**ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION
of the
LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION**

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this body is the Louisiana Baptist Convention, hereinafter referred to as “Convention.”

ARTICLE II. DURATION

The duration of this Convention shall be in perpetuity.

ARTICLE III. NON-PROFIT CORPORATION

The Convention is a nonprofit corporation organized under the Louisiana Non-Profit Corporation Act, LSA-R.S. 12:201 et seq. and shall have all of the powers, duties, authorizations and responsibilities as provided therein. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Convention shall neither have nor exercise any power, nor engage directly or indirectly in any activity that would invalidate its status as an organization exempt from federal income tax and described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, or the corresponding provision or provisions of any subsequent United States Internal Revenue law or laws.

ARTICLE IV. PURPOSE

Section 1. The purpose of this Convention is to provide means through which Louisiana Baptist churches and members can cooperate in bringing persons to God throughout the world.

Section 2. The Convention will assist churches and associations in the Christ-appointed tasks: to worship God, to proclaim the Gospel, to teach, to nurture Christians, to establish and strengthen churches, and to minister in Christ’s name.

Section 3. This Convention desires to carry its programs forward in fraternal concert with other Baptist groups. This Convention will never exercise authority of any type over such groups.

Section 4. This Convention recognizes the Southern Baptist Convention as the primary instrument used by Baptists to further the cause of Christ on a worldwide basis. The Convention pledges its loyalty and support to the purposes served by the Southern Baptist Convention.

Section 5. This Convention will do all its work in accord with the principle that the Bible is the inspired, inerrant, and infallible Word of God, and is sufficient for all faith and practice, and is truth without any mixture of error in every area of which it speaks (Matthew 22:29).

ARTICLE V. REGISTERED OFFICE

The registered office of the Convention shall be located at 1250 MacArthur Drive, Alexandria, Louisiana. The location of the Convention may be changed by an affirmative vote of a two-thirds (2/3) majority of the messengers of the Convention present and voting.

ARTICLE VI. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. This Convention shall be composed of messengers who are members in good standing of Baptist churches cooperating (defined below) with the Convention.

Section 2. This Convention shall be organized on a non-stock basis having messengers as its only members.

Section 3. Each cooperating Baptist church having fifty (50) members, or less, shall be entitled

to one (1) messenger; and an additional messenger for each additional fifty (50) members; however, no church shall be entitled to more than fifteen (15) messengers.

Section 4. Messengers shall be certified by their churches to the Convention, but the Convention shall be the final judge of the election and qualifications of its messengers.

Section 5. A cooperating church with the Louisiana Baptist Convention 1) is of like faith and order with Southern Baptists as expressed in the Baptist Faith and Message of the Southern Baptist Convention, 2) is sympathetic to the purposes and work of the Convention, 3) contributes to the work of Southern Baptists through the Cooperative Program and 4) has applied for membership in the local association and, upon recommendation by the LBC Committee on Credentials, has been approved to send messengers to the Convention.

Section 6. Any church which has taken action affirming, approving or endorsing the practice of homosexuality shall not be considered as cooperating with this Convention. Such actions include but are not limited to the licensure or ordination of homosexuals, marriage or blessing of homosexual relationships, and endorsing homosexuality as an acceptable lifestyle.

ARTICLE VII. TRUSTEES

Section 1. The Convention's management is vested in its Board of Trustees for the execution of legal documents as required by law in effectuation of direction given by and only with the prior approval of the messengers. The Board of Trustees and the Convention shall only act at the direction of and with the prior approval of the messengers. The messengers may delegate authority to officers or committees who shall be accountable to the messengers as provided in the Convention's Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws. The Trustees shall have no authority or powers except those explicitly granted to them by these Articles of Incorporation or in the Convention's By-laws.

Section 2. The members of the Board of Trustees of the Convention shall be the Convention President, First Vice President, Second Vice President and the Secretary-Treasurer.

ARTICLE VIII. OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Convention shall be a president, a first vice president and a second vice president. The office of secretary-treasurer shall be filled ex officio by the executive director of the Executive Board of the Convention.

Section 2. Officers shall be chosen annually from messengers in attendance at the Convention. Nominations shall be from the floor. Election shall be by ballot except when there is a single nominee for an office. In the latter case the president shall instruct the secretary to cast a unanimous ballot for the nominee.¹

Section 3. Officers shall serve for one (1) year and hold office until their successors are elected and qualified; however, no officers may serve more than two (2) complete successive terms in the same office. Terms of office shall commence at final adjournment of the Convention in session

at the time of their election and terminate at final adjournment of the succeeding regular session of the Convention. In case of death, disability of, or other cause making necessary the retirement of the president, the vice presidents shall succeed in order. The Executive Board shall determine when an office is vacant due to the disability of an incumbent.

Section 4. The president shall preside over all deliberations of the Convention and shall perform such other duties as may be customary to the position or as determined in the bylaws or by resolution, and shall, by his election, become an ex officio member of all Convention committees and boards. He shall continue as ex officio member of the Executive Board for one full year immediately following tenure as president of the Convention unless elected to fill a vacancy in the regular membership of the Executive Board.

Section 5. The vice presidents may, in the absence of the president or when requested by the president, preside over the Convention and shall perform such other duties as may be provided in the bylaws or resolutions or as requested by the president.

Section 6. The executive director shall keep accurate and faithful minutes of all sessions of the Convention. He shall cause these to be published in suitable form in the Annual of the Convention together with such other information as the Convention or the Executive Board of the Convention deems necessary and proper.

1 Expectations of Louisiana Baptist Convention Officers

The Louisiana Baptist Convention has been blessed across the decades with men who have provided excellent leadership in their elected roles as convention officers. A number of qualities have characterized these leaders and form an example and a description of the kind of leaders Louisiana Baptists ought to seek in the future, especially for the highest offices

1. A vital personal relationship with Jesus Christ that includes public and private devotions and holy living.
2. A belief in the authority and inerrancy of the Bible and agreement with the Convention's confession of faith which is the Baptist Faith and Message 2000.
3. A desire to see people come to faith in Christ, and an active participation in personal and congregational evangelism.
4. A commitment to cooperative missions, especially mission endeavors of Louisiana and Southern Baptists as evidenced by strong congregational support of the Cooperative Program.
5. A giftedness and experience in leadership that includes the ability to inspire confidence, build consensus, solve problems, and conduct the work of Louisiana Baptists in an orderly and effective manner.

(Approved by messengers, LBC, 165th Annual Meeting, 11/13/12)

ARTICLE IX. COMMITTEES AND BOARDS OF THE CONVENTION

Section 1. The plan of organization for standing committees and permanent boards of the Convention shall be as established in the bylaws of the Convention.

Section 2. Special committees shall serve for one (1) year or less as provided in the resolutions creating such committees.

Section 3. The members of all standing committees (except the Committee on Committees) and the permanent boards of the Convention shall be elected by the Convention. New members on all boards and committees who fill vacancies developing after annual Convention and before the month of May shall be elected by the Executive Board upon recommendation of the Convention Committee on Nominations or Committee on Committees.

Section 4. The president of the Convention shall appoint the members and the chairman and vice chairman of the Committee on Committees.

Section 5. Boards shall report annually to the Convention in the manner specified by the Executive Board of the Convention unless the Convention itself directs otherwise.

Section 6. Each committee and board of this Convention shall supply the executive director with an official copy of its charter or other legal evidence authorizing its establishment and a

copy of its bylaws, as well as copies of the official minutes of their regular and special meetings. The executive director shall maintain these in such fashion that they are readily available to all Louisiana Baptists at the Convention offices of the Executive Board of the Convention.

ARTICLE X. THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE CONVENTION

Section 1. The Executive Board of the Convention shall serve as the Convention ad interim, as the Convention's principle advisory committee on total programs, and as the Convention's operating board for the Convention-sponsored general programs and programs not specifically assigned elsewhere.

Section 2. The Executive Board shall consist of one (1) member from each association having a minimum of seven churches with an aggregate church membership of at least one thousand, plus one (1) additional board member from each association having as many as ten thousand (10,000) church members, and an additional board member for each additional five thousand (5,000) church members of such associations; provided, however, that not more than seven (7) members from any one association shall serve simultaneously as members of the Executive Board.

Section 3. The terms of elected Executive Board members shall run for three (3) years. No member may serve continuously for more than two (2) complete successive terms. No member shall be eligible to serve another term until an interval equal to the number of years served shall have elapsed.

Section 4. The membership of any Executive Board member shall be declared vacant if he ceases to be affiliated with a church that is a member of the association from which he was elected.

Section 5. The Convention shall annually elect members to fill all vacancies on the Executive Board.

Section 6. The elected officers of the Executive Board of the Convention shall consist of a president and a vice president chosen annually by the membership of the Executive Board. They shall have the duties customarily associated with such positions. The board itself shall elect an executive director for an indefinite term. The executive director shall be ex officio member of the board and serve as its secretary.

Section 7. The Executive Board itself shall determine its time of meeting, organization and method of proceeding subject to these articles and the Convention's bylaws.

Section 8. The Executive Board of the Convention shall report annually to the Convention concerning the total Convention program, the operating programs entrusted to the board, and such other matters as the board deems necessary and proper.

Section 9. The Executive Board of the Convention shall recommend annually to the Convention the appropriation or allocation of undesignated financial resources of the Convention.

Section 10. The Executive Board of the Convention shall serve as the general corporate authority of this Convention. No activity supported by and subject to the will of this Convention shall seek incorporated status in Louisiana or elsewhere without the express approval of this Convention or the Executive Board of this Convention.

ARTICLE XI. THE DENOMINATIONAL PAPER

The *Baptist Message* shall be the official paper of this Convention.

ARTICLE XII. MEETINGS

Section 1. The Convention shall meet in regular session in the week following the second Sunday in November unless unusual circumstances should require a change. In such a case, date, time and place shall be determined by the Executive Board.

Section 2. Only the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention is authorized to call a special meeting of the Convention and only upon giving churches cooperating with the Convention at least thirty (30) days written notice of the date, place and time of said special meeting which meeting can only be held within the state of Louisiana.

ARTICLE XIII. EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

In the event of an emergency declared as provided in this article, the following procedures shall control the operations, finances, officers, meetings, and purposes of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. until such time as the emergency is terminated. When the emergency has been terminated, then in that event, all provisions of the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. which were last in effect prior to the emergency shall again take effect until such time as another emergency may be declared, if any, as provided in this article. These emergency provisions and procedures are as follows:

1. "Emergency" means any occasion or instance for which, in the determination of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. by a majority vote of those present and voting, that the usual and customary conduct of business by the Convention must be curtailed or suspended because it is not feasible to comply with applicable provisions of the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. due to the existence of an emergency which may endanger lives, health, property, and/or safety, may increase the threat to lives, health, property and/or safety, and/or conditions are such that it is not possible to conduct the usual and customary business of the Convention in a manner provided by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Convention.

2. In the event that the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. cannot meet to consider an emergency declaration or termination, then the last elected officers of the Convention and the Executive Committee of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., may jointly declare an emergency which invokes the provisions of this Article XII and/or terminate a previously declared emergency.

3. In the event that the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. or, in its absence, the officers of the Convention and the Executive Committee of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. cannot meet to declare an emergency, then the Executive Director of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention may declare an emergency which invokes the provisions of this Article.

4. In the event that an emergency is declared invoking the provisions of this Article as provided in paragraphs 1, 2 or 3 above, then all Convention officers, Convention committee members, and board members of Convention agencies and members of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. shall continue in office until such time as the emergency declaration is terminated and his/her successor is duly elected as provided by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc.

5. In the event that an emergency is declared invoking the provisions of this Article as provided in paragraphs 1, 2 or 3 above, then all budgets, financial expenditures and operations authorized and last approved by the Convention prior to the emergency declaration shall remain in force and effect until such time as the emergency declaration is terminated and new budget, operational, and financial programs are duly adopted by the Convention as provided by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc.

6. In the event that an emergency has been properly declared, then all meetings of the Convention Messengers whether Annual or otherwise shall be suspended until such time as the emergency declaration is properly terminated and Messengers are able to meet and conduct business as provided by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc.

7. All meetings of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., officers of the Convention and the Executive Committee of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. may be held in any manner whether in person, by telephone, electronically or otherwise during the period an emergency has been properly declared and/or to consider whether to declare an emergency or terminate an emergency declaration.

8. In the event that an emergency has been properly declared, The *Louisiana Baptist Message* shall remain the official publication of the Convention. However, the *Baptist Message* may be published in any manner possible whether by print, by hand, electronically or any other method feasible during the emergency declaration. If the *Baptist Message* cannot be published in any

manner, then any reasonable method of communication to Convention Messengers, cooperating churches, officers, or other necessary persons or organizations may be used.

9. An emergency declaration may be terminated by the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., jointly by officers of the Convention and the Executive Committee of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. by a majority vote of those present and voting, or by the Executive Director of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. in the same order and manner as provided by paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 of this Article at such time as the conditions creating the emergency as defined in paragraph 1 above no longer exists.

10. Any provision of the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. in conflict with this ARTICLE XIII during the period that an emergency has been properly declared and has not been terminated, shall be suspended until such time as the declaration of emergency has been properly terminated.

ARTICLE XIV. INDEMNIFICATION

To the maximum extent permitted or required by LSA-R.S. 12:227 as it now exists or as it may be amended in the future, the Convention shall indemnify and advance expenses to persons indemnified in §227 for amounts such persons pay directly. The Convention shall not indemnify or advance expenses to such persons for any amount paid by a third party pursuant to a plan or contract of insurance.

ARTICLE XVI. AGENT FOR SERVICE

The first agent for service of process for the Convention shall be Dr. David E. Hankins. The Board of Trustees may from time to time as it shall determine in its discretion change the agent for service of process for the Convention without the necessity of approval by the messengers.

ARTICLE XVII. CONSTRUCTION

All references in these Articles of Incorporation to statutes, regulations, or other sources of legal authority shall refer to the authorities cited, or their successors, as they may be amended from time to time.

ARTICLE XVIII. AMENDMENTS

Proposed amendments originating in the Executive Board of the Convention are posted to the LBC website and published in one (1) issue of the *Baptist Message* (print edition or digital edition) no later than fifteen (15) days before the meeting of the Convention.

BYLAWS

of the

LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION

ARTICLE I. PARLIAMENTARY LAW AND CUSTOM

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order shall be recognized as the standard authority to guide the Convention on questions of parliamentary law and custom.

Section 2. One-fourth of the messengers enrolled shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business by the Convention. The minutes of the Convention shall indicate that a quorum was present for all business sessions.

Section 3. No persons addressing the Convention may speak more than twice on the same subject without unanimous consent.

Section 4. The president is charged at all times with the maintenance of decorum and order.

Section 5. All proposed resolutions coming before the Convention shall, prior to consideration by the Convention, be referred to the Committee on Resolutions without debate.

Section 6. All matters of business not scheduled on the agenda shall, prior to consideration by the Convention, be referred to the Committee on Order of Business without debate.

Section 7. The Convention shall express its official position only through its constitution, bylaws, and resolutions. The acceptance of a report shall not, in the absence of implementing resolutions, be construed as authorizing action by Convention committees, boards, and agencies.

ARTICLE II. PERMANENT PLAN OF ORGANIZATION OF THE CONVENTION AND ITS COMMITTEES AND BOARDS

Permanent organization of the Convention shall be as follows:

1. Standing Committees:
 - (1) Committee on Committees
 - (2) Committee on Nominations
 - (3) Committee on Order of Business
 - (4) Committee on Credentials
 - (5) Committee on Resolutions
 - (6) Committee on Moral and Social Concerns
2. Boards of Trustees for:
 - (1) Louisiana College
 - (2) Louisiana Baptist Children's Home
 - (3) Louisiana Baptist Foundation
 - (4) *The Baptist Message*
3. Executive Board of the Convention

ARTICLE III. COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF COMMITTEES AND BOARD

Section 1. The composition and duties of boards of trustees of agencies and institutions of this Convention shall be clearly set forth in the Convention resolutions authorizing their establishment and included subsequently in appropriate form in their respective corporate charters. All corporate charters and amendments thereto shall be expressly approved by the Convention or by the Executive Board of the Convention.

Section 2. The Committee on Committees shall be composed of nine (9) members one-third of whom shall be appointed each year by the president. This Committee shall nominate to the Convention the membership of all other committees of the Convention and shall nominate or appoint the membership

of special committees as instructed by the Convention. The Committee shall also nominate for election the chairman and vice chairman of all Convention committees. Vacancies occurring during the year may be filled by recommendation from this Committee to the Executive Board and may be approved by the Board in any of its regular or special meetings or by mail poll of the Board.

Section 3. The Committee on Nominations shall be composed of fifteen (15) members. It shall nominate to the Convention all members of boards of the Convention, including the Executive Board of the Convention. Vacancies on boards occurring prior to the May Executive Board meeting may be filled by recommendation from this Committee to the Executive Board. Vacancies occurring after the May meeting shall be left vacant until the Convention in November.

Section 4. The Committee on Order of Business shall be composed of seven (7) members and the person designated to plan the Convention music. It shall present to the opening session of the Convention for adoption a recommended agenda for the Convention sessions. The committee shall recommend to the Convention the preacher and music leader for the Convention meeting one year hence. The committee also may tentatively enlist Bible study leader and major speakers for Conventions scheduled up to three years in advance. The Committee shall be responsible for recommending to the Convention the host, the meeting hall or church, and the dates for the Convention meeting two years hence and, if feasible, for three years hence.

The Committee on Order of Business shall provide periods of time during the convention for the introduction of all matters requiring a vote not scheduled on the agenda, and, when introduced (unless the Convention then gives it unanimous consent for its immediate consideration) shall fix times for the consideration of the same. All such matters of business shall be introduced to the Convention during the time scheduled for Introduction of Business. No such matters of business may be introduced in the last session.

Section 5. The Committee on Credentials shall be composed of seven (7) members. It shall supervise the registration and accreditation of messengers to the Convention, and shall manage the application process for congregations desiring to become a cooperating church with the Louisiana Baptist Convention and qualified to send messengers for the first time. It shall recommend to the Convention, when necessary, the disaffiliation of any Louisiana Baptist Convention church that no longer complies with the Convention's definition of a cooperating church. It shall recommend action to the Convention concerning disputes as to status of persons as messengers.

Section 6. The Committee on Resolutions shall be composed of seven (7) members and three (3) ex officio members (including the Executive Board president) from the Executive Board of the Convention. The Committee shall be responsible for initiating, reviewing, commenting on, and recommending Convention action on all resolutions. In order to facilitate thorough consideration and to expedite the Committee's work, all proposed resolutions shall:

1. Be submitted to the Committee for review and consideration no more than ninety (90) days, but no later than fifteen (15) days, prior to the next LBC annual meeting.
2. Be addressed to the Committee on Resolutions in care of the Communications Team of the Louisiana Baptist Convention at its registered or e-mail address (electronic copies are preferred),
3. Be typewritten, titled, and dated,
4. Be accompanied by a letter from a church qualified to send a messenger to the annual meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention certifying that the person submitting the resolution is a member in good standing, and
5. Include complete contact information for both the person submitting it, and his or her church.

No person may submit more than three resolutions per year. The Committee on Resolutions shall prepare and submit to each annual meeting of the Convention only such resolutions the Committee recommends for adoption. Such resolutions may be based upon proposals received by the Committee or may originate with the Committee. Only resolutions recommended by the Committee may be considered by the Convention, except the Convention may, by a 2/3 vote, consider any other resolution properly submitted to the Committee.

Section 7. The Committee on Moral and Social Concerns shall be composed of fifteen members. The president of the Convention, the president of the Executive Board, and the editor of the *Baptist Message* shall be ex officio members. The Committee shall identify, study, provide information, and recommend actions on moral and social concerns which need to be of particular concern to Louisiana Baptists. The Committee shall also be authorized to speak publicly and/or conduct campaigns to influence the outcome of current issues on which the Executive Board or the Convention have taken an official position. The Committee may use resource persons and/or organizations in matters of common concern.

Section 8. The Executive Director of the Executive Board of the Convention shall serve ex officio as a member and as secretary of all standing committees of the Convention; however, he may be assisted in this task by members of the Executive Board staff.

Section 9. The financial transactions of all standing and special committees of the Convention shall be conducted only in accordance with policies and procedures established by the Executive Board of the Convention. The Executive Board shall retain exclusive authority over the custody and disbursement of all funds made available for expenses of committees of the Convention and the Convention itself.

Section 10. Trustees of corporate boards established under authority of the Convention shall be responsible for initiating charter amendments whenever such action is necessary to make charter provisions consistent with actions of the Convention.

Section 11. A report of all meetings of boards of the Convention shall be published in The *Baptist Message* (print edition or digital edition) as soon as possible after the meeting with the understanding that specifics concerning financial conditions and personnel relations must often be confidential for the welfare of the institutions and their employees and may be reported in only general terms.

Section 12. Baptist Faith and Message adopted by the Convention on 11/12/02.

ARTICLE IV. MEMBERSHIP OF COMMITTEES AND BOARDS

Section 1. The Convention affirms its adherence to the policy of periodic rotation of the membership of its committees and boards.

Section 2. The terms of members of boards shall be established as three (3) years. No member elected or appointed for a full term shall be eligible for more than two (2) complete successive terms on the same board. No member elected to serve as much as two (2) years of an unexpired term of any board shall be eligible for more than one (1) successive full term of three (3) years on the same board. A member shall be ineligible to serve on that board until an interval equal to the number of years served on that board shall have elapsed. A person shall not serve in more than one elected or appointed position at a time, unless authorized by the constitution and bylaws. Upon the expiration of the term of any member of a board or committee, no person who is a member of the same church as the person whose term is expiring may serve on that same board or committee until one year following the expiration of the serving member's term.

Membership on all boards and committees collectively shall in all cases be limited to the pastor and up to two (2) other members from any church at any one time. Existing board or committee members who move to a church without an eligible vacancy, shall be rendered ineligible to serve. Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary, a pastor who resigns his pastorate may continue to serve on the board or committee to which he was elected, provided that the church where he holds membership has an eligible vacancy. No more than one member of the same church may serve on the same board or committee. The terms of members of committees shall be established as three (3) years. No member elected or appointed for a full term or elected to fill an unexpired term shall be eligible to succeed himself until an interval equal to the number of years served on that committee shall have elapsed.

Section 3. As far as practicable, one-third of the membership of each committee or board shall be elected annually.

Section 4. At least one-fourth of the membership of each board shall live outside the association in which the institution is located, and an effort shall be made to have representatives from various areas of the state.

Section 5. All persons regularly elected by the Convention to agencies and boards shall be elected or selected in any convention session except the last session.

Section 6. Each board of the Convention shall organize and elect its own officers under its own rules and regulations. The president of the Convention shall appoint the chairman and vice chairman of the Committee on Committees. That committee shall nominate the chairman and vice chairman of all committees that it nominates to the Convention. Each committee may elect for itself such other officers as it may need.

Section 7. The initial meeting of newly authorized committees shall be called together during or following the Convention by the chairman in conjunction with the secretary of the committee and at such meeting the necessary officers shall be elected.

Section 8. Newly elected members for the first time to standing committees and boards of the Convention shall not be eligible for office within their respective committees or boards prior to the conclusion of one year's service with the committee or board. Ex officio members of standing committees or permanent boards of the Convention shall not hold office on such committees or boards unless specifically authorized to do so by the constitution of the Convention or these bylaws.

Section 9. Officers of committees and boards of this Convention shall be elected annually.

Section 10. No salaried employee of this Convention and its boards and committees shall be eligible for election as a voting member of boards or committees of this Convention except as provided in the constitution of the Convention or these bylaws.

Section 11. Boards and committees of this Convention may appoint persons other than members to subcommittees and advisory committees provided such persons shall serve only in an advisory capacity and shall never be permitted to vote at meetings of the authorizing committee or board.

ARTICLE V. INCLUSIONS OF THE CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS OF THE CONVENTION AND THE BYLAWS OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD IN THE ANNUAL OF THE CONVENTION

The directory of the Convention shall include the constitution and bylaws of the Convention and the bylaws of the Executive Board of the Convention in each edition of the Convention's Annual.

ARTICLE VI. AVOIDANCE OF ILLEGAL ACTION

No action of the Convention shall be construed as authorizing its committees or boards to take any action that may be contrary to law.

ARTICLE VII. AMENDMENT OF BYLAWS

These bylaws may be amended at any regular session of the Convention by affirmative vote of two-thirds of the messengers present and voting. Amendments sponsored by the Executive Board shall be posted to the LBC website and published in one (1) issue of the *Baptist Message* (print edition or digital edition) no later than fifteen (15) days before the meeting of the Convention.

BUSINESS AND FINANCIAL PLAN
OF
LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION

I. Preliminary Provisions

Each agency and institution of the Convention shall submit to the Business and Finance Committee of the Executive Board (1) an itemized estimate of its receipts for the next fiscal year, and (2) an itemized estimate of its expenditures for the next fiscal year.

The Executive Board shall recommend to the Convention a budget based on an analysis of the aforementioned data, which budget shall include allocations to agencies and institutions.

“Agencies” shall include the *Baptist Message*, Louisiana Baptist Foundation, and the Executive Board. “Institutions” shall include Louisiana Baptist Children’s Home, and Louisiana College.

The Budget and Financial Data Query Form shall include itemized estimates of receipts and expenditures for a three-year period, past, present and projected, as indicated in the report form.

II. Fiscal Periods

Except where agreement otherwise is effected between an agency or institution and the Executive Board, the financial affairs of the Convention and all agencies or institutions owned, operated and controlled by the Louisiana Baptist Convention, shall be operated on the calendar year.

III. Disbursement of Monetary Funds

The executive director shall disburse all monies in accordance with the provisions of the Convention budget. Exceptions to this must have Convention approval.

Each agency or institution of the Convention is hereby instructed and ordered to keep all trust funds and/or designated gifts (for they are trust funds) sacred to the trust or the designation involved, and that they be kept separate from all other funds of such agency or institution.

Disbursement of Cooperative Program and Designated funds will be made immediately after closing of the books and in no event shall they be made later than the 10th of each month.

Inasmuch as each church is an autonomous body it has the inherent right, as is of course true with each individual, to make designations as desired. When a designated gift is received at the Baptist Building Business Office it shall be recorded and the gift will be forwarded forthwith to the designated object or person. An exception is that any gift received by any Louisiana Baptist Convention entity from a church that affirms, approves, or endorses homosexual behavior shall be returned to the donor. The acceptance and disbursement of any gifts shall not be construed as endorsement or agreement with the beliefs and practices of the donor.

Allocations for agencies and institutions from the Cooperative Program shall be determined on the basis of church gifts to the Cooperative Program and church designations the previous year and on the basis of needs and requirements of institutions and agencies as evaluated by the Business and Finance Committee and the Executive Board with recommended allocations to be voted by the Convention each year.

In the event that Cooperative Program receipts are less than the budget, distribution of funds to the respective agencies and institutions will be made on the basis of budget percentage of actual receipts.

IV. Special Solicitations

Any special campaigns for funds by an agency or institution owned, controlled, or supported by the Convention, must first secure the endorsement and approval of the Executive Board and the Convention. This is not to be construed as prohibiting any agency or institution from approaching individuals or corporations for gifts, it being understood that such approach to an individual or corporation is to be made only by personal contact or personal correspondence.

V. Capital Investments and Liabilities

Without the approval of the Convention or Executive Board, no liability or indebtedness exceeding \$100,000 or 2% of a Convention entity's annual operating budget (whichever is greater), shall be incurred by a Convention entity other than those that can be repaid from anticipated receipts for operating purposes and/or capital needs within a period of three years from the date such obligations were incurred. A report on all entity indebtedness shall be made to the Executive Board annually.

VI. Emergency Reserves

Each agency and institution of this Convention shall set up a reserve for contingencies to provide for deficits that may occur either through decreased receipts or through emergencies.

The goal shall be that all agencies/institutions move immediately to accumulate funds in their operating reserve to 30 days operation within a long-term goal of at least three months.

VII. Financial Reports

Each agency and institution of the Convention shall close its books and accounts, and have them audited by a Certified Public Accountant as of the close of its fiscal year, and in turn shall forward two copies of its audit to the executive director as soon as available. These audits are to be studied by the Business and Finance Committee of the Executive Board, and shall include the following:

- 1) Balance Sheet
- 2) Analysis of surplus accounts
- 3) Income and expense
- 4) Classified list of investments by fund and type of investment
- 5) Receipts:
 - (a) Cooperative receipts
 - (b) Designated receipts
 - (c) Other income

Each agency and institution shall submit a report on the Budget and Financial Data form on or before June 1 of each year. A balance sheet of the financial condition after May 31 and prior to September 1 of the current year shall be submitted for publication in the current *Book of Reports* and Annual.

VIII. Handling of Funds

All persons who handle funds or securities for any agency or institution shall be adequately bonded. Discretion shall be exercised in the handling of all securities, deeds, notes and other valuable records (legal documents), and there must always be express authority from the proper source for such handling.

IX. Additional Agencies and Institutions

No new agency or institution shall be authorized by this Convention except after thorough study and presentation to the Convention for favorable action in two succeeding annual meetings.

X. Business Procedure

Each agency and institution of the Louisiana Baptist Convention as a normal operating policy shall refrain from entering any business transaction with a trustee or employee, or a business enterprise in which a trustee or employee has an interest. An exception to this policy may be made, at the discretion of the board of trustees, in any case wherein it appears that a commodity or service at the discretion of the board, is found to be in the best interest of the agency or institution. Competitive bids should be taken if practicable. In any case being considered for exception, the extent of the trustees' or employees' interest shall be disclosed to the entire board.

XI. Professional Services

The Executive Board at its discretion may employ an auditor to study the audited report with the auditors of the agencies and institutions in the light of Convention instructions.

The Executive Board at its discretion may employ an engineer or architect to study proposed capital projects or maintenance of present capital assets.

XII. Amendments

This Business and Financial Plan may be altered by two-thirds of the messengers present and voting at any time except during the last session (of the Convention), provided that recommended changes shall have been presented to the Executive Board and published in the *Baptist Message* (print edition or digital edition) at least one month in advance of the Convention.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation shall be THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, and under this name it shall have authority to sue and be sued; to have and to make a corporate seal; to own property both real and personal, and to receive the same by purchase, gift or any other process known to the law, to borrow money in its corporate name and to mortgage and hypothecate its property to secure the same, and generally to do, and to perform all acts necessary for the purposes for which it is created.

The corporate existence of this corporation shall be in perpetuity, unless sooner dissolved by a two-thirds vote of this corporation, which vote shall be taken not less than six months after receiving instructions to that effect in writing from the LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION.

ARTICLE II

The objects and purposes of this corporation shall be to foster Missions, at home and abroad, Christian Education and Benevolences, to promote and give direction to the work of the Louisiana Baptist Convention in these fields of service, through its several institutions and departments of service, necessary to the accomplishment of its objects and purposes, and to promote harmony of feeling and concert of action in adopting and carrying into operation such measures as may promote the Redeemer's Kingdom in Louisiana and in the regions beyond. It shall have power and authority to do all things necessary to carry out the objects and purposes for which it is organized.

ARTICLE III

The Executive Board shall consist of one (1) member from each association, having a minimum of seven churches with an aggregate church membership of at least one thousand, plus one (1) additional board member from each association having as many as ten thousand (10,000) church members, and an additional board member for each additional five thousand (5,000) church members of such associations; provided, however that not more than seven (7) members from any one association shall serve simultaneously as members of the Executive Board.”

The terms of elected board members shall run for three (3) years. No member may serve continuously for more than two (2) complete successive terms. No member shall be eligible to serve another term until an interval equal to the number of years served shall have elapsed.

The membership of any board member shall be declared vacant if he ceases to be affiliated with a church that is a member of the association from which he was elected.

The Convention shall annually elect members to fill all vacancies in the board.

“The qualifications, term of office and criteria for selection of persons to serve as a member of the Executive Board of this corporation shall be in conformity with *Article X. The Executive Board of the Convention* contained in the Articles of Incorporation of the Louisiana Baptist Convention and *Article IV. Membership of Committees And Boards* contained in the Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention and any future amendments thereto. In addition to vacancies described in the Articles of Incorporation and By-laws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, the death or resignation of a member of the Executive Board shall automatically and immediately cause that office to become vacant without the necessity of any further action. Any other vacancy in the office of member of the Executive Board of this corporation for any reason deemed sufficient by the member shall only be declared by a two-thirds majority affirmative vote of the messengers to the Louisiana Baptist Convention and only after the affirmative recommendation of the Convention Committee on Nominations has been published in the *BAPTIST MESSAGE*

(print edition or digital edition) not less than twice in the thirty days immediately preceding the meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.”

ARTICLE IV

The elected officers of the Executive Board of the Convention shall consist of a president and a vice president chosen annually by the membership of the Executive Board. They shall have the duties customarily associated with such positions. The board itself shall elect an executive director for an indefinite term. The executive director shall be ex officio member of the board and serve as its secretary.

The first officers of this corporation shall be as follows to wit: George W. Bolton, President, H. A. Sumrell, Vice-President; H. H. Webb, Recording Secretary; W. N. Johnson, Corresponding Secretary; B. F. Thompson, Treasurer; and H. H. Webb, Auditor, who shall hold office until their successors are elected.

ARTICLE V

This corporation shall have the authority to adopt such rules and bylaws, not contrary to law, or the provisions of this charter, as it deems proper, and to appoint all necessary committees to carry out the purposes for which this corporation was organized.

ARTICLE VI

The domicile of this corporation shall be at Alexandria, Rapides Parish, Louisiana, and the service of all legal process shall be made at the domicile of the corporation, upon the President, or in his absence upon the Vice President, or in the absence of both of these, upon the Executive Director/Secretary, and otherwise according to law.

ARTICLE VII

This corporation shall not issue any stock certificates, and the private property of the members of this corporation shall not be held liable for any of the debts of the corporation, nor shall any mere formality in the drawing of this charter have the effect of rendering it null.

ARTICLE VIII

The Articles of Incorporation may only be amended with the approval of two-thirds majority of the Executive Board and the approval of two-thirds majority of the membership at the annual meeting, six months notice having been given prior to the annual convention to the President of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, and also notice of the proposed amendments having been published in the *Baptist Message* (print edition or digital edition) for three consecutive weeks preceding the annual meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE IX

This Corporation shall be organized on a non-stock membership basis. The sole member of this corporation shall be the Louisiana Baptist Convention, a nonprofit, Louisiana Corporation domiciled in Alexandria, Louisiana. Except as otherwise provided in these Articles of Incorporation or by applicable law requiring a greater number of votes other than a simple majority for approval of any action by the member, any matter requiring a vote of the member of this corporation shall be adopted by a majority of messengers who are present and voting as is provided by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Articles of Incorporation. Each messenger shall have one vote.

ARTICLE X.

The annual meeting of the member of this corporation shall take place contemporaneously with the annual meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention without the necessity of giving notice to the member of said meeting. Any special meeting of the member of this corporation may only be called as provided in *Article XII Meetings* of the Louisiana Baptist Convention's Articles of Incorporation and shall only be held at the same places, dates and times as the Louisiana Baptist Convention determines in accordance with its Articles of Incorporation and By-laws. Notice of any special meeting of the member of this corporation shall be published in the *BAPTIST MESSAGE* (print edition or digital edition) not less than twice in thirty days immediately preceding the meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE XI.

Before any dissolution or merger of this corporation, transfer or sale of substantially all of this corporation's assets and/or the formation of other corporations, limited liability companies or other forms of doing business by this corporation may be implemented, the proposed action shall be approved by the member by a two-thirds affirmative vote of the messengers present and voting and only after the resolution authorizing the action has been published in the *BAPTIST MESSAGE* (print edition or digital edition) not less than twice in the thirty days immediately preceding the meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE XII.

1. "Emergency" means any occasion or instance for which, in the determination of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. by a majority vote of those present and voting, that the usual and customary conduct of business by the Executive Board must be curtailed or suspended because it is not feasible to comply with applicable provisions of the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the Executive Board due to the existence of an emergency which may endanger lives, health, property, and/or safety, may increase the threat to lives, health, property and/or safety, and/or conditions are such that it is not possible to conduct the usual and customary business of the Executive Board in a manner provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the Executive Board.

2. In the event that the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. cannot meet to consider an emergency declaration or termination, then the Executive Director of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., may declare an emergency which invokes the provisions of this Article and/or terminate a previously declared emergency.

3. In the event that an emergency is declared invoking the provisions of this Article as provided in paragraphs 1 or 2 above, then all Executive Board officers, Executive Board committee members, and Executive Board members shall continue in office until such time as the emergency declaration is terminated and his/her successor is duly elected as provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC.

4. In the event that an emergency is declared invoking the provisions of this Article as provided in paragraphs 1 or 2 above, then all budgets, financial expenditures and operations authorized and last approved by the Executive Board prior to the emergency declaration shall remain in force and effect until such time as the emergency declaration is terminated and new budget, operational, and financial programs are duly adopted by the Executive Board as provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC.

5. In the event that an emergency has been properly declared, then all meetings of the Executive Board shall be suspended until such time as the emergency declaration is properly terminated

and board members of the Executive Board are able to meet and conduct business as provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC.

6. In the event that a special meeting of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention may be safely and is reasonably necessary, then such meeting may be held with reasonable notice to the Executive Board members in any manner whether in person, by telephone, electronically, or otherwise during the time an emergency has been properly declared and/or to consider whether to declare or terminate an emergency.

7. In the event that an emergency has been properly declared, the BAPTIST MESSAGE shall remain the official publication of the Executive Board. However, the BAPTIST MESSAGE may be published in any manner possible whether by print, by hand, electronically or any other method feasible during the emergency declaration. If the BAPTIST MESSAGE cannot be published in any manner, then any reasonable method of communication to Executive Board members, officers, or other necessary persons or organizations may be used.

8. An emergency declaration may be terminated by the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., or by the Executive Director of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. in the same order and manner as provided by paragraphs 1 or 2 of this Article at such time as the conditions creating the emergency as defined in paragraph 1. above no longer exist.

9. Any provision of the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC. in conflict with ARTICLE XII during the period that an emergency has been properly declared and has not been terminated, shall be suspended until such time as the declaration of emergency has been properly terminated.

BYLAWS
of the
EXECUTIVE BOARD
of the
LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION

ARTICLE I. GENERAL FUNCTIONS

Section 1. It is the function of the Executive Board to perform such duties and responsibilities as may be authorized by the Louisiana Baptist Convention, including serving as the Convention ad interim, serving as the Convention's principal adviser on total program, and administering programs entrusted to it by the Convention or not expressly assigned to another board or committee by the Convention. The Executive Board shall, by resolution, enumerate its specific duties and responsibilities under these general delegations of responsibility by the Convention.

Section 2. Duties and responsibilities of this board as set forth in the constitution and bylaws of the Convention shall be construed as incorporated in these bylaws. The board shall at no time authorize action contrary to instructions of the Convention.

**ARTICLE II. PERMANENT PLAN OF ORGANIZATION
OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD**

Section 1. The plan of organization of the Executive Board, its committees and staff, shall be as follows:

1. The elected officers of the Executive Board of the Convention shall consist of a president and a vice president chosen annually by the membership of the Executive Board at the Pre-Convention Board meeting. They shall have the duties customarily associated with such positions. The board itself shall elect an executive director for an indefinite time. The executive director shall be an ex officio member of the board and serve as its secretary.

2. Standing committees of the Executive Board

- (1) Nominating Committee
- (2) Administrative Committee
- (3) Business and Finance Committee
- (4) Executive Committee
- (5) Missions Support Committee
- (6) Properties Committee

3. Subsidiary of the Executive Board: Church Site Corporation

ARTICLE III. MEETINGS

Section 1. The Executive Board shall hold regular meetings in May, September, and immediately prior to the convening of the annual Convention. The May meeting shall be on the first Tuesday. The September meeting shall be on the last Tuesday. Should unusual circumstances require a change in the meeting dates, the Executive Committee may recommend such a change for approval by the board at a regular meeting or by means of a mail poll. The board may, by resolution, hold such other meetings as it deems necessary and desirable.

Section 2. The Executive Committee of the board may, for reasons that seem to it good and proper, call the board to special meetings.

Section 3. Fifty-one percent (51%) of the elected membership of the board shall constitute a quorum for the conduct of business. The minutes shall always indicate the presence of a quorum at the openings of any business session.

Section 4. Notification of or an explanation of absence from meetings of the board should be given by members to the chairman or secretary.

ARTICLE IV. COMPOSITION, DUTIES, AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1. Committees authorized in Article II of these bylaws shall be primarily advisory in nature. The Executive Board may, however, delegate responsibility to a committee to act in the name of the board for specifically defined purposes.

Section 2. Committee members shall serve for three year terms with one-third of the membership rotating annually.

Section 3. No member may serve on more than two (2) standing committees, except the Executive Committee, simultaneously.

Section 4. The president of the board shall be an ex officio member of all committees, subcommittees and advisory committees. He shall hold no elective committee position. A committee chairman shall also be an ex officio member of subcommittees and advisory committees created and authorized by and for the committee.

Section 5. The executive director of the board shall serve ex officio as a member and as secretary of each committee. He may, however, appoint assistant secretaries from the Executive Board staff to assist him in the discharge of secretarial duties.

Section 6. All standing committees, except the Executive Committee and the Nominating Committee, shall consist of fifteen (15) or more elected members subject to the discretion of the board.

Section 7. Each committee shall be responsible for reporting to the Executive Board at each regular board meeting and for formulating its respective portion of the board's annual report to the Convention.

Section 8. All committees shall be of equal status with each committee reporting directly to the Executive Board; however, this shall not be construed as barring the submission by the Administrative Committee of requests for unallocated funds directly to the Business and Finance Committee or forbidding in any way cooperation among committees on common problems.

Section 9. The committees, themselves, shall determine the time, place, and frequency of their meetings unless the Executive Board directs otherwise.

Section 10. The executive director will maintain minutes of all official meetings of the board and its committees. These shall be available at the Executive Offices of the Executive Board.

Section 11. Standing committees of this board are authorized to create and utilize such subcommittees or advisory committees as may be necessary to the proper performance of their duties. A list of all such subcommittees or advisory committees and their membership shall be submitted to, and included in, the official minutes of the Executive Board. Persons other than elected members of the Executive Board may be utilized by the committee to render qualified service as advisory, nonvoting members on subcommittees and advisory committees.

Section 12. The **Nominating Committee** shall consist of nine (9) members appointed by the president of the Executive Board. One-third of the committee shall be appointed annually, subsequent to the meeting of the Convention but prior to the September meeting of the Executive Board. The Nominating Committee shall recommend assignment of Executive Board members to other standing committees of the board and shall also recommend officers for these committees.

Section 13. The responsibilities of the **Business and Finance Committee** shall be to advise and assist the Executive Board in recommending both long-range and short-range goals for the Convention; in recommending the allocations of undesignated resources of the Convention to its

respective agencies and institutions; and in recommending and appraising the financial policies and practices of the Convention and of its agencies and institutions.

Section 14. The **Administrative Committee's** principal function shall be to advise and assist the Executive Board in carrying out the program assigned by the Convention to the board for administration. The committee shall recommend plans of organization and general policies to the Executive Board for approval and shall itself review and approve administrative policies and actions as appropriate. The executive director shall report to the Executive Board through this committee. In the event of a vacancy in this position, this committee shall be the channel through which a successor shall be recommended to the Executive Board. The committee shall review and approve the budget proposals of the executive director concerning Executive Board programs and shall recommend to the Business and Finance Committee any desired allocation of undesignated funds. The committee shall also serve the Executive Board by having cognizance of such administrative problems as the board itself may have, including financial and administrative matters relating to standing and special committees of the Convention.

Section 15. The **Missions Support Committee** shall review and approve funds for mission budget supplements, church loans, and special requests from missions for financial assistance.

Section 16. The **Properties Committee** shall study and recommend property acquisition, sale, or lease, study and recommend insurance coverage on properties owned or leased by Executive Board, and study and recommend major building project(s) or renovation.

Section 17. The **Executive Committee** shall consist of the President and Vice President of the Executive Board, who shall serve as chairman and vice chairman respectively of the Executive Committee, plus the chairmen of the other five standing committees of the board. The Executive Committee's sole responsibility shall be to advise and assist the Executive board in carrying out its function as the convention ad interim to the extent this function is specifically delegated by the Convention. The committee shall not in any instance serve as a substitute for, or insert its judgment in lieu of that of the other standing committees of the board; nor shall it review or appraise the work of the other committees unless expressly so directed by the Executive Board. The Executive Committee shall have the duty of conducting the Executive Director's Annual Performance Review and recommending any adjustment to the Executive Director's compensation and benefits.

Section 18. The Executive Board may by resolution define more specifically the duties and responsibilities of its committees; provided, however, that duties and responsibilities contained in these bylaws shall be changed only through amendment of these bylaws.

ARTICLE V. THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR-TREASURER

Section 1. The executive director shall serve as the chief executive officer of the staff of the Executive Board. He shall be responsible for providing executive direction and leadership to all programs assigned to the Executive Board. The Administrative Committee shall determine in writing the specific responsibilities of the executive director; however, the committee itself shall not assume any executive or administrative functions.

Section 2. The executive director shall serve as the principal professional adviser and principal staff assistant to the Executive Board and all of its committees. In performing this function, the executive director is expected and directed to utilize all talents available to the Convention to the end that the Executive Board may be provided with the best possible assistance and advice.

Section 3. The executive director shall approve the employment of all Executive Board personnel. The employment procedures shall be in accordance with policies of the Executive Board.

Section 4. The executive director shall maintain on a current basis a policy manual and an organization manual that reflect the principal policies of the Convention and its general plan of organization. The manuals shall also include the principal policies and general plan of the organization of the Executive Board.

Section 5. When the office of the Executive Director becomes vacant, a successor shall be

elected by the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention. The name of the successor shall be recommended to the Board by a Search Committee comprised of the members of the Executive Committee and the Nominating Committee of the Board. The Search Committee shall be convened by the President of the Board upon the vacancy in the office or upon the notice by the Executive Director to vacate the office. The Search Committee will elect its own chairman, and once convened, will serve until the election of an Executive Director. However, the Executive Board, with proper notice and a two-thirds affirmative vote, may fill the office of the Executive Director at any meeting of the board without a recommendation from the Search Committee.

ARTICLE VI. AMENDMENTS

These bylaws may be amended at any meeting of the Executive Board provided:

1. Committee-sponsored amendments are announced at the preceding meeting of the board or published in the *Baptist Message* (print edition or digital edition) at least one month in advance of the board meeting at which they are considered.
2. Amendments from the floor are proposed at one meeting and acted upon at the next meeting.
3. Amendments to carry must receive a two-thirds vote of those present and voting.

LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION CHURCH SITE PLAN

I. PREAMBLE

That Louisiana Baptist Convention has been involved with churches and associations in the starting of new churches since its organization in 1848. The leaders of the Convention have been aware for some time that there was a need for some organization that could act promptly and efficiently in the matter of acquiring new church sites for developing new churches and missions. Accordingly, the following plan has been developed after thorough and open discussions of the matter by related staff persons, appropriate committees and subcommittees of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board, qualified lay persons in the fields of real estate, business, finance, and new churches.

II. ORGANIZATION

Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation

The Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation is a wholly-owned, non-profit, subsidiary corporation of the Executive Board, Louisiana Baptist Convention.

Purpose

The purpose shall be to assist Louisiana churches, associations, and the Louisiana Baptist Convention in the acquisitions of church sites for new Louisiana Baptist churches. The Church Site Corporation may purchase, receive, and otherwise acquire real and personal property for the establishment of new churches and missions, and to assist churches and associations related to the Louisiana Baptist Convention in acquiring real and personal property for the establishment of new churches and missions.

Membership and Participation

1. The membership of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board.

2. The Board of Directors of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be elected by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board upon recommendation of the Nominating Committee of the Executive Board.

3. Participation in the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be open to all persons interested in the development of new churches and missions in Louisiana.

(1) Participation shall be by donation of a share(s) of donation.

(2) Donor of a share or more shall be entitled to receive:

a. A donation share certificate stating the number of shares donated. These shares may be donated in the name of the donor, a family member, some other person or a memorial to a deceased person.

b. A quarterly newsletter presenting the status, actions, and plans of the Church Site Corporation.

c. A copy of the annual financial statement of the Church Site Corporation.

4. Relationship to Louisiana Baptist Convention Business and Financial Plan.

The Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall conduct its business, activities, programs, and projects subject to the Louisiana Baptist Convention Business and Financial Plan.

III. FUNDING

Sources of Capital Funds

1. Capital funds for the corpus of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be obtained by the receipt of donations for donation shares by individuals, churches, associations, businesses, foundations, and others interested in the development of new churches. The Church Site Corporation shall have the power to receive donation shares in the amount of 50,000 shares at \$25.00 per share initially. Subsequently, after the initial 50,000 shares have been donated, approval for additional shares must be secured from the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board.

2. The Church Site Corporation shall be responsible for administering the Mission Land Fund of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board. The corpus of the Mission Land Fund is to be transferred to the Church Site Corporation upon its activation on January 1, 1980. The Church Site Corporation shall have the responsibility of establishing policies and guidelines for this fund.

3. The Church Site Corporation shall be empowered by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board to borrow money provided the Church Site Corporation can repay any and all loans with its own sources and does not require repayment of loans from Executive Board funds.

4. The Church Site Corporation may use its earnings from interest income, profits from property dealings, gifts, bequests and donations, unless otherwise specified by the donor, to increase the corpus of the Corporation.

Sources of Grant Funds

1. The Church Site Corporation may seek and receive gifts, bequests, and donations of certain monies or real or personal properties to be used as grants to churches and associations to assist in the acquisition of new church sites.

2. The Corporation may request and receive allocations for its grant program from the Georgia Barnette State Mission Offering.

3. The Corporation may request and receive allocations from the Louisiana Baptist Convention Cooperative Program Budget to be used in its grant program.

4. The Corporation may use the earnings from its interest income, profits from property dealings, gifts, bequests, and donations, unless otherwise specified by the donor, for its grant program.

IV. GUIDELINES

Name

The name of this plan shall be the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Plan and the name of the organization shall be the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation.

Responsibility

The Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be responsible to plan and conduct the affairs of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Plan as adopted by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board and the Louisiana Baptist Convention and as revised from time to time by the Executive Board.

Nomination and Election of Board of Directors

The Church Site Corporation shall consist of nine (9) members elected by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board upon recommendation of the Executive Board Nominating Committee, and four (4) ex officio members.

1. The Board of Directors shall be composed of nine (9) elected members and four (4) ex officio members as follows:

a. Six (6) mission-minded persons (usually lay persons) experienced in finance, business or real estate, representing different areas of Louisiana.

b. Three (3) mission-minded church staff members with experience in real estate and new churches, if possible.

c. Four (4) ex officio members, the Louisiana Baptist Convention president, the chairman of the Executive Board, the chairman of the Missions Support Committee and the Executive Director.

2. Nominations to be developed in accordance with the procedures of the Executive Board.

3. The elected members of the Board of Directors shall serve for three years, and be eligible to serve a second three-year term. (In the beginning some members should be elected for three, four, and five-year terms in order to establish the rotation system.)

Officers

The officers of the Corporation shall consist of a president, vice president, and recording secretary. The recording secretary shall be the Executive Director of the Louisiana Baptist Convention or his designate.

The general counsel for the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board shall serve as legal advisor of the Corporation.

Meetings of the Board of Directors

The meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held in the Baptist Building, Alexandria, or in such place as may be designated by the Board of Directors or its officers. The Board of Directors shall meet at least twice each year, and as often as necessary to carry on the business of the Corporation. The President shall have the authority to call a meeting of the Board of Directors when it is deemed expedient to do so.

A majority of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Duties of the Board of Directors

The Board shall meet at stated times for the purpose of conducting the affairs of the Corporation. It shall also be the responsibility of the Board to make or have made certain studies of population and other data to establish trends and needs for new churches. The Board shall make decisions related to acquiring new church sites based upon demographic data, land surveys, appraisals, zoning, evidence of good title, legal description of the property, participation of local forces in the financing of the project, maintenance of the property, program evaluation, priority of the new work, available funds or other such information that the Board may require.

It is anticipated that the field work and studies shall be done by appropriate staff members of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board whose program assignments relate to new churches.

The Board shall also make regular reports of its work and actions to the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board.

Authority of the Board of Directors

1. The Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall have authority under its own charter to purchase, subdivide, sell, lease, rent, exchange, donate, and finance the purchase and/or sale of real and personal property to be used for purposes consistent with its stated program.

2. The Corporation shall have the authority to loan, or make grants to churches and asso-

4. The Corporation shall discuss and utilize the services of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board and staff persons of the Executive Board assigned to work with the development of new churches.

5. All properties purchased by the Church Site Corporation shall be held in the name of the Corporation.

Working Arrangements

1. The Board of Directors shall work with appropriate program leaders on the staff of the Executive Board in carrying out this work. It shall also be responsible to work with local churches and associations in the acquisition of new church sites. If it is not feasible to work with local Baptist leaders, the Board may proceed as necessary.

2. Any properties given to the Louisiana Baptist Convention through the Church Site Corporation shall be given without restrictions, except as agreed upon by the Board of Directors.

3. A local Baptist Church cooperating with the Louisiana Baptist Convention and the local association shall have the responsibility of sponsoring each new mission. It will be the normal procedure for the Board of Directors to have in hand a plan for each new church site, before it is purchased.

4. When new church sites are conveyed to sponsoring churches, certain stipulations shall be made to the church by the Board of Directors as follows:

a. The sponsoring church may not change the agreed upon financial plan for development without first consulting the Board of Directors.

b. The sponsoring church shall inform the mission church of the financial contributions made by the Church Site Corporation, the association and the sponsoring church in the acquisition of the property.

c. It shall be the sponsoring church's responsibility to enter into an agreement with its mission and the Louisiana Baptist Convention whereby any monies given or granted by the Corporation will be returned should such mission, or mission and sponsoring church, or mission after it is constituted as a church, disassociates itself from the Louisiana Baptist Convention. A recommended instrument shall be provided by the Church Site Corporation.

5. The Business Division office of the Louisiana Baptist Convention will be responsible to provide accounting and other business services to the Church Site Corporation.

Revisions

The provision of this document may be revised or amended by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board at any regular or special meeting of the Executive Board, acting on the recommendation of appropriate committees of the Executive Board.

BAPTIST FAITH AND MESSAGE
Adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, June 14, 2000

The 1999 session of the Southern Baptist Convention, meeting in Atlanta, Georgia, adopted the following motion addressed to the President of the Convention:

“I move that in your capacity as Southern Baptist Convention chairman, you appoint a blue ribbon committee to review the *Baptist Faith and Message* statement with the responsibility to report and bring any recommendations to this meeting next June in Orlando.”

President Paige Patterson appointed the committee as follows: Max Barnett (OK), Steve Gaines (AL), Susie Hawkins (TX), Rudy A. Hernandez (TX), Charles S. Kelley, Jr. (LA), Heather King (IN), Richard D. Land (TN), Fred Luter (LA), R. Albert Mohler, Jr. (KY), T. C. Pinckney (VA), Nelson Price (GA), Adrian Rogers (TN), Roger Spradlin (CA), Simon Tsoi (AZ), Jerry Vines (FL). Adrian Rogers (TN) was appointed chairman.

Your committee thus constituted begs leave to present its report as follows:

Baptists are a people of deep beliefs and cherished doctrines. Throughout our history we have been a confessional people, adopting statements of faith as a witness to our beliefs and a pledge of our faithfulness to the doctrines revealed in Holy Scripture.

Our confessions of faith are rooted in historical precedent, as the church in every age has been called upon to define and defend its beliefs. Each generation of Christians bears the responsibility of guarding the treasury of truth that has been entrusted to us [2 Timothy 1:14]. Facing a new century, Southern Baptists must meet the demands and duties of the present hour.

New challenges to faith appear in every age. A pervasive anti-supernaturalism in the culture was answered by Southern Baptists in 1925, when the *Baptist Faith and Message* was first adopted by this Convention. In 1963, Southern Baptists responded to assaults upon the authority and truthfulness of the Bible by adopting revisions to the *Baptist Faith and Message*. The Convention added an article on “The Family” in 1998, thus answering cultural confusion with the clear teachings of Scripture. Now, faced with a culture hostile to the very notion of truth, this generation of Baptists must claim anew the eternal truths of the Christian faith.

Your committee respects and celebrates the heritage of the *Baptist Faith and Message*, and affirms the decision of the Convention in 1925 to adopt the *New Hampshire Confession of Faith*, “revised at certain points and with some additional articles growing out of certain needs” We also respect the important contributions of the 1925 and 1963 editions of the *Baptist Faith and Message*.

With the 1963 committee, we have been guided in our work by the 1925 “statement of the historic Baptist conception of the nature and function of confessions of faith in our religious and denominational life” It is, therefore, quoted in full as a part of this report to the Convention:

(1) That they constitute a consensus of opinion of some Baptist body, large or small, for the general instruction and guidance of our own people and others concerning those articles of the Christian faith which are most surely held among us. They are not intended to add anything to the simple conditions of salvation revealed in the New Testament, viz., repentance toward God and faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord.

(2) That we do not regard them as complete statements of our faith, having any quality of finality or infallibility. As in the past so in the future, Baptists should hold themselves free to revise their statements of faith as may seem to them wise and expedient at any time.

(3) That any group of Baptists, large or small, have the inherent right to draw up for themselves and publish to the world a confession of their faith whenever they may think it advisable to do so.

(4) That the sole authority for faith and practice among Baptists is the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments. Confessions are only guides in interpretation, having no authority over the conscience.

(5) That they are statements of religious convictions, drawn from the Scriptures, and are not to be used to hamper freedom of thought or investigation in other realms of life.

Baptists cherish and defend religious liberty, and deny the right of any secular or religious authority to impose a confession of faith upon a church or body of churches. We honor the principles of soul competency and the priesthood of believers, affirming together both our liberty in Christ and our accountability to each other under the Word of God.

Baptist churches, associations, and general bodies have adopted confessions of faith as a witness to the world, and as instruments of doctrinal accountability. We are not embarrassed to state before the world that these are doctrines we hold precious and as essential to the Baptist tradition of faith and practice.

As a committee, we have been charged to address the “certain needs” of our own generation. In an age increasingly hostile to Christian truth, our challenge is to express the truth as revealed in Scripture, and to bear witness to Jesus Christ, who is “*the Way, the Truth, and the Life.*”

The 1963 committee rightly sought to identify and affirm “certain definite doctrines that Baptists believe, cherish, and with which they have been and are now closely identified.” Our living faith is established upon eternal truths. “Thus this generation of Southern Baptists is in historic succession of intent and purpose as it endeavors to state for its time and theological climate those articles of the Christian faith which are most surely held among us.”

It is the purpose of this statement of faith and message to set forth certain teachings which we believe.

THE BAPTIST FAITH & MESSAGE

I. THE SCRIPTURES

All Scripture is a testimony to Christ, who is Himself the focus of divine revelation.

C. GOD THE HOLY SPIRIT

His presence in the Christian is the guarantee that God will bring the believer into the fullness of the stature of Christ. III. MAN

Man is the special creation of God, made in His own image. He created them male and female as the crowning work of His creation. The gift of gender is thus part of the goodness of God's creation. In the beginning man was innocent of sin and was endowed by his Creator with freedom of choice. By his free choice man sinned against God and brought sin into the human race. Through the temptation of Satan man transgressed the command of God, and fell from his original innocence whereby his posterity inherit a nature and an environment inclined toward sin. Therefore, as soon as they are capable of moral action, they become transgressors and are under condemnation. Only the grace of God can bring man into His holy fellowship and enable man to fulfill the creative purpose of God. The sacredness of human personality is evident in that God created man in His own image, and in that Christ died for man; therefore, every person of every race possesses full dignity and is worthy of respect and Christian love.

IV. SALVATION

Salvation involves the redemption of the whole man, and is offered freely to all who accept Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour, who by His own blood obtained eternal redemption for the believer. In its broadest sense salvation includes regeneration, justification, sanctification, and glorification. There is no salvation apart from personal faith in Jesus Christ as Lord.

A. Regeneration, or the new birth, is a work of God's grace whereby believers become new creatures in Christ Jesus. It is a change of heart wrought by the Holy Spirit through conviction

of sin, to which the sinner responds in repentance toward God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. Repentance and faith are inseparable experiences of grace.

Repentance is a genuine turning from sin toward God. Faith is the acceptance of Jesus Christ and commitment of the entire personality to Him as Lord and Saviour.

B. Justification is God's gracious and full acquittal upon principles of His righteousness of all sinners who repent and believe in Christ. Justification brings the believer unto a relationship of peace and favor with God.

C. Sanctification is the experience, beginning in regeneration, by which the believer is set apart to God's purposes, and is enabled to progress toward moral and spiritual maturity through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit dwelling in him. Growth in grace should continue throughout the regenerate person's life.

D. Glorification is the culmination of salvation and is the final blessed and abiding state of the redeemed.

V. GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE

Election is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates, justifies, sanctifies, and glorifies sinners. It is consistent with the free agency of man, and comprehends all the means in connection with the end. It is the glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, and is infinitely wise, holy, and unchangeable. It excludes boasting and promotes humility.

All true believers endure to the end. Those whom God has accepted in Christ, and sanctified by His Spirit, will never fall away from the state of grace, but shall persevere to the end. Believers may fall into sin through neglect and temptation, whereby they grieve the Spirit, impair their graces and comforts, and bring reproach on the cause of Christ and temporal judgments on themselves; yet they shall be kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

VI. THE CHURCH

A New Testament church of the Lord Jesus Christ is an autonomous local congregation of baptized believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; observing the two ordinances of Christ, governed by His laws, exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word, and seeking to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth. Each congregation operates under the Lordship of Christ through democratic processes. In such a congregation each member is responsible and accountable to Christ as Lord. Its scriptural officers are pastors and deacons. While both men and women are gifted for service in the church, the office of pastor is limited to men as qualified by Scripture.

The New Testament speaks also of the church as the Body of Christ which includes all of the redeemed of all the ages, believers from every tribe, and tongue, and people, and nation.

VII. BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. It is an act of obedience symbolizing the believer's faith in a crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, the believer's death to sin, the burial of the old life, and the resurrection to walk in newness of life in Christ Jesus. It is a testimony to his faith in the final resurrection of the dead. Being a church ordinance, it is prerequisite to the privileges of church membership and to the Lord's Supper.

The Lord's Supper is a symbolic act of obedience whereby members of the church, through partaking of the bread and the fruit of the vine, memorialize the death of the Redeemer and anticipate His second coming.

VIII. THE LORD'S DAY

The first day of the week is the Lord's Day. It is a Christian institution for regular observance. It commemorates the resurrection of Christ from the dead and should include exercises of worship and spiritual devotion, both public and private. Activities on the Lord's Day should be commensurate with the Christian's conscience under the Lordship of Jesus Christ.

IX. THE KINGDOM

The Kingdom of God includes both His general sovereignty over the universe and His particular kingship over men who willfully acknowledge Him as King. Particularly the Kingdom is the realm of salvation into which men enter by trustful, childlike commitment to Jesus Christ. Christians ought to pray and to labor that the Kingdom may come and God's will be done on earth. The full consummation of the Kingdom awaits the return of Jesus Christ and the end of this age.

X. LAST THINGS

God, in His own time and in His own way, will bring the world to its appropriate end. The unrighteous will be consigned to Hell, the place of everlasting punishment. The righteous in their resurrected and glorified bodies will receive their reward and will dwell forever in Heaven with the Lord.

XI. EVANGELISM AND MISSIONS

It is the duty and privilege of every follower of Christ and of every church of the Lord Jesus Christ to endeavor to make disciples of all nations. The new birth of man's spirit by God's Holy Spirit means the birth of love for others. Missionary effort on the part of all rests thus upon a spiritual necessity of the regenerate life, and is expressly and repeatedly commanded in the teachings of Christ. The Lord Jesus Christ has commanded the preaching of the gospel to all nations. It is the duty of every child of God to seek constantly to win the lost to Christ by verbal witness undergirded by a Christian lifestyle, and by other methods in harmony with the gospel of Christ.

XII. EDUCATION

Christianity is the faith of enlightenment and intelligence. In Jesus Christ abide all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge. All sound learning is, therefore, a part of our Christian heritage. The new birth opens all human faculties and creates a thirst for knowledge. Moreover, the cause of education in the Kingdom of Christ is co-ordinate with the causes of missions and general benevolence, and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches. An adequate system of Christian education is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people.

In Christian education there should be a proper balance between academic freedom and academic responsibility. Freedom in any orderly relationship of human life is always limited and never absolute. The freedom of a teacher in a Christian school, college, or seminary is limited by the pre-eminence of Jesus Christ, by the authoritative nature of the Scriptures, and by the distinct purpose for which the school exists.

XIII. STEWARDSHIP

God is the source of all blessings, temporal and spiritual; all that we have and are we owe to Him. Christians have a spiritual debtorship to the whole world, a holy trusteeship in the gospel, and a binding stewardship in their possessions. They are therefore under obligation to serve Him with their time, talents, and material possessions; and should recognize all these as entrusted to them to use for the glory of God and for helping others. According to the Scriptures, Christians should contribute of their means cheerfully, regularly, systematically, proportionately, and liberally for the advancement of the Redeemer's cause on earth.

XIV. COOPERATION

Christ's people should, as occasion requires, organize such associations and conventions as may best secure cooperation for the great objects of the Kingdom of God. Such organizations have no authority over one another or over the churches. They are voluntary and advisory bodies designed to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of our people in the most effective manner. Members of New Testament churches should cooperate with one another in carrying forward the missionary, educational, and benevolent ministries for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Christian unity in the New Testament sense is spiritual harmony and voluntary cooperation for common ends by various groups of Christ's people. Cooperation is desirable between the various Christian denominations, when the end to be attained is itself justified, and when such cooperation involves no violation of conscience or compromise of loyalty to Christ and His Word as revealed in the New Testament.

XV. THE CHRISTIAN AND THE SOCIAL ORDER

All Christians are under obligation to seek to make the will of Christ supreme in our own lives and in human society. Means and methods used for the improvement of society and the establishment of righteousness among men can be truly and permanently helpful only when they are rooted in the regeneration of the individual by the saving grace of God in Jesus Christ. In the spirit of Christ, Christians should oppose racism, every form of greed, selfishness, and vice, and all forms of sexual immorality, including adultery, homosexuality, and pornography. We should work to provide for the orphaned, the needy, the abused, the aged, the helpless, and the sick. We should speak on behalf of the unborn and contend for the sanctity of all human life from conception to natural death. Every Christian should seek to bring industry, government, and society as a whole under the sway of the principles of righteousness, truth, and brotherly love. In order to promote these ends Christians should be ready to work with all men of good will in any good cause, always being careful to act in the spirit of love without compromising their loyalty to Christ and His truth.

XVI. PEACE AND WAR

It is the duty of Christians to seek peace with all men on principles of righteousness. In accordance with the spirit and teachings of Christ they should do all in their power to put an end to war.

The true remedy for the war spirit is the gospel of our Lord. The supreme need of the world is the acceptance of His teachings in all the affairs of men and nations, and the practical application of His law of love. Christian people throughout the world should pray for the reign of the Prince of Peace.

XVII. RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

God alone is Lord of the conscience, and He has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to His Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to every church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Civil government being ordained of God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to the civil power to carry on its work. The gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its ends. The state has no right to impose penalties for religious opinions of any kind. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal, and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

XVIII. THE FAMILY

God has ordained the family as the foundational institution of human society. It is composed of persons related to one another by marriage, blood, or adoption.

Marriage is the uniting of one man and one woman in covenant commitment for a lifetime. It is God's unique gift to reveal the union between Christ and His church and to provide for the man and the woman in marriage the framework for intimate companionship, the channel of sexual expression according to biblical standards, and the means for procreation of the human race.

The husband and wife are of equal worth before God, since both are created in God's image. The marriage relationship models the way God relates to His people. A husband is to love his wife as Christ loved the church. He has the God-given responsibility to provide for, to protect, and to lead his family. A wife is to submit herself graciously to the servant leadership of her husband even as the church willingly submits to the headship of Christ. She, being in the image of God as is her husband and thus equal to him, has the God-given responsibility to respect her husband and to serve as his helper in managing the household and nurturing the next generation.

Children, from the moment of conception, are a blessing and heritage from the Lord. Parents are to demonstrate to their children God's pattern for marriage. Parents are to teach their children spiritual and moral values and to lead them, through consistent lifestyle example and loving discipline, to make choices based on biblical truth. Children are to honor and obey their parents.

CHURCH-STATE RELATIONS

OUR HISTORIC CONCEPT OF RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

Democracy itself is rooted in the assumption that man is capable of making the choices needed for governance of his own life and his social institutions. This assumption is based in turn on the Christian concept that man is essentially a spiritual being; and only through the responses of his spiritual nature can he relate himself to God and thus rise above his animal limitations. But only one who is free can make a genuine response to God. Religious freedom is, therefore, antecedent to the creation of civil and political freedom, which constitutes the nature of democracy.

Historically, Baptists have been aggressive advocates of absolute freedom of conscience for all men. In England and Colonial America they led in formulating the concept of church-state separation. The power of government then was arbitrary and absolute, backed by an established church, the two often working in collusion to give mutual support to each other. The established church forced its doctrine and modes of worship upon all, with government lending use of its power to punish dissenters. Thus protected and supported, the established church itself was a strong political force. When joined to protect and expand their mutual vested interests, the two constituted a powerful political combine, perpetuating their power through forcing conformity in worship and stamping out dissent.

Baptists believed that this denied to man the right to live as God had willed that he live, a free and self-determining being. It destroyed an individual's liberty of the spirit, freedom of conscience, right of choice - in short, all that made a man a man, according to the Baptist conception. It was in the context of these experiences that Baptists evolved their unique conception of complete separation of the two in their respective operations.

During the evolution of the separation concept their focus of concern was always to protect the individual, Baptist or not, in the free exercise of his religious conscience, always, of course, within the context of the Christian concept of life dedicated to ministering to and serving the needs of people - whether family, neighbor or stranger. Just so on the present issue. Louisiana Baptists recognize, as Jesus indicated to Peter on the mountain top, that their place is down there in the valley where the people are - teaching, healing, serving. We are free, not to enjoy release from the demands of life, but to carry out the work of our Lord on the streets of life where men work, learn, and suffer.

GUIDELINES

This committee was appointed essentially "to recommend guidelines for policy implementation" concerning institutional use of governmental funds. In actuality, the Louisiana Baptist Convention has by its practice already adopted a general policy of selective participation in government programs, wherever it was felt there was no impingement on the institution's independence. It is the element of "selectivity" in this policy that makes it essential, for the guidance of all concerned - the Convention officers and the trustees and administrators of the institution. Out of its deliberations, the committee has identified certain statements of general principle which appear to offer valid guidelines for those responsible for institutional decision making.

First: The Institution Should Identify and Clarify Its Basic Purposes.

Through continuing study and open discussion, the administrators, staff, and representatives of the governing board should develop a clear-cut understanding of the basic nature and purposes of the institution. This should be reduced to writing and circulated regularly among all related in any way with the institution.

This study should become an ongoing process of constant re-evaluation in light of our constantly changing social and technological demands. To provide leadership for this is a function of the executive officer.

Second: Any Assistance That Creates a Limitation on or Diversion From These Purposes Should Not Be Permitted.

Once the institutional staff and its constituency are clear in their concept of the institution's nature and primary purposes, all limitations or diversions, financial or otherwise, should be avoided.

Third: Acceptance of Government Grants.

No grant to the institution from any government agency shall be accepted. A grant shall be construed to be any transfer of funds or property for which the institution does not give adequate consideration.

Fourth: The Institution Must Retain Its Own Integrity In the Matter of Control.

In considering whether to seek or accept funds of any type, the institution must determine whether any part of the agreement provides for governmental control of the institution's affairs - except for normal accounting procedure for the shared funds.

The institution must retain the right to determine what religious activities will be held on the premises. The Trustees of the institution and their staff must have freedom to operate in accordance with principles and policies inherent in good programs and not on the expediency of politics.

Fifth: Participation Relationships Must be Voluntary, With Clear-Cut Terminal Arrangements.

In participating in government programs, the relationship should be voluntary on both sides, with either party able to terminate the agreement when it appears desirable. The agreement should indicate clearly the point at which the participating institution has fulfilled its obligation in the contract.

Sixth: The Institution Must Not Become Dependent on These Funds for Program Operation.

The trustees should not permit acceptance of funds in any area of program to such an extent that the institution becomes so dependent on outside funds that it would suffer unduly if they were discontinued.

Seventh: The Institution Must Protect the Integrity of Its Basic Programs.

The trustees must guard against any tendency on the part of the institution to become so involved with government programs that the institutional programs begin to grow around the emphasis on this public phase of its work to the neglect of its private sector.

Eighth: The Institution Must Not Accept Funds That Relate to Teaching of Religion.

The trustees should not accept any governmental funds that might in any way come to influence the way in which religion is taught or the word of God spread in the institution.

Ninth: The Institution's Trustees Should Have a Large Degree of Freedom in Decision-making In These Operational Matters.

After the Convention has adopted a definite statement of policy guidelines, it should give the institutional trustees a large degree of freedom, within the guidelines, to formulate programs and make decisions affecting the ongoing program in this area as in others. With appropriate reporting through the established channels, the trustees will keep the Convention informed on their program decisions. Only so can the Convention and the trustees perform their respective roles with integrity.

The proper function of the Convention is to establish over-all policy directions. That of the trustees and their administrators is to develop and implement programs for the individual institutions within the framework of these established policy statements.

15. LBC Missions and Ministry Team Director John Hebert and St. Matthews Baptist Church, Pelican Point, Bahamas, Pastor, Freddie Laing, presented a Disaster Relief Update on the work at St. Matthews Baptist Church.

16. Committee on Credentials Chairman, Mark Morelock, announced 501 messengers registered as of 9:00 a.m.

17. David Cranford called for nominations for Louisiana Baptist Convention President.

18. Eddie Wren, messenger, First, Rayville, nominated Reggie Bridges, pastor, Temple, Ruston, as LBC President.

19. David Cranford called for other nominations. There were no other nominees.

20. In compliance with Article VIII, Section 2, of the LBC Constitution, LBC Secretary/Treasurer, Steve Horn, cast a unanimous ballot for Reggie Bridges as President of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.
21. David Cranford declared Reggie Bridges as president elect.
22. Executive Board President, David Goza, pastor, Jefferson, Baton Rouge, presented the report from the Executive Board as printed on pages 10-11 of the *Book of Reports*. David Goza moved the adoption of the 2022 Cooperative Program Allocation Budget of \$17,626,136 as printed on page 12 of the *Book of Reports*.

Dr. Brewer stated the vision statement of Louisiana Christian University continues to be preparing graduates and transforming lives.

38. David Cranford called for Introduction of Motions.
39. David Fuller, messenger, First, Baton Rouge, presented the following motion:
That the 2021 Annual Meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention condemn the Southern Baptist Convention President, Ed Litton, for plagiarizing his sermons for many years from his pulpit and call for him to resign from his position as President of the Southern Baptist Convention.
40. Michael Litton, messenger, First, Sulphur, called for a point of privilege and led in a special time of prayer for the SBC Sexual Abuse Task Force.
41. Executive Director Steve Horn presented the Executive Director's report assisted by Tommy and Eddie, also known as The Skit Guys. Horn expressed appreciation to Bill Dye, pastor, North Monroe Baptist Church, David Cranford, and to the LBC staff for their preparations for Annual Meeting. Horn stated we have work to do in Disaster Relief and we have work to do in "calling out the called". Dr. Horn stated that we have work to do in the area of preventing sexual abuse in the church and that we must be more engaged. Horn stated he is making a personal commitment to the messengers that before the Annual Meeting next year, we will do the following:

- We will dedicate a staff meeting in January to address with all our staff of the Louisiana Baptist Convention the existing personnel policies, best practices, and provide other helpful resources to our staff members. This meeting has been set for January 27.
- I will ask our Administrative Committee of the Executive Board to review and make any necessary changes to our personnel policies.
- We will undergo a thorough review of our procedures and staff training for LBC sponsored camps and events.
- We will explore this year how to help churches implement best practices to avoid sexual abuse in their churches.
- We will continue to train our staff to be resource providers for churches in the area of sexual abuse response just as we are resource providers in other areas.
- I have asked all our entities to join me in reviewing their own policies and training. They have all given me their enthusiastic word to do so.

Dr. Horn presented an overview of the personal revival guide, *Change Me*. He concluded his report time by extending an invitation for messengers and guests to participate in the *Change Me* emphasis.

42. Jay Adkins, messenger, First, Westwego, led in a special time of prayer for Dr. Steve Horn.
43. Blake Davis and North Monroe Baptist Church Praise Team led in special music.
44. Oren Conner, pastor, First, Baton Rouge, preached the Convention Sermon using Luke 18:9-14 as his text.
45. Michael Wood, pastor, First, West Monroe, led in the benediction and session one adjourned at 12:03.

Session Two

46. President David Cranford called the second session of the 174th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention to order at 1:45 p.m. A quorum was present.
47. LBC First Vice President, David Jeffreys, messenger, Highland, New Iberia, assumed the chair.
48. Blake Davis led in a time of praise and worship.
49. William Smith, LBC Second Vice President and messenger, Lakeshore, Monroe, led in the opening prayer.
50. Committee on Order of Business chairman, Stewart Holloway presented a report from the committee ruling the motion made by David Fuller in the morning session out of order.
51. Dr. Steve Echols led in his second Bible Study using Galatians 5:23-23 as his text.
52. Executive Editor of the *Baptist Message*, Will Hall, presented the *Baptist Message* report. Dr. Hall stated the production schedule moved from 24 productions to 14 productions per year. He also stated that churches may now import the *Baptist Message* content from the website on to their website. Hall expressed appreciation to Louisiana Baptists for their efforts in supporting and passing the Love Life Amendment and because of that work, other Conventions are now working to pass their own legislation. He concluded his report by presenting the Shammah's Courage Award to State Representatives Alan Seabaugh and Mike Johnson and the Esther Award to Senator Beth Mizell.
53. Committee on Moral and Social Concerns Chairman, Brian Gunter presented the Committee on Moral and Social Concerns Report as printed on pages 34-35 in the *Book of Reports*. Gunter stated that the committee will continue to work fighting abortions in the state of Louisiana.

54. David Jeffreys called for questions regarding the *Baptist Message* report.
55. David Fuller, messenger, First, Baton Rouge, called for a Point of Order regarding the motion he presented in the morning session and the opportunity to speak to the motion.
56. David Jeffreys responded he would have opportunity during the Miscellaneous Business time at 3:35.
57. David Cranford presented the President's Address using Matthew 6:5-15 as his text. He was assisted by The Skit Guys.
58. President David Cranford assumed the chair.
59. David Cranford called for nominations for LBC Second Vice President.
60. James Hester, messenger, Social Springs, Ringgold, nominated Price Harris, Calvary, Shreveport.
61. David Cranford called for other nominations. There were no other nominees.
62. In compliance with Article VIII, Section 2, of the LBC Constitution, LBC Secretary/Treasurer, Steve Horn, cast a unanimous ballot for Price Harris as LBC Second Vice President of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.
63. David Cranford declared Price Harris as LBC Second Vice President elect.
64. Blake Davis led in a time of Praise and Worship.
65. David Cranford called for a time of Miscellaneous Business which included the Point of Order by David Fuller, messenger, First, Baton Rouge, who requested a time for rebuttal on the motion presented in session one (line 38).
66. David Cranford called for a vote (2/3 majority needed) on the following motion:
That the messengers override the decision of the Committee on Order of Business and allow the motion presented by David Fuller to be debated on the floor.
67. The vote was taken, and the motion failed.
68. Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries Executive Director Perry Hancock presented a report highlighting the ministries of the Children's Home. He shared that over 3,200 children and others had been served through the support of Louisiana Baptists. He presented an overview of the various ministries of the Children's Home including the ministry to homeless children and their mothers, CWJC, Granberry, HomePlace, and Orphans Embrace. Hancock introduced Dr. Dennis Phelps who has joined their staff as the director of Church, Minister, and Alumni Relations. Dr. Hancock concluded his report by sharing a story about "Allie" and expressing thanks to the messengers for their continued support of the Cooperative Program.
69. David Cranford called for questions regarding the Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries report.
70. Committee on Resolutions Chairman, Johnny Hoychick presented the Committee on Resolutions report and moved the adoption of the report as printed on pages 30-33 of the *Book of Reports*.
71. Richard Methvin, messenger, Bistineau, Heflin, presented an amendment to Resolution 4 to strike the next to last paragraph on reaffirming the 1995 resolution that we apologize to all African Americans for condoning and/or perpetuating individual and systemic racism in our lifetime. He stated he is not a racist and hasn't seen racism in his church, nor in the room today and does not believe that racism exists. He further stated that he does not believe that we should apologize for the actions of our fathers or grandfathers.
72. Johnny Hoychick responded that the committee chose to use the same language as the SBC Resolution #2 but added CRT and intersectionality to make it very specific. The committee was unanimous that this language is proper.
73. Richard Methvin further stated that he fully supports the resolution and is against

- racism, but he does not believe that we should continue to apologize.
74. Brian Gunter, messenger, First, Pollock, stated the Committee on Moral and Social Concerns of which he is the chairman, presented the resolution to the Committee on Resolutions using the same language as SBC Resolution #2 and added CRT and intersectionality to the SBC language to make it clear that we were strongly opposing CRT and that it is unbiblical.
 75. Kevin Ulmer, messenger, First, Ferriday, spoke for the amendment.
 76. Michael Linton, messenger, First, Sulphur, spoke against the amendment.
 77. David Cranford called for a ballot vote and the amendment failed.
 78. Michel Linton, messenger, First, Sulphur, presented an amendment to Resolution #4 to remove the word “specifically” from the RESOLVED paragraphs and replace with “including many parts of”.
 79. Johnny Hoychick responded that the committee is unanimous in presenting the resolution as printed in the *Book of Reports*.
 80. Shad Tibbs, Fellowship, Trout, spoke against the amendment.
 81. David Cranford called for a raised ballot vote on the proposed amendment to Resolution 4 (remove the word “specifically” from the RESOLVED paragraphs and replace with “including many parts of”). The amendment failed.
 82. David Cranford called for a raised ballot vote on Resolution #4 as printed on page 32 of the *Book of Reports* and the motion carried.
 83. David Cranford called for a vote on Resolutions 1, 2, 3, and 5 and the resolutions were adopted.
 84. Nathaniel Gardner, Pineville Park, Pineville stated he submitted a resolution on Matters of Conscience to the Committee on Resolutions and the committee declined to bring it to the Convention floor. Gardner moved that he be allowed to submit the resolution to the messengers.
 85. Johnny Hoychick responded that the committee felt the resolution addressed an SBC entity and should be brought to the messengers at the SBC and not the Louisiana Baptist Convention floor.
 86. David Cranford called for a raised ballot vote to override the decision of the Committee on Resolutions, and the motion failed.
 87. Louisiana Baptist Foundation Executive Director, Jeff Steed, presented a report to the messengers. Steed stated that the Foundation is advancing the kingdom one dollar at a time, one ministry at a time, and one life at a time. He presented an overview of the services to ministries and to individuals. He concluded his report with a brief overview of the LBF Vision.
 88. David Cranford called for questions regarding the Louisiana Baptist Foundation report.
 89. David Cranford recognized outgoing LBC First Vice President, David Jeffreys and LBC Second Vice President William Smith, and presented them with a plaque.
 90. Steve Horn recognized outgoing LBC President, David Cranford, and presented him with a plaque.
 91. David Cranford recognized newly elected LBC President, Reggie Bridges, pastor, Temple, Ruston, LBC First Vice President, Steven Kelly, pastor, Bayou Vista, Morgan City, and LBC Second Vice President, Price Harris, member, Calvary, Shreveport.
 92. Jerry Price, messenger, First, West Monroe, led in the benediction.
 93. President David Cranford adjourned the 174th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention at 4:36 p.m.

STATE MISSIONS SERVICES FOR CHURCHES AND ASSOCIATIONS

EXECUTIVE TEAM Dr. Steve Horn, Executive Director

What can you say about 2020 that hasn't already been said?

As you review the following reports, you'll discover some of what God did through our cooperative missions and ministries in what was, without question, one of the most challenging years in recent memory. Even in the midst of a pandemic and natural disasters, God's spirit was at work, God's people were at work, and lives were changed. So, I encourage you to take a few minutes and review these reports.

I've shared with you before that one of my favorite passages of scripture is found in 1 Samuel chapter 7 where Samuel called on the Israelites to put away their foreign Gods and serve the Lord. While the Israelites gathered, the Philistines decided it was an opportune time to attack. As Israel continued to repent and worship, God thundered against the Philistines throwing them into confusion while, at the same time, empowering His people to drive them back. BUSINESS AND INFORMATION SERVICES TEAM Dale D. Lingenfelter, Director

The Business and Information Services Team serves as a support group for all the work of the LBC State Missions Services. The team provides expertise in the areas of financial accounting, information technology, facilities maintenance, office services, and human resources as well as providing hosting and program services for conferences and camps through Tall Timbers. Our goal is to enhance and support the work of all LBC Teams, so they accomplish the missions and ministry goals of the Convention.

In addition to coordinating the Annual Church Profile (ACP) process for the state, Shana Johnson serves as **Information Services** Support Manager and is responsible for the overall information technical support systems of the Convention and provides assistance to several state entities that are housed within the Baptist Building. In cooperation with other SBC state conventions and national SBC entities, Information Services has been instrumental in developing an online database of all SBC congregations and leadership. This program has become the national database for all SBC congregations and all SBC entities, both state and national. The database consists of all information collected through the ACP each year, as well as information directly communicated to the office. All information is retained to maintain historical statistical and leadership information for each reporting congregation. Through her team's effort along with assistance from the entire State Mission Services Staff, ACP reporting of all Louisiana Baptist congregations maintains an above average reporting percentage within the SBC network of congregations.

The **LBC Accounting Team** provides competent tax and accounting information to Louisiana Baptist churches. In addition to supporting the finances of State Missions Services, we assist with questions on Budgeting, Accounting, Payroll Taxes, and Church Accounting issues. We are here to help you! Our contact information can be found on the LBC website. In addition, consistent with prior years, the Louisiana Baptist Convention received an excellent review on our Annual Audit Report.

Tall Timbers experienced no programmed summer camps in 2020 due to the pandemic – the first time in camp history. In addition, the campground sustained wind and flood damages from Hurricanes Laura and Delta respectively in the fall of 2020. However, director, Josh Bumgardner, and a reduced staff worked through the year to improve the facilities while hosting much fewer guests. The staff trusted in God's provision through the hardships of 2020, knowing that the need would be great for guests to reconnect at retreats and summer camps in 2021! Hotel room renovations will resume in 2021, as well as the completion of a new cabin, and the start of construction of a new swimming pool.

The Business and Information Services Team considers all of its various areas of support work as ministry unto the Lord. We count it a privilege to serve our Lord by serving our colleagues and Louisiana Baptists in the work of reaching Louisiana for Christ and strengthening our churches.

BAPTIST COLLEGIATE MINISTRY

Mark Robinson, Director

Every report of 2021 will mention literally if not implied the Covid-19 pandemic's impact on ministry. BCM is no exception to this rule. We were impacted greatly by having to find new ways to reach students virtually and in person. The struggle made us better at reaching students because it gave our leaders new skill sets. We entered summer with loosened restrictions and had a very good summer missions program. Among the hundreds of students that went out to serve on mission this summer, we sent three GoLa VBS and youth ministry teams out. The Louisiana teams saw over 65 new decisions to follow Christ. Also, we assisted Level Ground Church of New Orleans in having their very first Vacation Bible School. One team spent the summer assisting churches in the Wyoming Baptist Convention in VBS, community evangelism, compassion ministry, youth ministry, and as camp counselors. That team saw 24 decisions for Christ.

BCM also held its first annual sermon scholarship competition. BCM students from around the state submitted videos of their sermons to a committee that listened and evaluated the presentation. Five young men were awarded scholarships for excellent submissions. We are planning to continue this program in 2021-22.

Below is an evaluation of impact the Covid changes brought to BCM. Shutting down for the quarantine allowed us to accomplish several important tasks for our ministry.

1. Buildings received much need updating and maintenance.
2. Staff received extra training in the area of digital communication including Webex seminars, Zoom meetings, and meeting rooms in FB groups.
3. We began to utilize these formats for reaching out to incoming freshmen earlier than ever by forming

- freshman meet and greet groups on Zoom weekly.
4. The University campuses became more generous by giving us contact information for incoming freshman and relying on BCM staff to serve in an advisory capacity with the campus officials and meeting crucial needs in the quarantine response period.
 5. International student ministry has had an all-time high impact this summer, particularly at LSU. These students were stranded on campus without work visas or campus cafeterias. The BCM has been providing boxes of groceries, through donations, to around 90 families a week throughout the year.
 6. Emphasis had to move from large events to primarily Gospel appointments and Discipleship.

There are many more good things that came from this time of struggle.

This fall BCM staff and facilities will be utilized to continue to reach the University city all over our state. There are adaptation plans in effect at every campus, and we will continue to strive to proclaim the Gospel daily.

COMMUNICATIONS TEAM

John Kyle, Director

Pivot

Pivot became one of the most frequently used words of 2020. Due to the changing nature of the pandemic, we went from “all systems go” in January to lockdowns and quarantines in March, and finally a gradual lessening of restrictions as the year progressed. In 2020, you didn’t pivot just once. Pivoting became the norm as we attempted to prayerfully discern what God would have us do during what certainly was the most tumultuous year in recent memory.

We pivoted in WHAT we communicated.

Events were cancelled. Churches and individuals had to be informed. Information relating to the pandemic was regularly compiled, released, and updated. Resources designed to assist churches in navigating regulations, procedures, assistance, and practices were posted.

We pivoted in HOW we communicated.

Due to COVID, almost everything communicated had to be done via the website and social media. With the exception of the PPP (Payroll Protection Program), there was little to no regular mail or correspondence distributed.

In collaboration with our I.T. team, we utilized Zoom and GoToWebinar® software to virtually gather groups to communicate, encourage, and pray for one another. Some of the virtual events included:

- Small/Medium/Large church webinars dealing with the pandemic
- Statewide online prayer meeting
- Encourage webinars for pastors and pastors’ wives
- Digital ReGroup Sunday School and Small Group training

This online communication was particularly helpful when the hurricanes hit in late August and September.

We pivoted in WHEN we communicated.

Pandemics and hurricanes don’t keep regular office hours. Working remotely, the Communications Team posted and updated information as soon as it was received to assist churches and individuals looking for information and assistance. It was not unusual to post several times a day in an effort to keep the information current.

We also pivoted relating to our efforts to seed God’s truth in every heart and every home via *Here for You*, our multi-media evangelistic outreach. COVID-related commercials were created, aired, and posted re-

sulting in touching 95% of TV households across the state. Those commercials can be viewed by visiting HereforYou.org and clicking on Videos. In addition, more than 224,000 people were reached each month via social media and streaming services and our partnership with the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association saw 1,273 people indicate a decision for Christ!

What do these numbers mean? They indicate the seeds of God's truth were scattered in hearts and homes across the state – even during a pandemic! God promises that “some” of those seeds find good soil and the return on those seeds is 30, 60, up to 100 times more than what was scattered, (Matthew 13:3-9).

EVANGELISM AND CHURCH GROWTH TEAM

Keith Manuel, Director

“Change Me” was the emphasis of the Evangelism Conference hosted by Summer Grove, Shreveport. We were challenged, equipped, and thrilled to gather online and in-person. Next year's ECON will be January 24-25, 2022. Our host is First, Covington.

Sean Keith is your Sunday School, Discipleship, and Revitalization Strategist. The Digital ReGroup Conference reached 1,000 participants, and helped equip pastors, staff, and lay leaders to reach their communities with the Gospel through small groups. Sean has spent much time preparing materials with a diverse group of pastors and church leaders to assist congregations with “ReFresh,” a way for churches to start fresh and anew, especially in light of the pandemic.

Your Adult Ministries and Church Administration Strategist is Jeff Ingram. He coordinated the Senior Adult portion of ECON 2020 which was still well attended, despite the pandemic. He also led meetings across the state for the Louisiana Association of Baptist Ministry Assistants. His work in Church Administration is mainly in consultations with churches/associations that cover the following areas: Pastor/Staff Salary Breakdowns; IRS Compliance; Best Practices for Church Finance Committees; Church/Associational By-Laws; Code of Ethics for Ministerial Staff; Church Staff Job Descriptions; and Sexual Harassment & Abuse. Jeff also connects Louisiana Baptist churches with the GOLLA teams to help our churches with VBS and other summer ministry projects.

Brandon Lewis serves as your Youth Strategist. The Youth Evangelism Celebration ministered to 1,100 youth and adults in-person and online with many different spiritual decisions made during this powerful gathering. Camps were held this summer at Tall Timbers with 850 teens gathering for worship, equipping, and fun. Twenty-eight students made professions of faith and ten students indicated a call to ministry. In addition to the spiritual decisions made, students learned how to share their faith to return to their home mission field equipped to impact others with the Gospel. Students gave over \$4,600 for missions during these camps. Prayerfully, YEC will return to the Rapides Coliseum on November 21-22, 2021. Speaking this year is Clayton King with worship led by the Jason Lovins Band. Our concert guest this year is Crowder. For the safety of our students, our leadership continues to meet with Rapides Coliseum personnel to monitor the COVID situation and to follow appropriate protocols given by the state/national medical community.

Serving as your Children's Ministry Strategist is David Anderson. This year our children's camps returned to Tall Timbers with attendance of over 900. We know of 107 students who made professions of faith and the children gave \$4,400 to missions. VBS trainings were held in two locations this year with plans

to expand locations in 2022. The Childhood Education Workshop which was cancelled last year returned with almost pre-pandemic numbers.

The Evangelism & Church Growth Team loves to serve you by providing training for your leaders and church members in evangelism, discipleship, administration, and age-group ministries. MISSIONS AND MINISTRY TEAM

John D. Hebert, Director

The Missions and Ministry Team of the Convention remains committed to helping our churches reach their full potential in reaching our state for Christ. Highlights for the year include a highly successful church planting effort, strides in our compassion ministry engagement with churches, and a growing mission builder program. These highlights accompany the execution of new strategies in Women’s Missions and Ministry, Partnership Missions, Disaster Relief/Men’s Ministry, and Missions Education.

Church Planting

James Jenkins, Director of Church Planting, continues to lead the effort of Church Planting. His team is comprised of Lane Corley, our Anglo-Church Planting and Replant Strategist, and Carlos Schmidt, Language Church Planting and Partnership Missions Strategist. In partnership with our churches and associations, this team has worked to meet the goal of the 2020 Presidential Commission to plant 300 new churches by the year 2021. Even with the challenge of the COVID-19 pandemic, that number is now 277 or 92% of the goal. Churches planted since 2010, have now led over 17,000 people to Christ and church membership. Church planting has helped Louisiana Baptists to reach every people group including Anglo, African American, Vietnamese, Burmese, Chinese, Korean, Haitians, Eritrean, Arabic, Hispanic, and Portuguese.

Church Planting Orientation has moved online, with over 200 logging in for a monthly orientation to Church Planting and Replanting through Louisiana Baptists since April 2020. Greenhouse training for Church Planters is also moving to an online format with fewer in person retreats in the future. In the fall of 2021, church multiplication events will return with new roundtables on starting simple, disciple making movement focused churches and ministries.

Language Church Planting and Partnership Missions

Carlos Schmidt has continued to foster and affirm all the existing partnerships Louisiana Baptist churches and organizations have with missions’ projects in the United States and the rest of the world. These partnerships include Haiti, Belarus, Brazil, US Virgin Islands, Puerto Rico, Brownsville/Matamoros, Cape Bretton Island Canada, Yucatan Mexico, and Madrid. Carlos led Missions Ready Roundtables at New Orleans Baptist Association, CenLa Baptist Association, Washington Baptist Association, William Wallace Baptist Association, and Gulf Coast Baptist Association. Missions Ready Roundtables were scheduled in other associations, but had to be cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Carlos partnered with the Baptist Association of Greater Baton Rouge to host two quarterly Asian Missions Leaders Fellowships. He also spoke at FBC Lafayette WMU meetings. He co-led in the formation of a Hispanic Southern State Hispanic Missions Coalition with the purpose of motivating, training, and mobilizing Hispanic churches in Alabama, Mississippi, Georgia, Florida, and Louisiana to local and global missions’ opportunities. Carlos also is working in close relationship with “Mueven y Conmmueven” (formerly IMB Hispanic Mobilization), in missions local and global networking. Carlos has also participated in Zoom conversations with IMB personnel and with Southern States Partnership Missions leaders. Carlos has made IMB missions’ trainings available to churches who have requested assistance.

The Church Planting trip to Belarus in July 2021 was cancelled due to political unrest in the country.

Compassion Ministries

Jeffrey Cook leads efforts to engage Louisiana Baptist churches in Compassion Ministries. Many of our

Louisiana Baptist churches are involved in some kind of Compassion Ministry seeking to: 1) Meet needs, 2) Build Trust, 3) Share the Gospel, and 4) Connect People to the Local Church. Jeff is assisted by a team of Association Compassion Missionaries (ACM) in several statewide associations. These workers are John Anderson, Deanna Corbett, Patrick Magee, and Pam Walker. Each ACM has hosted “Start Something”/ “Church Without Walls” meetings to encourage area pastors and church leaders to start new works of Compassion Ministry.

A new ministry has started in New Orleans that will have state-wide implications. Jacob Crawford is leading a Disciple Making Movement in New Orleans, utilizing Disciples Bible Study Strategies. Jacob is assisting our Louisiana Churches by training church leaders in DBS. Also, a Compassion Ministry Readiness Tool is being developed for online use to prepare churches to start Compassion Ministry.

Women’s Missions and Ministry

COVID cancellations affected fall and spring women’s events in 2020-2021, but they also gave opportunity for other ways of connecting with our audiences. Louisiana Baptist women donated and packed over 900 gift boxes for the incarcerated women. Ministry to Ministers’ Wives partnered through the Louisiana Baptist website with the executive office for a night of encouragement in October. Embrace, the event for all Louisiana Baptist women, was held in March 2021 as a hybrid event. Women gathered in person for a one-day Bible teaching and worship event, while breakout conferences were offered on the Louisiana Baptist website. Four leader training events are scheduled in 2021.

Mission offering giving shows impacts of COVID, the hurricanes in 2020, and the ice storm of 2021. The greatest story, though, is the giving of many faithful churches. Our prayer is to be joined by more mission giving churches in 2021.

Missions Education

Missions Education had a wonderful start to 2021. The first event of 2021 was M-JAM at Tall Timbers. The great part about this exciting mission’s event is that children were able to hear the Gospel message in a fun and exciting way and learn how to share it with their friends. Students were also able to meet a young pediatrician who serves with the IMB in Africa and learn about her ministry there. The 2021 total attendance for M-JAM will be higher than 2019, since we will add our first fall M-JAM at Parkview Baptist in Baton Rouge on October 30.

Our 2021 camp numbers have exceeded our 2019 camp totals! We are hosting two camps this year as opposed to only one camp in 2019. Over 550 people will be in attendance between both camps.

Jess Archer will be conducting several “Women Who Lead” training events around our state.

Men’s Ministry and Disaster Relief

Men’s Ministries experienced a change in leadership in 2021. Dr. Gibbie McMillan retired, and Dr. Stanley Statham was hired to lead our efforts in Disaster Relief and Men’s Ministries.

Disaster Relief was able to conduct all five of our in-person training events that were held January-March 2021. The first training in New Orleans followed the strict COVID-19 guidelines for masking and social distancing. We had just over 300 volunteers attend the five training events.

We have made a concerted effort to increase online training options. In part, we desire to engage the

younger generations in Disaster Relief training and believe they will be more likely to take part in the training if online courses are offered. We also want to be better prepared for future pandemics and other possible problems that could force another shutdown. We are currently planning on offering training in-person, online, and a hybrid model.

On May 17, 2021 Lake Charles had about 1,200 homes flooded that initiated a Disaster Relief deployment. We had about seven state conventions deploy DR teams to assist us with mud-out efforts. Again, COVID did not keep volunteers from responding to the needs of those impacted by the flood.

Volunteers also returned to the Bahamas for the rebuild at St. Matthews Baptist Church. They were required to have COVID tests before leaving the states and before returning. We hope to be able to send more groups in the near future to assist with the rebuild.

Mission Builders

Mission Builders strategist, Mike Shumock has worked with seven churches and one mission as well as putting on a roof for one church damaged from Hurricane Delta. He also consulted with and helped ten other churches and projects securing labor, materials, and providing information about construction needs.

PASTORAL LEADERSHIP TEAM

Ray Swift, Director

The Pastoral Leadership Team is available to serve churches of all sizes across Louisiana. Assistance includes training and working with pastor search committees, resumé services, leadership development, church administration, and prayer resources. We believe every church, of every size, in every area, is necessary and valuable in maximizing Gospel impact, and we are committed to assisting you towards that end.

Shepherd's Rest: From time to time, pastors need to step away to reflect and be refreshed. Your Cooperative Program gifts provide the opportunity for a four-week sabbatical for the pastor at no cost to the church. For details visit louisianabaptists.org/shepherdsrest.

Resume Services: Launched in March 2021, GoServeLA.org allows churches to post open ministry positions. Pastors and ministers seeking opportunities to serve can also confidentially post their resumes on the site. As of this writing, over 100 positions have been posted by churches.

Transitional Interim/Supply: Transitions can be tough, but they don't have to be tumultuous. Trained pastors are available to assist churches during the transitional period between pastors. Pastor Search Committees can also be prepared and equipped for their assignment. If a need arises for pulpit supply while the pastor is out, Louisiana Baptists staff are available to assist as schedules permit.

Granberry Counseling: Counseling is part of ministry. But there are times when the counselor (pastor) needs some Godly counsel for themselves or their families. Granberry has twelve (12) counseling centers across the state with licensed and trained counselors. Whether the need is for an individual, couples or families, a Godly, confidential listening ear is available. And, thanks to your participation in the Cooperative Program, there is no cost for pastors and ministers. Log on to granberrycounseling.org to set an appointment.

Singing Ministers & Singing Women: These volunteers gather each August to prepare for concerts in local churches, detention centers, youth intervention programs, and prisons. As they share their talents, they also share their faith. For more information visit LouisianaBaptists.org/pastors.

Baptist Message.....391,300

The *Baptist Message* is the news journal of the Louisiana Baptist Convention with an average distribution of 45,000 (approximately 30,000 subscriptions). Its support is derived from subscriptions by churches and individuals, the Cooperative Program, and advertising.

Louisiana Baptist Children’s Home392,188

The Children’s Home exists to provide a program of Christian childcare. The goal is to equip each child with the life skills needed to make his/her contribution to society as an effective Christian citizen. LBCH receives support from gifts and grants, revenues from assets, designations from churches and church groups, the children’s home offering each spring, and the Cooperative Program.

Louisiana Baptist Foundation207,988

The Foundation is responsible for receiving, managing, and administering funds and properties on behalf of the Convention and its causes. It receives support from investments and the Cooperative Program.

Louisiana College.....2,628,056

Louisiana College, the only institution of higher education operated by Louisiana Baptists, engages in a program of providing instruction for candidates seeking undergraduate and graduate degrees. It receives support from the Cooperative Program, student fees, auxiliary enterprises, gifts and grants, dividends and interest, and special funding campaigns.

Convention Operating and State Mission Services7,530,762

This allocation provides resources for state missions and ministries as well as Convention operations. The Mission Services funding supports all of the Louisiana Baptists ministry teams that serve Louisiana Baptist churches. Missions and ministries include, but are not limited to, special projects, Baptist Collegiate Ministries, accounting, stewardship and Cooperative Program promotion resources, Sunday School/Discipleship, age-graded ministries, Disaster Relief ministries, Tall Timbers Conference Center, church administration, church planting, evangelism equipping, women’s missions and ministries, media outreach, and Convention operations.

LOUISIANA BAPTIST MESSAGE

Will Hall, Editor

As you might guess, since Hurricane Ida, the *Baptist Message* has been busy providing news about the catastrophic devastation, but, more importantly, we have been reporting about the incredible response by Louisiana Baptists and the 31 state Baptist conventions around the country who have partnered with us in the massive recovery operations.

Our website and print editions have carried extensive coverage in photos and articles about Louisiana Baptists as well as the other Baptist disaster relief teams. Moreover, we have been intentional in pushing these resources out to the respective state papers of the 31 partnering state conventions – to help them show their constituents how partnering in the Gospel with Louisiana Baptists has made a difference, and to inform them about the great needs that still exist.

In that regard, the *Baptist Message* again partnered with the Association of State Baptist Papers to bring in a team to help us produce these customized stories for each of the 31 state conventions who came to our state.

Other noteworthy news:

- The new publishing schedule – we trimmed our print editions from 24 to 14 per year – we transitioned to in 2021 has been smoothly implemented. We have become more mindful about the time-sensitive nature of some events to make sure we give enough advance notice in print to our readers so that they can plan to participate. Likewise, we are learning how to better integrate our coverage of events in our online reporting. We are using the print edition to cover more enduring news, and our website for breaking news and information.
- We are working with our web developers to assess the utility of offering a phone / online only edition to subscribers as an option for receiving our news reports, feature articles and information updates:
 - those who have a print subscription also will have free access to the online content that originates in our newsroom;
 - those who purchase a web subscription would have online access, only; and
 - anyone without any paid subscription would have to pay a per article fee or simply subscribe.

We foresee a fee structure of \$1 per article, or, \$5 per year for digital access only, or, \$14 per year to receive all access (digital PLUS a monthly print edition mailed to your home – and a bonus edition in each of January and October).

Until we complete the web architecture, the online paywall will remain off and the content will be accessible to anyone.

- In that regard, we are working to develop an RSS feed that would allow churches to post our headlines on their websites to add a dynamic component to their online content – and we already have a prototype. Members would simply visit their church website and click on the *Baptist Message* headlines to access our content. Again, individuals who have a paid subscription (print and online) will be able to view all the content that is accessible through the RSS feed.

In addition to the structural changes that we are working on, we have moved forward in developing a new feature for the web and print editions. The *Baptist Message* has obtained a repository of more than 6,000 Christian cartoon panels and already we have added this new content to the website. Now, we are looking at regularly using these in our print editions, possibly within a redesigned special features page for young readers and adults alike.

Moving forward, we remain committed to being the voice of Louisiana Baptists, sharing the news of our individual and combined efforts to spread the Gospel in our state and to the world. We also pledge to stay focused on keeping you informed and equipped to fully participate in the Louisiana Baptist community and in the cooperative missions and ministries we participate in with our fellow Baptists around the country to reach our nation and the world.

Finally, and most importantly, the *Baptist Message* will continue to work to be a worthy partner in the Gospel with you.

LOUISIANA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME AND FAMILY MINISTRIES

Dr. Perry Hancock, President & CEO

In its 121st year of ministry Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries continued its mission of providing love, care, and hope in Christ for children and families in need. The Children's Home provided a positive Christian witness through its residential child and family care programs, foster care and adoption ministries, Granberry Counseling Centers, Christian Women's Job Corps, Compassion for Kids, and Orphans Embrace.

The Children's Home provided ministry services for over 3,200 children, families, and individuals. Through its on-campus and off-campus residential programs, 113 children and 42 homeless mothers were served. An additional 195 families received placement referral services.

The Granberry Counseling Centers staff provided professional Christian counseling for 907 individuals during the year. Through its Minister Care program, a partnership with the Pastoral Leadership division of LBC, Granberry provided counseling for 36 Louisiana Baptist minister families.

Christian Women's Job Corp provided educational and job skills training for 25 women and support services for 137 women. The ministry maintained its adult education certification with the state of Louisiana as an official HiSet training and testing site. Through its partnership with Women's Missionary Union and its World Crafts ministry, CWJC students served as artisans, producing over 200 Christian products.

Through a growing community care ministry, Compassion for Kids, the Children's Home served over 2,000 economically challenged children and family members in northeast Louisiana. Compassion for Kids provides life essentials and the message of Christ, meeting both physical and spiritual needs. Projects are conducted in partnership with local LBC churches and ministries.

The Children's Home also shared God's love in word and deed through its international orphan care ministry, Orphans Embrace. Twenty-six children were served through Louisiana Reach Haiti at its Children's Village in Croix-des-Bouquets.

On campus, construction of the new recreation center was completed. The facility includes a gymnasium and a pool. Construction began on a third family care cottage. The building provides housing for four families who are served through the HomePlace ministry. The renovation of Hope Cottage was also completed. The facility provides housing for terminated LBC minister families and furloughing missionaries.

Louisiana churches once again provided support for the Children's Home through the Annual Children's Home Sunday Offering. Churches also continued to support children and families at the Home through the Fall Food Roundup which provides all the non-perishable foods needed for the entire year. In the summer, churches from across Louisiana donated their VBS offerings to support the children. Many churches provided additional assistance in various ways throughout the year and God used LBC Cooperative Program giving to share His love with those in need.

As a result of the support from our churches and the witness provided by the various ministries of the Home, many children and others experienced the joy of salvation in Christ. Thank you, Louisiana Baptists, for meeting needs and changing lives in Jesus' name through your Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries.

We ended 2020 with over \$187 million in assets under management that represents funds owned by Louisiana Baptist churches and other ministries as well as gifts perpetually managed for Kingdom-impact. Every dollar generated on these funds represents another dollar to advance the Kingdom by spreading the Gospel.

In 2020, the Foundation adopted the LBF Vision200™ that will help provide the strategy of the Foundation for the next 20 years as it seeks to partner in ministry with churches and other ministries. We are driven to advance the Kingdom...one dollar at a time, one ministry at a time, one life at a time. The overall vision of this plan is to specifically advance the Kingdom through the Foundation's ministry by \$200 million over the next twenty years or less. Specifically, the Foundation will benefit the Kingdom through (1) facilitating planned gifts (example: non-cash gifts, estate gifts, charitable gift annuities, endowments, donor-advised funds and other special gifts beyond cash), and (2) serving churches and other ministries with funds management as well as other services to enhance their impact.

To accomplish the goal of \$200 million over the next 20 years or less, the Foundation has four overall objectives:

(1) Planned Giving: The following are provided for a comprehensive planned giving emphasis:

- A. Providing educational content to churches such as the Louisiana Legacy publication to provide to members practical ways they can benefit their church beyond cash,
- B. Speaking in churches and other ministry organizations to educate constituents on being good stewards related to their estates,
- C. Having robust planned giving website content,
- D. Sending periodic communications to constituents,
- E. Providing confidential one-on-one meetings with prospective donors on benefiting the Kingdom,
- F. Having the infrastructure in place to facilitate the logistics of special gifts, and
- G. Providing an opportunity for every Louisiana Baptist to obtain a free basic Will document when at least tithing her/his estate to a church and/or other ministry.

(2) Church/Ministry Services: Based upon a recent survey among Louisiana Baptist pastors, additional services are being added over time that focuses on church financial/management services. These additional services are part of the Foundation's additional overall emphasis, ChurchBiz Central™. The Foundation plans to launch the following additional services in 2021: church loans, payroll services, and capital/stewardship campaigns.

(3) Comprehensive Marketing Plan: The Foundation's comprehensive market plan initiative uses multiple communication channels that focus on the Foundation's services to help advance the Kingdom. The initiative also will further build its exposure across various social media platforms.

(4) Operations: The Foundation will continue to have a well-skilled and well-experienced staff that seeks to provide churches and ministries with top-tier service to help those organizations further enhance their impact on the Kingdom.

LOUISIANA CHRISTIAN UNIVERSITY

Dr. Rick Brewer, President

Louisiana College is a Christ-centered community committed to Academic Excellence where students are equipped for lives of Learning, Leading, and Serving. That mission proved to be both more challenging and rewarding during this past year.

This was definitely a year like no other, and in many ways not one anyone wishes to repeat. The continuing health safety issues from a pandemic with added shutdowns from Hurricanes Laura and Delta, and major interruption of services with an unusual ice storm, added much stress to operations at LC and also to many of our students whose lives were disrupted.

The resilience of our student body, the relevant ways our faculty and staff reached out to students during the time of quarantine, and the reaction of our alumni—stepping up more than ever knowing the financial consequences of this worldwide pandemic.

For all of this and so much more, we give God all the glory!

Faith Integration

This year's fall semester kicked off with Curtis "CZ" Zackery as keynote for "The Awakening" challenging students with the Truth of the Gospel. He is one of LC students' favorite speakers. The first Christ, Church, Culture Conference of the academic year was held in October on the role of women in the 21st century ministry. Speakers included Victoria Dixon, Jess Archer and Dr. Amanda Walker.

In November, LC held another timely topic in its 5th Annual Values & Ethics Series—the biblical response to racism. Former professional baseball player Chris Singleton, whose mother was murdered in the Charleston, South Carolina mass shooting at the Mother Emanuel AME Church, spoke on the message of love and forgiveness. He was joined by Louisiana Sen. Katrina Jackson and Alexandria physician Dr. Greg Bevels.

In the spring, LC held two more C3 events. Dana Harris, the regional director for the Alliance Defending Freedom spoke in March on "Religious Rights and COVID-19." And in April, Prof. R. Keith Lofton from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, spoke on "Calling and Career."

Our 5th Annual God in the Workplace Lecture Series was held in March. Keynote speaker was Dr. Jay W. Richards, professor at The Catholic University of America, who spoke on "Money, Greed and God: The Christian Case for Free Enterprise."

In addition, LC signed articulation agreements with Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary and Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary allowing students to apply college credits to a Master of Divinity degree at seminary.

Grants and Recognition

Louisiana College was recognized by niche.com as the safest college in the state and the second most diverse. We are extremely proud of these recognitions and will continue to take measures to meet those standards. LC was also named a "Top 30 Christian College" by national research group BestValueSchools.org. This organization recognized schools that meet educational needs and maximize the student experience in the most affordable ways.

LC was recognized with several grant awards for bettering classrooms, living spaces, academic departments, and athletic areas. In addition, The CENLA Chamber of Commerce named the College's website the No. 1 Business Website in Central Louisiana.

The College was awarded two Board of Regents grants for theatre and business. The department enhancement grants total more than \$135,000 and provided for a business analytics classroom and a new stage for the theatre program.

Enrollment and Retention

Many of the recruiting events we typically hold every year were cancelled due to COVID. The state also cancelled the High School Literary Rally in 2021 as we practiced social distancing.

We continue to grow our numbers of dual enrollment students with home schoolers, Pineville High School, and nearly 50 from Menard High School. LC Admissions team also held mini-college fairs at churches across the state.

At the time of the completion of this report, the College was expecting 350 freshmen, which would be the largest class in the institution's history.

Academics and Athletics

In March, LC had its SACSCOC On-site Reaffirmation Committee visit for our 10-year accreditation review. The committee informed the LC Leadership Team of no finding of non-compliance. Their report will be sent to the Board of SACSCOC for a final decision during the December 2021 annual meeting. The last time SACSCOC had no recommendations for LC was 1991.

LC and CHRISTUS St. Frances Cabrini partnered to establish the Cabrini Scholars program to provide unique economic support for nursing students. The program provides grant money to eligible students enrolled in the college's Accelerated Bachelor of Science in Nursing (ABSN) in exchange for a commitment of a commitment of employment as a registered nurse.

The Master of Social Work program, which began in January 2018, received its accreditation this summer from the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE). The accreditation of this program, which since its inception has been to apply the Heart of Christ to the Hurt of Humanity, strengthens our goal to ensure our graduates are prepared to make a positive difference in the lives of the people and communities they will serve.

We officially moved from NCAA Division III to NAIA in July 2021. Membership in the NAIA provides opportunities for competing regularly in key recruiting areas of Louisiana while offering possibilities for competing for conference, regional, and national championships annually. All sports join the Red River Athletic Conference except football. Football will be a member of the Sooner Athletic Conference. This offers LC the opportunity to gain traction in some athletic areas we hadn't had previously and compete for some championship titles.

Advancement and Alumni Affairs

Your financial gifts to Louisiana College provide scholarships to phenomenal students, support the work of gift faculty, invest in innovative programs, and continue the LC tradition of academic excellence and a Christian commitment.

In the Office of Advancement, we received approximately \$5 million in unrestricted and restricted gifts to the College.

With more than 15,000 alumni worldwide, the Louisiana College Alumni Association was established in 1958 to connect alumni to each other, faculty, staff, and current students. In every way, LC Alumni are an extension of the mission of the college.

Alumni Affairs is doing spotlights on alumni in monthly e-blasts, and this has been added to the alumni page on the LC website.

We have migrated from a list of 68,000 names to about 20,000 with updated correct information in one location, and Alumni Affairs has increased our alumni committee numbers and participants thereby increasing alumni engagement.

Wildcat Club has been reinvigorated with new membership categories to better represent members' specific areas of interest.

Refurbishment and Resource Development

Major renovations were completed this year in Cottingham women's residence hall, and Tudor Hall and English Village, men's residence halls, thanks to generous donor funds. English Village had a complete makeover with new siding on the exterior, and renovations of the interior including new furniture and wall hangings, and new tables and chairs in the Commons Area where students can charge phones and computers, as well as fellowship with students, play games and attend events held in this space.

LC became the first institution in Central Louisiana to partner with Ardeo Education Solutions to offer a loan repayment assistance program that will allow all incoming freshmen beginning this fall to get help repaying student loans.

In resource development, 80% of our existing Wi-Fi network was upgraded and additional expansions to the network produced coverage in all campus buildings. Sixteen classrooms and labs were upgraded with new computers, and 55 laptops were purchased for faculty—most of whom had never had one before.

Canvas was officially launched as the new LMS (learning management system) for LC Fall 2020. With the challenges of COVID and other natural disasters, online education and new hybrid online learning tools were more needed than ever before. The Center for Online Innovation and Development (COID) launched and trained faculty and staff on best practices for tools such as VoiceThread and Teams, which allowed for the use of document cameras (Hover Cam8) and video systems (Vaddio) that were installed in larger classrooms. Students were then able to attend class virtually (synchronously and asynchronously). This move to offering more modality options for students to attend classes required much more work from the magnificent LC faculty, but allowed for better retention and support for students in crisis/need.

In addition to launching Canvas, the COID has developed training and new benchmarks for the creation of online classes that meet Quality Matters standards. According to their website, Quality Matters "course review results in better course design, which makes navigation easier for students, reduces barriers to student achievement, and results in better outcomes." LC has focused on developing new general education courses and business major courses with an emphasis in project management. Students were able to attend classes with more flexibility during the uncertainty of 2020.

Online connectivity was also significantly improved across campus. Access Points (AP) were added across campus to ensure access to the internet. New switches were purchased and installed as well as many other technology upgrades to classrooms, dorms, and study areas. The library also added secure testing sites for online proctored exams.

This report captures the strategic planning and resolve of the last 12 months to rise to the challenges that came before us and the blessings that God has bestowed on Louisiana College.

I am grateful for all of the churches of the LBC for your continued support through the Cooperative Program. As the need for Christian higher education continues to grow, your support allows LC to continue offering an affordable and accessible education. It truly would not be possible without you.

Thank you all for your continued prayers and support for this worthy, Christ-centered institution.

We will continue to follow His call.

COMMITTEE ON MORAL AND SOCIAL CONCERNS

Brian Gunter

The Committee on Moral and Social Concerns has been actively engaged in critical issues that we know are important to Louisiana Baptists.

SPRING MEETING WITH STATE, NATIONAL LAWMAKERS

In the spring we met in the Pentagon Barracks offices of Lieutenant Governor Billy Nungesser and met with key state legislators regarding bills that related to the values of Louisiana Baptists and even had the opportunity to meet with Congressman Steve Scalise, the minority whip in the U.S. House and the number two ranking conservative in that chamber. He shared about his intentions at the national level to push through the Born Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act, which would require health care providers to medically care for a child who survives an abortion or attempted abortion.

TWO LEGISLATIVE TASK FORCES

Dr. Hall has given an update on various legislative actions, and a primary effort of the Office of Public Policy, on behalf of the Committee on Moral and Social Concerns, was to work with key legislators to re-establish the task force on marriage (which seeks to incentivize couples to participate in premarital counseling and parents in distressed relationships to undergo marriage counseling) as well as the task force on protecting children from intentional or accidental exposure to online pornography. The work of both task forces was suspended during the pandemic, and now each is set to continue until the important work by each is done.

Both statewide task forces were formed in large part because of resolutions offered by the Committee on Moral and Social Concerns that were adopted by messengers to the LBC annual Meeting.

FOSTER CARE COMMISSION

A new initiative we have undertaken is to establish a Foster Care Commission to work with Louisiana Baptists to increase participation in foster parenting. In Louisiana, there are approximately 3,600 children needing temporary homes to ensure their safety and growth while their permanent families are getting healthy. This is a tremendous ministry opportunity, a chance to provide essential stability during critical developmental years while also having the opportunity to share the Hope of Jesus to young ones.

Importantly, the commission also will work with lawmakers to establish a Foster Care Task Force under the aegis of the Louisiana legislature with the intent of crafting bills to enact needed reforms to the state foster care system.

ROSE LONG FOUNDATION

In 2020, we had to suspend the operations of the Rose Long Foundation because the state “remain-in-place” orders prevented our personnel from making necessary in-person visits to engage church members in the care of children who had been rescued from sexual trafficking. With the fading of COVID-19 cases, the Foundation is ready to resume its mission, and will be looking to expand its board of trustees to engage Louisiana Baptists more broadly in this critical ministry. RESOLUTIONS

The CMSC submitted two resolutions that were adopted by the Resolutions Committee and presented to you this year.

The first was authored by Dr. David Cranford, LBC president and pastor of First Baptist Church, Ponchatoula, “RESOLUTION: ON THE SUFFICIENCY OF SCRIPTURE FOR RACE AND RACIAL RECONCILIATION.” It is an edited version of 2021 Resolution #2 adopted by messengers to the Southern Baptist Convention. The SBC original was changed to specifically name Critical Race Theory and Intersectionality as incompatible with Scripture, in fulfillment of Dr. Cranford’s promise during the 2020 LBC Annual Meeting to address the matter if it was not sufficiently done so by messengers at the 2021 SBC Annual Meeting.

The other was crafted by Dr. Will Hall, executive editor of the *Baptist Message* and director of the Office of Public Policy for Louisiana Baptists. The “RESOLUTION: ON SUPPORT FOR *FAIRNESS IN WOMEN’S SPORTS ACT*” commends Sen. Beth Mizell, Senate president pro tempore and a member of First Baptist Church, Franklinton, for her courageous stand to submit legislation which bucked the national trend and banned biological males from competing on female-specific sports teams. The bill passed overwhelmingly during the 2021 Regular Session of the state legislature but was vetoed by the governor. It was the key reason that an override session was called by state legislators. It passed the Senate with the needed supermajority, 26-12-1, but fell two votes short of the two-thirds majority in the House, 68-30-6, after 10 legislators failed to vote for the bill, despite having supported it during the regular session.

FOSTER CARE

State Representative Mike Johnson, a member of First Baptist Church, Pineville, championed several key bills that represented the beliefs and values of Louisiana Baptists. But he also worked behind the scenes on an essential initiative that we shared with him about increasing support for foster families, and he led the successful effort to secure a \$12 million increase for foster care board rates, adoption subsidies, and guardianship subsidies, the first such increases in 15 years. This rate change brings the state much closer to the southern average for foster care and adoption support.

SPECIAL RECOGNITION

Finally, the Committee on Moral and Social Concerns wants to honor State Representative Alan Seabaugh, a member of Broadmoor Baptist Church, Shreveport, who suffered threats of gun violence and was physically attacked because of his efforts to secure precise language in a domestic violence bill. His stance offered protection to women and children but did not criminalize non-violent behaviors -- in an effort to protect pastors’ efforts at reconciliation in family situations that could be restored without placing women or children in harm’s way or in unhealthy conditions. The legislation subsequently was withdrawn by his attacker.

COMMITTEE ON CONVENTION ORDER OF BUSINESS

The Committee on Convention Order of Business met on April 29, 2021 at the LBC Baptist Building in Alexandria. This committee makes the following recommendations:

1. That the 2022 sermon be preached by Reggie Bridges, pastor, Temple Baptist Church, Ruston.
2. That Chad Gilbert, pastor, First Baptist Church, New Orleans, serve as the Alternate Preacher for the 2022 Convention.
3. That Jeremy Christ, Minister of Worship and Music, Calvary, Alexandria, serve as Worship Leader for the 2022 Convention.
4. That the venue for the 2022 Convention be Calvary Baptist Church, Alexandria, Louisiana.
5. That the venue for the 2023 Convention be Franklin Avenue Baptist Church, New Orleans, Louisiana.

That the agenda for this 174th annual meeting of Louisiana Baptist Convention be adopted as printed in the program and that the following proposed Convention Standing Rules be adopted:

Convention Standing Rules

1. The President shall be allowed to make minor changes in the agenda as may be necessary.
2. Nominating speeches for officers shall be limited to three (3) minutes each.
3. Debate on matters coming before the convention shall be limited to two speakers **for** and two speakers **against** for a period of up to three minutes each.
4. Persons addressing the Convention shall state their name and church.
5. No person addressing the Convention may speak more than twice on the same subject without unanimous consent.
6. The reports of the Committee on Nominations and the Committee on Committees be presented, followed by nominations from the floor, if any. Then the Committee nominees shall be voted on for election by the Convention. If the Committee nominees are not elected, then the vote on persons nominated from the floor shall follow immediately.
7. That a time for questions be provided following the reports of convention entities and the Executive Board.

RESOLVED, that we, the messengers to the 174th Session of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, meeting in Monroe, Louisiana, November 16, 2021, express to each of the above, and to all who contributed, our deepest heartfelt gratitude.

RESOLUTION 2: ON GRATITUDE FOR DISASTER RELIEF 'PARTNERS IN THE GOSPEL'

WHEREAS, The Bible declares the church as Christ's instrument to effect His will on earth (Ephesians 3:10) and that we are created for good works (Ephesians 2:10); and

WHEREAS, In the New Testament, one of the ministries of the Church was to bring relief to those experiencing calamity (Acts 11:27-30); and

WHEREAS, Disaster Relief is one of the most established and highly visible cooperative ministries among the state conventions of Baptists across the nation, providing emergency aid to churches, pastors and communities without strings attached or government assistance; and

WHEREAS, Louisiana has experienced multiple disasters in 2020-2021 (four hurricanes, two named storms, and an ice storm), each with devastating impacts that created long-term recovery needs; and

WHEREAS, Despite these enormous natural disasters, each a federally declared emergency taking place during an extended and surging coronavirus pandemic, Baptist state convention partners from around the nation responded generously with financial resources and donations of goods, as well as thousands of compassionate volunteers to assist Louisiana Baptist Disaster Relief efforts; and

WHEREAS, In 2020, this "partnership in the Gospel" (Philippians 1:5) – for recovery efforts related to Hurricanes Laura and Delta alone -- resulted in: Gospel presentations to 1,911 people, with 456 professing Christ; distribution of 2,860 Bibles; preparation of 430,669 meals; provision of 12,073 showers; and completion of 2,390 chainsaw assignments, 259 temporary roofing projects as well as debris removal from 202 sites; and

WHEREAS, In 2021, from August 29 through September 20, in response to the devastation wreaked

by Hurricane Ida, 29 state conventions have deployed Disaster Relief teams to 25 ministry sites around southeast Louisiana, and already have: presented the Gospel to 513 people, with 87 declaring “Jesus is Lord”; distributed 715 Bibles; prepared 638,660 meals; assessed 3,163 damaged properties; completed 494 chainsaw jobs; provided 7,558 showers; and finished 5,243 loads of laundry; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the messengers to the 174th session of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, meeting in Monroe, Louisiana, November 16, 2021, express our heartfelt gratitude to the thousands of Baptist volunteers in our state convention and from the state conventions of our Baptist partners who are helping Louisianans to recover from the havoc wrought by Hurricane Ida and who aided us after the devastating natural disasters in 2020; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we commit ourselves to pray diligently for the safety and well-being of our brothers and sisters who are volunteers in the massive recovery efforts that are underway, as well as for the churches, pastors and other fellow Louisianans who are seeking to rebuild their lives and livelihoods in the midst of difficult circumstances; and be it finally

RESOLVED, That we pray for God to continue to use this vital ministry to bring physical and emotional comfort to the hurting during desperate times of need, and, especially, to use Disaster Relief ministry as a means to bring the message of “hope in Christ” to those who are living in spiritual darkness and in need of salvation.

RESOLUTION 3: ON THE IMPORTANCE OF THE ANNUAL CHURCH PROFILE

WHEREAS, The example of Paul and Barnabas in bringing a report to the church in Antioch (Acts 14:26-27) established a precedent for the value of giving testimony to the work of God through our efforts; and

WHEREAS, Our present work of teaching the Gospel and creating disciples through the church is equally important to the health and growth of the Kingdom and should be evaluated regularly by the local church and pastor, as well as by leaders in the local association, state convention and the Southern Baptist Convention; and

WHEREAS, The Annual Church Profile system is an essential tool for gathering information to identify some of the visible results of the work of our churches, thereby helping us see trends and better understand the effectiveness of our methods and strategies; and

WHEREAS, Completing and submitting the ACP annual survey reflects support for the cooperative effort and contributes to the cooperative spirit that characterize our Great Commission fellowship; and

WHEREAS, This yearly administrative exercise offers a beneficial opportunity for self-evaluation to churches and pastors; and

WHEREAS, The ACP survey data is used to determine the representation of Louisiana Baptists on the SBC Executive Committee, the LBC Executive Committee, the trustee boards for NAMB, and the IMB, as well as to set the number of messengers each church qualifies to send to the state and national conventions; and

WHEREAS, Approximately 15 percent of Louisiana Baptist Churches do not return a completed ACP survey form; and

WHEREAS, Users and administrators across the denomination have collaborated to simplify the ACP survey, reducing the number of questions, and making it easier to understand; and

WHEREAS, The ACP survey can be completed online as well as in paper form; and

WHEREAS, Associational and state leaders offer help with completing the ACP survey; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the messengers to the 174th session of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, meeting in Monroe, Louisiana, November 16, 2021, call on all pastors and churches to complete and submit the ACP survey each year; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we affirm the value of an accurate, yearly testimony to the work of Christ in

Louisiana through local Baptist churches; and be it finally

RESOLVED, That we urge associational and state convention leaders to actively promote participation in the ACP process, by highlighting its importance at annual meetings and also using other forums and means to encourage pastors and churches to take part.

RESOLUTION 4: ON THE SUFFICIENCY OF SCRIPTURE FOR RACE AND RACIAL RECONCILIATION

WHEREAS, “All Scripture is inspired by God and is profitable for teaching, for rebuking, for correcting, for training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work” (2 Timothy 3:16-17); and

WHEREAS, The Baptist Faith and Message 2000 states, “all Scripture is totally true and trustworthy” (Article I); and

WHEREAS, “God created man in his own image” (Genesis 1:27); and

WHEREAS, “From one man [God] has made every nationality to live over the whole earth” (Acts 17:26); and

WHEREAS, In his prophetic vision John saw “a vast multitude from every nation, tribe, people, and language, which no one could number, standing before the throne and before the Lamb” (Revelation 7:9-10); and

WHEREAS, “Sin entered the world through one man, and death through sin, in this way death spread to all people, because all sinned” (Romans 5:12); and

WHEREAS, “Through faith [we] are all sons of God in Christ Jesus . . . There is no Jew or Greek, slave or free, male and female; since you are all one in Christ Jesus” (Galatians 3:26-28); and

WHEREAS, “God . . . has reconciled us to himself through Christ and has given us the ministry of reconciliation” (2 Corinthians 5:18); and **WHEREAS**, The Baptist Faith and Message 2000 states, “Christians should oppose racism” (Article XV); now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the messengers to the 174th session of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, meeting in Monroe, Louisiana, November 16, 2021, affirm the sufficiency of Scripture on race and racial reconciliation; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we reaffirm our agreement with historic, biblically-faithful Southern Baptist and Louisiana Baptist condemnations of racism in all forms; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we reject any theory or worldview, specifically Critical Race Theory and Intersectionality, that finds the ultimate identity of human beings in ethnicity or in any other group dynamic; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we reject any theory or worldview, specifically Critical Race Theory and Intersectionality, that sees the primary problem of humanity as anything other than sin against God and the ultimate solution as anything other than redemption found only in Christ; and be it further

RESOLVED, We, therefore, reject any theory or worldview, specifically Critical Race Theory and Intersectionality, that denies that racism, oppression, or discrimination is rooted, ultimately, in anything other than sin; and be it further

RESOLVED, That, understanding we live in a fallen world, we reaffirm the 1995 Resolution On Racial Reconciliation On The 150th Anniversary Of The Southern Baptist Convention, which includes, “That we apologize to all African-Americans for condoning and/or perpetuating individual and systemic racism in our lifetime; and we genuinely repent of racism of which we have been guilty, whether consciously (Psalm 19:13) or unconsciously (Leviticus 4:27),” applying this disposition to every instance of racism; and be it finally

RESOLVED, We affirm that our reconciliation in Christ gives us the opportunity and responsibility to pursue reconciliation with others so that we can display and share the hope of the Gospel with the world.

RESOLUTION 5: ON SUPPORT OF FAIRNESS IN WOMEN’S SPORTS ACT

WHEREAS, The Bible teaches that man and woman shared in the dignity of creation, both being made “in the image of God,” yet each being distinct and complementary of the other (Gen. 1:26-27); and

WHEREAS, Radical activism across the country is attempting to redefine human sexual identity in casual and fluid terms dependent only on the subjective self-sense of an individual’s mind and not on the biology that has always defined it; and

WHEREAS, Transgender politics now have invaded sports, allowing biological males to compete on teams designated for biological females despite the science which documents biological male advantages even with cross-sex hormone treatments (denser and stronger bones, tendons, and ligaments; larger hearts, greater lung volume per body mass, higher red blood cell counts, higher hemoglobin, as well as higher natural levels of testosterone -- all of which result, in general, in greater degrees of strength, speed, and endurance); and

WHEREAS, Already, biological females have been displaced by biological males in competitions on multiple levels from high school to the Olympic Games; and

WHEREAS, Ultimately, such policy changes deny biological girls and women opportunities to simply enjoy competition and receive recognition, but also to earn scholarships as well as to experience personal growth and leadership development (which are critical advantages when competing for positions of responsibility in business, government, military, and other career fields); and

WHEREAS, Title IX of the Education Amendments Act of 1972 was enacted specifically to provide girls and women opportunities in education and activities, including athletics; and

WHEREAS, Since that historic political victory, girls and women have earned hard-fought battles for equal support of female-specific sports teams; and

WHEREAS, During the 2021 Louisiana legislative season, Sen. Beth Mizell, Senate president pro tempore and a member of First Baptist Church, Franklinton, championed S.B. 156, *Fairness in Women’s Sports Act*, to level the playing field for women athletes by barring biological males from competing on teams designated for biological females; and

WHEREAS, S.B. 156 passed overwhelmingly during the regular session (29-6-4 by the Senate; 78-19-8 by the House) but was vetoed by Gov. John Bel Edwards and failed in a special override legislative session requiring a two-thirds vote in both chambers (successful in the Senate, 26-12-1; missed the threshold by two votes in the House, 68-30-6); now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the messengers to the 174th session of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, meeting in Monroe, Louisiana, November 16, 2021, commend Sen. Mizell for her courageous stand to defend the rights of girl and women athletes with legislation to bar biological males from competing against biological females; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge her and the other sponsors of the legislation to present these protections, again, during the 2022 schedule of the state legislature; and be it finally

RESOLVED, That we strongly counsel the governor and all lawmakers to represent the overwhelming will of the people of our state on this matter, which figures to impact this important sphere of life for so many of the daughters and granddaughters of Louisiana.

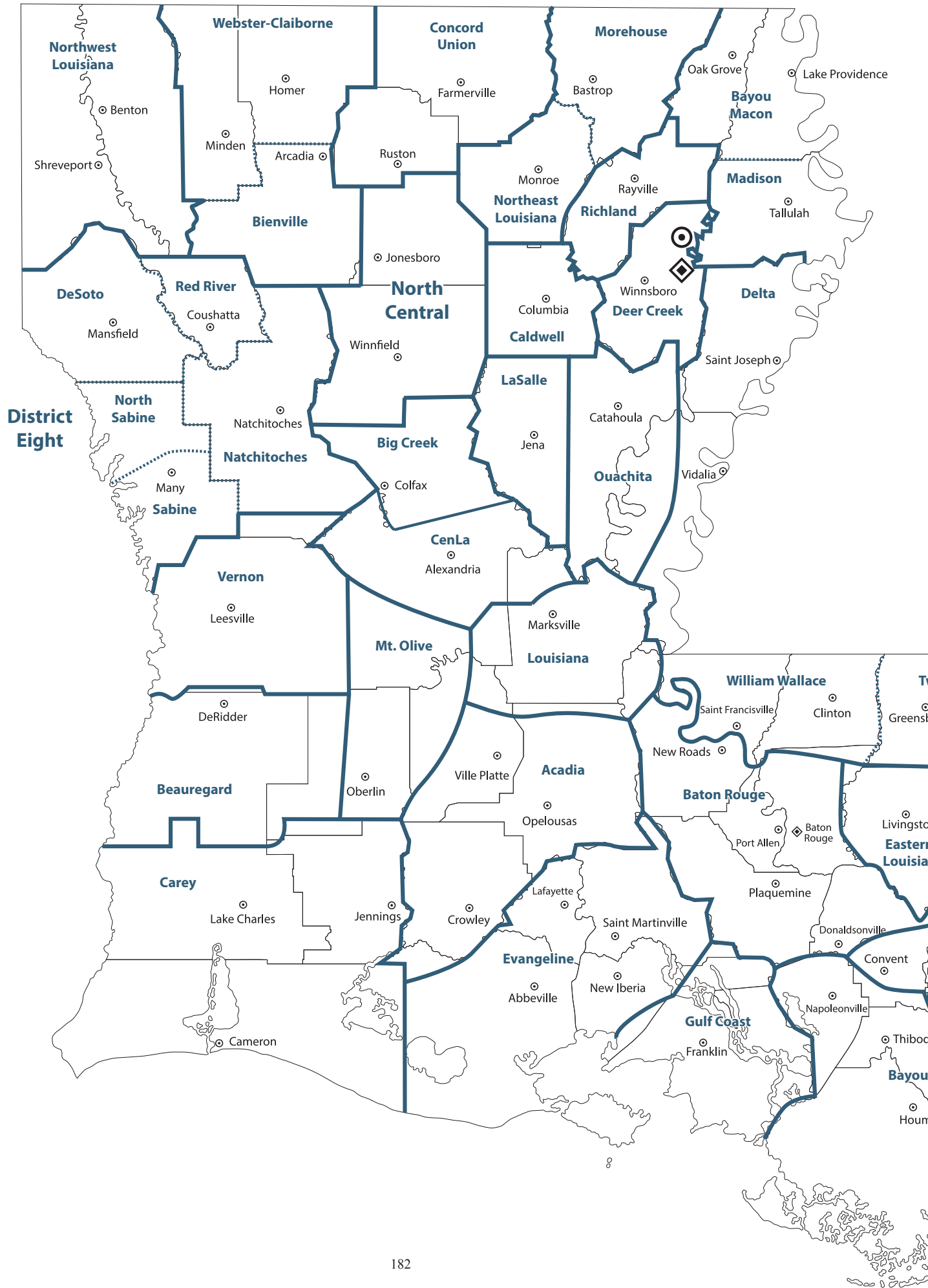

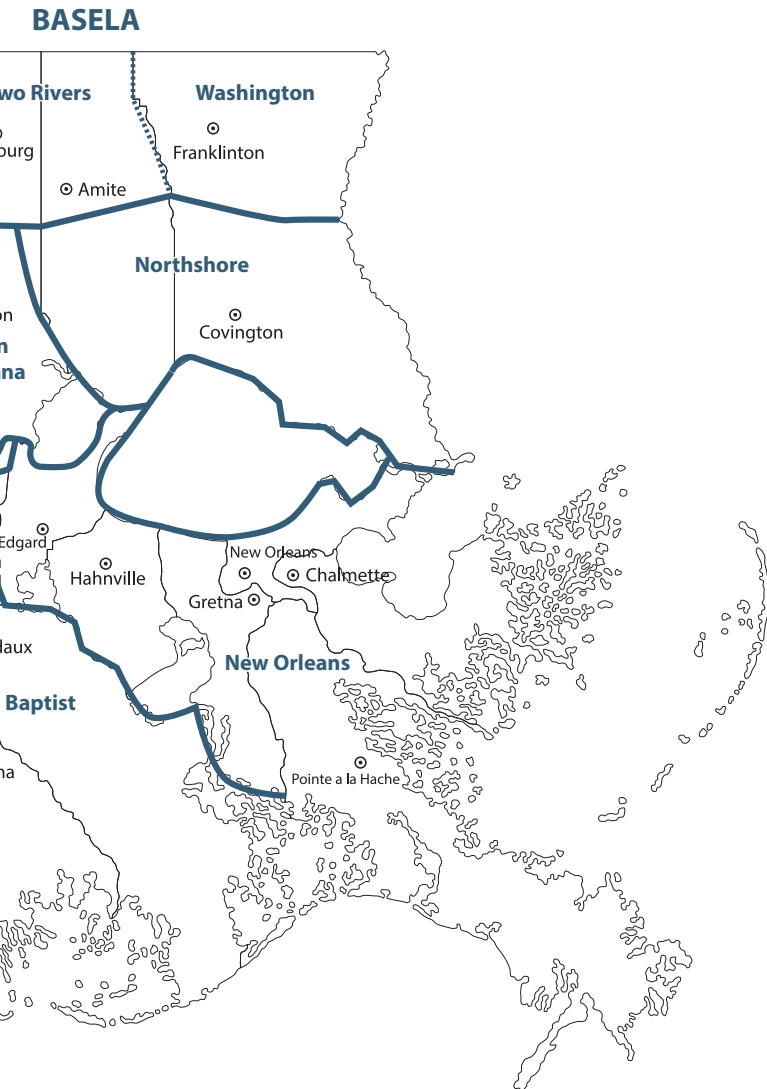
