property for the establishment of new churches and missions, and to assist churches and associations related to the Louisiana Baptist Convention in acquiring real and personal property for the establishment of new churches and missions.

Membership and Participation

1. The membership of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board.

2. The Board of Directors of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be elected by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board upon recommendation of the Nominating Committee of the Executive Board.

3. Participation in the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be open to all persons interested in the development of new churches and missions in Louisiana.

(1) Participation shall be by donation of a share(s) of donation.

(2) Donor of a share or more shall be entitled to receive:

a. A donation share certificate stating the number of shares donated. These shares may be donated in the name of the donor, a family member, some other person or a memorial to a deceased person.

b. A quarterly newsletter presenting the status, actions, and plans of the Church Site Corporation.

c. A copy of the annual financial statement of the Church Site Corporation.

4. Relationship to Louisiana Baptist Convention Business and Financial Plan.

The Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall conduct its business, activities, programs, and projects subject to the Louisiana Baptist Convention Business and Financial Plan.

III. FUNDING

Sources of Capital Funds

1. Capital funds for the corpus of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be obtained by the receipt of donations for donation shares by individuals, churches, associations, businesses, foundations, and others interested in the development of new churches. The Church Site Corporation shall have the power to receive donation shares in the amount of 50,000 shares at \$25.00 per share initially. Subsequently, after the initial 50,000 shares have been donated, approval for additional shares must be secured from the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board.

2. The Church Site Corporation shall be responsible for administering the Mission Land Fund of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board. The corpus of the Mission Land Fund is to be transferred to the Church Site Corporation upon its activation on January 1, 1980. The Church Site Corporation shall have the responsibility of establishing policies and guidelines for this fund.

3. The Church Site Corporation shall be empowered by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board to borrow money provided the Church Site Corporation can repay any and all loans with its own sources and does not require repayment of loans from Executive Board funds.

4. The Church Site Corporation may use its earnings from interest income, profits from property dealings, gifts, bequests and donations, unless otherwise specified by the donor, to increase the corpus of the Corporation.

Sources of Grant Funds

1. The Church Site Corporation may seek and receive gifts, bequests, and donations of certain monies or real or personal properties to be used as grants to churches and associations to assist in the acquisition of new church sites.

2. The Corporation may request and receive allocations for its grant program from the Georgia Barnette State Mission Offering.

3. The Corporation may request and receive allocations from the Louisiana Baptist Convention Cooperative Program Budget to be used in its grant program.

4. The Corporation may use the earnings from its interest income, profits from property dealings, gifts, bequests, and donations, unless otherwise specified by the donor, for its grant program.

IV. GUIDELINES

Name

The name of this plan shall be the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Plan and the name of the organization shall be the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation.

Responsibility

The Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be responsible to plan and conduct the affairs of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Plan as adopted by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board and the Louisiana Baptist Convention and as revised from time to time by the Executive Board.

Nomination and Election of Board of Directors

The Church Site Corporation shall consist of nine (9) members elected by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board upon recommendation of the Executive Board Nominating Committee, and four (4) ex officio members.

1. The Board of Directors shall be composed of nine (9) elected members and four (4) ex officio members as follows:

a. Six (6) mission-minded persons (usually lay persons) experienced in finance, business or real estate, representing different areas of Louisiana.

b. Three (3) mission-minded church staff members with experience in real estate and new churches, if possible.

c. Four (4) ex officio members, the Louisiana Baptist Convention president, the chairman of the Executive Board, the chairman of the Missions Support Committee and the Executive Director.

2. Nominations to be developed in accordance with the procedures of the Executive Board.

3. The elected members of the Board of Directors shall serve for three years, and be eligible to serve a second three-year term. (In the beginning some members should be elected for three, four, and five-year terms in order to establish the rotation system.)

Officers

The officers of the Corporation shall consist of a president, vice president, and recording secretary. The recording secretary shall be the Executive Director of the Louisiana Baptist Convention or his designate.

The general counsel for the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board shall serve as legal advisor of the Corporation.

Meetings of the Board of Directors

The meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held in the Baptist Building, Alexandria, or in such place as may be designated by the Board of Directors or its officers. The Board of Directors shall meet at least twice each year, and as often as necessary to carry on the business of the Corporation. The President shall have the authority to call a meeting of the Board of Directors when it is deemed expedient to do so.

A majority of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Duties of the Board of Directors

The Board shall meet at stated times for the purpose of conducting the affairs of the Corporation. It shall also be the responsibility of the Board to make or have made certain studies of population and other data to establish trends and needs for new churches. The Board shall make decisions related to acquiring new church sites based upon demographic data, land surveys, appraisals, zoning, evidence of good title, legal description of the property, participation of local forces in the financing of the project, maintenance of the property, program evaluation, priority of the new work, available funds or other such information that the Board may require.

It is anticipated that the field work and studies shall be done by appropriate staff members of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board whose program assignments relate to new churches.

The Board shall also make regular reports of its work and actions to the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board.

Authority of the Board of Directors

1. The Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall have authority under its own charter to purchase, subdivide, sell, lease, rent, exchange, donate, and finance the purchase and/or sale of real and personal property to be used for purposes consistent with its stated program.

2. The Corporation shall have the authority to loan, or make grants to churches and associations related to the Louisiana Baptist Convention, so long as it does not diminish its corpus funds; terms of the loans and grants shall be established by the Board of Directors of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation.

3. It shall be the duty and responsibility of the Corporation to actively seek out priority and strategic church sites in all areas of Louisiana.

4. The Corporation shall discuss and utilize the services of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board and staff persons of the Executive Board assigned to work with the development of new churches.

5. All properties purchased by the Church Site Corporation shall be held in the name of the Corporation.

Working Arrangements

1. The Board of Directors shall work with appropriate program leaders on the staff of the Executive Board in carrying out this work. It shall also be responsible to work with local churches and associations in the acquisition of new church sites. If it is not feasible to work with local Baptist leaders, the Board may proceed as necessary.

2. Any properties given to the Louisiana Baptist Convention through the Church Site Corporation shall be given without restrictions, except as agreed upon by the Board of Directors.

3. A local Baptist Church cooperating with the Louisiana Baptist Convention and the local association shall have the responsibility of sponsoring each new mission. It will be the normal procedure for the Board of Directors to have in hand a plan for each new church site, before it is purchased.

4. When new church sites are conveyed to sponsoring churches, certain stipulations shall be made to the church by the Board of Directors as follows:

a. The sponsoring church may not change the agreed upon financial plan for development without first consulting the Board of Directors.

b. The sponsoring church shall inform the mission church of the financial contributions made by the Church Site Corporation, the association and the sponsoring church in the acquisition of the property.

c. It shall be the sponsoring church's responsibility to enter into an agreement with its mission and the Louisiana Baptist Convention whereby any monies given or granted by the Corporation will be returned should such mission, or mission and sponsoring church, or mission after it is constituted as a church, disassociates itself from the Louisiana Baptist Convention. A recommended instrument shall be provided by the Church Site Corporation.

5. The Business Division office of the Louisiana Baptist Convention will be responsible to provide accounting and other business services to the Church Site Corporation.

Revisions

The provision of this document may be revised or amended by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board at any regular or special meeting of the Executive Board, acting on the recommendation of appropriate committees of the Executive Board.

BAPTIST FAITH AND MESSAGE

Adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, June 14, 2000

The 1999 session of the Southern Baptist Convention, meeting in Atlanta, Georgia, adopted the following motion addressed to the President of the Convention:

“I move that in your capacity as Southern Baptist Convention chairman, you appoint a blue ribbon committee to review the *Baptist Faith and Message* statement with the responsibility to report and bring any recommendations to this meeting next June in Orlando.”

President Paige Patterson appointed the committee as follows: Max Barnett (OK), Steve Gaines (AL), Susie Hawkins (TX), Rudy A. Hernandez (TX), Charles S. Kelley, Jr. (LA), Heather King (IN), Richard D. Land (TN), Fred Luter (LA), R. Albert Mohler, Jr. (KY), T. C. Pinckney (VA), Nelson Price (GA), Adrian Rogers (TN), Roger Spradlin (CA), Simon Tsoi (AZ), Jerry Vines (FL). Adrian Rogers (TN) was appointed chairman.

Your committee thus constituted begs leave to present its report as follows:

Baptists are a people of deep beliefs and cherished doctrines. Throughout our history we have been a confessional people, adopting statements of faith as a witness to our beliefs and a pledge of our faithfulness to the doctrines revealed in Holy Scripture.

Our confessions of faith are rooted in historical precedent, as the church in every age has been called upon to define and defend its beliefs. Each generation of Christians bears the responsibility of guarding the treasury of truth that has been entrusted to us [2 Timothy 1:14]. Facing a new century, Southern Baptists must meet the demands and duties of the present hour.

New challenges to faith appear in every age. A pervasive anti-supernaturalism in the culture was answered by Southern Baptists in 1925, when the *Baptist Faith and Message* was first adopted by this Convention. In 1963, Southern Baptists responded to assaults upon the authority and truthfulness of the Bible by adopting revisions to the *Baptist Faith and Message*. The Convention added an article on “The Family” in 1998, thus answering cultural confusion with the clear teachings of Scripture. Now, faced with a culture hostile to the very notion of truth, this generation of Baptists must claim anew the eternal truths of the Christian faith.

Your committee respects and celebrates the heritage of the *Baptist Faith and Message*, and affirms the decision of the Convention in 1925 to adopt the *New Hampshire Confession of Faith*, “revised at certain points and with some additional articles growing out of certain needs” We also respect the important contributions of the 1925 and 1963 editions of the *Baptist Faith and Message*.

With the 1963 committee, we have been guided in our work by the 1925 “statement of the historic Baptist conception of the nature and function of confessions of faith in our religious and denominational life” It is, therefore, quoted in full as a part of this report to the Convention:

(1) That they constitute a consensus of opinion of some Baptist body, large or small, for the general instruction and guidance of our own people and others concerning those articles of the Christian faith which are most surely held among us. They are not intended to add anything to the simple conditions of salvation revealed in the New Testament, viz., repentance toward God and faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord.

(2) That we do not regard them as complete statements of our faith, having any quality of finality or infallibility. As in the past so in the future, Baptists should hold themselves free to revise their statements of faith as may seem to them wise and expedient at any time.

(3) That any group of Baptists, large or small, have the inherent right to draw up for themselves and publish to the world a confession of their faith whenever they may think it advisable to do so.

(4) That the sole authority for faith and practice among Baptists is the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments. Confessions are only guides in interpretation, having no authority over the conscience.

(5) That they are statements of religious convictions, drawn from the Scriptures, and are not to be used to hamper freedom of thought or investigation in other realms of life.

Baptists cherish and defend religious liberty, and deny the right of any secular or religious authority to impose a confession of faith upon a church or body of churches. We honor the principles of soul competency and the priesthood of believers, affirming together both our liberty in Christ and our accountability to each other under the Word of God.

Baptist churches, associations, and general bodies have adopted confessions of faith as a witness to the world, and as instruments of doctrinal accountability. We are not embarrassed to state before the world that these are doctrines we hold precious and as essential to the Baptist tradition of faith and practice.

As a committee, we have been charged to address the “certain needs” of our own generation. In an age increasingly hostile to Christian truth, our challenge is to express the truth as revealed in Scripture, and to bear witness to Jesus Christ, who is *“the Way, the Truth, and the Life.”*

The 1963 committee rightly sought to identify and affirm “certain definite doctrines that Baptists believe, cherish, and with which they have been and are now closely identified.” Our living faith is established upon eternal truths. “Thus this generation of Southern Baptists is in historic succession of intent and purpose as it endeavors to state for its time and theological climate those articles of the Christian faith which are most surely held among us.”

It is the purpose of this statement of faith and message to set forth certain teachings which we believe.

THE BAPTIST FAITH & MESSAGE

I. THE SCRIPTURES

The Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is God's revelation of Himself to man. It is a perfect treasure of divine instruction. It has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth, without any mixture of error, for its matter. Therefore, all Scripture is totally true and trustworthy. It reveals the principles by which God judges us, and therefore is, and will remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and religious opinions should be tried. All Scripture is a testimony to Christ, who is Himself the focus of divine revelation.

II. GOD

There is one and only one living and true God. He is an intelligent, spiritual, and personal Being, the Creator, Redeemer, Preserver, and Ruler of the universe. God is infinite in holiness and all other perfections. God is all powerful and all knowing; and His perfect knowledge extends to all things, past, present, and future, including the future decisions of His free creatures. To Him we owe the highest love, reverence, and obedience. The eternal triune God reveals Himself to us as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, with distinct personal attributes, but without division of nature, essence, or being.

A. GOD THE FATHER

God as Father reigns with providential care over His universe, His creatures, and the flow of the stream of human history according to the purposes of His grace. He is all powerful, all knowing, all loving, and all wise. God is Father in truth to those who become children of God through faith in Jesus Christ. He is fatherly in His attitude toward all men.

B. GOD THE SON

Christ is the eternal Son of God. In His incarnation as Jesus Christ He was conceived of the Holy Spirit and born of the virgin Mary. Jesus perfectly revealed and did the will of God, taking upon Himself human nature with its demands and necessities and identifying Himself completely with mankind yet without sin. He honored the divine law by His personal obedience, and in His substitutionary death on the cross He made provision for the redemption of men from sin. He was raised from the dead with a glorified body and appeared to His disciples as the person who was with them before His crucifixion. He ascended into heaven and is now exalted at the right hand of God where He is the One Mediator, fully God, fully man, in whose Person is effected the reconciliation between God and man. He will return in power and glory to judge the world and to consummate His redemptive mission. He now dwells in all believers as the living and ever present Lord.

C. GOD THE HOLY SPIRIT

The Holy Spirit is the Spirit of God, fully divine. He inspired holy men of old to write the Scriptures. Through illumination He enables men to understand truth. He exalts Christ. He convicts men of sin, of righteousness, and of judgment. He calls men to the Saviour, and effects regeneration. At the moment of regeneration He baptizes every believer into the Body of Christ. He cultivates Christian character, comforts believers, and bestows the spiritual gifts by which they serve God through His church. He seals the believer unto the day of final redemption. His presence in the Christian is the guarantee that God will bring the believer into the fullness of the stature of Christ. He enlightens and empowers the believer and the church in worship, evangelism, and service.

III. MAN

Man is the special creation of God, made in His own image. He created them male and female as the crowning work of His creation. The gift of gender is thus part of the goodness of God's creation. In the beginning man was innocent of sin and was endowed by his Creator with freedom of choice. By his free choice man sinned against God and brought sin into the human race. Through the temptation of Satan man transgressed the command of God, and fell from his original innocence whereby his posterity inherit a nature and an environment inclined toward sin. Therefore, as soon as they are capable of moral action, they become transgressors and are under condemnation. Only the grace of God can bring man into His holy fellowship and enable man to fulfill the creative purpose of God. The sacredness of human personality is evident in that God created man in His own image, and in that Christ died for man; therefore, every person of every race possesses full dignity and is worthy of respect and Christian love.

IV. SALVATION

Salvation involves the redemption of the whole man, and is offered freely to all who accept Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour, who by His own blood obtained eternal redemption for the believer. In its broadest sense salvation includes regeneration, justification, sanctification, and glorification. There is no salvation apart from personal faith in Jesus Christ as Lord.

A. Regeneration, or the new birth, is a work of God's grace whereby believers become new creatures in Christ Jesus. It is a change of heart wrought by the Holy Spirit through conviction

of sin, to which the sinner responds in repentance toward God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. Repentance and faith are inseparable experiences of grace.

Repentance is a genuine turning from sin toward God. Faith is the acceptance of Jesus Christ and commitment of the entire personality to Him as Lord and Saviour.

B. Justification is God's gracious and full acquittal upon principles of His righteousness of all sinners who repent and believe in Christ. Justification brings the believer unto a relationship of peace and favor with God.

C. Sanctification is the experience, beginning in regeneration, by which the believer is set apart to God's purposes, and is enabled to progress toward moral and spiritual maturity through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit dwelling in him. Growth in grace should continue throughout the regenerate person's life.

D. Glorification is the culmination of salvation and is the final blessed and abiding state of the redeemed.

V. GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE

Election is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates, justifies, sanctifies, and glorifies sinners. It is consistent with the free agency of man, and comprehends all the means in connection with the end. It is the glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, and is infinitely wise, holy, and unchangeable. It excludes boasting and promotes humility.

All true believers endure to the end. Those whom God has accepted in Christ, and sanctified by His Spirit, will never fall away from the state of grace, but shall persevere to the end. Believers may fall into sin through neglect and temptation, whereby they grieve the Spirit, impair their graces and comforts, and bring reproach on the cause of Christ and temporal judgments on themselves; yet they shall be kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

VI. THE CHURCH

A New Testament church of the Lord Jesus Christ is an autonomous local congregation of baptized believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; observing the two ordinances of Christ, governed by His laws, exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word, and seeking to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth. Each congregation operates under the Lordship of Christ through democratic processes. In such a congregation each member is responsible and accountable to Christ as Lord. Its scriptural officers are pastors and deacons. While both men and women are gifted for service in the church, the office of pastor is limited to men as qualified by Scripture.

The New Testament speaks also of the church as the Body of Christ which includes all of the redeemed of all the ages, believers from every tribe, and tongue, and people, and nation.

VII. BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. It is an act of obedience symbolizing the believer's faith in a crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, the believer's death to sin, the burial of the old life, and the resurrection to walk in newness of life in Christ Jesus. It is a testimony to his faith in the final resurrection of the dead. Being a church ordinance, it is prerequisite to the privileges of church membership and to the Lord's Supper.

The Lord's Supper is a symbolic act of obedience whereby members of the church, through partaking of the bread and the fruit of the vine, memorialize the death of the Redeemer and anticipate His second coming.

VIII. THE LORD'S DAY

The first day of the week is the Lord's Day. It is a Christian institution for regular observance. It commemorates the resurrection of Christ from the dead and should include exercises of worship and spiritual devotion, both public and private. Activities on the Lord's Day should be commensurate with the Christian's conscience under the Lordship of Jesus Christ.

IX. THE KINGDOM

The Kingdom of God includes both His general sovereignty over the universe and His particular kingship over men who willfully acknowledge Him as King. Particularly the Kingdom is the realm of salvation into which men enter by trustful, childlike commitment to Jesus Christ. Christians ought to pray and to labor that the Kingdom may come and God's will be done on earth. The full consummation of the Kingdom awaits the return of Jesus Christ and the end of this age.

The righteous in their resurrected and glorified bodies will receive their reward and will dwell forever in Heaven with the Lord.

XI. EVANGELISM AND MISSIONS

It is the duty and privilege of every follower of Christ and of every church of the Lord Jesus Christ to endeavor to make disciples of all nations. The new birth of man's spirit by God's Holy Spirit means the birth of love for others. Missionary effort on the part of all rests thus upon a spiritual necessity of the regenerate life, and is expressly and repeatedly commanded in the teachings of Christ. The Lord Jesus Christ has commanded the preaching of the gospel to all nations. It is the duty of every child of God to seek constantly to win the lost to Christ by verbal witness undergirded by a Christian lifestyle, and by other methods in harmony with the gospel of Christ. XII. EDUCATION

Christianity is the faith of enlightenment and intelligence. In Jesus Christ abide all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge. All sound learning is, therefore, a part of our Christian heritage. The new birth opens all human faculties and creates a thirst for knowledge. Moreover, the cause of education in the Kingdom of Christ is co-ordinate with the causes of missions and general benevolence, and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches. An adequate system of Christian education is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people.

In Christian education there should be a proper balance between academic freedom and academic responsibility. Freedom in any orderly relationship of human life is always limited and never absolute. The freedom of a teacher in a Christian school, college, or seminary is limited by the pre-eminence of Jesus Christ, by the authoritative nature of the Scriptures, and by the distinct purpose for which the school exists.

XIII. STEWARDSHIP

God is the source of all blessings, temporal and spiritual; all that we have and are we owe to Him. Christians have a spiritual debtorship to the whole world, a holy trusteeship in the gospel, and a binding stewardship in their possessions. They are therefore under obligation to serve Him with their time, talents, and material possessions; and should recognize all these as entrusted to them to use for the glory of God and for helping others. According to the Scriptures, Christians should contribute of their means cheerfully, regularly, systematically, proportionately, and liberally for the advancement of the Redeemer's cause on earth.

XIV. COOPERATION

Christ's people should, as occasion requires, organize such associations and conventions as may best secure cooperation for the great objects of the Kingdom of God. Such organizations have no authority over one another or over the churches. They are voluntary and advisory bodies designed to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of our people in the most effective manner. Members of New Testament churches should cooperate with one another in carrying forward the missionary, educational, and benevolent ministries for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Christian unity in the New Testament sense is spiritual harmony and voluntary cooperation for common ends by various groups of Christ's people. Cooperation is desirable between the various Christian denominations, when the end to be attained is itself justified, and when such cooperation involves no violation of conscience or compromise of loyalty to Christ and His Word as revealed in the New Testament.

All Christians are under obligation to seek to make the will of Christ supreme in our own lives and in human society. Means and methods used for the improvement of society and the establishment of righteousness among men can be truly and permanently helpful only when they are rooted in the regeneration of the individual by the saving grace of God in Jesus Christ. In the spirit of Christ, Christians should oppose racism, every form of greed, selfishness, and vice, and all forms of sexual immorality, including adultery, homosexuality, and pornography. We should work to provide for the orphaned, the needy, the abused, the aged, the helpless, and the sick. We should speak on behalf of the unborn and contend for the sanctity of all human life from conception to natural death. Every Christian should seek to bring industry, government, and society as a whole under the sway of the principles of righteousness, truth, and brotherly love. In order to promote these ends Christians should be ready to work with all men of good will in any good cause, always being careful to act in the spirit of love without compromising their loyalty to Christ and His truth.

XVI. PEACE AND WAR

It is the duty of Christians to seek peace with all men on principles of righteousness. In accordance with the spirit and teachings of Christ they should do all in their power to put an end to war.

The true remedy for the war spirit is the gospel of our Lord. The supreme need of the world is the acceptance of His teachings in all the affairs of men and nations, and the practical application of His law of love. Christian people throughout the world should pray for the reign of the Prince of Peace.

XVII. RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

God alone is Lord of the conscience, and He has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to His Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to every church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Civil government being ordained of God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to the civil power to carry on its work. The gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its ends. The state has no right to impose penalties for religious opinions of any kind. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal, and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

XVIII. THE FAMILY

God has ordained the family as the foundational institution of human society. It is composed of persons related to one another by marriage, blood, or adoption.

Marriage is the uniting of one man and one woman in covenant commitment for a lifetime. It is God's unique gift to reveal the union between Christ and His church and to provide for the man and the woman in marriage the framework for intimate companionship, the channel of sexual expression according to biblical standards, and the means for procreation of the human race.

The husband and wife are of equal worth before God, since both are created in God's image. The marriage relationship models the way God relates to His people. A husband is to love his wife as Christ loved the church. He has the God-given responsibility to provide for, to protect, and to lead his family. A wife is to submit herself graciously to the servant leadership of her husband even as the church willingly submits to the headship of Christ. She, being in the image of God as is her husband and thus equal to him, has the God-given responsibility to respect her husband and to serve as his helper in managing the household and nurturing the next generation.

Children, from the moment of conception, are a blessing and heritage from the Lord. Parents are to demonstrate to their children God's pattern for marriage. Parents are to teach their children spiritual and moral values and to lead them, through consistent lifestyle example and loving discipline, to make choices based on biblical truth. Children are to honor and obey their parents.

CHURCH-STATE RELATIONS

OUR HISTORIC CONCEPT OF RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

Democracy itself is rooted in the assumption that man is capable of making the choices needed for governance of his own life and his social institutions. This assumption is based in turn on the Christian concept that man is essentially a spiritual being; and only through the responses of his spiritual nature can he relate himself to God and thus rise above his animal limitations. But only one who is free can make a genuine response to God. Religious freedom is, therefore, antecedent to the creation of civil and political freedom, which constitutes the nature of democracy.

Historically, Baptists have been aggressive advocates of absolute freedom of conscience for all men. In England and Colonial America they led in formulating the concept of church-state separation. The power of government then was arbitrary and absolute, backed by an established church, the two often working in collusion to give mutual support to each other. The established church forced its doctrine and modes of worship upon all, with government lending use of its power to punish dissenters. Thus protected and supported, the established church itself was a strong political force. When joined to protect and expand their mutual vested interests, the two constituted a powerful political combine, perpetuating their power through forcing conformity in worship and stamping out dissent.

Baptists believed that this denied to man the right to live as God had willed that he live, a free and self-determining being. It destroyed an individual's liberty of the spirit, freedom of conscience, right of choice - in short, all that made a man a man, according to the Baptist conception. It was in the context of these experiences that Baptists evolved their unique conception of complete separation of the two in their respective operations.

During the evolution of the separation concept their focus of concern was always to protect the individual, Baptist or not, in the free exercise of his religious conscience, always, of course, within the context of the Christian concept of life dedicated to ministering to and serving the needs of people - whether family, neighbor or stranger. Just so on the present issue. Louisiana Baptists recognize, as Jesus indicated to Peter on the mountain top, that their place is down there in the valley where the people are - teaching, healing, serving. We are free, not to enjoy release from the demands of life, but to carry out the work of our Lord on the streets of life where men work, learn, and suffer.

GUIDELINES

This committee was appointed essentially "to recommend guidelines for policy implementation" concerning institutional use of governmental funds. In actuality, the Louisiana Baptist Convention has by its practice already adopted a general policy of selective participation in government programs, wherever it was felt there was no impingement on the institution's independence. It is the element of "selectivity" in this policy that makes it essential, for the guidance of all concerned - the Convention officers and the trustees and administrators of the institution. Out of its deliberations, the committee has identified certain statements of general principle which appear to offer valid guidelines for those responsible for institutional decision making.

First: The Institution Should Identify and Clarify Its Basic Purposes.

Through continuing study and open discussion, the administrators, staff, and representatives of the governing board should develop a clear-cut understanding of the basic nature and purposes of the institution. This should be reduced to writing and circulated regularly among all related in any way with the institution.

This study should become an ongoing process of constant re-evaluation in light of our constantly changing social and technological demands. To provide leadership for this is a function of the executive officer.

Second: Any Assistance That Creates a Limitation on or Diversion From These Purposes Should Not Be Permitted.

Once the institutional staff and its constituency are clear in their concept of the institution's nature and primary purposes, all limitations or diversions, financial or otherwise, should be avoided.

Third: Acceptance of Government Grants.

No grant to the institution from any government agency shall be accepted. A grant shall be construed to be any transfer of funds or property for which the institution does not give adequate consideration.

Fourth: The Institution Must Retain Its Own Integrity In the Matter of Control.

In considering whether to seek or accept funds of any type, the institution must determine whether any part of the agreement provides for governmental control of the institution's affairs - except for normal accounting procedure for the shared funds.

The institution must retain the right to determine what religious activities will be held on the premises. The Trustees of the institution and their staff must have freedom to operate in accordance with principles and policies inherent in good programs and not on the expediency of politics.

Fifth: Participation Relationships Must be Voluntary, With Clear-Cut Terminal Arrangements.

In participating in government programs, the relationship should be voluntary on both sides, with either party able to terminate the agreement when it appears desirable. The agreement should indicate clearly the point at which the participating institution has fulfilled its obligation in the contract.

Sixth: The Institution Must Not Become Dependent on These Funds for Program Operation.

The trustees should not permit acceptance of funds in any area of program to such an extent that the institution becomes so dependent on outside funds that it would suffer unduly if they were discontinued.

Seventh: The Institution Must Protect the Integrity of Its Basic Programs.

The trustees must guard against any tendency on the part of the institution to become so involved with government programs that the institutional programs begin to grow around the emphasis on this public phase of its work to the neglect of its private sector.

Eighth: The Institution Must Not Accept Funds That Relate to Teaching of Religion.

The trustees should not accept any governmental funds that might in any way come to influence the way in which religion is taught or the word of God spread in the institution.

Ninth: The Institution's Trustees Should Have a Large Degree of Freedom in Decision-making In These Operational Matters.

After the Convention has adopted a definite statement of policy guidelines, it should give the institutional trustees a large degree of freedom, within the guidelines, to formulate programs and make decisions affecting the ongoing program in this area as in others. With appropriate reporting through the established channels, the trustees will keep the Convention informed on their program decisions. Only so can the Convention and the trustees perform their respective roles with integrity.

The proper function of the Convention is to establish over-all policy directions. That of the trustees and their administrators is to develop and implement programs for the individual institutions within the framework of these established policy statements.

9. Jerry Price, First, West Monroe, Chairman Order of Business Committee, presented the Order of Business Committee Report and read the standing rules as printed on page 34 of the *Book of Reports* and moved their approval:

I move that the agenda for this 165th annual meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention be as printed in the Book of Reports, pages 4-6;
I also move that the 2013 Convention to be held at Riverfront Convention Center, Alexandria, that the Annual Sermon be preached by Bill Dye, pastor of North Monroe, Monroe, that Stewart Holloway, pastor of First, Pineville, serve as the alternate preacher, Benjie Harlan, LBC Church Music Strategist, serve as Music Director and Fred Guilbert, Worship Pastor Philadelphia, Deville, serve as alternate.

I move that the following standing rules be adopted: That the President be allowed to make minor changes as may be necessary to the agenda; that nominating speeches for officers be limited to three (3) minutes each; that the Convention Worship Service be a fixed order of business; that debate on matters coming before the Convention be limited to two speakers for and two speakers against for a period of up to three minutes each; that persons addressing the Convention must state their name and church before they will be recognized by the Chair; and that no person addressing the Convention may speak more than twice on the same subject without unanimous consent.

The Committee on Nominations and the Committee on Committees reports will be first presented and then followed by nominations from the floor, if any. Then the Committee reports shall be voted on for adoption by the Convention. If the Committee reports are adopted as presented, then the vote on persons nominated from the floor becomes moot. These standing rules are printed on page 33 of the Book of Reports.

14. Jerry Price made the following announcement:

I would also want to remind messengers that according to Article I, section 6. All matters of business not scheduled on the agenda shall, prior to consideration by the Convention, be referred to the Committee on Order of Business without debate. The Order of Business Committee will determine if the motion needs to be referred to an appropriate committee, board or entity or scheduled for discussion at this convention. The times for introduction of new motions are 6:30 p.m. tonight and 9 a.m. in tomorrow morning's session. No new business may be introduced in the Tuesday afternoon session.

That recommendation will be a part of the Executive Board Report in the morning at 10:05.

16. Waylon Bailey called for introduction of motions. There were none.
17. A video presentation was shown spotlighting the ministries of the Missions and Ministry Team.
18. A video presentation was shown highlighting the ministries supported through the funds provided by the George Barnette State Missions Offering.
19. David Hankins Executive Director, Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board, presented his report focusing on the 200th Anniversary of Baptist work in Louisiana. Hankins reported on the Prayer Meetings held in all 64 parishes of Louisiana. Hankins' report included giving messengers a commemorative key marking the 200th anniversary. He concluded his remarks with a video presentation, "Am I Awake?"
20. The Voices of Louisiana College presented special music "We Believe".
21. Joe Aguillard, president of Louisiana College, presented a report which included a video highlighting the need for dorm renovations at Louisiana College. Aguillard reported that Louisiana College ranked in the top twelve most conservative college in the United States. Aguillard reported that on February 17, 2012, the LC board of trustees voted to stand against President Obama and Obama care regarding abortion. Dr. Aguillard concluded his remarks by thanking messengers for their support.
22. The Voices of Louisiana presented music, "America, the Beautiful".
23. Jay Johnston, Executive Pastor, First, Covington, introduced LBC President, Dr. Waylon Bailey.
24. Jason Brooks, Worship Leader, First, Covington, led in special music.
25. LBC President Waylon Bailey presented the President's Address, "Living in the Worst of Times; Doing Church in the Worst of Times", using Revelation 2:12 as his text.
26. First Vice President Michael Shamblin assumed the chair for the remainder of the session.
27. Michael Shamblin made announcements to messengers.
28. David Crosby, pastor, First, New Orleans, led in the benediction and the first session adjourned at 8:30 p.m.

TUESDAY MORNING

November 13, 2012

29. President Waylon Bailey called the second session of the 165th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention to order at 8:35 a.m. A quorum was present.
30. Bob Heustess, pastor, Grace Memorial, Slidell, led in the opening prayer.
31. Steve Lemke led in the Bible study using Matthew 26:36-46 as his text.
32. Waylon Bailey called for Introduction of Motions.
33. Jerry Price, Chairman, Order of Business Committee, reported no new motions to present to messengers.
34. Keith Manuel, LBC Evangelism/Church Growth Associate, reported on the evangelistic event, CrossOver, which was conducted over a few weeks preceeding the annual meeting. Manuel reported 105 professions of faith and 3,000 prospects were recorded during the evangelistic effort.
35. Waylon Bailey led in prayer for those who were led to Christ during the event.
36. Bill Robertson, Director of Pastoral Leadership presented a report on the ministries available through their office. Robertson announced a conference to be held at Louisiana College on February 21-22, 2013 focusing on revival. Robertson presented the book, "How Great is Our God", to pastors present in the session.

37. Kelly Boggs, *Baptist Message* editor, presented a report from the *Baptist Message*. Boggs stated that the *Baptist Message* exists to help Louisiana southern Baptists impact the world for Jesus Christ. He stated the *Baptist Message* strives to be a publication that in content and style honors the Lord. Boggs announced that an app for iphone and ipad would be available by the end of the year to subscribers. He thanked the messengers for their support of the Cooperative Program.
38. Randy Ray, St. Rest, Dubach, Chairman, Committee on Nominations, presented the Committee on Nominations Report as printed on pages 30-31 of the *Book of Reports* and moved the adoption of the report and the following addendum:
Addendum: Executive Board, North Sabine Association, Richard Enterkin, Union Springs, Converse, Term Expiring 2014
39. Waylon Bailey called for the question and the motion carried.
40. Lloyd Whitman, First, Dry Prong, Chairman, Committee on Committees, presented the Committee on Committees Report as printed on pages 28-29 of the *Book of Reports* and moved the adoption of the report.
41. Waylon Bailey called for the question and the motion carried.
42. Michael Shamblin, LBC First Vice President, pastor, New Prospect, Dry Prong, assumed the chair for this portion of the program.
43. Michael Shamblin called for nominations for Louisiana Baptist Convention President.
44. Lonnie Wascom, messenger, Crossroads, Hammond, nominated Waylon Bailey, pastor, First, Covington, as President.
45. Michael Shamblin called for other nominations. There were none.
46. In compliance with Article VIII, Section 2 of the LBC Constitution, LBC Secretary/Treasurer David Hankins cast a unanimous ballot for Waylon Bailey as President of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.
47. Ken Fryer, Second Vice President, assumed the chair for this portion of the program.
48. Ken Fryer made miscellaneous announcements.
49. Ernse Toepfer, member, First, Eunice, led in the offertory prayer.
50. Keron Jackson, Concert Artist, Dallas, Texas, led in offertory music.
51. Sean Keith, Sunday School/Discipleship Strategist presented a report highlighting the ministries of the Evangelism/Church Growth Team.
52. Rick Byargeon, pastor, Temple, Ruston, and Executive Board President, presented the report from the Executive Board as printed on pages 12-15 of the *Book of Reports*.
53. Rick Byargeon moved the adoption of the 2013 Cooperative Program Budget of \$21,627,235 as printed on page 18 of the *Book of Reports*.
54. Waylon Bailey called for the question. The motion was adopted.
55. Rick Byargeon moved the adoption to amend Article 1, Section 7 of the Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention as printed on page 17 of the *Book of Reports*.
The Convention shall express its official position only through its constitution, bylaws, and resolutions. The acceptance of a report shall not, in the absence of implementing resolutions, be construed as authorizing action by Convention committees, boards, and agencies.
56. Waylon Bailey called for the question. The motion was adopted.
57. Rick Byargeon moved the adoption of the following:
The Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention recommends the adoption of the statement "Expectations of Louisiana Baptist Convention Officers" and the attachment of it as a footnote to Article VIII, Section 2 of the LBC Articles of Incorporation:

Expectations of Louisiana Baptist Convention Officers

The Louisiana Baptist Convention has been blessed across the decades with men who have provided excellent leadership in their elected roles as convention officers. A number of qualities have characterized these leaders and form an example and

a description of the kind of leaders Louisiana Baptists ought to seek in the future, especially for the highest offices:

1. *A vital personal relationship with Jesus Christ that includes public and private devotions and holy living.*
 2. *A belief in the authority and inerrancy of the Bible and agreement with the Convention's confession of faith.*
 3. *A desire to see people come to faith in Christ, and an active participation in personal and congregational evangelism.*
 4. *A commitment to cooperative missions, especially mission endeavors of Louisiana and Southern Baptists as evidenced by strong congregational support of the Cooperative Program.*
 5. *A giftedness and experience in leadership that includes the ability to inspire confidence, build consensus, solve problems, and conduct the work of Louisiana Baptists in an orderly and effective manner.*
58. Ken Fryer, messenger, Heritage, Shreveport, proposed an amendment to #2 of the motion as follows:
- A belief in the authority and inerrancy of the Bible and agreement with the convention's confession of faith which is the Baptist Faith and Message 2000.*
59. Executive Board President Rick Byargeon accepted the motion as a friendly amendment.
60. Waylon Bailey called for the question. The amendment was adopted.
61. Fred Malone, messenger, First, Clinton, asked for clarification as to what is perceived as strong congregational support of the Cooperative Program.
62. Executive Director David Hankins responded that "Expectations of Louisiana Baptist Convention Officers" will be added as a footnote to Article VIII, Section 2 of the LBC Articles of Incorporation. It will be up to the messengers to vote their approval or disapproval of a nominee.
63. Rick Byargeon moved the adoption of the following:
- That the Executive Board grant permission for Louisiana College to enter into a comprehensive \$50,000,000 Capital Campaign to accomplish the deferred maintenance and new construction needs on the Louisiana College campus.*
64. Waylon Bailey called for the question. The motion was adopted.
65. Waylon Bailey announced the formation of the LBC President's 2020 Commission to study where Louisiana Baptists are in 2012 and to develop and recommend a seven year strategy to maximize Louisiana Baptists' effectiveness in ministry.
66. Waylon Bailey announced the offering received was \$1,498.07 for convention offering and \$130.00 for Georgia Barnette State Missions Offering, totaling \$1,628.07.
67. Joe Alain reported that 684 messengers were registered.
68. Perry Hancock, Executive Director, Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries presented the LBCH report. Hancock recognized LBCH trustees for helping to move the Children's Home forward. Hancock reported the Children's Home ministered to 260 children in the past year.
69. Chad Mills, Airline, Bossier City, Chairman, Moral and Social Concerns, presented the Moral and Social Concerns Report as printed on page 40 of the *Book of Reports*. Mills reported that Louisiana had solidified its status as the most pro life state in the United States. Mills expressed appreciation to Kelly Boggs for his help and assistance to the committee and its work.
70. Waylon Bailey called for nominations for First Vice President.
71. David Brown, messenger, Walker, Walker, nominated Richard Blue, pastor, Walker, Walker.
72. There were no other nominees.
73. In compliance with Article VIII, Section 2 of the LBC Constitution, LBC Secretary/Treasurer David Hankins cast a unanimous ballot for Richard Blue as First Vice President of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.

74. Waylon Bailey declared Richard Blue as First Vice President elect of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.
75. Waylon Bailey introduced Chuck Pourciau, pastor, Broadmoor, Shreveport.
76. The Praise Team from Summer Grove, Shreveport, led in special music.
77. Chuck Pourciau, pastor, Broadmoor, Shreveport, preached the Convention sermon using Acts 11:19 as his text.
78. Kevin Hand, pastor, Zoar, Baton Rouge, led in the benediction and the second session adjourned at 11:30 a.m.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON November 13, 2012

79. President Waylon Bailey called the third session of the Annual Meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention to order at 1:55 p.m. A quorum was present.
80. Stuart Graves, messenger, First, Longville, led in the opening prayer.
81. Jerry Price, Chairman Order of Business Committee, presented a report from the Committee on Order of Business in response to the motion presented in Session Two by Ken Fryer, messenger, Heritage, Shreveport, regarding the publication of Resolutions in the *Baptist Message* prior to the convention. The committee recommends that the motion be referred to the Executive Board for the following reasons: 1) requires amendment of LBC Bylaws and 2) needs consideration of potential conflict with 15 day notice requirement and publication deadlines for the *Baptist Message*.
82. Steve Lemke led in a third Bible study time using Matthew 10:7-9 as his text.
83. Steve Lemke, Provost and Professor of Philosophy and Ethics, New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, presented a report from the six southern Baptist seminaries. Lemke stated southern Baptists have six great seminaries. He thanked the messengers for their continued support of the Cooperative Program by Louisiana Baptists.
84. A video presentation highlighting the work of Women's Missions and Ministry was shown.
85. State Women's and Missions Strategist Janie Wise expressed appreciation to messengers for giving to the Georgia Barnette State Missions Offering which makes it possible to reach Louisiana for Christ. She concluded her report with an interview with Kylee Vincent, member, First, Gueydan.
86. Waylon Bailey called for nominations for Second Vice President.
87. Steve Horn, messenger, First, Lafayette, nominated Bert Langley, member, First, Lafayette.
88. Barry Joyner, Temple, Ruston, nominated Dwayne Monk, pastor, New Hope, Choudrant.
89. There were no other nominations.
90. Gevan Spinney, Chairman of the Teller's Committee, gave instructions to messengers for casting their vote for second vice president.
91. Clark Stewart, New Zion, Covington, Chairman, Resolutions Committee, presented the Resolutions Committee Report as found on pages 35-39 of the *Book of Reports*. Stewart stated one change to Resolution Three (the name of Randy Moffett should be changed to Sandra K. Woodley).
92. Fred Malone, messenger, First, Clinton, presented the following substitution amendment to Resolution Five.
That the Louisiana Baptist Convention 2012 affirm the Sinner's Prayer Resolution adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention in June 2012.
93. Clark Stewart, Chairman of the Teller's Committee, responded on behalf of the Committee of Resolutions stating the committee desired the report remain as printed in the *Book of Reports*.

94. Mitch Axsom, messenger, First, Clinton, spoke for the amendment encouraging messengers to vote for the amendment adopted at the SBC in June 2012.
95. Steve Horn, messenger, First, Lafayette, spoke for the original motion. Horn reminded messengers that the original motion was never presented at the Southern Baptist Convention. Horn stated he believes that Louisiana Baptists believe what is contained in the first “whereas”:
God desires for every person to be saved and has made salvation available for any person who hears the Gospel (John 3:16; Romans 10:14-17; 1 Timothy 2:3-4; 2 Peter 3:9, 1 John 2:2)
96. Waylon Bailey called for a raised ballot vote for the amendment. Motion defeated.
97. Waylon Bailey called for a raised ballot vote for the Committee on Resolutions report presented by Chairman Clark Stewart as printed on pages 35-39 of the *Book of Reports*. Motion approved.
98. Louisiana Baptist Foundation Executive Director Wayne Taylor brought a report to the messengers. Taylor reminded messengers that estate planning is Stewardship. Taylor concluded his report with a video “A Legacy of Faith”.
99. Augie Boto, Vice President and General Counsel, SBC Executive Committee, extended greetings to the messengers from Dr. Frank Page. He expressed appreciation to the messengers for their support of the Cooperative Program.
100. Gevan Spinney, messenger, First, Haughton, led in prayer for revival in the hearts of Louisiana Baptists.
101. Gevan Spinney, Chairman of the Teller’s Committee, announced the results of the Second Vice President election. There were 295 votes cast; Dwayne Monk received 168 votes (57.3%) and Bert Langley received 125 votes (42.7%), 2 ballots were not able to be counted.
102. Waylon Bailey declared Dwayne Monk Second Vice President elect of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.
103. Keron Jackson presented special music, “Someone’s Hurting Here”.
104. Using Luke 14 as his text, Johnny Hunt, pastor, First, Woodstock, Georgia, brought the closing message, “Unspoken”.
105. A video presentation was shown highlighting the ministries of the Baptist Collegiate Ministry Team.
106. Roy Davis, messenger, North Shreve, Shreveport, extended an invitation to messengers to participate in an Evangelistic Crusade in the Philippines, January 7-18.
107. Thom Rainer, President, LifeWay Christian Resources, Nashville, Tennessee, brought video greetings to the messengers. Kevin Roberts, LifeWay Representative, presented Waylon Bailey with a gift and expressed appreciation to the messengers for the partnership with LifeWay.
108. David Hankins recognized newly ordained ministers and new ministers to the state of Louisiana and presented them with a gift packet including the book “One Sacred Effort” written by Chad Owen Brand and David E. Hankins.
109. Waylon Bailey recognized outgoing first vice president, Michael Shamblin, and second vice president, Ken Fryer, and presented them a plaque.
110. David Hankins presented Dr. Waylon Bailey, pastor, First, Covington, as president of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.
111. Waylon Bailey recognized newly elected officers First Vice President elect Richard Blue, Walker, Walker, and Second Vice President elect Dwayne Monk, New Hope, Choudrant.
112. Randy Hales, messenger, First, Minden, read a scripture, 1 Timothy 1:12-16 and led in the benediction.
113. President Waylon Bailey adjourned the 165th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention at 4:33 p.m.

As we meet this year, I join our Convention President, Dr. Waylon Bailey, and our Executive Director, Dr. David Hankins, in asking God to bring a great spiritual awakening.

Actions taken by the Executive Board during the year:

Approved the hiring of John Kyle as Director of the Communications Team.
2. **2011 Fourth Quarter Financial Report (5/1/12)**
Received the 2011 Fourth Quarter Executive Board Financial Report.
3. **2012 First Quarter Financial Report (5/1/12)**
Received the 2012 First Quarter Executive Board Financial Report.
4. **Committee on Nominations Report (5/1/12)**
Filled three vacancies on the Louisiana College board of trustees.
5. **LSUA BCM Building Ground Lease (5/1/12)**
Adopted a resolution authorizing Dale Lingenfelter, Business and Information Services Team Director of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, to sign a ground lease with the Board of Supervisors of Louisiana State University and Agricultural and Mechanical College.
6. **Oil and Gas Mineral Lease – Tall Timbers Baptist Convention Center - 9 acres (5/1/12)**

The Convention shall express its official position only through its constitution, bylaws, and resolutions. 13. Executive Board Response to Louisiana Baptist Convention (LBC) Referred Motion (9/25/12)

Adopted the following report presented by the Administrative Study Committee:

Background

Jason Lupo, messenger, Lamar, Delhi, introduced the following motion:

I move that a nominee for the office of LBC president must be a member of a church which contributes at least seven-and-a-half percent of the undesignated receipts through the Cooperative Program. (Proceedings of the 2011 LBC Annual Meeting, Page 43, Item 37 of the LBC Annual Report).

Jerry Price, Chairman Order of Business Committee, presented a report from the Committee on Order of Business in response to the motion presented in Session Two by Jason Lupo, messenger, Lamar, Delhi, regarding nominees for the office of LBC President. Price reported, as the election of the LBC president is governed by the Articles of Incorporation, the Committee on Order of Business in accordance with Article XVII, Section 1, recommends that the motion be placed on the agenda of the 2012 annual meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, be published in full in the annual and be referred to the Executive Board of the Convention for study and recommendation. (Proceedings of the LBC Annual Report, Page 45, Item 84 of the LBC Annual Report)

Report

The Executive Board affirms the spirit of this motion which is to highlight the importance of leaders of this convention modeling enthusiastic support for the Cooperative Program. The Cooperative Program is the primary channel for providing the financial resources that makes all the Louisiana Baptist and Southern Baptist missions and ministries possible. It is not too much to suggest that, without the Cooperative Program, the Louisiana Baptist Convention would be reduced to a mere fellowship of churches with no sustained joint-ministry enterprises.

The role of leadership, especially the President, in relation to the Cooperative Program is crucial. Overseeing the disposition of Cooperative Program dollars through the budgetary process is a primary assignment of the elected leaders of our convention. Also, it is important for leaders to say with words and deeds, “The Cooperative Program is a priority”.

The Executive Board notes, with alarm, a 25-year trend of declining percentage giving from the churches through the Cooperative Program. While the causes of this serious decline are numerous, electing leaders who are weak in CP support is certainly a contributing factor. Historically, the elected officers of the LBC have had a commendable track record in CP support. The CP record for SBC leaders the last 25 years, on the other hand, has been frequently well below average. This practice cannot be good for the future of the Cooperative Program. We are thankful for current initiatives underway at the SBC level to reverse the declines in percentage giving through the Cooperative Program.

While we enthusiastically affirm the need for strong support for the Cooperative Program by convention leaders, the Executive Board, nevertheless, declines to recommend the motion under discussion. We believe it is not the wisest course of action to codify a required percentage of Cooperative Program giving by the church where the presidential nominee is a member. Among the difficulties with such an action are these:

Selecting the particular percentage (should it be 5%? 7.5%? 10%?)

Impossibility of knowing all the various personal and congregational dynamics

Elevating CP support beyond other important measures of cooperation and leadership

Implying the required threshold percentage is the new goal for everyone, thus encouraging minimum, rather than, maximum giving

Rather than adopting a Cooperative Program requirement for nominees, the Executive Board recommends that the LBC pursue a pathway of “persuasion” rather than “legislation.” The churches, and the messengers they send to the annual meetings, have the prerogative to elect leaders who possess all the qualities they desire, including CP support. In order to remind the messengers of the importance of CP giving (as well as other desirable qualities) by those who would lead the Convention, the Executive board offers the following recommendation.

Recommendation

The Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention recommends the adoption of the statement “Expectations of Louisiana Baptist Convention Officers” and the attachment of it as a footnote to Article VIII, Section 2 of the LBC Articles of Incorporation:

Expectations of Louisiana Baptist Convention Officers

The Louisiana Baptist Convention has been blessed across the decades with men who have provided excellent leadership in their elected roles as convention officers. A number of qualities have characterized these leaders and form an example and a description of the kind of leaders Louisiana Baptists ought to seek in the future, especially for the highest offices:

- A vital personal relationship with Jesus Christ that includes public and private devotions and holy living.
- A belief in the authority and inerrancy of the Bible and agreement with the Convention's confession of faith.
- A desire to see people come to faith in Christ, and an active participation in personal and congregational evangelism.
- A commitment to cooperative missions, especially mission endeavors of Louisiana and Southern Baptists as evidenced by strong congregational support of the Cooperative Program.
- A giftedness and experience in leadership that includes the ability to inspire confidence, build consensus, solve problems, and conduct the work of Louisiana Baptists in an orderly and effective manner.

14. Louisiana College Capital Campaign (9/25/12)

Granted permission for Louisiana College to enter into a comprehensive \$50,000,000 Capital Campaign to accomplish deferred maintenance and new construction needs on the Louisiana College campus.

15. Louisiana College Capital Campaign for Student Housing (9/25/12)

Granted permission for Louisiana College to approach the churches of the Louisiana Baptist Convention for \$12,000,000 over the next five years for their prayerful and monetary support for this campaign.

16. Executive Board Adhoc Study Committee (9/25/12)

Approved the appointment of an Adhoc Study Committee by the Executive Board president to study the membership requirements for the Louisiana Baptist Convention.

17. Cass County Oil, Gas and Mineral Lease (9/25/12)

Adopted a resolution authorizing Dale Lingenfelter, Business and Information Services Team Director of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, to sign a three year Oil and Gas Mineral Lease with Stroud Exploration Company, LLC, in regards to 1.2375 mineral acres, located in Cass County Texas, will to the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention under the Will of Ila Thomason Caldwell, Caddo Parish.

18. Sale of Palmetto Property - Lot 22 of Hatfield addition (email poll 10/10/12)

Adopted a resolution authorizing Dale Lingenfelter, Business and Information Services Team Director of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, to sell the Palmetto property, described as lot 22 of Hatfield addition (approximately 1.5 acres), in the town of Palmetto, for the price of \$10,000 and the proceeds of the sale go to the Church Site Corporation for future church sites.

19. LBC President's Commission (11/12/12)

Endorsed the formation of the LBC President's 2020 Commission.

EXECUTIVE BOARD RECOMMENDATION TO THE CONVENTION

1. **2013 Cooperative Program Budget**

That the Louisiana Baptist Convention meeting in West Monroe, Louisiana, November 12-13, 2012, adopt the 2013 Cooperative Program budget of \$21,627,235 as printed on page 18 of the Book of Reports.

2. **LBC Bylaw Amendment**

That the Louisiana Baptist Convention meeting in West Monroe, Louisiana, November 12-13, 2012, amend Article 1, Section 7 of the Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention as follows:

The Convention shall express its official position only through its constitution, bylaws, and resolutions. The acceptance of a report shall not, in the absence of implementing resolutions, be construed as authorizing action by Convention committees, boards, and agencies. ~~and any motions or recommendations pertaining to the appropriation may be called back to the floor for discussion and action with the report of the proper study of the Program Committee.~~

3. **LBC Referred Motion**

The Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention recommends the adoption of the statement “Expectations of Louisiana Baptist Convention Officers” and the attachment of it as a footnote to Article VIII, Section 2 of the LBC Articles of Incorporation

Expectations of Louisiana Baptist Convention Officers

The Louisiana Baptist Convention has been blessed across the decades with men who have provided excellent leadership in their elected roles as convention officers. A number of qualities have characterized these leaders and form an example and a description of the kind of leaders Louisiana Baptists ought to seek in the future, especially for the highest offices:

1. A vital personal relationship with Jesus Christ that includes public and private devotions and holy living.
2. A belief in the authority and inerrancy of the Bible and agreement with the Convention’s confession of faith.
3. A desire to see people come to faith in Christ, and an active participation in personal and congregational evangelism.
4. A commitment to cooperative missions, especially mission endeavors of Louisiana and Southern Baptists as evidenced by strong congregational support of the Cooperative Program.
5. A giftedness and experience in leadership that includes the ability to inspire confidence, build consensus, solve problems, and conduct the work of Louisiana Baptists in an orderly and effective manner.

STATE MISSIONS SERVICES FOR CHURCHES AND ASSOCIATIONS

EXECUTIVE TEAM

David Hankins, Executive Director

Rick Byargeon, pastor of Temple, Ruston, faithfully served as President of the Executive Board this past year. Bob Heustess, pastor of Grace Memorial, Slidell, was Vice President. Both served with diligence and dedication.

The Nominating Committee of the Board assigned members to the four major committees and recommended their officers. David Crosby, pastor of First, New Orleans, served as chairman and John Galey, pastor of Poydras, New Orleans, served as vice chairman.

The work of the Board is divided into four major committees: Administrative, Business and Finance, Properties, and Missions Support. It is through the Administrative Committee that the administrative policies and actions are reviewed and approved. Bob Adams, pastor of First, Bogalusa, served as chairman and Reggie Bridges, pastor of First, Zachary, served as vice chairman. The Business and Finance Committee is responsible for recommending long-range and short-range goals for the Convention, planning and recommending the Convention budget, reviewing and appraising the audits, financial policies and practices of Convention agencies and institutions. Thomas Strong, pastor of Metairie, Metairie, served as chairman and Jeff Smart, pastor of First, Swartz, served as vice chairman. The Missions Support Committee is responsible for reviewing and approving funds for mission budget supplements, church loans, and special requests from missions for financial assistance. Mike Hawkins, pastor of Heflin, Heflin, served as chairman. Joe Pool, pastor of Beauregard Friendship, DeRidder, served as vice chairman. The Properties Committee is responsible for properties owned or leased by the Executive Board. Tommy Middleton, member of Woodlawn, Baton Rouge, served as chairman and Rick Aultman, pastor of Mangham, Mangham, served as vice chairman.

The Executive Assistant serves as the liaison to the directors of missions. Dr. Wayne Sheppard and Dr. David Hankins continually work toward strengthening partnerships with associations and Directors of Missions. The annual Director of Missions retreat hosted by Dr. Hankins and Dr. Sheppard was held in Natchez, MS with 18 Directors of Missions present.

The annual **Associational Leadership Planning Conference (ALPC)** was conducted at First Baptist Church, Pineville in April with more than 150 in attendance. Key associational leaders were updated on all LBC and SBC programs and processes. Dr. Jim Slack was the main presenter.

The LBC Annual, Church Planning Guide and Book of Reports are also edited and produced by the Executive Office.

Partnership Missions is led by Dr. Wayne Sheppard. In facilitating churches for Acts 1:8 missions partnerships, People Group Networks drive the key strategy. Global advancement is being impacted by networks such as Haiti, Merida, Native Peoples, Peru, French Acadiana, Wales and others.

BUSINESS & INFORMATION SERVICES TEAM

Dale D. Lingenfelter, Director

The Business and Information Services Team serves as a support group for all the work of the LBC State Missions Services. The team provides expertise in the areas of financial accounting, information technology, facilities maintenance, office services and human resources. Our goal is to enhance and support the work of all LBC Teams so they accomplish the missions and ministry goals of the Convention.

Renovations to the Baptist Building continued this year to the first and second floor suites. Tom Carpenter, Facilities Maintenance Team Leader, and his staff worked diligently to enhance and maintain the building and the surrounding properties.

In addition to coordinating the Annual Church Profile (ACP) process for the state, Shana Johnson serves as Information Services Support Manager and is responsible for the overall information support systems of the Convention. Through her team's effort along with assistance from the entire State Mission Services Staff, ACP reporting maintains an above average reporting percentage of 92.2% of LBC churches reporting. Also congratulations to the Associational Clerks from 20 Associations who had 100% reporting.

The LBC Accounting Team, led by Rusty Johnson, continued to focus on getting the most out of the new accounting system. Further improvements were made to reporting and access to information for State Mission Services staff and LBC churches. The Accounting Department's focus on accuracy, timeliness and integrity, resulted in LBC receiving an excellent yearly audit report.

Tall Timbers' Director, Sam White, and his staff continue to serve the churches of the Louisiana Baptist Convention by providing a place for retreats, conferences, camps, seminars, and other events. This is accomplished by programs sponsored by Louisiana Baptist Convention entities, Tall Timbers, and church groups who provide their own programs. We again saw tremendous increases in attendance in our summer camps for youth and children in 2011. Many people are making life-changing decisions for God at Tall Timbers each year. This year, we began construction of a new maintenance shop which will free up the old shop to be converted to a much needed cabin to allow us to house more children and youth at our camps and retreats.

The Business and Information Services Team considers all of its various areas of support work as ministry unto the Lord. We count it a privilege to serve our Lord by serving our colleagues and Louisiana Baptists in the work of reaching Louisiana for Christ and strengthening our churches.

COLLEGIATE MINISTRY TEAM

Mark Robinson, Collegiate Team Director

The last year has proven to be a large step forward for BCM while we have revisited the strengths of our past. The traditional summer missions program has been updated and renamed to fit this generation. Collegiate missions experiences have been evolving over the last 25 years to include short-term strategic trips year round. Our program has been renamed GOLA (standing for Go Louisiana). Twenty collegiate missionaries were sent to an interior Chinese province to share the story of Jesus Christ over the Christmas holidays with university students and professors. This program is called Christmas in China or CIC. As a result of their efforts, seven nationals have followed Christ and are now in Bible study. Also, we mobilized two teams of six students to work with churches right here in Louisiana. These teams are called the GOLA VBS teams.

For the last four years, we have seen amazing results from the ministry. These students have worked alongside church staff and leaders to reach children in our state. This upcoming year, our GOLA teams will focus on Louisiana VBS, Ohio evangelism, New York inner city ministry, New England church planting, Portugal American football clinic evangelism, Greece evangelism and poverty ministry, and Wales church enhancement.

On Campus BCM ministry reaches over 35,000 students each year with an evangelical influence for Christ on our own campuses. Last year, 584 souls were saved through the local BCM ministries. There are so many stories of students that have given their lives to Christ to follow as a disciple, to serve in ministry and to share the gospel.

We have three new BCM directors this year. Lance Wright, a Louisiana native and former Grambling Tiger football player, is serving at his Alma Mater beginning his first fall semester as you read this report. Jonathan Clark served at Louisiana Tech as Associate BCM director under Linda Osborne and Kevin Inman. He is doing an amazing work at Southeastern Louisiana State BCM. Finally, Jonathan Lafleur is serving at his Alma Mater, following in his father's footsteps at Nichols State. Jonathan brings a fresh energized ministry to the campus while maintaining a love for the Lord and His word that transforms a campus.

I am frequently in meetings around the country where people mention the commitment that the Louisiana Baptist Convention has for reaching the college campus. The leadership of our Executive Director Dr. Hankins has empowered us to be bold with the Gospel in the marketplace of ideas called the university campus. I am grateful to be able to serve with people of such vision and passion.

COMMUNICATIONS TEAM

John Kyle, Director

The Communications Team of the LBC transitioned leadership in 2012 as Dr. John Yeats was called to serve as the Executive Director of the Missouri Baptist Convention and John Kyle was called to lead the team in February. John Kyle came to Louisiana from Nashville where he served 12 years as the Director of Cooperative Program for the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention. Prior to serving in Nashville, John served on the staff of Trinity Baptist in Lake Charles for 10 years.

In addition to the above changes, long-time employee Danny Nation retired after 28 years of faithful service to our Lord and Louisiana Baptists. Danny's most recent title was Media Production Strategist. He will be missed and has begun a "second career" with a local I.T. company in Pineville.

Two strategies will direct the Communications Team moving forward. The Internal Communications Strategy seeks to better serve the promotional and communication needs of all LBC teams as well as increasing the effectiveness of communication between the LBC and local churches. In the spring of 2012, a pastor's communication survey was conducted for all Louisiana pastors, full-time and bi-vocational. Over 420 pastors responded, primarily online. However, less than one dozen hard copies of the survey were also submitted. Results indicated three primary ways in which the majority of the pastors wish to receive communication from the LBC. They include emails, the e-newsletter and the website. The results were broken down by size of church, size of city, and the age of the pastor. The goal of the internal strategy is to increase the quality, efficiency and effectiveness of all the communications coming from the LBC.

The External Communications Strategy seeks to implement a 21st century version of Jesus' command to "go into the highways and hedges and compel them to come in" (Luke 14:23). It is our calling to reach Louisiana; therefore, how can we impact and influence every person in the state with the Gospel? The External Strategy has three primary goals. First, impact and influence those in Louisiana who do not have a relationship with Christ. We cannot tell them what to think, but we can give them some things to think about. The second goal is to embolden the witness of believers and create opportunities to share their faith. Thirdly, it is the intent of this strategy to drive people to local churches. The goal is to have someone in the pew of the average church on a regular basis because of what they've seen, what they've heard, or what they've read. Preparations for the first pilot market in southwest Louisiana are under way with a tentative start date in early 2013.

Matthew 21:10, NIV, reminds us "when Jesus entered Jerusalem the entire city was stirred and asked 'Who is this?'" It is our intent, in God's strength and God's wisdom, to stir this state for Christ.

Your prayers are requested and needed as these strategies are fleshed out and implemented.

EVANGELISM-CHURCH GROWTH TEAM

Wayne Jenkins, Director

Keith Manuel, Evangelism Associate

In cooperation with the other Louisiana Baptist Convention teams and the 43 associations, we assist local churches as catalysts, consultants and conduits in all areas of evangelism, Sunday School, discipleship and age-graded ministries.

God's Plan for Sharing (GPS) 2020, the national evangelistic initiative is allowing Louisiana Baptists to affect lostness in our state. The next phase of *GPS* leads churches to embrace a day or season of service by doing servant evangelism projects in their communities. Training for churches and associations will be available.

Louisiana College hosted the Evangelism Conference this year, which had an approximate attendance of 2,500. Next year's conference will be hosted by First Lafayette, January 28-29, 2013.

Crossover Northshore, a one-day evangelistic thrust, assisted local churches in evangelistic training and saw 300 decisions made during the activities. In 2012, churches in the Monroe area will host Crossover.

Sean Keith is the Sunday School/Discipleship Strategist. This year he launched the Expect More campaign, which includes three primary strategies (www.LBC.org/expectmore). The first strategy provided resources to train Sunday School leaders, which are available at www.LBC.org/awakenandgo. The second strategy was to conduct a Sunday School webcast based on the theme Awaken & GO. The final strategy was to provide age-group training in 20 locations. Resources are available from the 2011 emphasis at www.LBC.org/vibrant.

Jeff Ingram, serving as the Adult Ministry Strategist, coordinates the work of Sunday School, discipleship, and other ministries focused on adults. Under his leadership, the annual January Bible Study and Doctrine Study preview events held across the state have continued to grow.

The Senior Adult Luncheon at the Evangelism Conference registered over 400 in attendance. Several fellowships for ministers and leaders of Adults 55+ have occurred this year.

The GOLA VBS teams helped lead in sixteen churches this summer; 657 children attended with eleven decisions made during their church's VBS.

David Anderson is completing his first full year as the Children's Ministry Strategist. He led Pre-Teen Invasion, which was held at Louisiana College in January with more than 1,200 children in grades 4-6 attending.

Vacation Bible School trainings were held at Summer Grove Baptist Church in Shreveport and Jefferson Baptist Church in Baton Rouge.

The annual Childhood Education Workshops were at Cypress Baptist Church in Benton and at the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary.

Kevin Boles, Youth Ministry Strategist, coordinates work to reach, teach, and equip teenagers and their adult leaders. In addition to assisting with regional training events, the Youth Ministry Strategy office conducted individual and associational Youth Ministry consultations and Youth Sunday School leadership training conferences.

The Youth Ministry Strategy office produced two and a half consecutive weeks of Clear Youth Camp at Tall Timbers in July and saw record-setting attendance of more than 700 teenagers and leaders. This office continues to produce the largest ministry event within the Louisiana Baptist Convention, the Youth Evangelism Celebration (YEC). Attendance at the November 2011 event was 6,982. It was the second largest attendance in the history of the YEC.

MISSIONS AND MINISTRY TEAM

John D. Hebert, Director

The 2011 Missions and Ministries team is comprised of Church Planting, Ministry Evangelism, Mission Builders, Men's Ministry/Disaster Relief, and Women's Missions and Ministry under the leadership of John Hebert, Team Leader for Missions and Ministries. During 2012 the primary focus of the church planting and ministry personnel has been in the development of the 10-3-1 strategies across south Louisiana. In 2012, development was done in all of the southern Associations including BASELA, Bayou, BAGBR, Evangeline, Acadia, and Carey. Church Planting and Ministry starts have resulted from the strategies developed both this year and last. Dr. James Jenkins has led in our development of demographic studies and Dr. Jeff Cook has led in Compassion Ministries with Rev. Larry Badon in Church Planting.

To equip, enable and encourage is always the goal of Women's Missions and Ministry. In 2011 and 2012, increased involvement of women, teens and children in both women's ministry and WMU organizations has been the result. (An increased membership in Acteens is the first of several years.) As we participate in Awaken, the passion for missions and discipleship is strengthening women's work in our churches. Registration at our events, beginning with Ministers' Wives' Retreat in October 2011, has been higher. The work of our Sanctity of Human Life/Pregnancy Resource consultant has raised the level of our active involvement in this ministry and others.

Louisiana Baptists mission's offerings continue to be generously and sacrificially given.

Disaster Relief and Men's Ministry continue to experience new heights as different kinds of disasters take place across the US. Texas had wildfires which destroyed over 1,800 homes and our chainsaw recovery teams learned a new skill, ash-out. This skill set became more valuable as the need occurred again in Oklahoma with wildfires destroying 300 plus homes in Tulsa and Noble, OK. It is amazing to see how God continues to open doors for Louisiana Baptist Disaster Relief volunteers to minister through assisting those who need help to get through difficult times.

A new temporary childcare unit is being developed and will be the first of its kind in Louisiana. There are only 24 across the SBC. This will open still more ways for us to minister to hurting people. In the DR ministry we have trained over 300 new volunteers and we have added four new units. Our state coordinator for chaplains James Carson was awarded the Joel Phillips Lifetime Achievement Award at the national roundtable held in Des Moines, Iowa.

Royal Ambassadors had a successful year with the largest attendance in recent years at RA Camp held at Tall Timbers. Along with the high attendance, there were 23 professions of faith recorded with 19 different churches participating. Also a new feature was added to RA's, Camperee, held at Camp Harris in north Louisiana.

The Mission Builder program assists Mission Churches with their first unit buildings. We also assist various churches in their many construction and ministry needs throughout the state. Mission Service Corps Project Coordinators, Steve & Susan Hayes, Jim & Ivy Wyble, and Bill & Joyce Temple, are critical to the program. Projects for 2012 included Bethel Baptist Church, Kentwood; Chappapeela Baptist Church, Amite; First Baptist Church, Bernice Spanish Mission, Bernice; Grace Baptist Church, Baton Rouge; Lighthouse Baptist Church, Krotz Springs; St. Clare Baptist Church, Gardner; Teche Baptist Church, Breaux Bridge; Victory Baptist Church, Walker; Watson Baptist Church, Denham Springs; Westside Baptist Church, Ferriday; and the Delta Store Front Ministry, Ferriday. We also have a continuing partnership with Canadian Baptist Builders. Mission Service Corps Project Coordinators supervised hundreds of volunteer builders who put in thousands of man-hours on various projects.

PASTORAL LEADERSHIP TEAM

Bill Robertson, Director

The vision for the Pastoral Leadership Team is to ensure that there is no church without a leader, no leader without training, and no pastor or staff member without a friend. Together, our team seeks to be a friend to every staff person; a training resource for every staff member and resource provider for every church.

The PLT responds to crisis needs of ministers and families as well as the local church through conflict coaching, financial assistance and a ministry of Pastoral Leadership Team. Our ministry is dedicated to: support of internet resume referral service, pastoral encouragement and professional counseling in cooperation with Granberry Counseling Centers, ministry to terminated pastors and staff, ministry to pastors, staff, and churches in conflict, ministry to retired ministers and their families, and continuing education seminars, conferences, and retreats.

The year 2012 witnessed the launch of the “Louisiana Baptist Church Administration Network,” a comprehensive strategy that provides administrative resources to help churches pursue their mission efficiently and effectively. Volunteers preached 58 Sundays for Louisiana pastors through “The Shepherd’s Rest,” which provides a brief one-month sabbatical for pastors at little or no cost to the church. Stacy Morgan, church administration strategist, provides a variety of seminars and workshops to help churches with documentation, deacon ministry models, pastor/staff search committee training, and ministry assistant training. He also serves as the Louisiana state representative for GuideStone Financial Resources.

Benjamin Harlan is our Worship Arts Strategist. The multi-faceted music and drama ministry annually equips and offers support to hundreds of people in music leadership roles as they bring glory to God and bless His church.

We had another banner year with our Keyboard Festivals. There were a total of 593 students participating representing 100 churches. Our keyboard area, under the direction of Teresa Thomason continues to be one of our best avenues for reaching youth and making an impact with Louisiana Baptist churches.

Neva Haley directed our Children’s Honor Choir. There were 101 children in attendance along with 35 sponsors, representing 19 churches. The great weekend concluded with a concert at First Baptist Church, Pineville. Children’s consultant, Bonnie Beeman, continues to elicit a high level of excitement for our children and those who work with them.

Patti Yeats, drama consultant, reports that this year’s drama festival was held along with our Louisiana Baptist Church Music Conference at Calvary Baptist Church in Alexandria. There were over 100 participants representing 30 churches. In addition to various music and drama break-out groups, the conference included outstanding worship gatherings that featured excellent musical and dramatic presentations.

Under the direction of Herb Armentrout, our All State Youth Choir continues to bless our convention and churches. Thirty-five churches were represented by the 93-voice choir that toured Oklahoma City, Ok, Albuquerque, NM, and Santa Fe, NM – performing at least 3 concerts daily. The tour concluded with a concert to a packed house at First Baptist Church, Pineville.

Eddie Dehondt and Gary Mitchell work with 1,243 churches within the LBC that are considered “Smaller Churches”. Most of the pastors of these churches are bivocational and are among the approximately 37,000 smaller church pastors in the SBC. Eddie and Gary work closely with the Directors of Missions and the staff at LBC to assist and affirm these Iron Men in Louisiana.

Baptist Message480,389

The *Baptist Message* is the news journal of the Louisiana Baptist Convention with an average distribution of 45,000 (approximately 30,000 subscriptions provided by LBCLive.) Its support is derived from subscriptions by churches and individuals, the Cooperative Program, and advertising.

Louisiana Baptist Children's Home482,543

The Children's Home exists to provide a program of Christian childcare. The goal is to prepare each boy and girl entrusted to its care the life skills to make his/her contribution to society as an effective Christian citizen. LBCH receives its support from gifts and grants, revenues from assets, designations from churches and church groups, the special children's home offering each spring and the Cooperative Program.

Louisiana Baptist Foundation254,196

The Foundation is responsible for receiving, managing and administering funds and properties on behalf of the Convention and its causes. It receives its support from investments and the Cooperative Program.

Louisiana College3,224,853

Louisiana College, the only institution of higher education operated by Louisiana Baptists, engages in a program of providing instruction for candidates seeking undergraduate degrees. It receives its support from the Cooperative Program, student fees, auxiliary enterprises, gifts and grants dividends and interest, and special fund campaigns.

Convention Operating, Guidestone Protection Benefits and State

Mission Services9,239,408

This allocation contains the funds budgeted for Convention operations, Guidestone Protection Benefits and state mission services. The Mission Services funding contains the resources for all of the LBC ministry teams and their departments of work that serves Louisiana Baptist churches. These funds include, but are not limited to, special projects, Baptist Collegiate Ministries, accounting, stewardship and Cooperative Program promotion resources, Sunday School/ Discipleship, age graded ministries, Disaster Relief ministries, Tall Timbers Conference Center, church administration strategist, church planting, evangelism equipping, women's missions and ministries and Convention operations.

BAPTIST MESSAGE

When messengers to the 1886 Louisiana Baptist Convention Annual Meeting overwhelming voted to begin a convention newspaper, the seed was planted for what would eventually become the *Baptist Message*.

Originally known as the *Baptist Chronicle*, the publication was adopted as the LBC's official news journal in 1887. According to the book *House on a Rock: About Southern Baptists in Louisiana*, the periodical "was devoted to Baptist causes in Louisiana." The name was changed to the *Baptist Message* when the LBC purchased the publication in 1919.

For 126 years, the *Baptist Message* has sought to be faithful in reporting on ministries, missions and issues of interests to Louisiana Southern Baptists. The Message has also sought to support and promote the LBC and its entities: Louisiana Baptist Children's Home, Louisiana Baptist Foundation and Louisiana College.

Since the time of the LBC's purchase of the paper in 1919, the *Baptist Message* has only had five editors. Three of these five leaders guided the paper for a total of 84 years. Finley Tinnin was at the helm of the paper for 37 years; James Cole guided the *Message* for 20 years; Lynn Clayton was editor of the LBC's official news journal for 27 years.

While each editor placed his unique stamp on the *Baptist Message*, every man led the paper in a manner that produced a publication characterized by journalistic and fiscal integrity. Each editor also had to address unique challenges while at the helm of the *Message*.

The more things change the more, it seems, they remain the same. The *Baptist Message* strives to continue the legacy of quality journalism and financial integrity. The newspaper also has the unique challenge of navigating a constantly changing media landscape and less than stable economy.

The *Baptist Message* has attempted to respond to the demand for digital content via its website. The Internet presence of the *Message* is under constant evaluation and is updated when possible. The paper is also in the process of developing an app that will be available on the iPhone and iPad.

The *Baptist Message* continues to serve those who prefer a print product. As a result, approximately 40,000 people receive the paper via conventional mail on bi-weekly publishing schedule. Additionally, every pastor of an LBC church receives the paper and several churches utilize the print edition of the *Baptist Message* to deliver their newsletter to their members.

A challenging economy has also been an issue for the *Baptist Message*. Rising costs related to producing the print product and continuing rate increases by the U.S. Post Office have been ongoing challenges. However, God has provided for the Message via the Cooperative Program, the paper's faithful subscribers (which include many churches) and loyal advertisers. God's faithfulness coupled with responsible stewardship has allowed the *Baptist Message* to be financially stable while not raising the price of subscriptions.

The *Baptist Message* is committed to helping the churches of the LBC impact the world for Christ. Thank you Louisiana Baptists for supporting the *Baptist Message* in this commitment and thank you for your faithful support of the Cooperative Program. When it comes to impacting the world for Christ, we truly accomplish more by working together than we ever could by working alone.

LOUISIANA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME AND FAMILY MINISTRIES

Dr. Perry Hancock, President and CEO

In its 113th year of ministry, Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries continued moving forward with its mission to provide love, care and a positive Christian witness for children and families in need. The Children's Home staff served through its residential child and family care programs, Sellers Maternity Ministries, and its Granberry Counseling Centers.

In 2012 the Children's Home provided ministry services for over 2,400 children, families, and individuals. Through its residential and off-campus ministries, LBCH served 266 children and their families. One hundred and twenty-two children lived in residential foster and family care. The Children's Home also provided 37 women with job skills training through Christian Women's Job Corps.

Sellers Maternity Ministries provided a pro-life witness for over 600 women through its Mobile Pregnancy Care Center. Sellers also maintained its support of a Crisis Pregnancy Consultant in partnership with the LBC Missions and Ministry Division. In 2012 Children's Home Trustees voted to transition Sellers Maternity Home to a maternity foster home model. The goal is to provide residential care statewide for more young women facing a crisis pregnancy. The new model also provides for a more extended aftercare period for mothers who choose to parent their children. The Children's Home is now searching for Baptist couples who feel that they could serve in this important area of ministry.

The Granberry Counseling Centers staff provided professional Christian counseling for 1,314 individuals during the year. Through its Minister Care program, a partnership with the Pastoral Leadership Division of LBC, Granberry provided counseling for 60 Louisiana Baptist ministers and their families.

In 2012 the Children's Home expanded its foster care and adoption ministry by placing LBCH social workers in Alexandria and Baton Rouge. Twenty-three foster children were served through a partnership with First Baptist Church of New Orleans. The Children's Home also provided adoption services for 12 Louisiana Baptist couples. The goal of the Louisiana Baptist Foster and Adoption Network is to provide Baptist homes for as many children as possible. The Children's Home can provide a local church with training to develop foster care and adoption ministries.

In 2012 the Children's Home launched its new international orphan care ministry. The short-term mission trips will support existing Baptist ministries and establish new works through a partnership with the state convention and LBC churches. Sixty Louisiana Baptists served on the first trip to Guatemala in June, ministering to over 200 children at a malnutrition center and in the local community.

In 2012 Louisiana churches provided support for the Home through the Annual Children's Home Sunday Offering. The offering provides for many of the critical needs the children have during the year. Churches also continued to support children and families at the Home through the Fall Food Roundup which provides all of the non-perishable foods needed for the entire year. In the summer, churches from across Louisiana donated their VBS offerings to support the children. Many churches provided additional support in various ways throughout the year and God used LBC Cooperative Program giving from the churches to share His love with those in need.

As a result of the support from our churches and the great witness provided by the various ministries of the Home, many experienced the joy of salvation in Christ and received real hope for life and life eternal. Thank you Louisiana Baptists for meeting needs and changing lives through your Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries.

The Louisiana Baptist Foundation was chartered in 1944 as a non-profit agency of the Louisiana Baptist Convention to encourage giving to the Louisiana Baptist Convention and Southern Baptist Convention and to provide investment management and trust administration services for churches, institutions and ministries of Louisiana Baptists, as well as for individuals who wish to sustain Baptist ministries into the future. The Foundation is governed by a board of twelve trustees elected by the Convention and two ex-officio trustees who are Convention officers and receives approximately 40% of its operational funding from the Cooperative Program.

The Foundation continued to promote and receive gifts on behalf of or designated for Baptist churches, institutions, and causes. Promotion of giving was accomplished through advertising and articles in the *Baptist Message* as well as through seminars and speaking engagements, all with the theme “Estate Planning is Stewardship”! These gifts are channeled through Gift Annuities, Bequests, Donor Advised Funds, Charitable Remainder Trusts and Pass Through gifts.

Some 2011 highlights included:

- *429 Louisiana Baptist churches, agencies and institutions had over \$57 million on deposit in the Foundation's Short Term Fund (STF) at December 31, 2011. The STF provides a savings account option with instant liquidity and still offers a competitive interest rate. Other added benefits of using the STF include the ACH electronic transfer system and the monthly e-mail statement service. Churches using these services benefit from the convenience and quicker reporting.*
- *Gifts, bequests and trusts received by the Louisiana Baptist Foundation for the support of Christian ministry totaled \$920,801 in 2011. Every gift is significant because it supports ministries that spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Some examples are highlighted below:*
 - *Assisted a local couple in establishing their Wills that, after providing gifts to several family members, will leave 25% of their estate to several Baptist ministries.*
 - *Helped a church establish a scholarship fund that will provide scholarships to Louisiana students at all six SBC seminaries.*
 - *Completed the succession of a long time Foundation client who left behind a strong legacy of service to the Lord as well as \$252,000 for the mission efforts she loved.*

In its 106th year Louisiana College, your college, continued to fulfill The Great Commission through its ***Unchanging Foundations since 1906*** theme. We continue to grow and thrive as a distinctively Christian college, grounded in the preeminence of Jesus Christ, the authority of the Scriptures and academic excellence and a passion to change the world for Christ by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Campus News, Enrollment and Faculty Growth

This fall semester Louisiana College opened its 6th housing complex, Ware Street Apartments. WSA is apartment style living and houses up to 45 male students. WSA is the second phase of a 4 phase process with two more buildings scheduled to be built in the near future.

For the first time in Louisiana College history there have been over 300 freshman in back to back years from all over the world have chosen Louisiana College for their undergraduate studies.

In addition, forty-seven new faculty and staff members have been hired this year. The College maintains a faculty to student ratio of 17:1.

Louisiana College has been named the No. 12 “Most Conservative College” in the United States according to *Newsweek* as part of “2012’s Best Colleges For You”, its third annual college rankings report. Louisiana College is the most conservative Southern Baptist college in the United States according to the *Newsweek* report. Louisiana College has also been named one of America’s Best Christian Colleges by Institutional Research & Evaluation.

International Missions and Partnerships

Louisiana College is living out The Great Commission. Faculty, staff, and students participated in international and home mission projects across Louisiana, China, Uganda, India, Ecuador, Belgium, England, France, Solomon Islands, Turkey, and many more places across the world.

- LC student, Candice Carr, went to the Solomon Islands for the summer with Wycliffe Bible translators to translate scripture into local languages.
- An LC graduate taught English for a year in Haining, China. He’ll be going back to Horizon for at least another year.
- Continued partnerships with several universities in mainland China and high schools in South Korea as well as our educational mission projects in Tanzania.
- LC has hosted approximately 100 students and 50 faculty from partner international schools on our campus in 2011-2012. We’ll be hosting approximately the same amount in 2012-2013.
- A visiting Chinese nursing professor from Zibo Nursing Institute has been on our campus since January. The Gospel has been shared with her many times since she has been here and has formed great friendships with our Chinese faculty. She recently became a follower of Christ.
- The Louisiana Collegiate International Academy has eleven Chinese high school students attending this fall.

School of Divinity

The Caskey School of Divinity begins its second year this fall with 85 students, which is an increase of 36 students from last fall. Each semester Caskey School of Divinity students share in their communities. In the fall semester Divinity school students shared the Gospel

1265 times and in the spring semester an additional 648 times. Through the sharing of the Gospel by these students there have been over 200 professions of faith.

The Caskey School of Divinity is named after a Southern Baptist minister who tirelessly worked and evangelized in Louisiana. Most classes are offered through a unique delivery system including the evenings, weekends, and over holidays. The Caskey family has made it possible for qualified students who are admitted to pursue the degree programs tuition free.

Nursing, Medicine, and Allied Health

Nursing continues to be the largest undergraduate major offered at Louisiana College with demand for the Bachelor of Science in Nursing. Interest in the accelerated BSN, for students holding a previous bachelor's degree, remains strong and continues to rise. Over the past two years the students on the accelerated BSN route have had a 100% first time pass rate for each cohort sitting the NCLEX professional licensure examination. This exceptional success rate has helped to push the overall first time success rate for the NCLEX professional qualification for the Division of Nursing to 96% for the latest academic year. The continued success of the nursing program has started to attract increasing interest from students outside Louisiana and there is already a heavy demand for the nursing program for the upcoming academic year.

The Division of Nursing promotes nursing as a ministry for Jesus Christ and hosts two Faith and Health Care symposia each year that focus on the spiritual dimension of health care. Louisiana College continues to operate a nurse-led clinic as LC Family Health on campus that serves the public with quality health care. Nursing faculty who are credentialed nurse practitioners treat patients from the public and College employees in the walk-in clinic on campus, share Christ's love and provide supervised clinical practice opportunities for nursing students. A re-launch with standardized hours and financial links with Bayou Health and other key funding partnerships will help to establish a client base for the clinic.

UPDATE FROM LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION ARCHIVES

**Louisiana Baptists 1812-2012 – an early
historical perspective from the Library and Archives.**

In the early 1800s it was mandatory for anyone living in Louisiana to follow Bienville's Black Code, the preaching of Catholicism only. A number of Baptist preachers crossed into southeast Louisiana (then known as the Florida Parishes) and ministered in peril defying Catholic Authority. The first Baptist preacher, not to be deterred, was Bailey E. Chaney who secretly crossed into southeastern Louisiana to embrace the task God had bestowed upon him. Ezra Courtney, Jesse Young, and Moses Hadley were others that followed Chaney's lead. The first Baptist church in this struggling area was Half Moon Bluff in Washington Parish, organized on October 12, 1812. Also organized in this area were Mt. Nebo (1813), Peniel (1813), Hepzibah (1814), and Sharon (1818). The Florida Parishes' boundary dispute wasn't settled until a treaty in 1819, and then Louisiana was whole.

The United States bought the land known as the Louisiana Purchase in 1803 from France. Catholicism was exclusive and not to be questioned. God's hand was leading Baptists as they first appeared in Louisiana west of the Mississippi River in what was called the 'Opelousas region', now Evangeline Parish. In 1804 Joseph Willis, the 'Apostle to the Opelousas', arrived preaching the first gospel and establishing the first church west of the Mississippi River, Calvary in Bayou Chicot, now Ville Platte, organized on November 13, 1812. Ezekiel O'Quin, who settled in Rapides Parish, joined Willis in 1815. Progress was slow with only ten preachers, eight churches, and 150 members in the first 20 years in the area. Willis was also instrumental in establishing Beulah in Cheneyville (1816), and churches in Debourn, Vermillion, and Plaquemine.

Settling in North Louisiana, the first Baptist preacher seems to have been James Brinson, who came from Tennessee in 1820 and organized the Pine Hills church in the Natchitoches Parish area. Near Minden, Newitt Drew organized Black Lake church in 1823.

Some of the first Louisiana associations were Louisiana Association organized October 31, 1818, Concord Association on November 3, 1832, and the Eastern Louisiana Association in November, 1842. There was no unifying factor among the scattered Baptists in Louisiana until the organization of our state convention on December 2, 1848 at Mt. Lebanon church.

We have an exciting and noble history and thanks to God's blessing and visionary leadership, Louisiana Baptists now number in excess of 545,300 people who worship in 1,600 churches and missions. Two hundred years following the exploits of believers who faced religious and cultural adversity, Louisiana Baptists continue to spread and celebrate His Word across the globe.

COMMITTEE ON MORAL AND SOCIAL CONCERNS

The Committee on Moral and Social Concerns seeks to impact the culture of our state with a message of scriptural truth and a biblical worldview.

The spring meeting of the committee was held in Baton Rouge. After a morning meeting at a local hotel, the committee convened at the Capitol for a meeting with Governor Bobby Jindal in his office. The Governor entertained questions from the committee members, discussed his priorities as related to social/moral issues and expressed thanks for the ministry of Louisiana Baptists.

The committee met at the Baptist Building in Alexandria for its summer meeting and worked on resolutions of a moral and social nature. These were submitted for the Convention's consideration through the report of the Resolutions Committee.

Kelly Boggs, Director of the Convention's Office of Public Affairs, represented the LBC at the Capitol during the 2012 legislative session in Baton Rouge. Boggs provided a voice for Louisiana Baptists and advocated for biblically based values. Through collaboration with other advocacy groups, he was engaged in tracking and responding to several significant moral and social issues that impact our freedoms, families, churches and communities.

Louisiana solidified its status as the most pro-life state in America by passing two laws, Senate Bills 593 and 330, designed to further protect the unborn child in the womb. SB 592, sponsored by Senator John Alario of Westwego, prohibits abortion after 20 weeks gestation. SB 330, sponsored by Senator Rick Ward of Port Allen, criminalizes the act of performing where the abortionist is not a physician licensed by the State of Louisiana to practice medicine.

Anti-bullying was a prominent subject during the legislative session. House Bill 407, which became HB 1214 and was sponsored by Representative Pat Smith of Baton Rouge, sought to address bullying by focusing on perceived or actual characteristics and included gender expression and sexual orientation. HB 407 was defeated in the House Education Committee. Senate Bill 764, introduced by Senator Rick Ward, was comprehensive legislation that stated all bullying is wrong, regardless of motivation. It included training for public school teachers to assist in recognizing when bullying is taking place. SB 764 was passed and signed into law.

An attempt was made in the Senate to repeal the Louisiana Science Education Act. Signed into law in 2008, the act fosters an environment within public schools that promotes critical thinking, logical analysis and objective discussion of controversial scientific theories. Opponents of the act, who take umbrage to the fact it allows for a critical discussion of evolution, introduced Senate Bill 374 which called for the repeal of the act. The legislation was defeated in the Senate Education Committee.

The aforementioned legislative victories and defeats are just a few of the issues that were addressed during the 2012 legislative session. The Moral and Social Concerns Committee works with the LBC Office of Public Affairs to insure Louisiana Baptists have a voice in matters that affect our families, churches and communities.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that we, the messengers of this 165th session of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, meeting in West Monroe, Louisiana, November 12-13, 2012, express to each of the above our deepest heartfelt gratitude.

RESOLUTION 2: ON PROTECTING RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

WHEREAS, God has made the human conscience inviolable (Romans 2:14–15; 1 Corinthians 4:3–5; 8:12; 10:29); and

WHEREAS, God has granted to all human beings the freedom to worship Him or not to worship Him according to the dictates of their consciences (Matthew 23:37; Revelation 3:20); and

WHEREAS, History is replete with examples of the disastrous results of governmental efforts to interfere with individual conscience and religious belief; and

WHEREAS, Our Baptist forebears suffered great persecution from civil authorities, including beatings, imprisonment, and death because of their commitment to the inviolable nature of conscience and faith; and

WHEREAS, The First Amendment to the United States Constitution protects United States citizens from any interference by the Federal Government in their “free exercise” of religion; and

WHEREAS, The Department of Health and Human Services has determined that all health care plans under the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA) must provide free of charge contraceptives and abortion causing drugs and devices, even if such provisions violate the faith convictions of religious employers, health plan providers, and participants; and

WHEREAS, President Obama and his administration are requiring health plans under PPACA to maintain a separate abortion fund supported by a premium surcharge on health plan participants regardless of their religiously-informed convictions about abortion; and

WHEREAS, The Justice Department (Hosanna-Tabor Evangelical Lutheran Church and School v. EEOC, 2012) has asserted that government has the authority to determine which ministries of a church qualify for First Amendment staffing protections, in clear violation of the biblical teaching that churches are unique institutions by virtue of their divine origin (Matthew 16:18); and

WHEREAS, The United States military is currently engaged in efforts to normalize homosexual behavior in the armed services, threatening the ability of chaplains to perform ministry according to the dictates of their consciences and the teachings of their faith; and

WHEREAS, The Justice Department has argued that the federal definition of marriage as the union of one man and one woman is unconstitutional, threatening the ability of religious business owners and religious organizations to offer their services to those only who share their faith convictions about marriage; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the messengers to the Louisiana Baptist Convention meeting in West Monroe, Louisiana, November 12-13, 2012, steadfastly object to the administration's efforts to undermine the religious liberty of American citizens; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we call on President Obama to instruct the Department of Health and Human Services to withdraw its insistence that health care plans provide contraceptives and abortion causing drugs and devices and instead exempt from this requirement all religious organizations and people of faith, whether in their private capacity or as employers, who declare a religious objection to such coverage; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we deplore the provision in the PPACA that sets up a separate abortion fund in health care plans as well as the administration's efforts to require United States citizens to pay for abortion through their health care premiums contrary to the dictates of their faith; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we declare our support for the Constitution's recognition of the unique nature of the church and insist that the Justice Department retract its offensive, unconstitutional attitude toward the church; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we wholeheartedly support the ministry of chaplains in the United States military and call on the Obama administration to instruct our military leaders to ensure the freedom of chaplains to minister to members of the armed services according to the dictates of the chaplains' consciences without fear or coercion; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we express our deepest appreciation for every person who serves in the armed services of our nation and call on the Obama administration to guarantee the right of those who have volunteered to serve to express their religious convictions about homosexual behavior without fear of reprisal; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we call on the Justice Department to cease its efforts to overturn the Defense of Marriage Act and instead engage in a vigorous effort to defend this law of the land from every challenge; and be it finally

RESOLVED, That we pledge to defend the God-given and constitutionally guaranteed right of every American citizen to worship God freely in thought, word, and action, according to the dictates of his or her conscience.

RESOLUTION 3: ON UNIVERSITY OF LOUISIANA AT LAFAYETTE OFFERING A LGBT MINOR

WHEREAS, The Scriptures indicate that all sexual behavior outside of marriage is a sin; and

WHEREAS, Human sexuality is a gift from God to be enjoyed under His instruction; and

WHEREAS, The citizens of Louisiana voiced clearly their opposition to the normalizing of same-sex marriages by a vote of 78% in September of 2004 in passing the Louisiana Marriage Amendment, Article XII, section 15 of the Louisiana State Constitution; and

WHEREAS, The University of Louisiana at Lafayette introduced a minor in LGBT (Lesbian, Gay, Bi-Sexual, Transgender) studies during the 2012 spring semester which is in conflict with the values of a majority of Louisianans; and

WHEREAS, The University of Louisiana at Lafayette is a public university supported primarily with taxpayer funds; and

WHEREAS, These funds are being used to promote and endorse an agenda in opposition

to the expressed will of the majority of the people of the state of Louisiana; and

WHEREAS, We have a biblical responsibility to nurture and train young people in the way they should go; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, That the messengers to the Louisiana Baptist Convention meeting in West Monroe, Louisiana, November 12-13, 2012 strive diligently to uphold and advocate the biblical standard of sexuality; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That we call upon E. Joseph Savoie, Ed.D., President of the University of Louisiana at Lafayette, to use his authority to dissolve immediately this LGBT minor; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That we call upon Sandra K. Woodley, DBA, President of the University of Louisiana System, Wayne Parker, chairman of the Board of Supervisors of the University of Louisiana System, and the board members of the University of Louisiana System to support and encourage President Savoie in this decision; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That we call upon Governor Bobby Jindal and the State Legislature to use their influence to bring about the dissolution of the new LGBT minor being offered at the University of Louisiana at Lafayette; and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, That we call upon Louisiana Baptists, to publicly proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ in love as it relates to this issue.

RESOLUTION 4: ON “SAME-SEX MARRIAGE” AND CIVIL RIGHTS RHETORIC

WHEREAS, Marriage is a covenant relationship and an institution established by God rather than simply a human social construct (Genesis 2:24; Matthew 19:4–6; Ephesians 5:22–33); and

WHEREAS, Southern Baptists have consistently affirmed our support of the biblical definition of marriage as the exclusive union of one man and one woman; and

WHEREAS, The Word of God indicates that all sexual behavior outside of marriage is sinful; and

WHEREAS, All people, regardless of race or sexual preference, are created in the image of God and thus should be treated with dignity and love (Genesis 1:26–27); and

WHEREAS, The Department of Justice has argued (Perry v. Schwarzenegger) that the Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA) is unconstitutional claiming that DOMA unfairly discriminates against homosexuals; and

WHEREAS, For the first time in history the President of the United States has publicly voiced his personal support of “same-sex marriage”; and affirmation of homosexual “marriage” has been added as a specific plank in the official platform of the Democratic National Convention; and

WHEREAS, Much of popular media overtly promotes the acceptance of homosexuality and portrays homosexual behavior as a legitimate variation of human sexuality; and

WHEREAS, Dan Cathy, Chief Operating Officer of Chick-fil-A, voiced support of a biblical definition of marriage and was met with a firestorm of criticism from public and corporate officials who hold that a biblical definition of marriage is discriminatory,

WHEREAS, Constitutional and statutory law already protect the civil rights of every American citizen, and sexual preferences do not constitute a special and protected class of citizens; and

WHEREAS, It is regrettable that homosexual rights activists and those who are promoting the recognition of “same-sex marriage” have misappropriated the rhetoric of the Civil Rights Movement; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the messengers to the Louisiana Baptist Convention meeting in West Monroe, Louisiana, November 12-13, 2012, oppose any attempt to frame “same-sex marriage” as a civil rights issue; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we deny that the effort to legalize “same-sex marriage” qualifies as a civil rights issue since homosexuality does not qualify as a class meriting special protections, like race and gender; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage our fellow Louisiana Baptists to fight for the civil rights of all people where such rights are consistent with the righteousness of God; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we express our love to those who struggle with same-sex attraction and who are engaged in homosexual behavior; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we stand against any disrespectful attitudes, hateful rhetoric, or hate-incited actions toward persons who engage in acts of homosexuality; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we affirm that pastors should preach the truth of God’s word on human sexuality, marriage, purity, and love with all boldness and without fear of reprisal; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage our fellow Southern Baptists to consider how they and their churches might engage in compassionate, redemptive ministry to those who struggle with homosexuality; and be it finally

RESOLVED, That we proclaim that Christ offers forgiveness of and freedom from sin for those who turn from their sins and believe on Christ for the forgiveness of sin.

RESOLUTION 5: ON THE “SINNER’S PRAYER”

WHEREAS, God desires for every person to be saved and has made salvation available for any person who hears the Gospel (John 3:16; Romans 10:14-17; 1 Timothy 2:3-4; 2 Peter 3:9; 1 John 2:2); and

WHEREAS, A free response to the Holy Spirit’s drawing through the Gospel is both possible and necessary in order for anyone to be born again (John 3:1-16; Acts 16:30-31; Romans 10:11-13; 1 Thessalonians 2:13); and

WHEREAS, Prayer is God’s gracious means through which any person can communicate with Him and is everywhere in Scripture commanded and commended for every matter and every person (2 Chronicles 7:14; Matthew 7:7-11; Mark 11:17; Philippians 4:6); and

WHEREAS, Praying to God to express repentance for sins, to acknowledge Christ as Lord, and to ask for forgiveness and salvation is modeled in the Bible (Acts 2:37-38; Romans 10:9-10); and

WHEREAS, While there is no one uniform wording found in Scripture or in the churches for a “Sinner’s Prayer,” the prayer of repentance and faith, acknowledging salvation through Christ alone and expressing complete surrender to His Lordship, is the biblical means by which any person can turn from sin and self, place his faith in Christ, and find forgiveness and eternal life (Luke 18:9-14, 23:39-43); and

WHEREAS, It is biblically appropriate to help a sinner in calling on the Lord for salvation and to speak of Christ’s response to such a prayer as “entering a sinner’s heart and life” (John 14:23; Acts 2:37-40; 16:29-30; Romans 10:11-17; Ephesians 3:17); and

WHEREAS, A “Sinner’s Prayer” is not an incantation that results in salvation merely by its recitation and should never be manipulatively employed or utilized apart from a clear articulation of the Gospel (Matthew 6:7, 15:7-9; 28:18-20); now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Louisiana Baptist Convention, meeting in West Monroe, LA, November 12-13, 2012, commend the use of a “Sinner’s Prayer” as a biblically sound and spiritually significant component of the evangelistic task of the church; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage all Christians to enthusiastically and intentionally proclaim the Gospel to sinners everywhere, being prepared to give them the reason for the hope we have in Christ (1 Peter 3:15), and being prepared to lead them to confess faith in Christ (Romans 10:9), including praying to receive Him as Savior and surrender to Him as Lord (John 1:12).

RESOLUTION 6: ON DEBT AND FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY

WHEREAS, Holy Scripture warns of the danger of debt (Deuteronomy 28:15, 43-45; Proverbs 22:7) and mandates financial responsibility, including the repayment of debts (Matthew 25:14-28; Psalm 37:21)

WHEREAS, debt in general creates an obligation to the lender that threatens and reduces personal freedom,

WHEREAS, government debt in particular creates an obligation to the lender that threatens and weakens our and our posterity's personal and political freedoms, (Deuteronomy 28:44 contra. Deuteronomy 15:6; 28:12)

WHEREAS, studies show that the effects of debt contribute to marital and social stresses, including but not limited to, mental health problems, physical illness, divorce, bankruptcies, loss of homes and property, higher crime, and reductions of essential government services, and be it,

RESOLVED, We the messengers of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, meeting at West Monroe, Louisiana, November 12-13, 2012, strongly encourage our church members, families, churches and governments to practice financial responsibility according to biblical principles,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That we steadfastly object to the accumulation of irresponsible, unreasonable, and unrestrained personal, family, church, and governmental debt,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we strongly encourage those who are in debt to pay in full by all ethical and legitimate means all debts that have been accumulated,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, we call for our church members and families to act proactively in learning, applying daily, and teaching to others biblical financial principles (Proverbs 6:1-5),

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, we call upon our churches to preach and to teach biblical financial principles,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, we call upon our churches, our associations, the Louisiana Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention to promote continually biblical financial principles through various means,

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, we call upon government officials at all levels (local, state, and federal) to operate within their incomes, balance their budgets, and eliminate all debt.

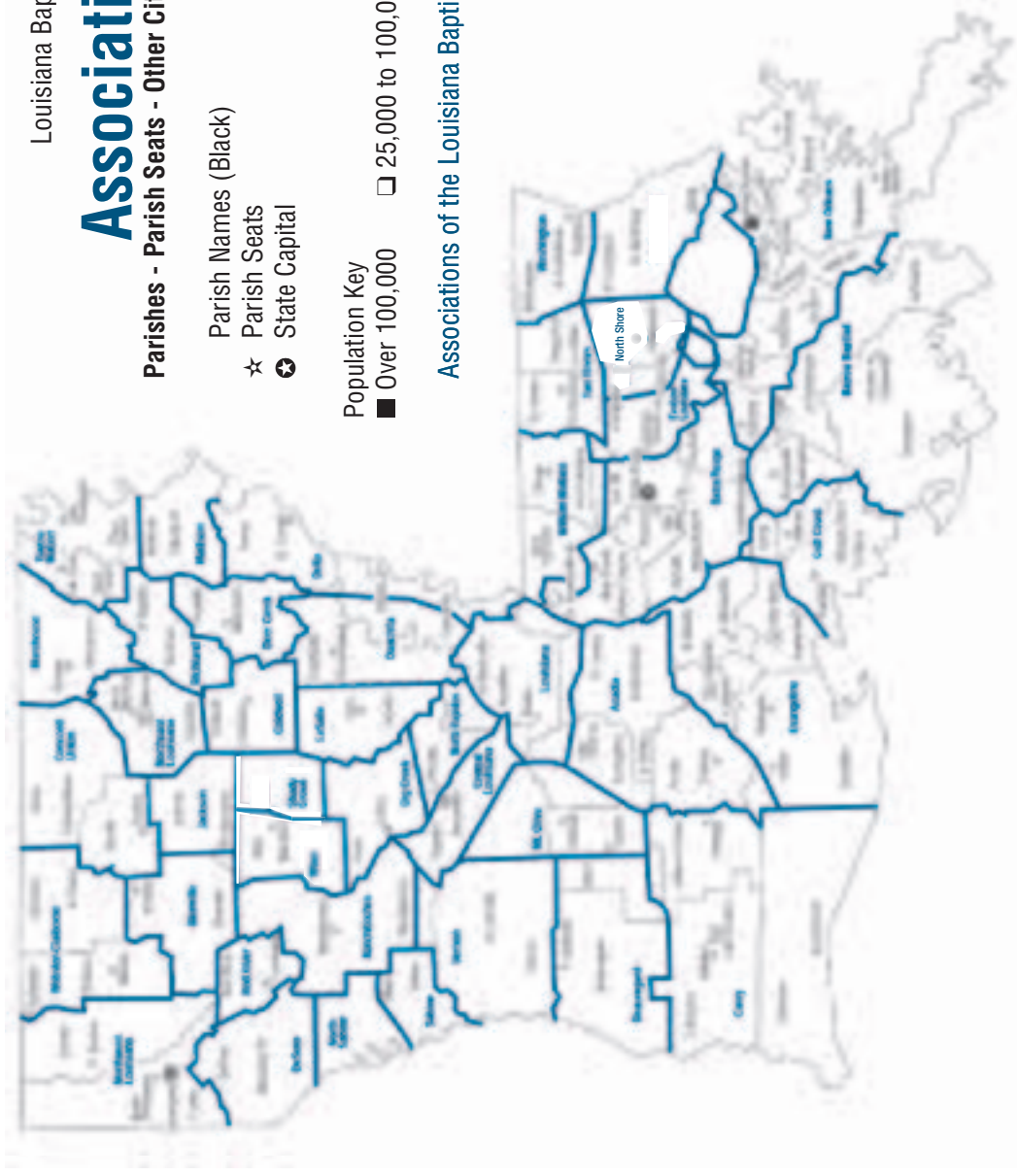
