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# ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION of the LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION

#### ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this body is the Louisiana Baptist Convention, hereinafter referred to as "Convention."

#### ARTICLE II. DURATION

The duration of this Convention shall be in perpetuity.

#### ARTICLE III. NON-PROFIT CORPORATION

The Convention is a nonprofit corporation organized under the Louisiana Non-Profit

Corporation Act, LSA-R.S. 12:201 et seq. and shall have all of the powers, duties, authorizations and responsibilities as provided therein. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Convention shall neither have nor exercise any power, nor engage directly or indirectly in any activity that would invalidate its status as an organization exempt from federal income tax and described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, or the corresponding provision or provisions of any subsequent United States Internal Revenue law or laws.

#### ARTICLE IV. PURPOSE

- Section 1. The purpose of this Convention is to provide means through which Louisiana Baptist churches and members can cooperate in bringing persons to God throughout the world. Section 2. The Convention will assist churches and associations in the Christ-appointed tasks: to worship God, to proclaim the Gospel, to teach, to nurture Christians, to establish and strengthen churches, and to minister in Christ's name.
- Section 3. This Convention desires to carry its programs forward in fraternal concert with other Baptist groups. This Convention will never exercise authority of any type over such groups.
- Section 4. This Convention recognizes the Southern Baptist Convention as the primary instrument used by Baptists to further the cause of Christ on a worldwide basis. The Convention pledges its loyalty and support to the purposes served by the Southern Baptist Convention.
- Section 5. This Convention will do all its work in accord with the principle that the Bible is the inspired, inerrant, and infallible Word of God, and is sufficient for all faith and practice, and is truth without any mixture of error in every area of which it speaks (Matthew 22:29).

#### ARTICLE V. REGISTERED OFFICE

The registered office of the Convention shall be located at 1250 MacArthur Drive, Alexandria, Louisiana. The location of the Convention may be changed by an affirmative vote of a two-thirds (2/3) majority of the messengers of the Convention present and voting.

#### ARTICLE VI. MEMBERSHIP

- Section 1. This Convention shall be composed of messengers who are members in good standing of Baptist churches cooperating (defined below) with the Convention.
- Section 2. This Convention shall be organized on a non-stock basis having messengers as its only members.
  - Section 3. Each cooperating Baptist church having fifty (50) members, or less, shall be entitled

to one (1) messenger; and an additional messenger for each additional fifty (50) members; however, no church shall be entitled to more than fifteen (15) messengers.

Section 4. Messengers shall be certified by their churches to the Convention, but the Convention shall be the final judge of the election and qualifications of its messengers.

Section 5. A cooperating church with the Louisiana Baptist Convention 1) is of like faith and order with Southern Baptists as expressed in the Baptist Faith and Message of the Southern Baptist Convention, 2) is sympathetic to the purposes and work of the Convention, 3) contributes to the work of Southern Baptists through the Cooperative Program and 4) has applied for membership in the local association and, upon recommendation by the LBC Committee on Credentials, has been approved to send messengers to the Convention.

Section 6. Any church which has taken action affirming, approving or endorsing the practice of homosexuality shall not be considered as cooperating with this Convention. Such actions include but are not limited to the licensure or ordination of homosexuals, marriage or blessing of homosexual relationships, and endorsing homosexuality as an acceptable lifestyle.

#### ARTICLE VII. TRUSTEES

Section 1. The Convention's management is vested in its Board of Trustees for the execution of legal documents as required by law in effectuation of direction given by and only with the prior approval of the messengers. The Board of Trustees and the Convention shall only act at the direction of and with the prior approval of the messengers. The messengers may delegate authority to officers or committees who shall be accountable to the messengers as provided in the Convention's Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws. The Trustees shall have no authority or powers except those explicitly granted to them by these Articles of Incorporation or in the Convention's By-laws.

Section 2. The members of the Board of Trustees of the Convention shall be the Convention President, First Vice President, Second Vice President and the Secretary-Treasurer.

#### ARTICLE VIII. OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Convention shall be a president, a first vice president and a second vice president. The office of secretary-treasurer shall be filled ex officio by the executive director of the Executive Board of the Convention.

Section 2. Officers shall be chosen annually from messengers in attendance at the Convention. Nominations shall be from the floor. Election shall be by ballot except when there is a single nominee for an office. In the latter case the president shall instruct the secretary to cast a unanimous ballot for the nominee.1

Section 3. Officers shall serve for one (1) year and hold office until their successors are elected and qualified; however, no officers may serve more than two (2) complete successive terms in the same office. Terms of office shall commence at final adjournment of the Convention in session

at the time of their election and terminate at final adjournment of the succeeding regular session of the Convention. In case of death, disability of, or other cause making necessary the retirement of the president, the vice presidents shall succeed in order. The Executive Board shall determine when an office is vacant due to the disability of an incumbent.

Section 4. The president shall preside over all deliberations of the Convention and shall perform such other duties as may be customary to the position or as determined in the bylaws or by resolution, and shall, by his election, become an ex officio member of all Convention committees and boards. He shall continue as ex officio member of the Executive Board for one full year immediately following tenure as president of the Convention unless elected to fill a vacancy in the regular membership of the Executive Board.

Section 5. The vice presidents may, in the absence of the president or when requested by the president, preside over the Convention and shall perform such other duties as may be provided in the bylaws or resolutions or as requested by the president.

Section 6. The executive director shall keep accurate and faithful minutes of all sessions of the Convention. He shall cause these to be published in suitable form in the Annual of the Convention together with such other information as the Convention or the Executive Board of the Convention deems necessary and proper.

1 Expectations of Louisiana Baptist Convention Officers

The Louisiana Baptist Convention has been blessed across the decades with men who have provided excellent leadership in their elected roles as convention officers. A number of qualities have characterized these leaders and form an example and a description of the kind of leaders Louisiana Baptists ought to seek in the future, especially for the highest offices

- 1. A vital personal relationship with Jesus Christ that includes public and private devotions and holy living.
- 2. A belief in the authority and inerrancy of the Bible and agreement with the Convention's confession of faith which is the Baptist Faith and Message 2000.
- A desire to see people come to faith in Christ, and an active participation in personal and congregational evangelism.
- 4. A commitment to cooperative missions, especially mission endeavors of Louisiana and Southern Baptists as evidenced by strong congregational support of the Cooperative Program.
- A giftedness and experience in leadership that includes the ability to inspire confidence, build consensus, solve problems, and conduct the work of Louisiana Baptists in an orderly and effective manner.

#### ARTICLE IX. COMMITTEES AND BOARDS OF THE CONVENTION

Section 1. The plan of organization for standing committees and permanent boards of the Convention shall be as established in the bylaws of the Convention.

Section 2. Special committees shall serve for one (1) year or less as provided in the resolutions creating such committees.

Section 3. The members of all standing committees (except the Committee on Committees) and the permanent boards of the Convention shall be elected by the Convention. New members on all boards and committees who fill vacancies developing after annual Convention and before the month of May shall be elected by the Executive Board upon recommendation of the Convention Committee on Nominations or Committee on Committees.

Section 4. The president of the Convention shall appoint the members and the chairman and vice chairman of the Committee on Committees.

Section 5. Boards shall report annually to the Convention in the manner specified by the Executive Board of the Convention unless the Convention itself directs otherwise.

Section 6. Each committee and board of this Convention shall supply the executive director with an official copy of its charter or other legal evidence authorizing its establishment and a

copy of its bylaws, as well as copies of the official minutes of their regular and special meetings. The executive director shall maintain these in such fashion that they are readily available to all Louisiana Baptists at the Convention offices of the Executive Board of the Convention.

#### ARTICLE X. THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE CONVENTION

Section 1. The Executive Board of the Convention shall serve as the Convention ad interim, as the Convention's principle advisory committee on total programs, and as the Convention's operating board for the Convention-sponsored general programs and programs not specifically assigned elsewhere.

Section 2. The Executive Board shall consist of one (1) member from each association having a minimum of seven churches with an aggregate church membership of at least one thousand, plus one (1) additional board member from each association having as many as ten thousand (10,000) church members, and an additional board member for each additional five thousand (5,000) church members of such associations; provided, however, that not more than seven (7) members from any one association shall serve simultaneously as members of the Executive Board.

Section 3. The terms of elected Executive Board members shall run for three (3) years. No member may serve continuously for more than two (2) complete successive terms. No member shall be eligible to serve another term until an interval equal to the number of years served shall have elapsed.

Section 4. The membership of any Executive Board member shall be declared vacant if he ceases to be affiliated with a church that is a member of the association from which he was elected.

Section 5. The Convention shall annually elect members to fill all vacancies on the Executive Board. Section 6. The elected officers of the Executive Board of the Convention shall consist of a president and a vice president chosen annually by the membership of the Executive Board. They shall have the duties customarily associated with such positions. The board itself shall elect an executive director for an indefinite term. The executive director shall be ex officio member of the board and serve as its secretary.

Section 7. The Executive Board itself shall determine its time of meeting, organization and method of proceeding subject to these articles and the Convention's bylaws.

Section 8. The Executive Board of the Convention shall report annually to the Convention concerning the total Convention program, the operating programs entrusted to the board, and such other matters as the board deems necessary and proper.

Section 9. The Executive Board of the Convention shall recommend annually to the Convention the appropriation or allocation of undesignated financial resources of the Convention.

Section 10. The Executive Board of the Convention shall serve as the general corporate authority of this Convention. No activity supported by and subject to the will of this Convention shall seek incorporated status in Louisiana or elsewhere without the express approval of this Convention or the Executive Board of this Convention.

#### ARTICLE XI. THE DENOMINATIONAL PAPER

The Baptist Message shall be the official paper of this Convention.

#### ARTICLE XII. MEETINGS

Section 1. The Convention shall meet in regular session in the week following the second Sunday in November unless unusual circumstances should require a change. In such a case, date, time and place shall be determined by the Executive Board.

Section 2. Only the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention is authorized to call a special meeting of the Convention and only upon giving churches cooperating with the Convention at least thirty (30) days written notice of the date, place and time of said special meeting which meeting can only be held within the state of Louisiana.

#### ARTICLE XIII. EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

In the event of an emergency declared as provided in this article, the following procedures shall control the operations, finances, officers, meetings, and purposes of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. until such time as the emergency is terminated. When the emergency has been terminated, then in that event, all provisions of the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. which were last in effect prior to the emergency shall again take effect until such time as another emergency may be declared, if any, as provided in this article. These emergency provisions and procedures are as follows:

- 1."Emergency" means any occasion or instance for which, in the determination of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. by a majority vote of those present and voting, that the usual and customary conduct of business by the Convention must be curtailed or suspended because it is not feasible to comply with applicable provisions of the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. due to the existence of an emergency which may endanger lives, health, property, and/or safety, may increase the threat to lives, health, property and/or safety, and/or conditions are such that it is not possible to conduct the usual and customary business of the Convention in a manner provided by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Convention.
- 2. In the event that the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. cannot meet to consider an emergency declaration or termination, then the last elected officers of the Convention and the Executive Committee of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., may jointly declare an emergency which invokes the provisions of this Article XII and/or terminate a previously declared emergence.
- 3. In the event that the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. or, in its absence, the officers of the Convention and the Executive Committee of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. cannot meet to declare an emergency, then the Executive Director of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention may declare an emergency which invokes the provisions of this Article.
- 4. In the event that an emergency is declared invoking the provisions of this Article as provided in paragraphs 1, 2 or 3 above, then all Convention officers, Convention committee members, and board members of Convention agencies and members of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. shall continue in office until such time as the emergency declaration is terminated and his/her successor is duly elected as provided by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc.
- 5. In the event that an emergency is declared invoking the provisions of this Article as provided in paragraphs 1, 2 or 3 above, then all budgets, financial expenditures and operations authorized and last approved by the Convention prior to the emergency declaration shall remain in force and effect until such time as the emergency declaration is terminated and new budget, operational, and financial programs are duly adopted by the Convention as provided by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc.
- 6. In the event that an emergency has been properly declared, then all meetings of the Convention Messengers whether Annual or otherwise shall be suspended until such time as the emergency declaration is properly terminated and Messengers are able to meet and conduct business as provided by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc.
- 7. All meetings of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., officers of the Convention and the Executive Committee of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. may be held in any manner whether in person, by telephone, electronically or otherwise during the period an emergency has been properly declared and/or to consider whether to declare an emergency or terminate an emergency declaration.
- 8. In the event that an emergency has been properly declared, The Louisiana Baptist Message shall remain the official publication of the Convention. However, the Baptist Message may be published in any manner possible whether by print, by hand, electronically or any other method feasible during the emergency declaration. If the Baptist Message cannot be published in any

manner, then any reasonable method of communication to Convention Messengers, cooperating churches, officers, or other necessary persons or organizations may be used.

9.An emergency declaration may be terminated by the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., jointly by officers of the Convention and the Executive Committee of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. by a majority vote of those present and voting, or by the Executive Director of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. in the same order and manner as provided by paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 of this Article at such time as the conditions creating the emergency as defined in paragraph 1 above no longer exists.

10. Any provision of the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. in conflict with this ARTICLE XIII during the period that an emergency has been properly declared and has not been terminated, shall be suspended until such time as the declaration of emergency has been properly terminated.

#### ARTICLE XIV. INDEMNIFICATION

To the maximum extent permitted or required by LSA-R.S. 12:227 as it now exists or as it may be amended in the future, the Convention shall indemnify and advance expenses to persons indemnified in §227 for amounts such persons pay directly. The Convention shall not indemnify or advance expenses to such persons for any amount paid by a third party pursuant to a plan or contract of insurance.

#### ARTICLE XVI. AGENT FOR SERVICE

The first agent for service of process for the Convention shall be Dr. David E. Hankins. The Board of Trustees may from time to time as it shall determine in its discretion change the agent for service of process for the Convention without the necessity of approval by the messengers.

#### ARTICLE XVII. CONSTRUCTION

All references in these Articles of Incorporation to statutes, regulations, or other sources of legal authority shall refer to the authorities cited, or their successors, as they may be amended from time to time.

#### ARTICLE XVIII. AMENDMENTS

Proposed amendments originating in the Executive Board of the Convention are posted to the LBC website and published in one (1) issue of the Baptist Message (print edition or digital edition) no later than fifteen (15) days before the meeting of the Convention.

#### **BYLAWS**

#### of the

#### LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION

#### ARTICLE I. PARLIAMENTARY LAW AND CUSTOM

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order shall be recognized as the standard authority to guide the Convention on questions of parliamentary law and custom.

Section 2. One-fourth of the messengers enrolled shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business by the Convention. The minutes of the Convention shall indicate that a quorum was present for all business sessions.

Section 3. No persons addressing the Convention may speak more than twice on the same subject without unanimous consent.

Section 4. The president is charged at all times with the maintenance of decorum and order.

Section 5. All proposed resolutions coming before the Convention shall, prior to consideration by the Convention, be referred to the Committee on Resolutions without debate.

Section 6. All matters of business not scheduled on the agenda shall, prior to consideration by the Convention, be referred to the Committee on Order of Business without debate.

Section 7. The Convention shall express its official position only through its constitution, bylaws, and resolutions. The acceptance of a report shall not, in the absence of implementing resolutions, be construed as authorizing action by Convention committees, boards, and agencies.

## ARTICLE II. PERMANENT PLAN OF ORGANIZATION OF THE CONVENTION AND ITS COMMITTEES AND BOARDS

Permanent organization of the Convention shall be as follows:

- 1. Standing Committees:
  - (1) Committee on Committees
  - (2) Committee on Nominations
  - (3) Committee on Order of Business
  - (4) Committee on Credentials
  - (5) Committee on Credentials
  - (6) Committee on Moral and Social Concerns
- 2. Boards of Trustees for:
  - (1) Louisiana College
  - (2) Louisiana Baptist Children's Home
  - (3) Louisiana Baptist Foundation
  - (4) The Baptist Message
- 3. Executive Board of the Convention

# ARTICLE III. COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF COMMITTEES AND BOARD

Section 1. The composition and duties of boards of trustees of agencies and institutions of this Convention shall be clearly set forth in the Convention resolutions authorizing their establishmentand included subsequently in appropriate form in their respective corporate charters. All corporate charters and amendments thereto shall be expressly approved by the Convention or by the Executive Board of the Convention.

Section 2. The Committee on Committees shall be composed of nine (9) members one-third of whom shall be appointed each year by the president. This Committee shall nominate to the Convention the membership of all other committees of the Convention and shall nominate or appoint the membership

of special committees as instructed by the Convention. The Committee shall also nominate for election the chairman and vice chairman of all Convention committees. Vacancies occurring during the year may be filled by recommendation from this Committee to the Executive Board and may be approved by the Board in any of its regular or special meetings or by mail poll of the Board.

Section 3. The Committee on Nominations shall be composed of fifteen (15) members. It shall nominate to the Convention all members of boards of the Convention, including the Executive Board of the Convention. Vacancies on boards occurring prior to the May Executive Board meeting may be filled by recommendation from this Committee to the Executive Board. Vacancies occurring after the May meeting shall be left vacant until the Convention in November.

Section 4. The Committee on Order of Business shall be composed of seven (7) members and the person designated to plan the Convention music. It shall present to the opening session of the Convention for adoption a recommended agenda for the Convention sessions. The committee shall recommend to the Convention the preacher and music leader for the Convention meeting one year hence. The committee also may tentatively enlist Bible study leader and major speakers for Conventions scheduled up to three years in advance. The Committee shall be responsible for recommending to the Convention the host, the meeting hall or church, and the dates for the Convention meeting two years hence and, if feasible, for three years hence.

The Committee on Order of Business shall provide periods of time during the convention for the introduction of all matters requiring a vote not scheduled on the agenda, and, when introduced (unless the Convention then gives it unanimous consent for its immediate consideration) shall fix times for the consideration of the same. All such matters of business shall be introduced to the Convention during the time scheduled for Introduction of Business. No such matters of business may be introduced in the last session.

Section 5. The Committee on Credentials shall be composed of seven (7) members. It shall supervise the registration and accreditation of messengers to the Convention, and shall manage the application process for congregations desiring to become a cooperating church with the Louisiana Baptist Convention and qualified to send messengers for the first time. It shall recommend to the Convention, when necessary, the disaffiliation of any Louisiana Baptist Convention church that no longer complies with the Convention's definition of a cooperating church. It shall recommend action to the Convention concerning disputes as to status of persons as messengers.

Section 6. The Committee on Resolutions shall be composed of seven (7) members and three (3) ex officio members (including the Executive Board president) from the Executive Board of the Convention. The Committee shall be responsible for initiating, reviewing, commenting on, and recommending Convention action on all resolutions. In order to facilitate thorough consideration and to expedite the Committee's work, all proposed resolutions shall:

- 1. Be submitted to the Committee for review and consideration no more than ninety (90) days, but no later than fifteen (15) days, prior to the next LBC annual meeting.
- 2. Be addressed to the Committee on Resolutions in care of the Communications Team of the Louisiana Baptist Convention at its registered or e-mail address (electronic copies are preferred),
- 3. Be typewritten, titled, and dated,
- 4. Be accompanied by a letter from a church qualified to send a messenger to the annual meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention certifying that the person submitting the resolution is a member in good standing, and
- 5. Include complete contact information for both the person submitting it, and his or her church.

No person may submit more than three resolutions per year. The Committee on Resolutions shall prepare and submit to each annual meeting of the Convention only such resolutions the Committee recommends for adoption. Such resolutions may be based upon proposals received by the Committee or may originate with the Committee. Only resolutions recommended by the Committee may be considered by the Convention, except the Convention may, by a 2/3 vote, consider any other resolution properly submitted to the Committee.

Section 7. The Committee on Moral and Social Concerns shall be composed of fifteen members. The president of the Convention, the president of the Executive Board, and the editor of the Baptist Message shall be ex officio members. The Committee shall identify, study, provide information, and recommend actions on moral and social concerns which need to be of particular concern to Louisiana Baptists. The Committee shall also be authorized to speak publicly and/or conduct campaigns to influence the outcome of current issues on which the Executive Board or the Convention have taken an official position. The Committee may use

resource persons and/or organizations in matters of common concern.

Section 8. The Executive Director of the Executive Board of the Convention shall serve ex officio as a member and as secretary of all standing committees of the Convention; however, he may be assisted in this task by members of the Executive Board staff.

Section 9. The inancial transactions of all standing and special committees of the Con-vention shall be conducted only in accordance with policies and procedures established by the Executive Board of the Convention. The Executive Board shall retain exclusive authority over the custody and disbursement of all funds made available for expenses of committees of the Convention and the Convention itself.

Section 10. Trustees of corporate boards established under authority of the Convention shall be responsible for initiating charter amendments whenever such action is necessary to make charter provisions consistent with actions of the Convention.

Section 11. A report of all meetings of boards of the Convention shall be published in The Baptist Message (print edition or digital edition) as soon as possible after the meeting with the understanding that specifics con-cerning financial conditions and personnel relations must often be confidential for the welfare of the institutions and their employees and may be reported in only general terms.

Section 12. Baptist Faith and Message adopted by the Convention on 11/12/02.

#### ARTICLE IV. MEMBERSHIP OF COMMITTEES AND BOARDS

Section 1. The Convention affirms its adherence to the policy of periodic rotation of the membership of its committees and boards.

Section 2. The terms of members of boards shall be established as three (3) years. No member elected or appointed for a full term shall be eligible for more than two (2) complete successive terms on the same board. No member elected to serve as much as two (2) years of an unexpired term of any board shall be eligible for more than one (1) successive full term of three (3) years on the same board. A member shall be ineligible to serve on that board until an interval equal to the number of years served on that board shall have elapsed. A person shall not serve in more than one elected or appointed position at a time, unless authorized by the constitution and bylaws. Upon the expiration of the term of any member of a board or committee, no person who is a member of the same church as the person whose term is expiring may serve on that same board or committee until one year following the expiration of the serving member's term.

Membership on all boards and committees collectively shall in all cases be limited to the pastor and up to two (2) other members from any church at any one time. Existing board or committee members who move to a church without an eligible vacancy, shall be rendered ineligible to serve. Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary, a pastor who resigns his pastorate may continue to serve on the board or committee to which he was elected, provided that the church where he holds membership has an eligible vacancy. No more than one member of the same church may serve on the same board or committee. The terms of members of committees shall be established as three (3) years. No member elected or appointed for a full term or elected to fill an unexpired term shall be eligible to succeed himself until an interval equal to the number of years served on that committee shall have elapsed.

Section 3. As far as practicable, one-third of the membership of each committee or board shall be elected annually.

Section 4. At least one-fourth of the membership of each board shall live outside the association in which the institution is located, and an effort shall be made to have representatives from various areas of the state.

Section 5. All persons regularly elected by the Convention to agencies and boards shall be elected or selected in any convention session except the last session.

Section 6. Each board of the Convention shall organize and elect its own officers under its own rules and regulations. The president of the Convention shall appoint the chairman and vice chairman of the Committee on Committees. That committee shall nominate the chairman and vice chairman of all committees that it nominates to the Convention. Each committee may elect for itself such other officers as it may need.

Section 7. The initial meeting of newly authorized committees shall be called together during or following the Convention by the chairman in conjunction with the secretary of the committee and at such meeting the necessary officers shall be elected.

Section 8. Newly elected members for the first time to standing committees and boards of the Convention shall not be eligible for office within their respective committees or boards prior to the conclusion of one year's service with the committee or board. Ex officio members of standing committees or permanent boards of the Convention shall not hold office on such committees or boards unless specifically authorized to do so by the constitution of the Convention or these bylaws.

Section 9. Officers of committees and boards of this Convention shall be elected annually.

Section 10. No salaried employee of this Convention and its boards and committees shall be eligible for election as a voting member of boards or committees of this Convention except as provided in the constitution of the Convention or these bylaws.

Section 11. Boards and committees of this Convention may appoint persons other than members to subcommittees and advisory committees provided such persons shall serve only in an advisory capacity and shall never be permitted to vote at meetings of the authorizing committee or board.

# ARTICLE V. INCLUSIONS OF THE CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS OF THE CONVENTION AND THE BYLAWS OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD IN THE ANNUAL OF THE CONVENTION

The directory of the Convention shall include the constitution and bylaws of the Convention and the bylaws of the Executive Board of the Convention in each edition of the Convention's Annual.

#### ARTICLE VI. AVOIDANCE OF ILLEGAL ACTION

No action of the Convention shall be construed as authorizing its committees or boards to take any action that may be contrary to law.

#### ARTICLE VII. AMENDMENT OF BYLAWS

These bylaws may be amended at any regular session of the Convention by affirmative vote of two-thirds of the messengers present and voting. Amendments sponsored by the Executive Board shall be posted to the LBC website and published in one (1) issue of the Baptist Message (print edition or digital edition) no later than fifteen (15) days before the meeting of the Convention.

# ARTICLE V. INCLUSIONS OF THE CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS OF THE CONVENTION AND THE BYLAWS OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD IN THE ANNUAL OF THE CONVENTION

The directory of the Convention shall include the constitution and bylaws of the Convention and the bylaws of the Executive Board of the Convention in each edition of the Convention's Annual.

#### ARTICLE VI. AVOIDANCE OF ILLEGAL ACTION

No action of the Convention shall be construed as authorizing its committees or boards to take any action that may be contrary to law.

#### ARTICLE VII. AMENDMENT OF BYLAWS

These bylaws may be amended at any regular session of the Convention by affirmative vote of two-thirds of the messengers present and voting. Amendments sponsored by the Executive Board shall be posted to the LBC website and published in one (1) issue of the *Baptist Message* no later than fifteen (15) days before the meeting of the Convention.

#### BUSINESS AND FINANCIAL PLAN

#### **OF**

#### LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION

#### I. Preliminary Provisions

Each agency and institution of the Convention shall submit to the Business and Finance Committee of the Executive Board (1) an itemized estimate of its receipts for the next fiscal year, and (2) an itemized estimate of its expenditures for the next fiscal year.

The Executive Board shall recommend to the Convention a budget based on an analysis of the aforementioned data, which budget shall include allocations to agencies and institutions.

"Agencies" shall include the *Baptist Message*, Louisiana Baptist Foundation, and the Executive Board. "Institutions" shall include Louisiana Baptist Children's Home, and Louisiana College.

The Budget and Financial Data Query Form shall include itemized estimates of receipts and expenditures for a three-year period, past, present and projected, as indicated in the report form.

#### II. Fiscal Periods

Except where agreement otherwise is effected between an agency or institution and the Executive Board, the financial affairs of the Convention and all agencies or institutions owned, operated and controlled by the Louisiana Baptist Convention, shall be operated on the calendar year.

#### III. Disbursement of Monetary Funds

The executive director shall disburse all monies in accordance with the provisions of the Convention budget. Exceptions to this must have Convention approval.

Each agency or institution of the Convention is hereby instructed and ordered to keep all trust funds and/or designated gifts (for they are trust funds) sacred to the trust or the designation involved, and that they be kept separate from all other funds of such agency or institution.

Disbursement of Cooperative Program and Designated funds will be made immediately after closing of the books and in no event shall they be made later than the 10th of each month.

Inasmuch as each church is an autonomous body it has the inherent right, as is of course true with each individual, to make designations as desired. When a designated gift is received at the Baptist Building Business Office it shall be recorded and the gift will be forwarded forthwith to the designated object or person. An exception is that any gift received by any Louisiana Baptist Convention entity from a church that affirms, approves, or endorses homosexual behavior shall be returned to the donor. The acceptance and disbursement of any gifts shall not be construed as endorsement or agreement with the beliefs and practices of the donor.

Allocations for agencies and institutions from the Cooperative Program shall be determined on the basis of church gifts to the Cooperative Program and church designations the previous year and on the basis of needs and requirements of institutions and agencies as evaluated by the Business and Finance Committee and the Executive Board with recommended allocations to be voted by the Convention each year.

In the event that Cooperative Program receipts are less than the budget, distribution of funds to the respective agencies and institutions will be made on the basis of budget percentage of actual receipts.

#### IV. Special Solicitations

Any special campaigns for funds by an agency or institution owned, controlled, or supported by the Convention, must first secure the endorsement and approval of the Executive Board and the Convention. This is not to be construed as prohibiting any agency or institution from approaching individuals or corporations for gifts, it being understood that such approach to an individual or corporation is to be made only by personal contact or personal correspondence.

#### V. Capital Investments and Liabilities

Without the approval of the Convention or Executive Board, no liability or indebtedness exceeding \$100,000 or 2% of a Convention entity's annual operating budget (whichever is greater), shall be incurred by a Convention entity other than those that can be repaid from anticipated receipts for operating purposes and/or capital needs within a period of three years from the date such obligations were incurred. A report on all entity indebtedness shall be made to the Executive Board annually.

#### VI. Emergency Reserves

Each agency and institution of this Convention shall set up a reserve for contingencies to provide for deficits that may occur either through decreased receipts or through emergencies.

The goal shall be that all agencies/institutions move immediately to accumulate funds in their operating reserve to 30 days operation within a long-term goal of at least three months.

#### VII. Financial Reports

Each agency and institution of the Convention shall close its books and accounts, and have them audited by a Certified Public Accountant as of the close of its fiscal year, and in turn shall forward two copies of its audit to the executive director as soon as available. These audits are to be studied by the Business and Finance Committee of the Executive Board, and shall include the following:

- 1) Balance Sheet
- 2) Analysis of surplus accounts
- 3) Income and expense
- 4) Classified list of investments by fund and type of investment
- 5) Receipts:
  - (a) Cooperative receipts
  - (b) Designated receipts
  - (c) Other income

Each agency and institution shall submit a report on the Budget and Financial Data form on or before June 1 of each year. A balance sheet of the financial condition after May 31 and prior to September 1 of the current year shall be submitted for publication in the current *Book of Reports* and Annual.

#### VIII. Handling of Funds

All persons who handle funds or securities for any agency or institution shall be adequately bonded. Discretion shall be exercised in the handling of all securities, deeds, notes and other valuable records (legal documents), and there must always be express authority from the proper source for such handling.

#### IX. Additional Agencies and Institutions

No new agency or institution shall be authorized by this Convention except after thorough study and presentation to the Convention for favorable action in two succeeding annual meetings.

#### X. Business Procedure

Each agency and institution of the Louisiana Baptist Convention as a normal operating policy shall refrain from entering any business transaction with a trustee or employee, or a business enterprise in which a trustee or employee has an interest. An exception to this policy may be made, at the discretion of the board of trustees, in any case wherein it appears that a commodity or service at the discretion of the board, is found to be in the best interest of the agency or institution. Competitive bids should be taken if practicable. In any case being considered for exception, the extent of the trustees' or employees' interest shall be disclosed to the entire board.

#### XI. Professional Services

The Executive Board at its discretion may employ an auditor to study the audited report with the auditors of the agencies and institutions in the light of Convention instructions.

The Executive Board at its discretion may employ an engineer or architect to study proposed capital projects or maintenance of present capital assets.

#### XII. Amendments

This Business and Financial Plan may be altered by two-thirds of the messengers present and voting at any time except during the last session (of the Convention), provided that recommended changes shall have been presented to the Executive Board and published in the *Baptist Message* (print edition or digital edition) at least one month in advance of the Convention.

# ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION

#### ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation shall be THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, and under this name it shall have authority to sue and be sued; to have and to make a corporate seal; to own property both real and personal, and to receive the same by purchase, gift or any other process known to the law, to borrow money in its corporate name and to mortgage and hypothecate its property to secure the same, and generally to do, and to perform all acts necessary for the purposes for which it is created.

The corporate existence of this corporation shall be in perpetuity, unless sooner dissolved by a two-thirds vote of this corporation, which vote shall be taken not less than six months after receiving instructions to that effect in writing from the LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION.

#### ARTICLE II

The objects and purposes of this corporation shall be to foster Missions, at home and abroad, Christian Education and Benevolences, to promote and give direction to the work of the Louisiana Baptist Convention in these fields of service, through its several institutions and departments of service, necessary to the accomplishment of its objects and purposes, and to promote harmony of feeling and concert of action in adopting and carrying into operation such measures as may promote the Redeemer's Kingdom in Louisiana and in the regions beyond. It shall have power and authority to do all things necessary to carry out the objects and purposes for which it is organized."

#### ARTICLE III

The Executive Board shall consist of one (1) member from each association, having a minimum of seven churches with an aggregate church membership of at least one thousand, plus one (1) additional board member from each association having as many as ten thousand (10,000) church members, and an additional board member for each additional five thousand (5,000) church members of such associations; provided, however that not more than seven (7) members from any one association shall serve simultaneously as members of the Executive Board."

The terms of elected board members shall run for three (3) years. No member may serve continuously for more than two (2) complete successive terms. No member shall be eligible to serve another term until an interval equal to the number of years served shall have elapsed.

The membership of any board member shall be declared vacant if he ceases to be affiliated with a church that is a member of the association from which he was elected.

The Convention shall annually elect members to fill all vacancies in the board.

"The qualifications, term of office and criteria for selection of persons to serve as a member of the Executive Board of this corporation shall be in conformity with Article X. The Executive Board of the Convention contained in the Articles of Incorporation of the Louisiana Baptist Convention and Article IV. Membership of Committees And Boards contained in the Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention and any future amendments thereto. In addition to vacancies described in the Articles of Incorporation and By-laws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, the death or resignation of a member of the Executive Board shall automatically and immediately cause that office to become vacant without the necessity of any further action. Any other vacancy in the office of member of the Executive Board of this corporation for any reason deemed sufficient by the member shall only be declared by a two-thirds majority affirmative vote of the messengers to the Louisiana Baptist Convention and only after the affirmative recommendation of the Convention Committee on Nominations has been published in the BAPTIST MESSAGE

(print edition or digital edition) not less than twice in the thirty days immediately preceding the meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention."

#### ARTICLE IV

The elected officers of the Executive Board of the Convention shall consist of a president and a vice president chosen annually by the membership of the Executive Board. They shall have the duties customarily associated with such positions. The board itself shall elect an executive director for an indefinite term. The executive director shall be ex officio member of the board and serve as its secretary.

The first officers of this corporation shall be as follows to wit: George W. Bolton, President, H. A. Sumrell, Vice-President; H. H. Webb, Recording Secretary; W. N. Johnson, Corresponding Secretary; B. F. Thompson, Treasurer; and H. H. Webb, Auditor, who shall hold office until their successors are elected.

#### ARTICLE V

This corporation shall have the authority to adopt such rules and bylaws, not contrary to law, or the provisions of this charter, as it deems proper, and to appoint all necessary committees to carry out the purposes for which this corporation was organized.

#### ARTICLE VI

The domicile of this corporation shall be at Alexandria, Rapides Parish, Louisiana, and the service of all legal process shall be made at the domicile of the corporation, upon the President, or in his absence upon the Vice President, or in the absence of both of these, upon the Executive Director/Secretary, and otherwise according to law.

#### ARTICLE VII

This corporation shall not issue any stock certificates, and the private property of the members of this corporation shall not be held liable for any of the debts of the corporation, nor shall any mere formality in the drawing of this charter have the effect of rendering it null.

#### ARTICLE VIII

The Articles of Incorporation may only be amended with the approval of two-thirds majority of the Executive Board and the approval of two-thirds majority of the membership at the annual meeting, six months notice having been given prior to the annual convention to the President of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, and also notice of the proposed amendments having been published in the *Baptist Message* (print edition or digital edition) for three consecutive weeks preceding the annual meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.

#### ARTICLE IX

This Corporation shall be organized on a non-stock membership basis. The sole member of this corporation shall be the Louisiana Baptist Convention, a nonprofit, Louisiana Corporation domiciled in Alexandria, Louisiana. Except as otherwise provided in these Articles of Incorporation or by applicable law requiring a greater number of votes other than a simple majority for approval of any action by the member, any matter requiring a vote of the member of this corporation shall be adopted by a majority of messengers who are present and voting as is provided by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Articles of Incorporation. Each messenger shall have one vote."

#### ARTICLE X.

The annual meeting of the member of this corporation shall take place contemporaneously with the annual meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention without the necessity of giving notice to the member of said meeting. Any special meeting of the member of this corporation may only be called as provided in *Article XII Meetings* of the Louisiana Baptist Convention's Articles of Incorporation and shall only be held at the same places, dates and times as the Louisiana Baptist Convention determines in accordance with its Articles of Incorporation and By-laws. Notice of any special meeting of the member of this corporation shall be published in the *BAPTIST MESSAGE* (print edition or digital edition) not less than twice in thirty days immediately preceding the meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention."

#### ARTICLE XI.

Before any dissolution or merger of this corporation, transfer or sale of substantially all of this corporation's assets and/or the formation of other corporations, limited liability companies or other forms of doing business by this corporation may be implemented, the proposed action shall be approved by the member by a two-thirds affirmative vote of the messengers present and voting and only after the resolution authorizing the action has been published in the *BAPTIST MESSAGE* (print edition or digital edition) not less than twice in the thirty days immediately preceding the meeting of the Lou-isiana Baptist Convention."

#### ARTICLE XII.

- 1. "Emergency" means any occasion or instance for which, in the determination of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. by a majority vote of those present and voting, that the usual and customary conduct of business by the Executive Board must be curtailed or suspended because it is not feasible to comply with applicable provisions of the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the Executive Board due to the existence of an emergency which may endanger lives, health, property, and/or safety, may increase the threat to lives, health, property and/or safety, and/or conditions are such that it is not possible to conduct the usual and customary business of the Executive Board in a manner provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the Executive Board.
- 2. In the event that the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. cannot meet to consider an emergency declaration or termination, then the Executive Director of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., may declare an emergency which invokes the provisions of this Article and/or terminate a previously declared emergency.
- 3. In the event that an emergency is declared invoking the provisions of this Article as provided in paragraphs 1 or 2 above, then all Executive Board officers, Executive Board committee members, and Executive Board members shall continue in office until such time as the emergency declaration is terminated and his/her successor is duly elected as provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC.
- 4. In the event that an emergency is declared invoking the provisions of this Article as provided in paragraphs 1 or 2 above, then all budgets, financial expenditures and operations authorized and last approved by the Executive Board prior to the emergency declaration shall remain in force and effect until such time as the emergency declaration is terminated and new budget, operational, and financial programs are duly adopted by the Executive Board as provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC.
- 5. In the event that an emergency has been properly declared, then all meetings of the Executive Board shall be suspended until such time as the emergency declaration is properly terminated

and board members of the Executive Board are able to meet and conduct business as provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC.

- 6. In the event that a special meeting of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention may be safely and is reasonably necessary, then such meeting may be held with reasonable notice to the Executive Board members in any manner whether in person, by telephone, electronically, or otherwise during the time an emergency has been properly declared and/or to consider whether to declare or terminate an emergency.
- 7. In the event that an emergency has been properly declared, the BAPTIST MESSAGE shall remain the official publication of the Executive Board. However, the BAPTIST MESSAGE may be published in any manner possible whether by print, by hand, electronically or any other method feasible during the emergency declaration. If the BAPTIST MESSAGE cannot be published in any manner, then any reasonable method of communication to Executive Board members, officers, or other necessary persons or organizations may be used.
- 8. An emergency declaration may be terminated by the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., or by the Executive Director of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. in the same order and manner as provided by paragraphs 1 or 2 of this Article at such time as the conditions creating the emergency as defined in paragraph 1. above no longer exist.
- 9. Any provision of the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC. in conflict with ARTICLE XII during the period that an emergency has been properly declared and has not been terminated, shall be suspended until such time as the declaration of emergency has been properly terminated."

#### **BYLAWS**

#### of the

#### EXECUTIVE BOARD

#### of the

#### LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION

#### ARTICLE I. GENERAL FUNCTIONS

Section 1. It is the function of the Executive Board to perform such duties and responsibilities as may be authorized by the Louisiana Baptist Convention, including serving as the Convention ad interim, serving as the Convention's principal adviser on total program, and administering programs entrusted to it by the Convention or not expressly assigned to another board or committee by the Convention. The Executive Board shall, by resolution, enumerate its specific duties and responsibilities under these general delegations of responsibility by the Convention.

Section 2. Duties and responsibilities of this board as set forth in the constitution and bylaws of the Convention shall be construed as incorporated in these bylaws. The board shall at no time authorize action contrary to instructions of the Convention.

# ARTICLE II. PERMANENT PLAN OF ORGANIZATION OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

Section 1. The plan of organization of the Executive Board, its committees and staff, shall be as follows:

- 1. The elected officers of the Executive Board of the Convention shall consist of a president and a vice president chosen annually by the membership of the Executive Board at the Pre-Convention Board meeting. They shall have the duties customarily associated with such positions. The board itself shall elect an executive director for an indefinite time. The executive director shall be an ex officio member of the board and serve as its secretary.
  - 2. Standing committees of the Executive Board
    - (1) Nominating Committee
    - (2) Administrative Committee
    - (3) Business and Finance Committee
    - (4) Executive Committee
    - (5) Missions Support Committee
    - (6) Properties Committee
  - 3. Subsidiary of the Executive Board: Church Site Corporation

#### ARTICLE III. MEETINGS

Section 1. The Executive Board shall hold regular meetings in May, September, and immediately prior to the convening of the annual Convention. The May meeting shall be on the first Tuesday. The September meeting shall be on the last Tuesday. Should unusual circumstances require a change in the meeting dates, the Executive Committee may recommend such a change for approval by the board at a regular meeting or by means of a mail poll. The board may, by resolution, hold such other meetings as it deems necessary and desirable.

Section 2. The Executive Committee of the board may, for reasons that seem to it good and proper, call the board to special meetings.

Section 3. Fifty-one percent (51%) of the elected membership of the board shall constitute a quorum for the conduct of business. The minutes shall always indicate the presence of a quorum at the openings of any business session.

Section 4. Notification of or an explanation of absence from meetings of the board should be given by members to the chairman or secretary.

## ARTICLE IV. COMPOSITION, DUTIES, AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1. Committees authorized in Article II of these bylaws shall be primarily advisory in nature. The Executive Board may, however, delegate responsibility to a committee to act in the name of the board for specifically defined purposes.

Section 2. Committee members shall serve for three year terms with one-third of the membership rotating annually.

Section 3. No member may serve on more than two (2) standing committees, except the Executive Committee, simultaneously.

Section 4. The president of the board shall be an ex officio member of all committees, subcommittees and advisory committees. He shall hold no elective committee position. A committee chairman shall also be an ex officio member of subcommittees and advisory committees created and authorized by and for the committee.

Section 5. The executive director of the board shall serve ex officio as a member and as secretary of each committee. He may, however, appoint assistant secretaries from the Executive Board staff to assist him in the discharge of secretarial duties.

Section 6. All standing committees, except the Executive Committee and the Nominating Committee, shall consist of fifteen (15) or more elected members subject to the discretion of the board

Section 7. Each committee shall be responsible for reporting to the Executive Board at each regular board meeting and for formulating its respective portion of the board's annual report to the Convention

Section 8. All committees shall be of equal status with each committee reporting directly to the Executive Board; however, this shall not be construed as barring the submission by the Administrative Committee of requests for unallocated funds directly to the Business and Finance Committee or forbidding in any way cooperation among committees on common problems.

Section 9. The committees, themselves, shall determine the time, place, and frequency of their meetings unless the Executive Board directs otherwise.

Section 10. The executive director will maintain minutes of all official meetings of the board and its committees. These shall be available at the Executive Offices of the Executive Board.

Section 11. Standing committees of this board are authorized to create and utilize such subcommittees or advisory committees as may be necessary to the proper performance of their duties. A list of all such subcommittees or advisory committees and their membership shall be submitted to, and included in, the official minutes of the Executive Board. Persons other than elected members of the Executive Board may be utilized by the committee to render qualified service as advisory, nonvoting members on subcommittees and advisory committees.

Section 12. The **Nominating Committee** shall consist of nine (9) members appointed by the president of the Executive Board. One-third of the committee shall be appointed annually, subsequent to the meeting of the Convention but prior to the September meeting of the Executive Board. The Nominating Committee shall recommend assignment of Executive Board members to other standing committees of the board and shall also recommend officers for these committees.

Section 13. The responsibilities of the **Business and Finance Committee** shall be to advise and assist the Executive Board in recommending both long-range and short-range goals for the Convention; in recommending the allocations of undesignated resources of the Convention to its

respective agencies and institutions; and in recommending and appraising the financial policies and practices of the Convention and of its agencies and institutions.

Section 14. The **Administrative Committee's** principal function shall be to advise and assist the Executive Board in carrying out the program assigned by the Convention to the board for administration. The committee shall recommend plans of organization and general policies to the Executive Board for approval and shall itself review and approve administrative policies and actions as appropriate. The executive director shall report to the Executive Board through this committee. In the event of a vacancy in this position, this committee shall be the channel through which a successor shall be recommended to the Executive Board. The committee shall review and approve the budget proposals of the executive director concerning Executive Board programs and shall recommend to the Business and Finance Committee any desired allocation of undesignated funds. The committee shall also serve the Executive Board by having cognizance of such administrative problems as the board itself may have, including financial and administrative matters relating to standing and special committees of the Convention.

Section 15. The **Missions Support Committee** shall review and approve funds for mission budget supplements, church loans, and special requests from missions for financial assistance.

Section 16. The **Properties Committee** shall study and recommend property acquisition, sale, or lease, study and recommend insurance coverage on properties owned or leased by Executive Board, and study and recommend major building project(s) or renovation.

Section 17. The **Executive Committee** shall consist of the President and Vice President of the Executive Board, who shall serve as chairman and vice chairman respectively of the Executive Committee, plus the chairmen of the other five standing committees of the board. The Executive Committee's sole responsibility shall be to advise and assist the Executive board in carrying out its function as the convention ad interim to the extent this function is specifically delegated by the Convention. The committee shall not in any instance serve as a substitute for, or insert its judgment in lieu of that of the other standing committees of the board; nor shall it review of appraise the work of the other committees unless expressly so directed by the Executive Board. The Executive Committee shall have the duty of conducting the Executive Director's Annual Performance Review and recommending any adjustment to the Executive Director's compensation and benefits.

Section 18. The Executive Board may by resolution define more specifically the duties and responsibilities of its committees; provided, however, that duties and responsibilities contained in these bylaws shall be changed only through amendment of these bylaws.

#### ARTICLE V. THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR-TREASURER

Section 1. The executive director shall serve as the chief executive officer of the staff of the Executive Board. He shall be responsible for providing executive direction and leadership to all programs assigned to the Executive Board. The Administrative Committee shall determine in writing the specific responsibilities of the executive director; however, the committee itself shall not assume any executive or administrative functions.

Section 2. The executive director shall serve as the principal professional adviser and principal staff assistant to the Executive Board and all of its committees. In performing this function, the executive director is expected and directed to utilize all talents available to the Convention to the end that the Executive Board may be provided with the best possible assistance and advice.

Section 3. The executive director shall approve the employment of all Executive Board personnel. The employment procedures shall be in accordance with policies of the Executive Board.

Section 4. The executive director shall maintain on a current basis a policy manual and an organization manual that reflect the principal policies of the Convention and its general plan of organization. The manuals shall also include the principal policies and general plan of the organization of the Executive Board.

Section 5. When the office of the Executive Director becomes vacant, a successor shall be

elected by the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention. The name of the successor shall be recommended to the Board by a Search Committee comprised of the members of the Executive Committee and the Nominating Committee of the Board. The Search Committee shall be convened by the President of the Board upon the vacancy in the office or upon the notice by the Executive Director to vacate the office. The Search Committee will elect its own chairman, and once convened, will serve until the election of an Executive Director. However, the Executive Board, with proper notice and a two-thirds affirmative vote, may fill the office of the Executive Director at any meeting of the board without a recommendation from the Search Committee.

#### ARTICLE VI. AMENDMENTS

These bylaws may be amended at any meeting of the Executive Board provided:

- 1. Committee-sponsored amendments are announced at the preceding meeting of the board or published in the *Baptist Message* (print edition or digital edition) at least one month in advance of the board meeting at which they are considered.
  - 2. Amendments from the floor are proposed at one meeting and acted upon at the next meeting.
  - 3. Amendments to carry must receive a two-thirds vote of those present and voting.

#### LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION CHURCH SITE PLAN

#### I. PREAMBLE

That Louisiana Baptist Convention has been involved with churches and associations in the starting of new churches since its organization in 1848. The leaders of the Convention have been aware for some time that there was a need for some organization that could act promptly and efficiently in the matter of acquiring new church sites for developing new churches and missions. Accordingly, the following plan has been developed after thorough and open discussions of the matter by related staff persons, appropriate committees and subcommittees of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board, qualified lay persons in the fields of real estate, business, finance, and new churches.

#### II. ORGANIZATION

#### **Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation**

The Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation is a wholly-owned, non-profit, subsidiary corporation of the Executive Board, Louisiana Baptist Convention.

#### Purpose

The purpose shall be to assist Louisiana churches, associations, and the Louisiana Baptist Convention in the acquisitions of church sites for new Louisiana Baptist churches. The Church Site Corporation may purchase, receive, and otherwise acquire real and personal property for the establishment of new churches and missions, and to assist churches and associations related to the Louisiana Baptist Convention in acquiring real and personal property for the establishment of new churches and missions.

#### Membership and Participation

- 1. The membership of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board.
- The Board of Directors of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be elected by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board upon recommendation of the Nominating Committee of the Executive Board.
- 3. Participation in the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be open to all persons interested in the development of new churches and missions in Louisiana.
  - (1) Participation shall be by donation of a share(s) of donation.
  - (2) Donor of a share or more shall be entitled to receive:
    - a. A donation share certificate stating the number of shares donated. These shares may be donated in the name of the donor, a family member, some other person or a memorial to a deceased person.
    - A quarterly newsletter presenting the status, actions, and plans of the Church Site Corporation.
    - c. A copy of the annual financial statement of the Church Site Corporation.
  - 4. Relationship to Louisiana Baptist Convention Business and Financial Plan.

The Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall conduct its business, activities, programs, and projects subject to the Louisiana Baptist Convention Business and Financial Plan.

#### III. FUNDING

#### **Sources of Capital Funds**

- 1. Capital funds for the corpus of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be obtained by the receipt of donations for donation shares by individuals, churches, associations, businesses, foundations, and others interested in the development of new churches. The Church Site Corporation shall have the power to receive donation shares in the amount of 50,000 shares at \$25.00 per share initially. Subsequently, after the initial 50,000 shares have been donated, approval for additional shares must be secured from the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board.
- 2. The Church Site Corporation shall be responsible for administering the Mission Land Fund of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board. The corpus of the Mission Land Fund is to be transferred to the Church Site Corporation upon its activation on January 1, 1980. The Church Site Corporation shall have the responsibility of establishing policies and guidelines for this fund
- 3. The Church Site Corporation shall be empowered by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board to borrow money provided the Church Site Corporation can repay any and all loans with its own sources and does not require repayment of loans from Executive Board funds.
- 4. The Church Site Corporation may use its earnings from interest income, profits from property dealings, gifts, bequests and donations, unless otherwise specified by the donor, to increase the corpus of the Corporation.

#### Sources of Grant Funds

- 1. The Church Site Corporation may seek and receive gifts, bequests, and donations of certain monies or real or personal properties to be used as grants to churches and associations to assist in the acquisition of new church sites.
- 2. The Corporation may request and receive allocations for its grant program from the Georgia Barnette State Mission Offering.
- 3. The Corporation may request and receive allocations from the Louisiana Baptist Convention Cooperative Program Budget to be used in its grant program.
- 4. The Corporation may use the earnings from its interest income, profits from property dealings, gifts, bequests, and donations, unless otherwise specified by the donor, for its grant program.

#### IV. GUIDELINES

#### Name

The name of this plan shall be the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Plan and the name of the organization shall be the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation.

#### Responsibility

The Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be responsible to plan and conduct the affairs of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Plan as adopted by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board and the Louisiana Baptist Convention and as revised from time to time by the Executive Board.

#### Nomination and Election of Board of Directors

The Church Site Corporation shall consist of nine (9) members elected by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board upon recommendation of the Executive Board Nominating Committee, and four (4) ex officio members.

1. The Board of Directors shall be composed of nine (9) elected members and four (4) ex officio members as follows:

- a. Six (6) mission-minded persons (usually lay persons) experienced in finance, business or real estate, representing different areas of Louisiana.
- b. Three (3) mission-minded church staff members with experience in real estate and new churches, if possible.
- c. Four (4) ex officio members, the Louisiana Baptist Convention president, the chairman of the Executive Board, the chairman of the Missions Support Committee and the Executive Director.
  - 2. Nominations to be developed in accordance with the procedures of the Executive Board.
- 3. The elected members of the Board of Directors shall serve for three years, and be eligible to serve a second three-year term. (In the beginning some members should be elected for three, four, and five-year terms in order to establish the rotation system.)

#### Officers

The officers of the Corporation shall consist of a president, vice president, and recording secretary. The recording secretary shall be the Executive Director of the Louisiana Baptist Convention or his designate.

The general counsel for the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board shall serve as legal advisor of the Corporation.

#### **Meetings of the Board of Directors**

The meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held in the Baptist Building, Alexandria, or in such place as may be designated by the Board of Directors or its officers. The Board of Directors shall meet at least twice each year, and as often as necessary to carry on the business of the Corporation. The President shall have the authority to call a meeting of the Board of Directors when it is deemed expedient to do so.

A majority of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

#### **Duties of the Board of Directors**

The Board shall meet at stated times for the purpose of conducting the affairs of the Corporation. It shall also be the responsibility of the Board to make or have made certain studies of population and other data to establish trends and needs for new churches. The Board shall make decisions related to acquiring new church sites based upon demographic data, land surveys, appraisals, zoning, evidence of good title, legal description of the property, participation of local forces in the financing of the project, maintenance of the property, program evaluation, priority of the new work, available funds or other such information that the Board may require.

It is anticipated that the field work and studies shall be done by appropriate staff members of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board whose program assignments relate to new churches.

The Board shall also make regular reports of its work and actions to the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board.

#### **Authority of the Board of Directors**

- 1. The Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall have authority under its own charter to purchase, subdivide, sell, lease, rent, exchange, donate, and finance the purchase and/or sale of real and personal property to be used for purposes consistent with its stated program.
- 2. The Corporation shall have the authority to loan, or make grants to churches and associations related to the Louisiana Baptist Convention, so long as it does not diminish its corpus funds; terms of the loans and grants shall be established by the Board of Directors of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation.
- 3. It shall be the duty and responsibility of the Corporation to actively seek out priority and strategic church sites in all areas of Louisiana.

- 4. The Corporation shall discuss and utilize the services of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board and staff persons of the Executive Board assigned to work with the development of new churches.
- 5. All properties purchased by the Church Site Corporation shall be held in the name of the Corporation.

#### **Working Arrangements**

- 1. The Board of Directors shall work with appropriate program leaders on the staff of the Executive Board in carrying out this work. It shall also be responsible to work with local churches and associations in the acquisition of new church sites. If it is not feasible to work with local Baptist leaders, the Board may proceed as necessary.
- 2. Any properties given to the Louisiana Baptist Convention through the Church Site Corporation shall be given without restrictions, except as agreed upon by the Board of Directors.
- 3. A local Baptist Church cooperating with the Louisiana Baptist Convention and the local association shall have the responsibility of sponsoring each new mission. It will be the normal procedure for the Board of Directors to have in hand a plan for each new church site, before it is purchased.
- 4. When new church sites are conveyed to sponsoring churches, certain stipulations shall be made to the church by the Board of Directors as follows:
- a. The sponsoring church may not change the agreed upon financial plan for development without first consulting the Board of Directors.
- b. The sponsoring church shall inform the mission church of the financial contributions made by the Church Site Corporation, the association and the sponsoring church in the acquisition of the property.
- c. It shall be the sponsoring church's responsibility to enter into an agreement with its mission and the Louisiana Baptist Convention whereby any monies given or granted by the Corporation will be returned should such mission, or mission and sponsoring church, or mission after it is constituted as a church, disassociates itself from the Louisiana Baptist Convention. A recommended instrument shall be provided by the Church Site Corporation.
- 5. The Business Division office of the Louisiana Baptist Convention will be responsible to provide accounting and other business services to the Church Site Corporation.

#### Revisions

The provision of this document may be revised or amended by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board at any regular or special meeting of the Executive Board, acting on the recommendation of appropriate committees of the Executive Board.

### BAPTIST FAITH AND MESSAGE Adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, June 14, 2000

The 1999 session of the Southern Baptist Convention, meeting in Atlanta, Georgia, adopted the following motion addressed to the President of the Convention:

"I move that in your capacity as Southern Baptist Convention chairman, you appoint a blue ribbon committee to review the *Baptist Faith and Message* statement with the responsibility to report and bring any recommendations to this meeting next June in Orlando."

President Paige Patterson appointed the committee as follows: Max Barnett (OK), Steve Gaines (AL), Susie Hawkins (TX), Rudy A. Hernandez (TX), Charles S. Kelley, Jr. (LA), Heather King (IN), Richard D. Land (TN), Fred Luter (LA), R. Albert Mohler, Jr. (KY), T. C. Pinckney (VA), Nelson Price (GA), Adrian Rogers (TN), Roger Spradlin (CA), Simon Tsoi (AZ), Jerry Vines (FL). Adrian Rogers (TN) was appointed chairman.

Your committee thus constituted begs leave to present its report as follows:

Baptists are a people of deep beliefs and cherished doctrines. Throughout our history we have been a confessional people, adopting statements of faith as a witness to our beliefs and a pledge of our faithfulness to the doctrines revealed in Holy Scripture.

Our confessions of faith are rooted in historical precedent, as the church in every age has been called upon to define and defend its beliefs. Each generation of Christians bears the responsibility of guarding the treasury of truth that has been entrusted to us [2 Timothy 1:14]. Facing a new century, Southern Baptists must meet the demands and duties of the present hour.

New challenges to faith appear in every age. A pervasive anti-supernaturalism in the culture was answered by Southern Baptists in 1925, when the *Baptist Faith and Message* was first adopted by this Convention. In 1963, Southern Baptists responded to assaults upon the authority and truthfulness of the Bible by adopting revisions to the *Baptist Faith and Message*. The Convention added an article on "The Family" in 1998, thus answering cultural confusion with the clear teachings of Scripture. Now, faced with a culture hostile to the very notion of truth, this generation of Baptists must claim anew the eternal truths of the Christian faith.

Your committee respects and celebrates the heritage of the *Baptist Faith and Message*, and affirms the decision of the Convention in 1925 to adopt the *New Hampshire Confession of Faith*, "revised at certain points and with some additional articles growing out of certain needs . . . ." We also respect the important contributions of the 1925 and 1963 editions of the *Baptist Faith and Message*.

With the 1963 committee, we have been guided in our work by the 1925 "statement of the historic Baptist conception of the nature and function of confessions of faith in our religious and denominational life . . . ." It is, therefore, quoted in full as a part of this report to the Convention:

- (1) That they constitute a consensus of opinion of some Baptist body, large or small, for the general instruction and guidance of our own people and others concerning those articles of the Christian faith which are most surely held among us. They are not intended to add anything to the simple conditions of salvation revealed in the New Testament, viz., repentance toward God and faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord.
- (2) That we do not regard them as complete statements of our faith, having any quality of finality or infallibility. As in the past so in the future, Baptists should hold themselves free to revise their statements of faith as may seem to them wise and expedient at any time.
- (3) That any group of Baptists, large or small, have the inherent right to draw up for themselves and publish to the world a confession of their faith whenever they may think it advisable to do so.

- (4) That the sole authority for faith and practice among Baptists is the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments. Confessions are only guides in interpretation, having no authority over the conscience.
- (5) That they are statements of religious convictions, drawn from the Scriptures, and are not to be used to hamper freedom of thought or investigation in other realms of life.

Baptists cherish and defend religious liberty, and deny the right of any secular or religious authority to impose a confession of faith upon a church or body of churches. We honor the principles of soul competency and the priesthood of believers, affirming together both our liberty in Christ and our accountability to each other under the Word of God.

Baptist churches, associations, and general bodies have adopted confessions of faith as a witness to the world, and as instruments of doctrinal accountability. We are not embarrassed to state before the world that these are doctrines we hold precious and as essential to the Baptist tradition of faith and practice.

As a committee, we have been charged to address the "certain needs" of our own generation. In an age increasingly hostile to Christian truth, our challenge is to express the truth as revealed in Scripture, and to bear witness to Jesus Christ, who is "the Way, the Truth, and the Life."

The 1963 committee rightly sought to identify and affirm "certain definite doctrines that Baptists believe, cherish, and with which they have been and are now closely identified." Our living faith is established upon eternal truths. "Thus this generation of Southern Baptists is in historic succession of intent and purpose as it endeavors to state for its time and theological climate those articles of the Christian faith which are most surely held among us."

It is the purpose of this statement of faith and message to set forth certain teachings which we believe.

#### THE BAPTIST FAITH & MESSAGE

#### I. THE SCRIPTURES

The Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is God's revelation of Himself to man. It is a perfect treasure of divine instruction. It has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth, without any mixture of error, for its matter. Therefore, all Scripture is totally true and trustworthy. It reveals the principles by which God judges us, and therefore is, and will remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and religious opinions should be tried. All Scripture is a testimony to Christ, who is Himself the focus of divine revelation.

#### III. MAN

Man is the special creation of God, made in His own image. He created them male and female as the crowning work of His creation. The gift of gender is thus part of the goodness of God's creation. In the beginning man was innocent of sin and was endowed by his Creator with freedom of choice. By his free choice man sinned against God and brought sin into the human race. Through the temptation of Satan man transgressed the command of God, and fell from his original innocence whereby his posterity inherit a nature and an environment inclined toward sin. Therefore, as soon as they are capable of moral action, they become transgressors and are under condemnation. Only the grace of God can bring man into His holy fellowship and enable man to fulfill the creative purpose of God. The sacredness of human personality is evident in that God created man in His own image, and in that Christ died for man; therefore, every person of every race possesses full dignity and is worthy of respect and Christian love.

#### IV. SALVATION

Salvation involves the redemption of the whole man, and is offered freely to all who accept Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour, who by His own blood obtained eternal redemption for the believer. In its broadest sense salvation includes regeneration, justification, sanctification, and glorification. There is no salvation apart from personal faith in Jesus Christ as Lord.

A. Regeneration, or the new birth, is a work of God's grace whereby believers become new creatures in Christ Jesus. It is a change of heart wrought by the Holy Spirit through conviction

of sin, to which the sinner responds in repentance toward God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. Repentance and faith are inseparable experiences of grace.

Repentance is a genuine turning from sin toward God. Faith is the acceptance of Jesus Christ and commitment of the entire personality to Him as Lord and Saviour.

B. Justification is God's gracious and full acquittal upon principles of His righteousness of all sinners who repent and believe in Christ. Justification brings the believer unto a relationship of peace and favor with God.

C. Sanctification is the experience, beginning in regeneration, by which the believer is set apart to God's purposes, and is enabled to progress toward moral and spiritual maturity through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit dwelling in him. Growth in grace should continue throughout the regenerate person's life.

D. Glorification is the culmination of salvation and is the final blessed and abiding state of the redeemed.

#### V. GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE

Election is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates, justifies, sanctifies, and glorifies sinners. It is consistent with the free agency of man, and comprehends all the means in connection with the end. It is the glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, and is infinitely wise, holy, and unchangeable. It excludes boasting and promotes humility.

All true believers endure to the end. Those whom God has accepted in Christ, and sanctified by His Spirit, will never fall away from the state of grace, but shall persevere to the end. Believers may fall into sin through neglect and temptation, whereby they grieve the Spirit, impair their graces and comforts, and bring reproach on the cause of Christ and temporal judgments on themselves; yet they shall be kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

#### VI. THE CHURCH

A New Testament church of the Lord Jesus Christ is an autonomous local congregation of baptized believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; observing the two ordinances of Christ, governed by His laws, exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word, and seeking to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth. Each congregation operates under the Lordship of Christ through democratic processes. In such a congregation each member is responsible and accountable to Christ as Lord. Its scriptural officers are pastors and deacons. While both men and women are gifted for service in the church, the office of pastor is limited to men as qualified by Scripture.

The New Testament speaks also of the church as the Body of Christ which includes all of the redeemed of all the ages, believers from every tribe, and tongue, and people, and nation.

#### VII. BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. It is an act of obedience symbolizing the believer's faith in a crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, the believer's death to sin, the burial of the old life, and the resurrection to walk in newness of life in Christ Jesus. It is a testimony to his faith in the final resurrection of the dead. Being a church ordinance, it is prerequisite to the privileges of church membership and to the Lord's Supper.

The Lord's Supper is a symbolic act of obedience whereby members of the church, through partaking of the bread and the fruit of the vine, memorialize the death of the Redeemer and anticipate His second coming.

#### VIII. THE LORD'S DAY

The first day of the week is the Lord's Day. It is a Christian institution for regular observance. It commemorates the resurrection of Christ from the dead and should include exercises of worship and spiritual devotion, both public and private. Activities on the Lord's Day should be commensurate with the Christian's conscience under the Lordship of Jesus Christ.

#### IX. THE KINGDOM

The Kingdom of God includes both His general sovereignty over the universe and His particular kingship over men who willfully acknowledge Him as King. Particularly the Kingdom is the realm of salvation into which men enter by trustful, childlike commitment to Jesus Christ. Christians ought to pray and to labor that the Kingdom may come and God's will be done on earth. The full consummation of the Kingdom awaits the return of Jesus Christ and the end of this age.

#### X. LAST THINGS

God, in His own time and in His own way, will bring the world to its appropriate end. The unrighteous will be consigned to Hell, the place of everlasting punishment. The righteous in their resurrected and glorified bodies will receive their reward and will dwell forever in Heaven with the Lord.

#### XI. EVANGELISM AND MISSIONS

It is the duty and privilege of every follower of Christ and of every church of the Lord Jesus Christ to endeavor to make disciples of all nations. The new birth of man's spirit by God's Holy Spirit means the birth of love for others. Missionary effort on the part of all rests thus upon a spiritual necessity of the regenerate life, and is expressly and repeatedly commanded in the teachings of Christ. The Lord Jesus Christ has commanded the preaching of the gospel to all nations. It is the duty of every child of God to seek constantly to win the lost to Christ by verbal witness undergirded by a Christian lifestyle, and by other methods in harmony with the gospel of Christ.

#### XII. EDUCATION

Christianity is the faith of enlightenment and intelligence. In Jesus Christ abide all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge. All sound learning is, therefore, a part of our Christian heritage. The new birth opens all human faculties and creates a thirst for knowledge. Moreover, the cause of education in the Kingdom of Christ is co-ordinate with the causes of missions and general benevolence, and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches. An adequate system of Christian education is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people.

In Christian education there should be a proper balance between academic freedom and academic responsibility. Freedom in any orderly relationship of human life is always limited and never absolute. The freedom of a teacher in a Christian school, college, or seminary is limited by the pre-eminence of Jesus Christ, by the authoritative nature of the Scriptures, and by the distinct purpose for which the school exists.

#### XIII. STEWARDSHIP

God is the source of all blessings, temporal and spiritual; all that we have and are we owe to Him. Christians have a spiritual debtorship to the whole world, a holy trusteeship in the gospel, and a binding stewardship in their possessions. They are therefore under obligation to serve Him with their time, talents, and material possessions; and should recognize all these as entrusted to them to use for the glory of God and for helping others. According to the Scriptures, Christians should contribute of their means cheerfully, regularly, systematically, proportionately, and liberally for the advancement of the Redeemer's cause on earth.

#### XIV. COOPERATION

Christ's people should, as occasion requires, organize such associations and conventions as may best secure cooperation for the great objects of the Kingdom of God. Such organizations have no authority over one another or over the churches. They are voluntary and advisory bodies designed to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of our people in the most effective manner. Members of New Testament churches should cooperate with one another in carrying forward the missionary, educational, and benevolent ministries for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Christian unity in the New Testament sense is spiritual harmony and voluntary cooperation for common ends by various groups of Christ's people. Cooperation is desirable between the various Christian denominations, when the end to be attained is itself justified, and when such cooperation involves no violation of conscience or compromise of loyalty to Christ and His Word as revealed in the New Testament.

#### XV. THE CHRISTIAN AND THE SOCIAL ORDER

All Christians are under obligation to seek to make the will of Christ supreme in our own lives and in human society. Means and methods used for the improvement of society and the establishment of righteousness among men can be truly and permanently helpful only when they are rooted in the regeneration of the individual by the saving grace of God in Jesus Christ. In the spirit of Christ, Christians should oppose racism, every form of greed, selfishness, and vice, and all forms of sexual immorality, including adultery, homosexuality, and pornography. We should work to provide for the orphaned, the needy, the abused, the aged, the helpless, and the sick. We should speak on behalf of the unborn and contend for the sanctity of all human life from conception to natural death. Every Christian should seek to bring industry, government, and society as a whole under the sway of the principles of righteousness, truth, and brotherly love. In order to promote these ends Christians should be ready to work with all men of good will in any good cause, always being careful to act in the spirit of love without compromising their loyalty to Christ and His truth.

#### XVI. PEACE AND WAR

It is the duty of Christians to seek peace with all men on principles of righteousness. In accordance with the spirit and teachings of Christ they should do all in their power to put an end to war.

The true remedy for the war spirit is the gospel of our Lord. The supreme need of the world is the acceptance of His teachings in all the affairs of men and nations, and the practical application of His law of love. Christian people throughout the world should pray for the reign of the Prince of Peace.

#### XVII. RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

God alone is Lord of the conscience, and He has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to His Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to every church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Civil government being ordained of God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to the civil power to carry on its work. The gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its ends. The state has no right to impose penalties for religious opinions of any kind. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal, and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

#### XVIII. THE FAMILY

God has ordained the family as the foundational institution of human society. It is composed of persons related to one another by marriage, blood, or adoption.

Marriage is the uniting of one man and one woman in covenant commitment for a lifetime. It is God's unique gift to reveal the union between Christ and His church and to provide for the man and the woman in marriage the framework for intimate companionship, the channel of sexual expression according to biblical standards, and the means for procreation of the human race.

The husband and wife are of equal worth before God, since both are created in God's image. The marriage relationship models the way God relates to His people. A husband is to love his wife as Christ loved the church. He has the God-given responsibility to provide for, to protect, and to lead his family. A wife is to submit herself graciously to the servant leadership of her husband even as the church willingly submits to the headship of Christ. She, being in the image of God as is her husband and thus equal to him, has the God-given responsibility to respect her husband and to serve as his helper in managing the household and nurturing the next generation.

Children, from the moment of conception, are a blessing and heritage from the Lord. Parents are to demonstrate to their children God's pattern for marriage. Parents are to teach their children spiritual and moral values and to lead them, through consistent lifestyle example and loving discipline, to make choices based on biblical truth. Children are to honor and obey their parents.

#### CHURCH-STATE RELATIONS

#### OUR HISTORIC CONCEPT OF RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

Democracy itself is rooted in the assumption that man is capable of making the choices needed for governance of his own life and his social institutions. This assumption is based in turn on the Christian concept that man is essentially a spiritual being; and only through the responses of his spiritual nature can he relate himself to God and thus rise above his animal limitations. But only one who is free can make a genuine response to God. Religious freedom is, therefore, antecedent to the creation of civil and political freedom, which constitutes the nature of democracy.

Historically, Baptists have been aggressive advocates of absolute freedom of conscience for all men. In England and Colonial America they led in formulating the concept of church-state separation. The power of government then was arbitrary and absolute, backed by an established church, the two often working in collusion to give mutual support to each other. The established church forced its doctrine and modes of worship upon all, with government lending use of its power to punish dissenters. Thus protected and supported, the established church itself was a strong political force. When joined to protect and expand their mutual vested interests, the two constituted a powerful political combine, perpetuating their power through forcing conformity in worship and stamping out dissent.

Baptists believed that this denied to man the right to live as God had willed that he live, a free and self-determining being. It destroyed an individual's liberty of the spirit, freedom of conscience, right of choice - in short, all that made a man a man, according to the Baptist conception. It was in the context of these experiences that Baptists evolved their unique conception of complete separation of the two in their respective operations.

During the evolution of the separation concept their focus of concern was always to protect the individual, Baptist or not, in the free exercise of his religious conscience, always, of course, within the context of the Christian concept of life dedicated to ministering to and serving the needs of people - whether family, neighbor or stranger. Just so on the present issue. Louisiana Baptists recognize, as Jesus indicated to Peter on the mountain top, that their place is down there in the valley where the people are - teaching, healing, serving. We are free, not to enjoy release from the demands of life, but to carry out the work of our Lord on the streets of life where men work, learn, and suffer.

#### **GUIDELINES**

This committee was appointed essentially "to recommend guidelines for policy implementation" concerning institutional use of governmental funds. In actuality, the Louisiana Baptist Convention has by its practice already adopted a general policy of selective participation in government programs, wherever it was felt there was no impingement on the institution's independence. It is the element of "selectivity" in this policy that makes it essential, for the guidance of all concerned - the Convention officers and the trustees and administrators of the institution. Out of its deliberations, the committee has identified certain statements of general principle which appear to offer valid guidelines for those responsible for institutional decision making.

#### First: The Institution Should Identify and Clarify Its Basic Purposes.

Through continuing study and open discussion, the administrators, staff, and representatives of the governing board should develop a clear-cut understanding of the basic nature and purposes of the institution. This should be reduced to writing and circulated regularly among all related in any way with the institution.

This study should become an ongoing process of constant re-evaluation in light of our constantly changing social and technological demands. To provide leadership for this is a function of the executive officer.

# Second: Any Assistance That Creates a Limitation on or Diversion From These Purposes Should Not Be Permitted.

Once the institutional staff and its constituency are clear in their concept of the institution's nature and primary purposes, all limitations or diversions, financial or otherwise, should be avoided.

#### Third: Acceptance of Government Grants.

No grant to the institution from any government agency shall be accepted. A grant shall be construed to be any transfer of funds or property for which the institution does not give adequate consideration.

#### Fourth: The Institution Must Retain Its Own Integrity In the Matter of Control.

In considering whether to seek or accept funds of any type, the institution must determine whether any part of the agreement provides for governmental control of the institution's affairs - except for normal accounting procedure for the shared funds.

The institution must retain the right to determine what religious activities will be held on the premises. The Trustees of the institution and their staff must have freedom to operate in accordance with principles and policies inherent in good programs and not on the expediency of politics.

#### Fifth: Participation Relationships Must be Voluntary, With Clear-Cut Terminal Arrangements.

In participating in government programs, the relationship should be voluntary on both sides, with either party able to terminate the agreement when it appears desirable. The agreement should indicate clearly the point at which the participating institution has fulfilled its obligation in the contract.

#### Sixth: The Institution Must Not Become Dependent on These Funds for Program Operation.

The trustees should not permit acceptance of funds in any area of program to such an extent that the institution becomes so dependent on outside funds that it would suffer unduly if they were discontinued.

#### Seventh: The Institution Must Protect the Integrity of Its Basic Programs.

The trustees must guard against any tendency on the part of the institution to become so involved with government programs that the institutional programs begin to grow around the emphasis on this public phase of its work to the neglect of its private sector.

#### Eighth: The Institution Must Not Accept Funds That Relate to Teaching of Religion.

The trustees should not accept any governmental funds that might in any way come to influence the way in which religion is taught or the word of God spread in the institution.

# Ninth: The Institution's Trustees Should Have a Large Degree of Freedom in Decision-making In These Operational Matters.

After the Convention has adopted a definite statement of policy guidelines, it should give the institutional trustees a large degree of freedom, within the guidelines, to formulate programs and make decisions affecting the ongoing program in this area as in others. With appropriate reporting through the established channels, the trustees will keep the Convention informed on their program decisions. Only so can the Convention and the trustees perform their respective roles with integrity.

The proper function of the Convention is to establish over-all policy directions. That of the trustees and their administrators is to develop and implement programs for the individual institutions within the framework of these established policy statements.

- 3. Stewart Holloway, pastor, First, Pineville, led in prayer.
- 4. David Cranford made the following presidential appointments: Parliamentarian: Reggie Ogea, member, First, Covington Tellers Committee Chairman: Tim Hisaw, pastor, Tioga, First, Pineville Tellers Committee: Susan Duke, Tioga First Baptist Church; Thomas Pharris, Tioga First Baptist Church; Janice Pharris, Tioga First Baptist Church; Clark Palmer, Faith Baptist Church; Stuart Sasser, Philadelphia Baptist Church, Horseshoe; David Shaw, Parkview Baptist Church; Jeremy Shepherd, Pineville Park Baptist Church; Christian Stubbs, Calvary Baptist Church Woodworth;

I move that the following standing rules be adopted: That the President be allowed to make minor changes as may be necessary to the agenda; that nominating speeches for officers be limited to three (3) minutes each; that debate on matters coming before the Convention be limited to two speakers for and two speakers against for a period of up to three minutes each; that persons addressing the Convention must state their name and church before they will be recognized by the Chair; and that no person addressing the Convention may speak more than twice on the same subject without unanimous consent. The Committee on Nominations and the Committee on Committees reports will be first presented and then followed by nominations from the floor, if any. Then the Committee reports shall be voted on for adoption by the Convention. If the Committee reports are adopted as presented, then the vote on persons nominated from the floor becomes moot. That a time for questions be provided following the reports of convention entities and the Executive Board. These standing rules are printed on page 37 of the Book of Reports.

- 12. David Cranford called for a raised ballot vote on the motion, and the motion carried.
- 13. David Cranford called for introduction of motions. There were none.
- LBC First Vice President, Leroy Fountain, assumed the chair for this portion of the session.
- 15. LBC President, David Cranford, presented the President's Address using II Corinthians 4:1-18 as his text stating that this is not a time for Louisiana Baptists to give up. He concluded his address with prayer.
- Committee on Credentials Chairman, Todd Free, announced 382 messengers registered.
- 17. Leroy Fountain called for nominations for Louisiana Baptist Convention President.
- Philip Robertson, messenger, Philadelphia, Deville, nominated David Cranford, pastor, First, Ponchatoula, as LBC President.
- 19. Leroy Fountain called for other nominations. There were no other nominees.
- In compliance with Article VIII, Section 2, of the LBC Constitution, LBC Secretary/ Treasurer, Steve Horn, cast a unanimous ballot for David Cranford as President of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.
- 21. LBC President David Cranford assumed the chair.
- Committee on Nominations Chairman, Chuck McInturf, Woodridge, Shreveport, presented the Committee on Nominations Report as printed on pages 33-36 of the Book of Reports and moved the adoption of the report.
- 23. David Cranford called for additional nominations. There were none.
- 24. David Cranford called for the question and the motion carried.
- 25. Committee on Committees Chairman, Ray Swift, messenger, First, Lafayette, presented the Committee on Committees Report as printed on pages 31-32 of the *Book of Reports* and moved the adoption of the report.
- 26. David Cranford called for additional nominations. There were none.
- 27. David Cranford called for the guestion and the motion carried.

- 28. Executive Board President, David Goza, pastor, Jefferson, Baton Rouge, presented the report from the Executive Board as printed on pages 10-13 of the *Book of Reports*. David Goza moved the adoption of the 2021 Cooperative Program Allocation Budget of \$18,653,700 (Recommendation 1) as printed on page 20 of the *Book of Reports*.
- 29. David Cranford called for the question and the motion was adopted.
- David Goza moved the adoption of amending the LBC Articles of Incorporation and LBC Bylaws as printed in the *Book of Reports* on pages 14-16 (Recommendations 2-5).
- 31. Lewis Richerson, messenger, Woodlawn, Baton Rouge, called for a friendly amendment to the motion as follows:

On page 18 in the Book of Reports under #1 adding "by a 3/4 majority" instead of it reading as simply a majority. Second under numbers 2 and 8 on pages 18 and 19 adding the following: "then the executive director of the Executive Board of the LBC AND the President of the Executive Board may declare..."

- Vincent Bellone, messenger, First, Lafayette, asked if the motion could read 2/3
  majority instead of 3/4 majority.
- 33. Lewis Richerson agreed to the suggested amendment to his motion.
- 34. Steve James, messenger, Trinity, Lake Charles, spoke against the motion stating that during an extreme emergency you do not have the opportunity to gather everyone and possibly have limited or no communications. Such was the case during Hurricane Laura in Lake Charles and decisions were made on behalf of the church.
- Calvin Hubbard, messenger, Barksdale, Bossier City, stated the motion is out of order because it is for recommendation 11 and not related to recommendations 2-5 which is the motion on the floor.
- 36. David Cranford declared a five minute recess.
- 37. David Cranford reconvened the session following a five minute recess.
- 38. Lewis Richerson, messenger, Woodlawn, Baton Rouge, withdrew his motion to amend.
- David Cranford called for the question on Executive Board recommendations 2-5, and the motion was adopted.
- 40. David Goza moved the adoption of amending LBC Article XII of the LBC Business and Financial Plan as printed in the *Book of Reports* on page 16 (Recommendation 6).
- 41. David Cranford called for the question and the motion was adopted.
- 42. David Goza moved the adoption of amending the LBC Executive Board Articles of Incorporation and LBC Executive Board Bylaws as printed in the *Book of Reports* on pages 16-19 (Recommendations 7-12).
- 43. David Cranford called for the question and the motion was adopted.
- 44. David Goza concluded the Executive Board Report by referring messengers to the printed report in the *Book of Reports* regarding the Executive Board's response to motions presented at the 2018 and 2019 LBC Annual Meeting.
- 45. David Cranford called for questions regarding the Executive Board report.
- 46. David Cranford called for Introduction of Motions.
- 47. Brad Jurkovich, messenger, First, Bossier City, asked about consideration of resolutions during the Committee on Resolutions report.
- 48. David Cranford responded resolutions would be addressed during the Committee on Resolutions report.
- 49. Louisiana College President, Dr. Rick Brewer, presented the Louisiana College Report stating the vision statement of Louisiana College continues to be preparing graduates and transforming lives. Dr. Brewer recognized Louisiana College board president, Dr. David Jeffreys, messenger, Highland, New Iberia. Dr. Jeffreys presented background information related to the number of trustees on the Louisiana

College board. He concluded his presentation with a video of Louisiana College board member, Ray Young, First, Wisner, who had submitted the recommendation to reduce the number of board members to the Louisiana College board.

50. David Jeffreys presented the following motion:

The Louisiana College Board of Trustees recommends that the Louisiana Baptist Convention meeting in Pineville, Louisiana, November 10, 2020 amend the Louisiana College Articles of Incorporation, Article IV, Section 2, by reducing the number of trustees appointed by the Louisiana Baptist Convention from 33 to 21.

- 51. Dr. Jeffreys stated the move will be made through attrition over the next few years through the LBC Committee on Nominations process.
- 52. Jay Adkins, messenger, First, Westwego, and former Louisiana College board member, spoke in favor of the motion stating that after serving on the board, he felt it would be a smart move to reduce the board to a smaller number.
- 53. Vincent Bellone, messenger, First, Lafayette, questioned as to why there were as many trustees and how will they be reduced. Dr. Brewer responded that the number had been determined many years before and that the move will be made through attrition over the next few years.
- 54. David Cranford called for a raised ballot vote on the motion and the motion carried.
- 55. David Cranford called for questions regarding the Louisiana College Report.
- 56. Executive Director Steve Horn presented the Executive Director's report. Horn stated that in Louisiana we are tough; we are tired, but we are resilient. Louisiana Baptists have been resilient in giving and resilient in gathering. He stated we may have been confined, but not contained. Horn's address included a video of the damage to Louisiana Baptist churches as a result of Hurricanes Laura and Delta. Horn concluded his remarks by stating that God's grace is always sufficient and it is always enough.
- 57. Dustin Stockstill, pastor, Bedico, Ponchatoula, led in closing prayer and the first session adjourned at 2:42 p.m.

#### Session Two

- 58. President David Cranford called the second session of the 173rd Annual Meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention to order at 3:00 p.m. A quorum was present.
- 59. Ricky Draper led in a time of praise and worship.
- 60. Steven Beckham, messenger, Church of Life, Baton Rouge, led in the opening prayer.
- 61. David Cranford called for nominations for LBC First Vice President.
- 62. David Denton, messenger, Highland, New Iberia, nominated David Jeffreys, member, Highland, New Iberia.
- 63. David Cranford called for other nominations. There were no other nominations.
- 64. In compliance with Article VIII, Section 2 of the LBC Constitution, LBC Secretary/ Treasurer, Steve Horn, cast a unanimous ballot for David Jeffreys as First Vice President of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.
- David Cranford declared David Jeffreys as First Vice-President-elect of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.
- 66. Executive Editor of the *Baptist Message*, Will Hall, presented the *Baptist Message* report. Dr. Hall stated that although during the pandemic, the paper was temporarily out of print, the *Baptist Message* continued to publish and spread the gospel through social media. Hall announced changes in the production schedule beginning in January 2021. Subscription rate will remain at \$14.00, but the paper will move

- from 24 productions to 14 productions per year. Hall also expressed appreciation to Louisiana Baptists for their efforts in supporting and passing Amendment #1. He concluded his report by presenting the Shammah's Courage Award to Brian Gunter, pastor, First, Pollock.
- 67. David Cranford called for questions regarding the *Baptist Message* report.
- 68. Committee on Moral and Social Concerns Chairman, Brian Gunter presented the Committee on Moral and Social Concerns Report as printed on page 39 in the *Book of Reports* stating that one day soon there will be no legal abortions in Louisiana that will be due primarily due to the work and efforts of Louisiana Baptists.
- 69. Vice President of Development and Public Relations, Marc Eichelberger presented the Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries Report highlighting the ministries of the Children's Home. He shared that over 2,200 children and others had been served in the past year. He concluded his report with personal testimonies from individuals whose lives had been impacted by the work of the Children's Home.
- 70. David Cranford called for questions regarding the Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries report.
- 71. Louisiana Baptist Foundation Executive Director, Jeff Steed, presented a report to the messengers. Steed stated that the Foundation is advancing the kingdom one dollar at a time, one ministry at a time, and one life at a time. He presented an overview of the services to ministries and to individuals. He concluded his report with a brief overview of the LBF Vision.
- 72. David Cranford called for questions regarding the Louisiana Baptist Foundation report.
- 73. David Cranford called for nominations for LBC Second Vice President.
- 74. Neil Everett, messenger, First, Calhoun, nominated William Smith, pastor, Lakeshore, Monroe.
- 75. David Cranford called for other nominations. There were no other nominations.
- 76. In compliance with Article VIII, Section 2 of the LBC Constitution, LBC Secretary/
  Treasurer, Steve Horn, cast a unanimous ballot for William Smith as Second Vice
  President of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.
- David Cranford declared William Smith as Second Vice-President-elect of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.
- 78. Steve James, pastor, Trinity, Lake Charles, expressed appreciation to Louisiana Baptists for their help to those in the Lake Charles area due to Hurricane Laura. James stated that as a result of the resources and money shared, Trinity was able to minister to those in the community. James stated that over 250 people came to know the Lord and Trinity could not have done it on their own.
- 79. Committee on Resolutions Chairman, Steve McAlister presented the Committee on Resolutions report. McAlister reminded messengers that the committee brought a resolution to last year's Annual Meeting to support the Love Life Amendment and expressed appreciation to the messengers for their support. McAlister referred messengers to the printed resolution on page 38 of the *Book of Reports*. McAlister stated that with the recommendation from Executive Director Steve Horn, he embraced the idea of one resolution in that the Gospel is the answer to all the problems facing us. He stated the committee felt that by passing one resolution it would show unity of Louisiana Baptists.
- 80. Nathaniel Gardner, messenger, Pineville Park, Pineville, presented a motion that the report be amended to strike "this one and only resolution".
- 81. David Cranford called for a raised ballot vote on the amendment and the amendment failed.
- 82. David Cranford called for a raised ballot vote on the Committee on Resolutions

- original report and the motion carried.
- 83. Ricky Draper led in a time of praise and worship music.
- 84. Steve McAlister, pastor, Westside, Natchitoches preached the Convention sermon using Genesis 1:26-27, Genesis 2:15-17, and Genesis 3:22-24 as his text. McAlister reminded messengers of how God has blessed America and how the church can also bless America too.
- 85. David Cranford recognized outgoing LBC First Vice President, Leroy Fountain and presented him with a plaque.
- 86. Steve Horn recognized re-elected LBC President, David Cranford, First, Ponchatoula, and led in prayer for Dr. Cranford.
- 87. David Cranford recognized newly elected LBC First Vice President, David Jeffreys, member, Highland, New Iberia, and Second Vice President William Smith, pastor, Lakeshore, Monroe.
- 88. Jack West, pastor, Holloway, Deville, led in the benediction.
- 89. President David Cranford adjourned the 173rd Annual Meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention at 4:48 p.m.

At the 2018 LBC Annual Meeting, the following motion was made by Myrt Hales, Jr., messenger from First Baptist Church, Rayville:

I move that the Louisiana Baptist Convention form a committee to explore establishing a Christian-based addiction recovery center to aid and assist persons with chemical dependencies to overcome and to be redeemed into freedom from the chains of addiction and to experience the love and redemption found in Christ.

This motion was referred by the Committee on Order of Business to the Executive Board. A Task Force was assembled and began their research in October 2019. The task force completed their work and presented a report to the full Executive Board on September 29, 2020. The committee concluded that whereas we are thankful for this motion in that it raises awareness of this growing crisis and need, Louisiana Baptists can best accomplish our role by partnering with ministries already established. The Executive Board submits the following response:

That the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention receive the report from the Study Committee (see attached) and instructs the State Missions Services staff to continue to develop training opportunities and to keep an up-to-date list of Christ-centered resources available to Louisiana Baptists to use in ministry to those desiring "freedom from the chains of addiction."

# 10. Response to Motion (Prison Ministry) - 2019 LBC Annual Meeting (9/29/20)

Adopted a motion that the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention believes that the answer to this ministry opportunity is the same as ministry to those with addictions.

At the 2019 LBC Annual Meeting, Lloyd Whitman, messenger, First Baptist Church, Dry Prong, made the following motion:

I move that the Louisiana Baptist Convention form a committee, or assign to an existing committee the task of exploring ways to promote and facilitate churches to minister to offenders in local and state prisons, offender's family members, and offenders who have been released.

The Executive Board submits the following response:

That the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention believes that the answer to this ministry opportunity is the same as ministry to those with addictions. The purpose of the LBC is to be a catalyst, consultant, and conduit for ministry and therefore and instructs the State Missions Service staff to continue to develop training opportunities and to keep an up to date list of Christ-centered resources available to Louisiana Baptists to use in ministry to offenders in local and state prisons, offender's family members, and offenders who have been released.

# 11. Response to Motion (SBC Messenger Requirements) - 2019 LBC Annual Meeting (9/29/20)

Adopted a motion in response to motion presented at the 2019 LBC Annual Meeting that the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention concurs with the LBC Committee on Order of Business in that the LBC Articles of Incorporation align with the SBC Constitution guidelines (Article III), regarding membership requirements for messengers.

At the 2019 LBC Annual Meeting, Checkerz Williams, messenger, Celebration, New Orleans, made the following motion:

I move that the Louisiana Baptist Convention adopt the same messenger requirements as the SBC. As a church planter who gives to the Cooperative Program, our church plant is able to register messengers for the SBC Annual Meeting. However, church plants are not currently allowed to register messengers for the LBC Annual Meeting.

The Committee on Order of Business referred the motion to the Executive Board for clarification and the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention concurs with the LBC Committee on Order of Business in that the LBC Articles of Incorporation align with the SBC Constitution guidelines (Article III), regarding membership requirements for messengers.

The Executive Board submits the following response:

That the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention concurs with the LBC Committee on Order of Business in that the LBC Articles of Incorporation align with the SBC Constitution guidelines (Article III), regarding membership requirements for messengers.

# Recommendation 1 - 2021 Cooperative Program Budget

That the Louisiana Baptist Convention meeting in Pineville, Louisiana, November 10, 2020, adopt the 2021 Cooperative Program budget of \$18,653,700 as printed on page 20 of the Book of Reports.

# Recommendation 2 - LBC Articles of Incorporation Amendment

That the Louisiana Baptist Convention meeting in Pineville, Louisiana, November 10, 2020, amend LBC Articles of Incorporation as follows:

WHEREAS, The ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION of the LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC. have no provisions outlining procedures for the conduct of its business in an emergency; and,

WHEREAS, The Executive Board has determined that it is in the interest of and necessity for the Louisiana Baptist Convention to provide for the continuation and ability of the Convention to conduct its business in an emergency in the least disruptive and efficient manner:

BE IT RESOLVED that the Articles of Incorporation be and are hereby amended to read as follows:

- The ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION of the LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC. as they exist prior to the adoption of these amendments shall remain in place and shall not change except as specifically amended herein.
- 2. The ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION of the LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC. article headings shall be amended and renumbered as follows:
  - a. <u>ARTICLE XIII. INDEMNIFICATION</u> heading shall be amended and renumbered to read as follows: "ARTICLE XIV INDEMNIFICATION"
  - b. ARTICLE XIV. INCORPORATORS heading shall be amended and renumbered to read as follows: "ARTICLE XV. INCORPORATORS"
  - c. ARTICLE XV. AGENT FOR SERVICE heading shall be amended and renumbered to read as follows: "ARTICLE XVI. AGENT FOR SERVICE"
  - d. ARTICLE XVI. CONSTRUCTION heading shall be amended and renumbered to read as follows:
    "ARTICLE XVII. CONSTRUCTION"
    - ADTICLE VIII. AMENDMENTS 1 1: 1 111
  - e. <u>ARTICLE XVII, AMENDMENTS heading shall be amended and renumbered to read as</u> <u>follows: "ARTICLE XVIII, AMENDMENTS"</u>
- 3. The ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION of the LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC. shall be amended to add a new article with the heading XIII. EMERGENCY PROCEDURES to read as follows:

# XIII. EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

In the event of an emergency declared as provided in this article, the following procedures shall control the operations, finances, officers, meetings, and purposes of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. until such time as the emergency is terminated. When the emergency has been terminated, then in that event, all provisions of the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC. which were last in effect prior to the emergency shall again take effect until such time as another emergency may be declared, if any, as provided in this article. These emergency provisions and procedures are as follows:

1. "Emergency" means any occasion or instance for which, in the determination of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. by a majority vote of those present and voting, that the usual and customary conduct of business by the Convention must be curtailed or suspended because it is not feasible to comply with applicable

- provisions of the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. due to the existence of an emergency which may endanger lives, health, property, and/or safety, may increase the threat to lives, health, property and/or safety, and/or conditions are such that it is not possible to conduct the usual and customary business of the Convention in a manner provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the Convention.
- 2. In the event that the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. cannot meet to consider an emergency declaration or termination, then the last elected officers of the Convention and the Executive Committee of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., may jointly declare an emergency which invokes the provisions of this Article XII and/or terminate a previously declared emergence.
- 3. In the event that the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. or, in its absence, the officers of the Convention and the Executive Committee of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. cannot meet to declare an emergency, then the Executive Director of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention may declare an emergency which invokes the provisions of this Article.
- 4. In the event that an emergency is declared invoking the provisions of this Article as provided in paragraphs 1, 2 or 3 above, then all Convention officers, Convention committee members, and board members of Convention agencies and members of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. shall continue in office until such time as the emergency declaration is terminated and his/her successor is duly elected as provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC.
- 5. In the event that an emergency is declared invoking the provisions of this Article as provided in paragraphs 1, 2 or 3 above, then all budgets, financial expenditures and operations authorized and last approved by the Convention prior to the emergency declaration shall remain in force and effect until such time as the emergency declaration is terminated and new budget, operational, and financial programs are duly adopted by the Convention as provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC.
- 6. In the event that an emergency has been properly declared, then all meetings of the Convention Messengers whether Annual or otherwise shall be suspended until such time as the emergency declaration is properly terminated and Messengers are able to meet and conduct business as provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC.
- 7. All meetings of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., officers of the Convention and the Executive Committee of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. may be held in any manner whether in person, by telephone, electronically or otherwise during the period an emergency has been properly declared and/or to consider whether to declare an emergency or terminate an emergency declaration.
- 8. In the event that an emergency has been properly declared, THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST MESSAGE shall remain the official publication of the Convention. However, the BAPTIST MESSAGE may be published in any manner possible whether by print, by hand, electronically or any other method feasible during the emergency declaration. If the BAPTIST MESSAGE cannot be published in any manner, then any reasonable method of communication to Convention Messengers, cooperating churches, officers, or other necessary persons or organizations may be used.
- 9. An emergency declaration may be terminated by the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., jointly by officers of the Convention and the Executive Committee of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. by a majority vote of those present and voting, or by the Executive Director of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. in the same order and manner as provided by paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 of this Article at such time as the conditions creating the emergency as defined in paragraph 1 above no longer exists.
- 10. Any provision of the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC. in conflict with this ARTICLE XIII during the period that an emergency has been properly declared and has not been terminated, shall be suspended until such time as the declaration of emergency has been properly terminated.

# Recommendation 3 - LBC Articles of Incorporation (Article XVII) Amendment

That the Louisiana Baptist Convention meeting in Pineville, Louisiana, November 10, 2020, amend Article XVII (Amendments) of the LBC Articles of Incorporation as follows:

Proposed amendments originating in the Executive Board of the Convention are posted to the LBC website and published in one (1) issue of the BAPTIST MESSAGE (print edition or digital edition) no later than fifteen (15) days before the meeting of the Convention.

# Recommendation 4 - LBC Bylaws (Article III, Section 11) Amendment

That the Louisiana Baptist Convention meeting in Pineville, Louisiana, November 10, 2020, amend Article III, Section 11 (Composition and Duties of Committees and Boards) of the LBC Bylaws as follows:

A report of all meetings of boards of the Convention shall be <u>printed published</u> in The BAPTIST MESSAGE (<u>print edition or digital edition</u>) as soon as possible after the meeting with the understanding that specifics concerning financial conditions and personnel relations must often be confidential for the welfare of the institutions and their employees and may be reported in only general terms.

# Recommendation 5 - LBC Bylaws (Article VII) Amendment

That the Louisiana Baptist Convention meeting in Pineville, Louisiana, November 10, 2020, amend Article VII (Amendment of Bylaws) of the LBC Bylaws as follows:

These bylaws may be amended at any regular session of the Convention by affirmative vote of twothirds of the messengers present and voting. Amendments sponsored by the Executive Board shall be posted to the LBC website and published in one (1) issue of the BAPTIST MESSAGE (print edition or digital edition) no later than fifteen (15) days before the meeting of the Convention.

# Recommendation 6 - LBC Business and Financial Plan (Article XII) Amendment

That the Louisiana Baptist Convention meeting in Pineville, Louisiana, November 10, 2020, amend Article XII (Amendments) of the LBC Business and Financial Plan as follows:

This Business and Financial Plan may be altered by two-thirds of the messengers present and voting at any time except during the last session (of the Convention), provided that recommended changes shall have been presented to the Executive Board and published in the BAPTIST MESSAGE (print edition or digital edition) at least one month in advance of the Convention.

# Recommendation 7 - Executive Board Articles of Incorporation (Article III) Amendment

That the Louisiana Baptist Convention meeting in Pineville, Louisiana, November 10, 2020, amend Article III of the Executive Board Articles of Incorporation as follows:

The Executive Board shall consist of one (1) member from each association, having a minimum of seven churches with an aggregate church membership of at least one thousand, plus one (1) additional board member from each association having as many as ten thousand (10,000) church members, and an additional board member for each additional five thousand (5,000) church members of such associations; provided, however that not more than seven (7) members from any one association shall serve simultaneously as members of the Executive Board.

The terms of elected board members shall run for three (3) years. No member may serve continuously for more than two (2) complete successive terms. No member shall be eligible to serve another term until an interval equal to the number of years served shall have elapsed.

The membership of any board member shall be declared vacant if he ceases to be affiliated with a church that is a member of the association from which he was elected.

The Convention shall annually elect members to fill all vacancies in the board.

The qualifications, term of office and criteria for selection of persons to serve as a member of the Executive Board of this corporation shall be in conformity with Article X. The Executive Board of the Convention contained in the Articles of Incorporation of the Louisiana Baptist Convention and Article IV. Membership of Committees and Boards contained in the Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention and any future amendments thereto. In addition to vacancies described in the Articles of Incorporation and By-laws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, the death or resignation of a member of the Executive Board shall automatically and immediately cause that office to become vacant without the necessity of any further action. Any other vacancy in the office of member of the Executive Board of this corporation for any reason deemed sufficient by the member shall only be declared by a two-thirds majority affirmative vote of the messengers to the Louisiana Baptist Convention and only after the affirmative recommendation of the Convention Committee on Nominations has been published in the BAPTIST MESSAGE (print edition or digital edition) not less than twice in the thirty days immediately preceding the meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.

# Recommendation 8 - Executive Board Articles of Incorporation (Article VIII) Amendment

That the Louisiana Baptist Convention meeting in Pineville, Louisiana, November 10, 2020, amend Article VIII of the Executive Board Articles of Incorporation as follows:

The Articles of Incorporation may only be amended with the approval of two-thirds majority of the Executive Board and the approval of two-thirds majority of the membership at the annual meeting, six months' notice having been given prior to the annual convention to the President of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, and also notice of the proposed amendments having been published in the BAPTIST MESSAGE (print edition or digital edition) for three consecutive weeks preceding the annual meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.

# Recommendation 9 - Executive Board Articles of Incorporation (Article X) Amendment

That the Louisiana Baptist Convention meeting in Pineville, Louisiana, November 10, 2020, amend Article X of the Executive Board Articles of Incorporation as follows:

The annual meeting of the member of this corporation shall take place contemporaneously with the annual meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention without the necessity of giving notice to the member of said meeting. Any special meeting of the member of this corporation may only be called as provided in Article XII Meetings of the Louisiana Baptist Convention's Articles of Incorporation and shall only be held at the same places, dates and times as the Louisiana Baptist Convention determines in accordance with its Articles of Incorporation and By-laws. Notice of any special meeting of the member of this corporation shall be published in the BAPTIST MESSAGE (print edition or digital edition) not less than twice in thirty days immediately preceding the meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.

# Recommendation 10 - Executive Board Articles of Incorporation (Article XI) Amendment

That the Louisiana Baptist Convention meeting in Pineville, Louisiana, November 10, 2020, amend Article XI of the Executive Board Articles of Incorporation as follows:

Before any dissolution or merger of this corporation, transfer or sale of substantially all of this corporation's assets and/or the formation of other corporations, limited liability companies or other forms of doing business by this corporation may be implemented, the proposed action shall be approved by the member by a two-thirds affirmative vote of the messengers present and voting and only after the resolution authorizing the action has been published in the BAPTIST MESSAGE (print edition or digital edition) not less than twice in the thirty days immediately preceding the meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.

# Recommendation 11 - Executive Board Articles of Incorporation Amendment

That the Louisiana Baptist Convention meeting in Pineville, Louisiana, November 10, 2020, amend the Executive Board Articles of Incorporation as follows:

WHEREAS, The ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC. have no provisions outlining procedures for the conduct of its business in an emergency; and,

WHEREAS, The Executive Board has determined that it is in the interest of and necessity for the Louisiana Baptist Convention to provide for the continuation and ability of the Convention to conduct its business in an emergency in the least disruptive and efficient manner:

BE IT RESOLVED that the Executive Board Articles of Incorporation be and are hereby amended to read as follows:

- 1. The ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC. as they exist prior to the adoption of these amendments shall remain in place and shall not change except as specifically amended herein.
- 2. The ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC. shall be amended to add a new article numbered as ARTICLE XII to read as follows:

# XII EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

In the event of an emergency declared as provided in this article, the following procedures shall control the operations, finances, officers, meetings, and purposes of the Executive Board until such time as the emergency is terminated. When the emergency has been terminated, then in that event all provisions of the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC. which were last in effect prior to the emergency shall again take effect until such time as another emergency may be declared, if any, as provided in this article. These emergency provisions and procedures are as follows:

- 1. "Emergency" means any occasion or instance for which, in the determination of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. by a majority vote of those present and voting, that the usual and customary conduct of business by the Executive Board must be curtailed or suspended because it is not feasible to comply with applicable provisions of the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the Executive Board due to the existence of an emergency which may endanger lives, health, property, and/or safety, may increase the threat to lives, health, property and/or safety, and/or conditions are such that it is not possible to conduct the usual and customary business of the Executive Board in a manner provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the Executive Board.
- In the event that the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. cannot
  meet to consider an emergency declaration or termination, then the Executive Director of
  the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., may declare an emergency
  which invokes the provisions of this Article and/or terminate a previously declared
  emergency.
- 3. In the event that an emergency is declared invoking the provisions of this Article as provided in paragraphs 1 or 2 above, then all Executive Board officers, Executive Board committee members, and Executive Board members shall continue in office until such time as the emergency declaration is terminated and his/her successor is duly elected as provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC.
- 4. In the event that an emergency is declared invoking the provisions of this Article as provided in paragraphs 1 or 2 above, then all budgets, financial expenditures and operations authorized and last approved by the Executive Board prior to the emergency declaration shall remain in force and effect until such time as the emergency declaration is terminated and new budget, operational, and financial programs are duly adopted by

- the Executive Board as provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC.
- 5. In the event that an emergency has been properly declared, then all meetings of the Executive Board shall be suspended until such time as the emergency declaration is properly terminated and board members of the Executive Board are able to meet and conduct business as provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC.
- 6. In the event that a special meeting of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist
  Convention may be safely and is reasonably necessary, then such meeting may be held
  with reasonable notice to the Executive Board members in any manner whether in
  person, by telephone, electronically, or otherwise during the time an emergency has been
  properly declared and/or to consider whether to declare or terminate an emergency.
- 7. In the event that an emergency has been properly declared, the BAPTIST MESSAGE shall remain the official publication of the Executive Board. However, the BAPTIST MESSAGE may be published in any manner possible whether by print, by hand, electronically or any other method feasible during the emergency declaration. If the BAPTIST MESSAGE cannot be published in any manner, then any reasonable method of communication to Executive Board members, officers, or other necessary persons or organizations may be used.
- 8. An emergency declaration may be terminated by the Executive Board of the Louisiana
  Baptist Convention, Inc., or by the Executive Director of the Executive Board of the
  Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. in the same order and manner as provided by
  paragraphs 1 or 2 of this Article at such time as the conditions creating the emergency as
  defined in paragraph 1, above no longer exist.
- 9. Any provision of the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC. in conflict with ARTICLE XII during the period that an emergency has been properly declared and has not been terminated, shall be suspended until such time as the declaration of emergency has been properly terminated.

# Recommendation 12 - Executive Board Bylaws (Article VI) Amendment

That the Louisiana Baptist Convention meeting in Pineville, Louisiana, November 10, 2020, amend Article VI (Amendments) of the Executive Board Bylaws as follows:

These bylaws may be amended at any meeting of the Executive Board provided:

- Committee-sponsored amendments are announced at the preceding meeting of the board or published in the BAPTIST MESSAGE (print edition or digital edition) at least one month in advance of the board meeting at which they are considered.
- Amendments from the floor are proposed at one meeting and acted upon at the next meeting.
- 3. Amendments to carry must receive a two-thirds vote of those present and voting.

# STATE MISSIONS SERVICES FOR CHURCHES AND ASSOCIATIONS

# **EXECUTIVE TEAM**

# Steve Horn, Executive Director

Following the adjournment of the Annual Meeting in November, the work of our convention of churches continues via the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention and the State Missions Services staff. One of the roles of the Executive Team is to ensure the directives expressed and approved by the messengers are carried out. This is accomplished in the following ways.

# Accountability

The Executive Team coordinates the broad efforts of the State Missions Services staff. Assignments and strategies are delegated to one of seven teams. Each team has provided a report for your review, which is part of the accountability process.

In this unusual year of a pandemic, much of our regular work came to a halt and our efforts centered on consolidating information from various government agencies and making this information easily accessible to churches. In addition to connecting churches to current information and practices, our State Missions Services staff reached out to pastors and AMS's by making approximately 4,000 phone calls to offer assistance, a listening ear, and prayer.

The Executive Team also oversees the personnel and budgets of the State Missions Services staff. The last several years have seen reductions in budgets and personnel; however, the staff continues to operate efficiently and are good stewards of the funds provided by Louisiana Baptists.

The Executive Director works with the elected LBC President to coordinate the planning and execution of the Annual Meeting. He also works with the elected Executive Board President to plan and coordinate Executive Board meetings which are held in September, May, and November.

Publications including the Book of Reports and Annuals are generated by the Executive Team and distributed via public meetings and/or made available online via our website, LouisianaBaptists.org.

The Office of Public Policy falls under the purview of the Executive Team. Dr. Will Hall, Editor of the *Baptist Message*, provides leadership in this area on behalf of Louisiana Baptists. His report is included below.

# Presence

The Executive Director serves as an ex-officio member of the Board of Trustees for every Louisiana Baptist entity and regularly attends their schedule meetings.

Associational Mission Strategists (formerly Directors of Missions) are key partners in our cooperative structure. The Executive Director participates in regular communications with these partners and hosts periodic meetings to enhance communication and coordination of shared ministries. The COVID-19 pandemic provided the opportunity to enhance these relationships as everyone attempted to interpret and navigate the various regulations and phases outlined by the governor and other officials. The Executive Director participated in over a dozen ZOOM meetings with AMS's this year.

The Executive Director also provides a presence for Louisiana Baptists during various meetings of SBC entities and frequently serves on SBC committees and boards. He participates in ongoing dialogue with each of the SBC entity presidents/executive directors, is part of a fellowship with other State Convention

Executive Directors, and remains in close contact and fellowship with the State Convention Executive Directors of the Southern states.

One of the most important functions of the Executive Director is to represent the larger Louisiana Baptist family to local congregations. Invitations to speak during regular services and special events are welcomed and will be accepted as schedules permit.

# BUSINESS & INFORMATION SERVICES TEAM Dale D. Lingenfelter, Director

The Business and Information Services Team serves as a support group for all the work of the LBC State Missions Services. The team provides expertise in the areas of financial accounting, information technology, facilities maintenance, office services, and human resources. Our goal is to enhance and support the work of all LBC Teams so they accomplish the missions and ministry goals of the Convention.

In addition to coordinating the Annual Church Profile (ACP) process for the state, Shana Johnson serves as **Information Services** Support Manager and is responsible for the overall information technical support systems of the Convention and several state entities that are housed within the Baptist Building. In cooperation with other SBC state conventions and national SBC entities, Information Services has been instrumental in developing an online database of all SBC congregations and leadership. This program has become the national database for all SBC congregations and all SBC entities, both state and national. The database consists of all information collected through the ACP each year, as well as information directly communicated to the office. All information is retained so as to maintain historical statistical and leadership information for each reporting congregation. Through her team's effort along with assistance from the entire State Mission Services Staff, ACP reporting of all Louisiana Baptist congregations maintains an above average reporting percentage within the SBC network of congregations.

The LBC Accounting Team provides competent tax and accounting information to Louisiana Baptist Churches. It's more likely than not your church secretary has contacted us with questions on Budgeting, Accounting, Payroll Taxes, and Church Accounting issues. We are here to help you! Our contact information can be found on the LBC website. In addition, consistent with prior years, the Louisiana Baptist Convention received an excellent review on our Annual Audit Report.

Tall Timbers experienced its greatest summer camp attendance in 2019 and greatest number of decisions made for Christ. Director, Josh Bumgardner, and his staff want you to consider summer camp or scheduling a retreat if you have not done so recently. With one floor of hotel renovations completed, our adult accommodations are upgrading with more rooms to follow. A cabin renovation with a different layout was completed in 2019, and another cabin upgrade has begun, which will add another 40 bed spaces to our capacity. There are more improvements and additions currently being planned at Tall Timbers as summer camps and annual attendance continues to grow. With improvements to our facilities, we hope even more to remove distractions as we serve our guests so that they may grow closer to Christ. We provide everything from conference room set ups and meals to activities or teambuilding for youth. We encourage you to register for a summer camp, attend a Louisiana Baptist event here, or program your own retreat at Tall Timbers.

The Business and Information Services Team considers all of its various areas of support work as ministry unto the Lord. We count it a privilege to serve our Lord by serving our colleagues and Louisiana Baptists in the work of reaching Louisiana for Christ and strengthening our churches.

### BAPTIST COLLEGIATE MINISTRY

### Mark Robinson, Director

It is sometimes difficult to remember how ministry operated before the pandemic of 2020. BCM had another incredible year of outreach in 2019 with every campus ministry strong. Soon after our incredible Collegiate Evangelism Conference on February 14-15 held at Louisiana College our work suddenly shifted. All our campus ministers were well versed in utilization of Zoom and Facebook live formats for digital communication before the quarantine began. So, consequentially we made the transition to meeting virtually with students well. A good example is Nicholls State BCM. They reported a 100 percent transfer from in person discipleship groups to virtual. I attended many meetings of students online in the spring and summer. Every campus completed the academic year meeting virtually.

Shutting down for the quarantine allowed us to accomplish several important tasks for our ministry.

- 1. Buildings received much need updating and maintenance.
- Staff received extra training in the area of digital communication including webx seminars, zoom meetings, and meeting rooms in FB groups.
- 3. We began to utilize these formats for reaching out to incoming freshmen earlier than ever by forming freshman meet and greet groups on zoom weekly.
- 4. The University campuses became more generous by giving us contact information for incoming freshman and relying on BCM staff to serve in an advisory capacity with the campus officials and meet crucial needs in the quarantine response period.
- International student ministry has had an all-time high impact this summer, particularly at LSU.
   These students were stranded on campus without work visas or campus cafeterias. The BCM has been providing boxes of groceries, through donations, around 90 families a week throughout the summer.
- 6. Emphasis had to move from large events to primarily Gospel appointments and Discipleship.

There are many more good things that came from this time of struggle.

This fall BCM staff and facilities will be utilized to continue to reach the University city all over our state. There are adaptation plans in effect at every campus and we will continue to strive to proclaim the gospel daily.

# COMMUNICATIONS TEAM John Kyle, Director

### DOING MORE

One of the goals for the Communications Team is to do more things for more people. This is more than a slogan for us. We desire to maximize our efforts to honor the Lord and serve you.

We meet with each strategist and review their events from the previous year and discuss their needs for the coming year. We drill down on ways we can better communicate with their desired audience and prayerfully, make them more effective.

What did this look like in 2019?

- Social media continues to be an effective tool to communicate with Louisiana Baptists. Facebook generated over 12.5 million impressions with an average daily reach of 24,995 people.
- LouisianaBaptists.org welcomed almost 268,000 visitors as mobile access continues to increase.
- Eighty-five print pieces were designed, printed and distributed to promote and support various events.

- Fifty-nine ads were designed for and printed in the *Baptist Message*.
- Over 40 promotional videos were created and more than 60 additional videos were posted on Vimeo, our video storage site, for use during the events or on social media.
- Stacy Morgan joined the Communications Team in 2019. He conducted 18 roundtables with dozens
  of pastors to discover their needs relating to stewardship and Cooperative Program resources. There
  are now more than 150 resources available at LouisianaBaptists.org/stewardship.
- Coordinate, the Church Planning Guide, is produced by the Communications Team. Last year in excess of 4,500 copies were distributed to churches and Associations.

Here for You, Louisiana Baptists multi-media outreach strategy, launched statewide in February 2019 with the goal of seeding God's truth inside every heart and every home almost every day. Various platforms including TV, social media, digital streaming and billboards were used. We also partnered with the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association and their internet evangelism strategy. Here are some of the fruits of this effort:

- During the last two quarters of 2019, you seeded God's word inside 85% of TV households across
  the state an average of eight or more times during the weeks we aired. This is an across the market
  average.
- Social media/digital streaming reached an average of over 293,000 people monthly.
- The Graham partnership generated 4,346 views of the gospel presentation on *HereforYou.org* and 784 people indicated a decision for Christ!

What do these *Here for You* numbers mean? They indicate the seeds of God's truth were scattered in hearts and homes across the state. God promises that "some" of those seeds find good soil and the return on those seeds is 30, 60, up to 100 times more than what was scattered, (Matthew 13:3-9).

# EVANGELISM AND CHURCH GROWTH TEAM Keith Manuel, Director

Creating an Evangelistic Culture was the emphasis of the Evangelism Conference hosted by First, Lafayette. We were challenged and equipped to carry the Gospel near and far by our speakers. Next year's ECON will be January 25-26, 2021. Our host is Summer Grove, Shreveport.

Sean Keith is our Sunday School, Discipleship, and Revitalization Strategist. The ReGroup Conference and Associational Clinics reached over 1,000 participants, and helped equip pastors, staff, and lay leaders to reach their communities with the Gospel through small groups. Due to the global pandemic, this year ReGroup was a digital experience, held August 10-11, 2020.

Our Adult Ministries and Church Administration Strategist is Jeff Ingram. He coordinated the Senior Adult portion of ECON 2020 with over 450 participants this year. In addition, Jeff hosted over 200 pastors/leaders for the annual January Bible Study and Doctrine Study previews. The work in Church Administration is mainly in consultations with churches/associations that cover the following areas:

Pastor/Staff Salary Breakdowns; IRS Compliance; Best Practices for Church Finance Committees; Church/Associational By-Laws; Code of Ethics for Ministerial Staff; Church Staff Job Descriptions; and Sexual Harassment & Abuse.

Brandon Lewis serves as our Youth Strategist. The Youth Evangelism Celebration held at the Rapides Parish Coliseum, saw 6,000 youth and adults in attendance and many different spiritual decisions made during this powerful, two-day gathering. Unfortunately, camps for this summer had to be canceled. However, plans are already in place to make next summer a memorable time for students with the anticipation of many decisions made to follow the Lord.

Serving as your Children's Ministry Strategist is David Anderson. Just as our youth camps were canceled, so were our children's camps and our Kid's Weekend of Worship. However, this year, there was strong attendance for the VBS training for LifeWay's VBS Curriculum. Pray for our churches because many had great plans and were not able to adjust to hold the most evangelistic event that they have during the summer. The Children's Ministry Retreat was another highlight of this strange year. Children's ministers gathered from around the state to encourage and challenge one another, as well as, spend time being refreshed and renewed.

## MISSIONS AND MINISTRY TEAM

John D. Hebert, Director

The Missions and Ministry Team of the Convention is committed to helping our churches reach their full potential in reaching our state for Christ. The team is led by John Hebert. Highlights for the year include a highly successful church planting effort, strides in our compassion ministry engagement with churches, and a growing mission builder program. These highlights accompany the execution of new strategies in Women's Missions and Ministry, Partnership Missions, Disaster Relief/Men's Ministry, and Mission Education.

James Jenkins, Director of Church Planting, continues to lead the effort of Church Planting. His team is comprised of Lane Corley, our Anglo-Church Planting and Replant Strategist, and Carlos Schmidt, Language Church Planting and Partnership Missions Strategist. Together with our churches and associations, these men have worked to meet the goal of the 2020 Presidential Commission to plant 300 new churches by the year 2020. By mid-year 2020, that number is now 262 or 87% of the goal. The spiritual fruit of these church plants totals 3,749 baptisms and 13,285 decisions for Christ since 2010.

Carlos Schmidt has continued to foster and affirm all the existing partnerships Louisiana Baptist churches and organizations have with missions' projects in the United States and the rest of the world. These partnerships include Haiti, Belarus, and Brazil. In addition, new partnerships in 2020 have been established with US Virgin Islands, Puerto Rico, Brownsville/Matamoros, Cape Bretton Island Canada, Yucatan Mexico, and Madrid. Carlos led Missions Ready Roundtables at Evangeline Baptist Association, Northshore Baptist Association, and New Orleans Baptist Association. Missions Ready Roundtables were scheduled in other associations, but had to be canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Missions Ready Conference scheduled for May 2, 2020 also had to be canceled. Carlos has stayed closely connected with IMB, NAMB, and other agencies to keep Louisiana Baptist churches informed of any guidelines that need to be followed in view of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Carlos also had planned a VBS training mission trip to Madrid, Spain which had to be canceled. With grateful hearts we increased our giving to the Georgia Barnette State Missions Offering in 2019.

Even though giving is impacted by the pandemic that our nation is experiencing in 2020, we see continued faithfulness. Praying for, giving to, and being involved in missions are discipleship fundamentals and are a result of Bible study and mission's awareness. Assisting churches to explore new ways to involve women in Bible study and mission's discipleship is always the goal and purpose of Women's Missions & Ministry, led by Janie R. Wise.

Children's/Youth Mission Education Strategist, Jess Archer, reported that 432 campers, leaders, staff, and guests attended Children's Mission Camp 2019.

- 17 students made professions of faith in Christ and three rededicated their lives to Him in 2019 at camp.
- Since January 2020, she has spoken with eight new churches who were interested in starting Preschool, Children, and Youth WMU programs.

With spring and summer events canceled due to the pandemic, we are looking forward to a great fall of 2020 and 2021.

Jeffrey Cook leads efforts to engage Louisiana Baptist churches in Compassion Ministries. Many of our Louisiana Baptist churches are involved in some kind of Compassion Ministry. Jeff is assisted by a team of Association Compassion Missionaries (ACM) in several statewide associations. These workers are John Anderson, Deanna Corbett, Patrick Magee, Randy Osborn, and Pam Walker. Each ACM has hosted "Start Something" meetings to encourage area pastors and church leaders to start new works of Compassion Ministry. Additionally, the Compassion Ministry Team will provide training, utilizing the "Bridges out of Poverty" materials to help churches understand and assist those in systemic poverty throughout Louisiana.

In spite of the Covid-19 issues, Gibbie McMillan of Men's Ministries and Disaster Relief has been busy. Several tornadoes in the spring across Louisiana left two of our churches in need of repair. Marlow and Gravel Hill Baptist Churches in the Pitkin area needed help cleaning up the debris. In Lake Charles, 50,000 meals were prepared and distributed from Trinity Baptist Church to aide in serving the public with food during the response of Covid-19 pandemic. Tropical Storm Cristobal came ashore in Grand Isle in early June causing flooding in several areas along the coast due to storm surge. Over 100 clean up buckets were distributed through Bayou Baptist Association. Six trainings were held across the state. Our shower units are always in demand. Louisiana Baptists are still leading the charge when disasters happen.

This year our Disaster Relief team and volunteers have also been involved rebuilding St. Mathews Baptist Church, located at Pelican Point East Grand Bahama Island, which was destroyed during Hurricane Dorian. Louisiana and Mississippi state conventions joined together to rebuild this church. A grant was given by Southern Baptists through Baptist Global Response. We have hosted over 100 volunteers in this process. Another donor made it possible to be able to offer building material grants to the homeowners in the village of Pelican Point.

In other areas of Men's Ministries, Gibbie works with Royal Ambassadors through coordinating events like RA Congress and Missions Camp held at Tall Timbers Conference Center. Laymen like Hartie Spence, from FBC Lafayette, led in a similar effort by planning and coordinating Survivor Man Camp at ABC in Eunice. Mike Collie, layman from Temple in Ruston, coordinates Camp O Ree held at Camp Harris in Minden. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, we were forced to cancel RA Congress and Missions Camp which is aimed at reaching RA's and GA's. Missions Education is a vital part in preparing our young men and women for the future of missions in Louisiana.

Mission Builder Strategist, Mike Shumock, has been engaged with churches and church plants throughout the year despite the difficulties of the pandemic. Louisiana Baptists have been involved in working on eleven projects.

# PASTORAL LEADERSHIP TEAM (vacant)

The Pastoral Leadership Team serves churches of all sizes in many different ministries. Although the director's position remains unfilled, the work of this team has continued through the joint efforts of the state missions staff. This past year, we had 95 requests for resumes through our resume service. We have about 650 resumes on our server.

Granberry Counseling is a very important ministry to our pastors, staff, and ministers. This ministry is provided through your gifts to the Cooperative Program at no cost to our ministry staff. Thank you so much for your faithful giving.

Pastor search committee training remains an important task as we seek to serve our churches. We have a pastor search tool box which can be found online to better equip a committee to find God's man for their church.

We partnered with our Directors of Missions in providing financial assistance through the Shepherd's fund. We dispersed \$13,155 in assistance in 2019.

Shepherd's Rest offers pastors and their churches a four week sabbatical rest at no cost to the pastors or churches. In 2019, two pastors took advantage of this offering.

We are here to serve you and minister to you in any way we can.

# LOUISIANA BAPTIST MESSAGE Will Hall, Executive Editor

The dramatic events that shaped our nation and our state this year influenced not just the coverage of news but also the operations of the *Baptist Message*.

The nation's shutdown and our state's stay-at-home mandate have been sobering with respect to their impact on household incomes, businesses' bottom lines and ministries' finances. Likewise, the restrictions on gatherings forced Louisiana Baptists to find creative ways to conduct ministry and missions.

In the month that followed the near total stoppage of the economy, the *Baptist Message* saw an initial dramatic drop in revenue from all sources:

- -- Advertising for 2020 was on a record pace for the third straight year, but shortly after the state's action, that revenue stream dried up to a trickle because so much of our advertising is event related.
- -- Cooperative Program gifts had dropped by about seven percent.
- -- Subscription payments from churches and individuals had slowed.

Consequently, we suspended the printing of the *Baptist Message*. This was an unprecedented move, but it was not extreme action. It was a necessary preemptory response to the circumstances in order to keep the *Baptist Message* viable and vibrant now and in the future.

We subsequently transitioned to a full focus on our website and social media presence.

The *Baptist Message* already had been making a number of improvements with regard to making it easier to navigate our website, but also in expanding the content to include broader news coverage and information services.

This made it easier to shift attention to our online operations, using the *Baptist Message* website to publish the news as it happens, and using Facebook and Twitter to alert our readers to reports, articles and features -- as well as to push our news beyond the website.

Just four months later, we were back in print (once per month) while continuing to maintain the emphasis we had placed on our internet offerings.

It is a pleasure to report that Cooperative Program gifts have rebounded somewhat, advertising revenues are back on a high pace, and by being mindful of expenses, we have managed to keep our operating account on solid footing.

Moreover, the Small Business Administration approved our request for a CARES Act loan equal to two-and-a-half months of payroll. We have been recommended for this loan to be converted to a grant, and are awaiting final word that the amount we received has been forgiven.

Importantly, the vital function the *Baptist Message* serves in informing and equipping Louisiana Baptists about key events, issues, persons and developments did not suffer:

-- We covered the extraordinary efforts our churches to overcome the obstacles in presenting the Gospel during this time of social distancing, and the news we broke about these innovations inspired other news services, secular and religious, to do follow-on stories about Louisiana Baptists.

- -- The *Baptist Message* played a critical role in alerting our churches and evangelists about the developing opportunities offered through the CARES Act to nonprofits. Using our contacts in government and sharing information as it emerged from these sources, we were ahead of the curve in preparing Louisiana Baptists to take advantage of the Payroll Protection Program loans even sharing a link to the application form only minutes after it was distributed to the Small Business Administration's D.C. office.
- -- We have led the reporting in our state about the disproportionate burden of COVID-19 deaths suffered by our elderly in nursing homes because of the state's failure to quarantine this frail population from outside infection. The 23,000 residents of these facilities compose only half of a percent of Louisiana's total population of 4,650,000. But the more than 2,100 deaths among this vulnerable group made up nearly 40 percent of the COVID-19 deaths in the state.
- -- Online and in print we have given priority to the disaster relief efforts that followed in the wakes of Hurricanes Laura and Delta. We hired freelancers to add extra eyes and ears on the ground to report about the expansive response; we worked with the 42 editors of the Association of State Baptist Publications to bring in two reporting teams to give special attention to the various out-of-state teams so that the word would get back to their readers about the great need and the great help they were providing through their support of the disaster relief efforts here; and, we supported the disaster coverage by a two-person team from the Convergence Media program at Louisiana College.

Other emphases in 2020 have been to push passage of the Love Life Amendment on the Nov. 3 ballot; report about the growing concerns from non-South state conventions about the North American Mission Board's lack of partnership with them (and one state's decision to defund NAMB); publish about the emerging financial controversy involving LifeWay's former CEO and a former trustee chairman; and, inform Louisiana Baptists about other key issues like the backlash to Resolution 9 (that approved Marxist theories as "analytical tools" for examining society) that was adopted by Southern Baptist Convention messengers last year in Birmingham.

We urge you to subscribe to the *Baptist Message* today, and to visit www.BaptistMessage.com everyday, to ensure you stay informed and equipped to fully participate in the cooperative ministries and missions that define our fellowship of churches at the local, state and national levels.

Finally, we want to assure you that no matter what – whether enduring times of challenge or experiencing moments of peace -- the *Baptist Message* remains committed to being the voice of Louisiana Baptists, sharing the news of our individual and combined efforts to spread the Gospel in our state and to the world.

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### LOUISIANA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME AND FAMILY MINISTRIES

Dr. Perry Hancock, President & CEO

In its 120th year of ministry Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries continued its mission of providing love, care, and hope in Christ for children and families in need. The Children's Home provided a positive Christian witness through its residential child and family care programs, foster care and adoption ministries, Granberry Counseling Centers, Christian Women's Job Corp, Compassion for Kids, and Orphans Embrace.

In 2019 the Children's Home provided ministry services for over 2,200 children, families, and individuals. Through its on-campus and off-campus residential programs, 196 children and 35 mothers were served. An additional 54 families received placement referral services.

The Granberry Counseling Centers staff provided professional Christian counseling for 930 individuals during the year. Through its Minister Care program, a partnership with the Pastoral Leadership division of LBC, Granberry provided counseling for 51 Louisiana Baptist minister families.

Christian Women's Job Corp provided educational and job skills training for 74 women and support services for 25 women in 2019. The ministry maintained its adult education certification with the state of Louisiana and had 7 graduates. Through its partnership with Women's Missionary Union and its World Crafts ministry, 3 CWJC students served as artisans, producing over 1,000 Christian products.

Through a growing community care ministry, Compassion for Kids, the Children's Home served over 900 economically challenged children and family members in northeast Louisiana. Compassion for Kids provides life essentials and the message of Christ, meeting both physical and spiritual needs. Projects are conducted in partnership with local LBC churches.

In 2019 the Children's Home also shared God's love in word and deed through its international orphan care ministry, Orphans Embrace. The children's residential village in Haiti was opened and 17 children were accepted as residents of the village.

On campus, a second family care cottage was completed. The facility provides housing for four families who are served through the HomePlace ministry. Construction of a third family care cottage will begin soon. Work on a new recreation complex began in 2019. The facility will include a gymnasium and a pool. Construction should be completed in early 2021.

Louisiana churches once again provided support for the Children's Home through the Annual Children's Home Sunday Offering. The offering meets many of the critical needs the children have during the year. Churches also continued to support children and families at the Home through the Fall Food Roundup which provides all of the non-perishable foods needed for the entire year. In the summer, churches from across Louisiana donated their VBS offerings to support the children. Many churches provided additional assistance in various ways throughout the year and God used LBC Cooperative Program giving from the churches to share His love with those in need.

As a result of the support from our churches and the witness provided by the various ministries of the Home, many children and others experienced the joy of salvation in Christ and received real hope for life and life eternal. Thank you Louisiana Baptists for meeting needs and changing lives through your Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries.

# LOUISIANA BAPTIST FOUNDATION Jeff Steed, Executive Director

The Louisiana Baptist Foundation was chartered as a non-profit agency of the Louisiana Baptist Convention in 1944 for the purpose of encouraging and assisting with gifts to the churches, institutions and entities of the LBC and the Southern Baptist Convention. A total of 14 Trustees govern the LBF with 12 elected by the Convention, along with the Convention Executive Director and the Convention President serving ex-officio. The LBF receives approximately 26% of its operational funding from the Cooperative Program with the remainder primarily provided through fee-based income on assets under management.

The Foundation is in its 76th year of service in 2020 with new leadership. With the retirement of Wayne Taylor, Dr. Jeffrey Steed took the helm as Executive Director on April 1, 2020.

Ministries can receive gifts through a variety of methods including charitable gift annuities, bequests, donor advised funds, charitable remainder trusts and pass-through stock donations. In addition to assisting with gifts supporting the churches and agencies of the LBC and SBC, the Foundation also provides investment management and trust administration services for churches, institutions and ministries of Louisiana Baptists. Baptist churches and institutions benefit from using the Short Term Fund for cash reserves and designated accounts.

### Highlights from 2019 include:

- Distributions or reinvestments of \$5,269,895 were made in 2019. The total market value of assets managed at December 31, 2019 was \$162,999,666.
- Over 400 Louisiana Baptist churches, agencies and institutions had nearly \$44 million on deposit in the Foundation's Short Term Fund (STF) at December 31, 2019. Learn more about the STF and its benefits at www.LBFinfo.org.
- Gifts, bequests and trusts received by the Louisiana Baptist Foundation for the support of Christian ministry totaled \$2,510,784 in 2019. Every gift is designed to Advance the Kingdom! Some examples are highlighted below:
  - -- The Foundation accepted gifts creating several new endowments in 2019 totaling \$1.23 million. These endowments will pay income to a variety of ministries including local missions and global missions.
  - -- Multiple donors established their Last Will and Testament that included a gift to a Baptist ministry important to them. In the future, as these donors step into Heaven, these Testaments will direct gifts to Louisiana Baptist churches, Louisiana Baptist Children's Home, a Baptist camp and New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary.
  - -- The Foundation completed estate successions and is working on others that will provide well over a million dollars to Baptist ministries. The LBF staff can assist you with an estate plan that benefits your family and will Advance the Kingdom beyond your lifetime.
- In 2019, the LBF received \$217,211 from the Cooperative Program and the LBF distributed \$4,793,853 to Baptist ministries in return. Over the history of the Foundation, the Cooperative Program has invested \$10.3 million while over \$139.7 million has been distributed or reinvested for Baptist causes!

### Dr. Rick Brewer, President

Louisiana College is a Christ-centered community committed to Academic Excellence where students are equipped for Lives of Learning, Leading, and Serving. This is the mission of Louisiana College.

During the last five years, my leadership team and I have worked to restructure, reorganize and find ways to improve the efficiency of how Louisiana College functions, to better deliver services to our students and the community, but also to be the best steward. This year was unlike any other, yet God has shown his favor amidst the storm.

### COVID-19

Louisiana College, like all colleges and universities, has faced unprecedented challenges this spring due to the COVID-19 pandemic, including making the heart-wrenching decision to cancel our annual commencement exercises, after first postponing them until August. With the revived massive upswing in cases in the state, we believe the best decision for the health and safety of our graduates, their family, and LC personnel was to host a virtual ceremony during the scheduled ceremony time. It was live-streamed so all graduates and their loved ones could attend. Photographs of each graduate were featured as their names were read, and while we would not share the momentous occasion in person, we all celebrated with our graduating Wildcats. All the graduates of December 2019 and May 2020 have also been invited to participate in the May 2021 ceremony.

Although the leadership at LC has worked diligently since March to create the best response possible to the pandemic and be proactive for students to return this fall, much uncertainty remains about the upcoming school year. We promise to continue to seek God's will and listen intently to governmental and medical experts and do our part in keeping our entire college community as safe as possible.

Still, we have much to be thankful for and have received many blessings throughout the 2019-20 academic year to share with you. Please accept our continued appreciation for your economic and spiritual support.

### **Faith Integration**

This year evangelism seminars were designed to equip staff and coaches with principles for integrating the Christian faith into college life were led by Vice President for Advancement, Dr. Jerry Pipes and Dr. Keith Manuel, Evangelism Church Growth Director, for the Louisiana Baptist Convention.

Chapel speakers led our students, faculty and staff through the Book of I Peter, and BCM Director Thomas Worsham organized weekly student-led small groups to study a master/teacher booklet on I Peter written by faculty. BCM mission projects this year included ministry at the Bridge Church in Covington and the CENLA Food Bank in Alexandria. It also provided funds to support the LBC's E4 Preaching Conference at First Baptist Church in Pineville.

In the fall, our annual Christ, Church, and Culture (C3) Conference "Evangelizing Millennials" discussed the timely issue "What is the Real Issue with Social Justice?"

Fall and spring Campus Awakenings were hosted by the Jenkins Center for Evangelism and Missions. Dr. Don Wilton, pastor of First Baptist Church in Spartanburg, South Carolina led the fall revival, and Dr. John Fream, pastor of Cypress Baptist Church in Louisiana led the spring revival.

Dr. Rick Brewer was keynote speaker at the annual CENLA March for Life. The largest march in the state of Louisiana includes thousands of campus and community members march from LC to downtown Alexandria in support of life.

### Grants

College students today face very different technological needs than their parents' generation. The increased demands on their attention and seismic cultural shifts that have occurred in the last few years call for a university campus that can accommodate today's needs without sacrificing integrity and rigor.

We can see God's hand in so many of the grants and opportunities that have come our way this year.

Louisiana College was blessed to be awarded a \$2.2 million Title III grant to improve and expand online education from the U.S. Department of Education. This has allowed for the creation of a Faculty Development Center with support personnel, including a director of online education and an instructional designer. It couldn't have come at a more important time, with all instruction having to abruptly move online in March due to the coronavirus.

The grant, the largest in LC history, allows us to go to the state-of-the-art learning platform, Canvas, to deliver premiere online content. In addition, we are moving to a cloud environment that allows the Enterprise Resource Planning System to conduct routine business.

Perhaps more relevant at the moment, though, is that this grant allowed us to hire Dr. Natalie Maxey as an engineering professor, in a new pre-engineering program. This, in turn, led us to partnering in a 3+2 engineering degree with Louisiana Tech University. This led to a generous donation from Jim and Mary Terrell of \$100,000 for the equipment to offer a first-year engineering course at LC. This equipment, specifically a 3-D printer, allowed Dr. Maxey to step in and create personal protective equipment (PPE) to protect medical personnel and first responders in the fight against COVID-19. Blue Cross Blue Shield, in turn, gave LC a \$5,000 a grant to continue this work, and we have raised more than \$20,000 to defray expenses and purchased three additional 3D printers to produce PPE for area medical facilities. LC has produced more than 3,000 items for medical care workers and facilities around the state, and requests continue for equipment. God has allowed LC to use science and technology to minister to our community in a very rewarding way.

We were also blessed to receive several other grants this year.

- Louisiana Board of Regents awarded LC \$87,330 department enhancement grant to renovate classrooms in Guinn Auditorium.
- The Rapides Foundation awarded LC an \$111,200 Healthy Behaviors Program Grant to increase
  access to health and fitness opportunities for the greater Pineville area, including rehabilitating the
  Parrish Fuller Fitness Trail
- Homeland Security Grant of \$100,000 was awarded for additional surveillance cameras and lighting on campus.

### **Enrollment and Retention**

Our retention rate from fall 2019 to spring 2020 was 88 percent. Student enrollment at the college has grown 15 percent since 2015.

We increased the number of CENLA high schools participating in District Rally this year from 21 to 28. LC also hosted the Future Business Leaders of America Leadership Conference and general conference with more than 375 high school students attending.

A three-week recruitment trip to Thailand, Malaysia, Indonesia, the Philippines, and Taiwan was held in partnership with Haven of Hope Academy in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania, and schools in Southeast Asia.

The Louisiana Board of Regents approved the college to offer dual enrollment courses, and DE courses were provided for Tioga High School in the fall and spring.

### Academic and Athletic Programs

We have partnered with CHRISTUS St. Frances Hospital to establish the Cabrini Scholars program to provide economic support for students in our Accelerated Bachelor of Nursing (ABSN) program. These are adult students returning to college to pursue a second degree in nursing, and these grants of \$5,000 or \$10,000 come with a promise of full-time employment as a registered nurse upon graduation. This is an innovative track to nursing and Cabrini Scholars is an innovative way to assist these dedicated students in paying for it.

LC produces top-notch nurses, and we are grateful for the support of Cabrini to allow us to produce many more. Our ABSN licensure exam passage rate for recent graduates of the college's nursing program is 100 percent.

The Louisiana College Athletic Department formally applied for admission to the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) this summer. This decision received the unanimous support from the College's Board of Trustees. LC was previously part of NAIA in the 1970s-1990s and experienced several conference and regional title play during those years. This will allow us to play against schools in our region. Perhaps the biggest reason that NAIA is a good fit, though, is its Champions of Character initiative and five core values of integrity, respect, responsibility, sportsmanship and servant leadership, which lend itself to LC's own core mission as well as many other faith-based institutions.

Our student athletes reached a significant milestone this year. The student-athlete 2019-2020 aggregate GPA was 3.004, a goal set in our 2016-2020 Strategic Plan. We believe NAIA membership will only help bolster this with its focus not only on integrity but also on academic success.

### Advancement

Total gifts to LC were in excess of \$5 million for the fiscal year. These include gifts from 195 Board of Visitors members, whose gifts total \$231,000, in addition to several substantial restricted and unrestricted gifts from alumni and other individual donors.

### Refurbishment

During the past year, significant renovations have been done in the residence halls. Phase I of the renovations began summer 2019 and included a \$3.7 million upgrade to Tudor Hall and \$1.9 million to English Village. Summer 2020 upgrades include Cottingham and Church Halls. Eighty percent of residence halls will have been refurbished by August 7, 2020.

Other improvements done this year include the replacement of the air handler in Cavanaugh Hall and replacing the upper roof of H.O. West Gymnasium.

### Resource Development

We want to express our gratitude to the churches of the LBC for support through the Cooperative Program. This support allows LC to maintain an affordable and accessible education for students who sincerely desire a Christian education. It would not be possible without your continued support, and we are continuously grateful.

We are preparing to file our self-report for SACSCOC this fall in anticipation of our standard 10-year review, which will be done in the spring of 2021. We are optimistic, as our fifth-year review was excellent. We appreciate the commitment of the LC Board of Trustees to ensure the college's accreditation is never in doubt.

### COMMITTEE ON MORAL AND SOCIAL CONCERNS

### Brian Gunter, Chairman

The Committee on Moral and Social Concerns is instructed by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Bylaws to "identify, study, provide information, and recommend actions on moral and social concerns which need to be of particular concern to Louisiana Baptists." Likewise the committee is authorized "to speak publicly and/or conduct campaigns to influence the outcome of current issues on which the Executive board or the Convention have taken an official position."

Our committee largely works through the Office of Public Policy to accomplish this objective with regard to the policy making processes of the state legislature. But we also pursue issues and initiatives that might engage Louisiana Baptists in a number of issues. Since 2015 the CMSC has recommended 11 resolutions that have been presented by the Resolutions Committee and adopted by messengers and subsequently translated into public policy. A number have been framed into bills passed by the Louisiana legislature and signed into law by the governor. Similarly, we have worked to engage Louisiana Baptists in different compassion ministry issues.

This year, the resolution adopted by messengers in 2019 "On Protecting the Bride of Christ" was crafted into a bill, sponsored by state Sen. Mark Abraham, a member of Trinity Baptist Church in Lake Charles, that provides immunity for churches who, in trying to prevent sexual assaults, show good faith in reporting to future employers about concerns regarding a former employee's suspected sexual misconduct. Governor Edwards recently signed S.B. 439 into law as Act 123.

Last year messengers also adopted a resolution supporting the Love Life Amendment, a 2020 ballot initiative to amend the Louisiana Constitution to prevent the overturning of pro-life laws by a state judge who declares a right to abortion in the Constitution that is not specifically written in it. To date, 12 states have had their pro-life laws wiped off the books, eliminating common sense protections for mothers and their unborn, because of such rogue court action.

We have worked closely with the Louisiana Right to Life and reached out to our churches and associations in a statewide effort to urge Louisianans to vote YES on #1. At the LBC annual meeting, we hope to celebrate an overwhelming victory for the unborn.

Moving forward, there are a number of issues the Committee on Moral and Social Concerns will address.

Our members have expressed concern about the Resolution 9 adopted by messengers last year at the Southern Baptist Convention in Birmingham. Presented as a consensus statement of all Southern Baptists, it described Critical Race Theory and Intersectionality as "analytical tools subordinate to Scripture" to "aid in evaluating a variety of human experiences." However, the overwhelming view of our committee is that these two secular philosophies, rooted in Marxism, are inconsistent with Scripture.

We believe that the consensus of Louisiana Baptists agree with us that Scripture is the basis on which we should build our worldview and express our theology; and, we trust they concur that Scripture is sufficient, especially in our seminary classrooms, for evaluating the world even in an academic context such as the social sciences.

We have contacted Louisiana Baptist leaders in the state legislature to see what can be done to address the Netflix pornographic series "Cuties" that sexualizes young girls. We have state laws that prevent pornographers from profiting from tax breaks in our state. But, Netflix does not film here. So, we are looking at how to coordinate with like-minded officials at the national level to stop this exploitation of children.

Likewise, we plan to reach out to our Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Services to see how we can help them engage Louisiana Baptists in foster care for the more than 4,600 children in the Louisiana foster care system. We have received reports of difficulties in the DCFS system that are complicating the process of care and creating a deterrent to couples serving as foster parents. We hope to engage state officials to remedy these bureaucratic burdens.

Finally, we hope to come up with concrete actions to recommend to the Convention that will move members of our community of faith to provide "forever homes" for the more than 900 children in our state who have been qualified for adoption. We believe Louisiana Baptists can offer homes that will nurture these children to productive lives and spiritual growth.

# COMMITTEE ON CONVENTION ORDER OF BUSINESS Jay Victory, Chairman

The Committee on Convention Order of Business met on March 3, 2020 at the LBC Baptist Building in Alexandria. This committee makes the following recommendations:

- That the 2021 sermon be preached by Oren Conner, pastor, First Baptist Church, Baton Rouge.
- That Reggie Bridges, pastor, Temple Baptist Church, Ruston, serve as the Alternate Preacher for the 2021 Convention.
- That Blake Davis, Minister of Worship and Music, North Monroe, Monroe, serve as Worship Leader for the 2021 Convention.
- That the venue for the 2021 Convention be North Monroe Baptist Church, Monroe, Louisiana.
- 5. That the location for 2022 Convention be in central Louisiana.

The Committee on Convention Order of Business met by Zoom on October 1, 2020. The committee makes the following recommendation:

That the agenda for this 173nd annual meeting of Louisiana Baptist Convention be adopted as printed in the program and that the following proposed Convention Standing Rules be adopted:

### **Convention Standing Rules**

- The President shall be allowed to make minor changes in the agenda as may be necessary.
- 2. Nominating speeches for officers shall be limited to three (3) minutes each.
- 3. Debate on matters coming before the convention shall be limited to two speakers for and two speakers against for a period of up to three minutes each.
- 4. Persons addressing the Convention shall state their name and church.
- No person addressing the Convention may speak more than twice on the same subject without unanimous consent.
- 6. The reports of the Committee on Nominations and the Committee on Committees be presented, followed by nominations from the floor, if any. Then the Committee nominees shall be voted on for election by the Convention. If the Committee nominees are not elected, then the vote on persons nominated from the floor shall follow immediately.
- That a time for questions be provided following the reports of convention entities and the Executive Board.



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
