**ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION
of the
LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION**

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this body is the Louisiana Baptist Convention, hereinafter referred to as "Convention."

ARTICLE II. DURATION

The duration of this Convention shall be in perpetuity.

ARTICLE III. NON-PROFIT CORPORATION

The Convention is a nonprofit corporation organized under the Louisiana Non-Profit Corporation Act, LSA-R.S. 12:201 et seq. and shall have all of the powers, duties, authorizations and responsibilities as provided therein. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Convention shall neither have nor exercise any power, nor engage directly or indirectly in any activity that would invalidate its status as an organization exempt from federal income tax and described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, or the corresponding provision or provisions of any subsequent United States Internal Revenue law or laws.

ARTICLE IV. PURPOSE

Section 1. The purpose of this Convention is to provide means through which Louisiana Baptist churches and members can cooperate in bringing persons to God throughout the world.

Section 2. The Convention will assist churches and associations in the Christ-appointed tasks: to worship God, to proclaim the Gospel, to teach, to nurture Christians, to establish and strengthen churches, and to minister in Christ's name.

Section 3. This Convention desires to carry its programs forward in fraternal concert with other Baptist groups. This Convention will never exercise authority of any type over such groups.

Section 4. This Convention recognizes the Southern Baptist Convention as the primary instrument used by Baptists to further the cause of Christ on a worldwide basis. The Convention pledges its loyalty and support to the purposes served by the Southern Baptist Convention.

Section 5. This Convention will do all its work in accord with the principle that the Bible is the inspired, inerrant, and infallible Word of God, and is sufficient for all faith and practice, and is truth without any mixture of error in every area of which it speaks (Matthew 22:29).

ARTICLE V. REGISTERED OFFICE

The registered office of the Convention shall be located at 1250 MacArthur Drive, Alexandria, Louisiana. The location of the Convention may be changed by an affirmative vote of a two-thirds (2/3) majority of the messengers of the Convention present and voting.

ARTICLE VI. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. This Convention shall be composed of messengers who are members in good standing of Baptist churches cooperating (defined below) with the Convention.

Section 2. This Convention shall be organized on a non-stock basis having messengers as its only members.

Section 3. Each cooperating Baptist church having fifty (50) members, or less, shall be entitled to one (1) messenger; and an additional messenger for each additional fifty (50) members; however, no church shall be entitled to more than fifteen (15) messengers.

Section 4. Messengers shall be certified by their churches to the Convention, but the Convention shall be the final judge of the election and qualifications of its messengers.

Section 5. A cooperating church with the Louisiana Baptist Convention 1) is of like faith and order with Southern Baptists as expressed in the Baptist Faith and Message of the Southern Baptist Convention, 2) is sympathetic to the purposes and work of the Convention, 3) Contributes to the work of Southern Baptists through the Cooperative Program or the work of Louisiana Baptists through contributions to the Louisiana Baptist Convention for its use in state programs and agencies and 4) has applied for membership in the local association and, upon recommendation by the LBC Committee on Credentials, has been approved to send messengers to the Convention.

Section 6. Any church which has taken action affirming, approving or endorsing the practice of homosexuality shall not be considered as cooperating with this Convention. Such actions include but are not limited to the licensure or ordination of homosexuals, marriage or blessing of homosexual relationships, and endorsing homosexuality as an acceptable lifestyle.

ARTICLE VII. TRUSTEES

Section 1. The Convention's management is vested in its Board of Trustees for the execution of legal documents as required by law in effectuation of direction given by and only with the prior approval of the messengers. The Board of Trustees and the Convention shall only act at the direction of and with the prior approval of the messengers. The messengers may delegate authority to officers or committees who shall be accountable to the messengers as provided in the Convention's Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws. The Trustees shall have no authority or powers except those explicitly granted to them by these Articles of Incorporation or in the Convention's Bylaws.

Section 2. The members of the Board of Trustees of the Convention shall be the Convention President, First Vice President, Second Vice President and the Secretary-Treasurer.

ARTICLE VIII. OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Convention shall be a president, a first vice president and a second vice president. The office of secretary-treasurer shall be filled ex officio by the executive director of the Executive Board of the Convention.

Section 2. Officers shall be chosen annually from messengers in attendance at the Convention. Nominations shall be from the floor. Election shall be by ballot except when there is a single nominee for an office. In the latter case the president shall instruct the secretary to cast a unanimous ballot for the nominee.¹

Section 3. Officers shall serve for one (1) year and hold office until their successors are elected and qualified; however, no officers may serve more than two (2) complete successive terms in the same office. Terms of office shall commence at final adjournment of the Convention in session at the time of their election and terminate at final adjournment of the succeeding regular session of the Convention. In case of death, disability of, or other cause making necessary the retirement of the president, the vice presidents shall succeed in order. The Executive Board shall determine when an office is vacant due to the disability of an incumbent.

Section 4. The president shall preside over all deliberations of the Convention and shall perform such other duties as may be customary to the position or as determined in the bylaws or by resolution, and shall, by his election, become an ex officio member of all Convention committees and boards. He shall continue as ex officio member of the Executive Board for one full year immediately following tenure as president of the Convention unless elected to fill a vacancy in the regular membership of the Executive Board.

Section 5. The vice presidents may, in the absence of the president or when requested by the president, preside over the Convention and shall perform such other duties as may be provided in the bylaws or resolutions or as requested by the president.

Section 6. The executive director shall keep accurate and faithful minutes of all sessions of the Convention. He shall cause these to be published in suitable form in the Annual of the Convention together with such other information as the Convention or the Executive Board of the Convention deems necessary and proper.

ARTICLE IX. COMMITTEES AND BOARDS OF THE CONVENTION

Section 1. The plan of organization for standing committees and permanent boards of the Convention shall be as established in the bylaws of the Convention.

Section 2. Special committees shall serve for one (1) year or less as provided in the resolutions creating such committees.

Section 3. The members of all standing committees (except the Committee on Committees) and the permanent boards of the Convention shall be elected by the Convention. New members on all boards and committees who fill vacancies developing after annual Convention and before the

¹ Expectations of Louisiana Baptist Convention Officers

The Louisiana Baptist Convention has been blessed across the decades with men who have provided excellent leadership in their elected roles as convention officers. A number of qualities have characterized these leaders and form an example and a description of the kind of leaders Louisiana Baptists ought to seek in the future, especially for the highest offices.

1. A vital personal relationship with Jesus Christ that includes public and private devotions and holy living.
2. A belief in the authority and inerrancy of the Bible and agreement with the Convention's confession of faith which is the Baptist Faith and Message 2000.
3. A desire to see people come to faith in Christ, and an active participation in personal and congregational evangelism.
4. A commitment to cooperative missions, especially mission endeavors of Louisiana and Southern Baptists as evidenced by strong congregational support of the Cooperative Program.
5. A giftedness and experience in leadership that includes the ability to inspire confidence, build consensus, solve problems, and conduct the work of Louisiana Baptists in an orderly and effective manner.

month of May shall be elected by the Executive Board upon recommendation of the Convention Committee on Nominations or Committee on Committees.

Section 4. The president of the Convention shall appoint the members and the chairman and vice chairman of the Committee on Committees.

Section 5. Boards shall report annually to the Convention in the manner specified by the Executive Board of the Convention unless the Convention itself directs otherwise.

Section 6. Each committee and board of this Convention shall supply the executive director with an official copy of its charter or other legal evidence authorizing its establishment and a copy of its bylaws, as well as copies of the official minutes of their regular and special meetings. The executive director shall maintain these in such fashion that they are readily available to all Louisiana Baptists at the Convention offices of the Executive Board of the Convention.

ARTICLE X. THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE CONVENTION

Section 1. The Executive Board of the Convention shall serve as the Convention ad interim, as the Convention's principle advisory committee on total programs, and as the Convention's operating board for the Convention-sponsored general programs and programs not specifically assigned elsewhere.

Section 2. The Executive Board shall consist of one (1) member from each association having a minimum of seven churches with an aggregate church membership of at least one thousand, plus one (1) additional board member from each association having as many as ten thousand (10,000) church members, and an additional board member for each additional five thousand (5,000) church members of such associations; provided, however, that not more than seven (7) members from any one association shall serve simultaneously as members of the Executive Board.

Section 3. The terms of elected Executive Board members shall run for three (3) years. No member may serve continuously for more than two (2) complete successive terms. No member shall be eligible to serve another term until an interval equal to the number of years served shall have elapsed.

Section 4. The membership of any Executive Board member shall be declared vacant if he ceases to be affiliated with a church that is a member of the association from which he was elected.

Section 5. The Convention shall annually elect members to fill all vacancies on the Executive Board.

Section 6. The elected officers of the Executive Board of the Convention shall consist of a president and a vice president chosen annually by the membership of the Executive Board. They shall have the duties customarily associated with such positions. The board itself shall elect an executive director for an indefinite term. The executive director shall be ex officio member of the board and serve as its secretary.

Section 7. The Executive Board itself shall determine its time of meeting, organization and method of proceeding subject to these articles and the Convention's bylaws.

Section 8. The Executive Board of the Convention shall report annually to the Convention concerning the total Convention program, the operating programs entrusted to the board, and such other matters as the board deems necessary and proper.

Section 9. The Executive Board of the Convention shall recommend annually to the Convention the appropriation or allocation of undesignated financial resources of the Convention.

Section 10. The Executive Board of the Convention shall serve as the general corporate authority of this Convention. No activity supported by and subject to the will of this Convention shall seek incorporated status in Louisiana or elsewhere without the express approval of this Convention or the Executive Board of this Convention.

ARTICLE XI. THE DENOMINATIONAL PAPER

The *Baptist Message* shall be the official paper of this Convention.

ARTICLE XII. MEETINGS

Section 1. The Convention shall meet in regular session in the week following the second

Sunday in November unless unusual circumstances should require a change. In such a case, date, time and place shall be determined by the Executive Board.

Section 2. Only the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention is authorized to call a special meeting of the Convention and only upon giving churches cooperating with the Convention at least thirty (30) days written notice of the date, place and time of said special meeting which meeting can only be held within the state of Louisiana.

ARTICLE XIII. EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

In the event of an emergency declared as provided in this article, the following procedures shall control the operations, finances, officers, meetings, and purposes of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. until such time as the emergency is terminated. When the emergency has been terminated, then in that event, all provisions of the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. which were last in effect prior to the emergency shall again take effect until such time as another emergency may be declared, if any, as provided in this article. These emergency provisions and procedures are as follows:

1. "Emergency" means any occasion or instance for which, in the determination of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. by a majority vote of those present and voting, that the usual and customary conduct of business by the Convention must be curtailed or suspended because it is not feasible to comply with applicable provisions of the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. due to the existence of an emergency which may endanger lives, health, property, and/or safety, may increase the threat to lives, health, property and/or safety, and/or conditions are such that it is not possible to conduct the usual and customary business of the Convention in a manner provided by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Convention.

2. In the event that the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. cannot meet to consider an emergency declaration or termination, then the last elected officers of the Convention and the Executive Committee of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., may jointly declare an emergency which invokes the provisions of this Article XII and/or terminate a previously declared emergency.

3. In the event that the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. or, in its absence, the officers of the Convention and the Executive Committee of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. cannot meet to declare an emergency, then the Executive Director of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention may declare an emergency which invokes the provisions of this Article.

4. In the event that an emergency is declared invoking the provisions of this Article as provided in paragraphs 1, 2 or 3 above, then all Convention officers, Convention committee members, and board members of Convention agencies and members of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. shall continue in office until such time as the emergency declaration is terminated and his/her successor is duly elected as provided by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc.

5. In the event that an emergency is declared invoking the provisions of this Article as provided in paragraphs 1, 2 or 3 above, then all budgets, financial expenditures and operations authorized and last approved by the Convention prior to the emergency declaration shall remain in force and effect until such time as the emergency declaration is terminated and new budget, operational, and financial programs are duly adopted by the Convention as provided by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc.

6. In the event that an emergency has been properly declared, then all meetings of the Convention Messengers whether Annual or otherwise shall be suspended until such time as the emergency declaration is properly terminated and Messengers are able to meet and conduct business as provided by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc.

7. All meetings of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., officers of the Convention and the Executive Committee of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. may be held in any manner whether in person, by telephone, electronically or

otherwise during the period an emergency has been properly declared and/or to consider whether to declare an emergency or terminate an emergency declaration.

8. In the event that an emergency has been properly declared, The *Louisiana Baptist Message* shall remain the official publication of the Convention. However, the *Baptist Message* may be published in any manner possible whether by print, by hand, electronically or any other method feasible during the emergency declaration. If the *Baptist Message* cannot be published in any manner, then any reasonable method of communication to Convention Messengers, cooperating churches, officers, or other necessary persons or organizations may be used.

9. An emergency declaration may be terminated by the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., jointly by officers of the Convention and the Executive Committee of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. by a majority vote of those present and voting, or by the Executive Director of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. in the same order and manner as provided by paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 of this Article at such time as the conditions creating the emergency as defined in paragraph 1 above no longer exists.

10. Any provision of the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. in conflict with this ARTICLE XIII during the period that an emergency has been properly declared and has not been terminated, shall be suspended until such time as the declaration of emergency has been properly terminated.

ARTICLE XIV. INDEMNIFICATION

To the maximum extent permitted or required by LSA-R.S. 12:227 as it now exists or as it may be amended in the future, the Convention shall indemnify and advance expenses to persons indemnified in §227 for amounts such persons pay directly. The Convention shall not indemnify or advance expenses to such persons for any amount paid by a third party pursuant to a plan or contract of insurance.

ARTICLE XVI. AGENT FOR SERVICE

The first agent for service of process for the Convention shall be Dr. David E. Hankins. The Board of Trustees may from time to time as it shall determine in its discretion change the agent for service of process for the Convention without the necessity of approval by the messengers.

ARTICLE XVII. CONSTRUCTION

All references in these Articles of Incorporation to statutes, regulations, or other sources of legal authority shall refer to the authorities cited, or their successors, as they may be amended from time to time.

ARTICLE XVIII. AMENDMENTS

Proposed amendments originating in the Executive Board of the Convention are posted to the LBC website and published in one (1) issue of the *Baptist Message* (print edition or digital edition) no later than fifteen (15) days before the meeting of the Convention.

**BYLAWS
of the
LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION**

ARTICLE I. PARLIAMENTARY LAW AND CUSTOM

Section 1. *Robert's Rules of Order* shall be recognized as the standard authority to guide the Convention on questions of parliamentary law and custom.

Section 2. One-fourth of the messengers enrolled shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business by the Convention. The minutes of the Convention shall indicate that a quorum was present for all business sessions.

Section 3. No persons addressing the Convention may speak more than twice on the same subject without unanimous consent.

Section 4. The president is charged at all times with the maintenance of decorum and order.

Section 5. All proposed resolutions coming before the Convention shall, prior to consideration by the Convention, be referred to the Committee on Resolutions without debate.

Section 6. All matters of business not scheduled on the agenda shall, prior to consideration by the Convention, be referred to the Committee on Order of Business without debate.

Section 7. The Convention shall express its official position only through its constitution, bylaws, and resolutions. The acceptance of a report shall not, in the absence of implementing resolutions, be construed as authorizing action by Convention committees, boards, and agencies.

**ARTICLE II. PERMANENT PLAN OF ORGANIZATION OF THE
CONVENTION AND ITS COMMITTEES AND BOARDS**

Permanent organization of the Convention shall be as follows:

1. Standing Committees:
 - (1) Committee on Committees
 - (2) Committee on Nominations
 - (3) Committee on Order of Business
 - (4) Committee on Credentials
 - (5) Committee on Resolutions
 - (6) Committee on Moral and Social Concerns
2. Boards of Trustees for:
 - (1) Louisiana College
 - (2) Louisiana Baptist Children's Home
 - (3) Louisiana Baptist Foundation
 - (4) *The Baptist Message*
3. Executive Board of the Convention

**ARTICLE III. COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF
COMMITTEES AND BOARD**

Section 1. The composition and duties of boards of trustees of agencies and institutions of this Convention shall be clearly set forth in the Convention resolutions authorizing their establishment and included subsequently in appropriate form in their respective corporate charters. All corporate charters and amendments thereto shall be expressly approved by the Convention or by the Executive Board of the Convention.

Section 2. **The Committee on Committees** shall be composed of nine (9) members one-third of whom shall be appointed each year by the president. This Committee shall nominate to the Convention the membership of all other committees of the Convention and shall nominate or appoint the membership of special committees as instructed by the Convention. The Committee shall also nominate

for election the chairman and vice chairman of all Convention committees. Vacancies occurring during the year may be filled by recommendation from this Committee to the Executive Board and may be approved by the Board in any of its regular or special meetings or by mail poll of the Board.

Section 3. **The Committee on Nominations** shall be composed of fifteen (15) members. It shall nominate to the Convention all members of boards of the Convention, including the Executive Board of the Convention. Vacancies on boards occurring prior to the May Executive Board meeting may be filled by recommendation from this Committee to the Executive Board. Vacancies occurring after the May meeting shall be left vacant until the Convention in November.

Section 4. **The Committee on Order of Business** shall be composed of seven (7) members and the person designated to plan the Convention music. It shall present to the opening session of the Convention for adoption a recommended agenda for the Convention sessions. The committee shall recommend to the Convention the preacher and music leader for the Convention meeting one year hence. The committee also may tentatively enlist Bible study leader and major speakers for Conventions scheduled up to three years in advance. The Committee shall be responsible for recommending to the Convention the host, the meeting hall or church, and the dates for the Convention meeting two years hence and, if feasible, for three years hence.

The Committee on Order of Business shall provide periods of time during the convention for the introduction of all matters requiring a vote not scheduled on the agenda, and, when introduced (unless the Convention then gives it unanimous consent for its immediate consideration) shall fix times for the consideration of the same. All such matters of business shall be introduced to the Convention during the time scheduled for Introduction of Business. No such matters of business may be introduced in the last session.

Section 5. **The Committee on Credentials** shall be composed of seven (7) members. It shall supervise the registration and accreditation of messengers to the Convention, and shall manage the application process for congregations desiring to become a cooperating church with the Louisiana Baptist Convention and qualified to send messengers for the first time. It shall recommend to the Convention, when necessary, the disaffiliation of any Louisiana Baptist Convention church that no longer complies with the Convention's definition of a cooperating church. It shall recommend action to the Convention concerning disputes as to status of persons as messengers.

Section 6. **The Committee on Resolutions** shall be composed of seven (7) members and three (3) ex officio members (including the Executive Board president) from the Executive Board of the Convention. The Committee shall be responsible for initiating, reviewing, commenting on, and recommending Convention action on all resolutions. In order to facilitate thorough consideration and to expedite the Committee's work, all proposed resolutions shall:

1. Be submitted to the Committee for review and consideration no more than ninety (90) days, but no later than fifteen (15) days, prior to the next LBC annual meeting.
2. Be addressed to the Committee on Resolutions in care of the Communications Team of the Louisiana Baptist Convention at its registered or e-mail address (electronic copies are preferred),
3. Be typewritten, titled, and dated,
4. Be accompanied by a letter from a church qualified to send a messenger to the annual meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention certifying that the person submitting the resolution is a member in good standing, and
5. Include complete contact information for both the person submitting it, and his or her church.

No person may submit more than three resolutions per year. The Committee on Resolutions shall prepare and submit to each annual meeting of the Convention only such resolutions the Committee recommends for adoption. Such resolutions may be based upon proposals received by the Committee or may originate with the Committee. Only resolutions recommended by the Committee may be considered by the Convention, except the Convention may, by a 2/3 vote, consider any other resolution properly submitted to the Committee.

Section 7. **The Committee on Moral and Social Concerns** shall be composed of fifteen members. The president of the Convention, the president of the Executive Board, and the editor of the *Baptist Message* shall be ex officio members. The Committee shall identify, study, provide information, and recommend actions on moral and social concerns which need to be of particular concern to Louisiana Baptists. The Committee shall also be authorized to speak publicly and/or conduct campaigns to influence the outcome of current issues on which the Executive Board or the Convention have taken an official position. The Committee may use resource persons and/or organizations in matters of common concern.

Section 8. The Executive Director of the Executive Board of the Convention shall serve ex officio as a member and as secretary of all standing committees of the Convention; however, he may be assisted in this task by members of the Executive Board staff.

Section 9. The financial transactions of all standing and special committees of the Convention shall be conducted only in accordance with policies and procedures established by the Executive Board of the Convention. The Executive Board shall retain exclusive authority over the custody and disbursement of all funds made available for expenses of committees of the Convention and the Convention itself.

Section 10. Trustees of corporate boards established under authority of the Convention shall be responsible for initiating charter amendments whenever such action is necessary to make charter provisions consistent with actions of the Convention.

Section 11. A report of all meetings of boards of the Convention shall be published in *The Baptist Message* (print edition or digital edition) as soon as possible after the meeting with the understanding that specifics concerning financial conditions and personnel relations must often be confidential for the welfare of the institutions and their employees and may be reported in only general terms.

Section 12. **Baptist Faith and Message** adopted by the Convention on 11/12/02.

ARTICLE IV. MEMBERSHIP OF COMMITTEES AND BOARDS

Section 1. The Convention affirms its adherence to the policy of periodic rotation of the membership of its committees and boards.

Section 2. The terms of members of boards shall be established as three (3) years. No member elected or appointed for a full term shall be eligible for more than two (2) complete successive terms on the same board. No member elected to serve as much as two (2) years of an unexpired term of any board shall be eligible for more than one (1) successive full term of three (3) years on the same board. A member shall be ineligible to serve on that board until an interval equal to the number of years served on that board shall have elapsed. A person shall not serve in more than one elected or appointed position at a time, unless authorized by the constitution and bylaws. Upon the expiration of the term of any member of a board or committee, no person who is a member of the same church as the person whose term is expiring may serve on that same board or committee until one year following the expiration of the serving member's term.

Membership on all boards and committees collectively shall in all cases be limited to the pastor and up to two (2) other members from any church at any one time. Existing board or committee members who move to a church without an eligible vacancy, shall be rendered ineligible to serve. Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary, a pastor who resigns his pastorate may continue to serve on the board or committee to which he was elected, provided that the church where he holds membership has an eligible vacancy. No more than one member of the same church may serve on the same board or committee. The terms of members of committees shall be established as three (3) years. No member elected or appointed for a full term or elected to fill an unexpired term shall be eligible to succeed himself until an interval equal to the number of years served on that committee shall have elapsed.

Section 3. As far as practicable, one-third of the membership of each committee or board shall be elected annually.

Section 4. At least one-fourth of the membership of each board shall live outside the association in which the institution is located, and an effort shall be made to have representatives from various areas of the state.

Section 5. All persons regularly elected by the Convention to agencies and boards shall be elected or selected in any convention session except the last session.

Section 6. Each board of the Convention shall organize and elect its own officers under its own rules and regulations. The president of the Convention shall appoint the chairman and vice chairman of the Committee on Committees. That committee shall nominate the chairman and vice chairman of all committees that it nominates to the Convention. Each committee may elect for itself such other officers as it may need.

Section 7. The initial meeting of newly authorized committees shall be called together during or following the Convention by the chairman in conjunction with the secretary of the committee and at such meeting the necessary officers shall be elected.

Section 8. Newly elected members for the first time to standing committees and boards of the Convention shall not be eligible for office within their respective committees or boards prior to the conclusion of one year's service with the committee or board. Ex officio members of standing committees or permanent boards of the Convention shall not hold office on such committees or boards unless specifically authorized to do so by the constitution of the Convention or these bylaws.

Section 9. Officers of committees and boards of this Convention shall be elected annually.

Section 10. No salaried employee of this Convention and its boards and committees shall be eligible for election as a voting member of boards or committees of this Convention except as provided in the constitution of the Convention or these bylaws.

Section 11. Boards and committees of this Convention may appoint persons other than members to subcommittees and advisory committees provided such persons shall serve only in an advisory capacity and shall never be permitted to vote at meetings of the authorizing committee or board.

ARTICLE V. INCLUSIONS OF THE CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS OF THE CONVENTION AND THE BYLAWS OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD IN THE ANNUAL OF THE CONVENTION

The directory of the Convention shall include the constitution and bylaws of the Convention and the bylaws of the Executive Board of the Convention in each edition of the Convention's Annual.

ARTICLE VI. AVOIDANCE OF ILLEGAL ACTION

No action of the Convention shall be construed as authorizing its committees or boards to take any action that may be contrary to law.

ARTICLE VII. AMENDMENT OF BYLAWS

These bylaws may be amended at any regular session of the Convention by affirmative vote of two-thirds of the messengers present and voting. Amendments sponsored by the Executive Board shall be posted to the LBC website and published in one (1) issue of the *Baptist Message* (print edition or digital edition) no later than fifteen (15) days before the meeting of the Convention.

BUSINESS AND FINANCIAL PLAN OF LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION

I. Preliminary Provisions

Each agency and institution of the Convention shall submit to the Business and Finance Committee of the Executive Board (1) an itemized estimate of its receipts for the next fiscal year, and (2) an itemized estimate of its expenditures for the next fiscal year.

The Executive Board shall recommend to the Convention a budget based on an analysis of the aforementioned data, which budget shall include allocations to agencies and institutions.

“Agencies” shall include the *Baptist Message*, Louisiana Baptist Foundation, and the Executive Board. “Institutions” shall include Louisiana Baptist Children’s Home, and Louisiana College.

The Budget and Financial Data Query Form shall include itemized estimates of receipts and expenditures for a three-year period, past, present and projected, as indicated in the report form.

II. Fiscal Periods

Except where agreement otherwise is effected between an agency or institution and the Executive Board, the financial affairs of the Convention and all agencies or institutions owned, operated and controlled by the Louisiana Baptist Convention, shall be operated on the calendar year.

III. Disbursement of Monetary Funds

The executive director shall disburse all monies in accordance with the provisions of the Convention budget. Exceptions to this must have Convention approval.

Each agency or institution of the Convention is hereby instructed and ordered to keep all trust funds and/or designated gifts (for they are trust funds) sacred to the trust or the designation involved, and that they be kept separate from all other funds of such agency or institution.

Disbursement of Cooperative Program and Designated funds will be made immediately after closing of the books and in no event shall they be made later than the 10th of each month.

Inasmuch as each church is an autonomous body it has the inherent right, as is of course true with each individual, to make designations as desired. When a designated gift is received at the Baptist Building Business Office it shall be recorded and the gift will be forwarded forthwith to the designated object or person. An exception is that any gift received by any Louisiana Baptist Convention entity from a church that affirms, approves, or endorses homosexual behavior shall be returned to the donor. The acceptance and disbursement of any gifts shall not be construed as endorsement or agreement with the beliefs and practices of the donor.

Allocations for agencies and institutions from the Cooperative Program shall be determined on the basis of church gifts to the Cooperative Program and church designations the previous year and on the basis of needs and requirements of institutions and agencies as evaluated by the Business and Finance Committee and the Executive Board with recommended allocations to be voted by the Convention each year.

In the event that Cooperative Program receipts are less than the budget, distribution of funds to the respective agencies and institutions will be made on the basis of budget percentage of actual receipts.

IV. Special Solicitations

Any special campaigns for funds by an agency or institution owned, controlled, or supported by the Convention, must first secure the endorsement and approval of the Executive Board and the Convention. This is not to be construed as prohibiting any agency or institution from approaching individuals or corporations for gifts, it being understood that such approach to an individual or corporation is to be made only by personal contact or personal correspondence.

V. Capital Investments and Liabilities

Without the approval of the Convention or Executive Board, no liability or indebtedness exceeding \$100,000 or 2% of a Convention entity's annual operating budget (whichever is greater), shall be incurred by a Convention entity other than those that can be repaid from anticipated receipts for operating purposes and/or capital needs within a period of three years from the date such obligations were incurred. A report on all entity indebtedness shall be made to the Executive Board annually.

VI. Emergency Reserves

Each agency and institution of this Convention shall set up a reserve for contingencies to provide for deficits that may occur either through decreased receipts or through emergencies.

The goal shall be that all agencies/institutions move immediately to accumulate funds in their operating reserve to 30 days operation within a long-term goal of at least three months.

VII. Financial Reports

Each agency and institution of the Convention shall close its books and accounts, and have them audited by a Certified Public Accountant as of the close of its fiscal year, and in turn shall forward two copies of its audit to the executive director as soon as available. These audits are to be studied by the Business and Finance Committee of the Executive Board, and shall include the following:

- 1) Balance Sheet
- 2) Analysis of surplus accounts
- 3) Income and expense
- 4) Classified list of investments by fund and type of investment
- 5) Receipts:
 - (a) Cooperative receipts
 - (b) Designated receipts
 - (c) Other income

Each agency and institution shall submit a report on the Budget and Financial Data form on or before June 1 of each year. A balance sheet of the financial condition after May 31 and prior to September 1 of the current year shall be submitted for publication in the current *Book of Reports* and Annual.

VIII. Handling of Funds

All persons who handle funds or securities for any agency or institution shall be adequately bonded. Discretion shall be exercised in the handling of all securities, deeds, notes and other valuable records (legal documents), and there must always be express authority from the proper source for such handling.

IX. Additional Agencies and Institutions

No new agency or institution shall be authorized by this Convention except after thorough study and presentation to the Convention for favorable action in two succeeding annual meetings.

X. Business Procedure

Each agency and institution of the Louisiana Baptist Convention as a normal operating policy shall refrain from entering any business transaction with a trustee or employee, or a business enterprise in which a trustee or employee has an interest. An exception to this policy may be made, at the discretion of the board of trustees, in any case wherein it appears that a commodity or service at the discretion of the board, is found to be in the best interest of the agency or institution. Competitive bids should be taken if practicable. In any case being considered for exception, the extent of the trustees' or employees' interest shall be disclosed to the entire board.

XI. Professional Services

The Executive Board at its discretion may employ an auditor to study the audited report with the auditors of the agencies and institutions in the light of Convention instructions.

The Executive Board at its discretion may employ an engineer or architect to study proposed capital projects or maintenance of present capital assets.

XII. Amendments

This Business and Financial Plan may be altered by two-thirds of the messengers present and voting at any time except during the last session (of the Convention), provided that recommended changes shall have been presented to the Executive Board and published in the *Baptist Message* (print edition or digital edition) at least one month in advance of the Convention.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION

ARTICLE I.

The name of this corporation shall be THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, and under this name it shall have authority to sue and be sued; to have and to make a corporate seal; to own property both real and personal, and to receive the same by purchase, gift or any other process known to the law, to borrow money in its corporate name and to mortgage and hypothecate its property to secure the same, and generally to do, and to perform all acts necessary for the purposes for which it is created.

The corporate existence of this corporation shall be in perpetuity, unless sooner dissolved by a two-thirds vote of this corporation, which vote shall be taken not less than six months after receiving instructions to that effect in writing from the LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION.

ARTICLE II.

The objects and purposes of this corporation shall be to foster Missions, at home and abroad, Christian Education and Benevolences, to promote and give direction to the work of the Louisiana Baptist Convention in these fields of service, through its several institutions and departments of service, necessary to the accomplishment of its objects and purposes, and to promote harmony of feeling and concert of action in adopting and carrying into operation such measures as may promote the Redeemer's Kingdom in Louisiana and in the regions beyond. It shall have power and authority to do all things necessary to carry out the objects and purposes for which it is organized.

ARTICLE III.

The Executive Board shall consist of one (1) member from each association, having a minimum of seven churches with an aggregate church membership of at least one thousand, plus one (1) additional board member from each association having as many as ten thousand (10,000) church members, and an additional board member for each additional five thousand (5,000) church members of such associations; provided, however that not more than seven (7) members from any one association shall serve simultaneously as members of the Executive Board.

The terms of elected board members shall run for three (3) years. No member may serve continuously for more than two (2) complete successive terms. No member shall be eligible to serve another term until an interval equal to the number of years served shall have elapsed.

The membership of any board member shall be declared vacant if he ceases to be affiliated with a church that is a member of the association from which he was elected.

The Convention shall annually elect members to fill all vacancies in the board.

The qualifications, term of office and criteria for selection of persons to serve as a member of the Executive Board of this corporation shall be in conformity with *Article X. The Executive Board of the Convention* contained in the Articles of Incorporation of the Louisiana Baptist Convention and *Article IV. Membership of Committees And Boards* contained in the Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention and any future amendments thereto. In addition to vacancies described in the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, the death or resignation of a member of the Executive Board shall automatically and immediately cause that office to become vacant without the necessity of any further action. Any other vacancy in the office of member of the Executive Board of this corporation for any reason deemed sufficient by the member shall only be declared by a two-thirds majority affirmative vote of the messengers to the Louisiana Baptist Convention and only after the affirmative recommendation of the Convention Committee on Nominations has been published in the *BAPTIST MESSAGE*

(print edition or digital edition) not less than twice in the thirty days immediately preceding the meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE IV.

The elected officers of the Executive Board of the Convention shall consist of a president and a vice president chosen annually by the membership of the Executive Board. They shall have the duties customarily associated with such positions. The board itself shall elect an executive director for an indefinite term. The executive director shall be ex officio member of the board and serve as its secretary.

The first officers of this corporation shall be as follows to wit: George W. Bolton, President; H. A. Sumrell, Vice-President; H. H. Webb, Recording Secretary; W. N. Johnson, Corresponding Secretary; B. F. Thompson, Treasurer; and H. H. Webb, Auditor, who shall hold office until their successors are elected.

ARTICLE V.

This corporation shall have the authority to adopt such rules and bylaws, not contrary to law, or the provisions of this charter, as it deems proper, and to appoint all necessary committees to carry out the purposes for which this corporation was organized.

ARTICLE VI.

The domicile of this corporation shall be at Alexandria, Rapides Parish, Louisiana, and the service of all legal process shall be made at the domicile of the corporation, upon the President, or in his absence upon the Vice President, or in the absence of both of these, upon the Executive Director/Secretary, and otherwise according to law.

ARTICLE VII.

This corporation shall not issue any stock certificates, and the private property of the members of this corporation shall not be held liable for any of the debts of the corporation, nor shall any mere formality in the drawing of this charter have the effect of rendering it null.

ARTICLE VIII.

The Articles of Incorporation may only be amended with the approval of two-thirds majority of the Executive Board and the approval of two-thirds majority of the membership at the annual meeting, six months notice having been given prior to the annual convention to the President of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, and also notice of the proposed amendments having been published in the *Baptist Message* (print edition or digital edition) for three consecutive weeks preceding the annual meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE IX.

This Corporation shall be organized on a non-stock membership basis. The sole member of this corporation shall be the Louisiana Baptist Convention, a nonprofit, Louisiana Corporation domiciled in Alexandria, Louisiana. Except as otherwise provided in these Articles of Incorporation or by applicable law requiring a greater number of votes other than a simple majority for approval of any action by the member, any matter requiring a vote of the member of this corporation shall be adopted by a majority of messengers who are present and voting as is provided by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Articles of Incorporation. Each messenger shall have one vote.

ARTICLE X.

The annual meeting of the member of this corporation shall take place contemporaneously with the annual meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention without the necessity of giving notice to the member of said meeting. Any special meeting of the member of this corporation may only be called as provided in *Article XII Meetings* of the Louisiana Baptist Convention's Articles of Incorporation and shall only be held at the same places, dates and times as the Louisiana Baptist Convention determines in accordance with its Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws. Notice of any special meeting of the member of this corporation shall be published in the *BAPTIST MESSAGE* (print edition or digital edition) not less than twice in thirty days immediately preceding the meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE XI.

Before any dissolution or merger of this corporation, transfer or sale of substantially all of this corporation's assets and/or the formation of other corporations, limited liability companies or other forms of doing business by this corporation may be implemented, the proposed action shall be approved by the member by a two-thirds affirmative vote of the messengers present and voting and only after the resolution authorizing the action has been published in the *BAPTIST MESSAGE* (print edition or digital edition) not less than twice in the thirty days immediately preceding the meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE XII.

1. "Emergency" means any occasion or instance for which, in the determination of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. by a majority vote of those present and voting, that the usual and customary conduct of business by the Executive Board must be curtailed or suspended because it is not feasible to comply with applicable provisions of the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the Executive Board due to the existence of an emergency which may endanger lives, health, property, and/or safety, may increase the threat to lives, health, property and/or safety, and/or conditions are such that it is not possible to conduct the usual and customary business of the Executive Board in a manner provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the Executive Board.

2. In the event that the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. cannot meet to consider an emergency declaration or termination, then the Executive Director of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., may declare an emergency which invokes the provisions of this Article and/or terminate a previously declared emergency.

3. In the event that an emergency is declared invoking the provisions of this Article as provided in paragraphs 1 or 2 above, then all Executive Board officers, Executive Board committee members, and Executive Board members shall continue in office until such time as the emergency declaration is terminated and his/her successor is duly elected as provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC.

4. In the event that an emergency is declared invoking the provisions of this Article as provided in paragraphs 1 or 2 above, then all budgets, financial expenditures and operations authorized and last approved by the Executive Board prior to the emergency declaration shall remain in force and effect until such time as the emergency declaration is terminated and new budget, operational, and financial programs are duly adopted by the Executive Board as provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC.

5. In the event that an emergency has been properly declared, then all meetings of the Executive Board shall be suspended until such time as the emergency declaration is properly terminated

and board members of the Executive Board are able to meet and conduct business as provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC.

6. In the event that a special meeting of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention may be safely and is reasonably necessary, then such meeting may be held with reasonable notice to the Executive Board members in any manner whether in person, by telephone, electronically, or otherwise during the time an emergency has been properly declared and/or to consider whether to declare or terminate an emergency.

7. In the event that an emergency has been properly declared, the *BAPTIST MESSAGE* shall remain the official publication of the Executive Board. However, the *BAPTIST MESSAGE* may be published in any manner possible whether by print, by hand, electronically or any other method feasible during the emergency declaration. If the *BAPTIST MESSAGE* cannot be published in any manner, then any reasonable method of communication to Executive Board members, officers, or other necessary persons or organizations may be used.

8. An emergency declaration may be terminated by the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., or by the Executive Director of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. in the same order and manner as provided by paragraphs 1 or 2 of this Article at such time as the conditions creating the emergency as defined in paragraph 1 above no longer exist.

9. Any provision of the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC. in conflict with ARTICLE XII during the period that an emergency has been properly declared and has not been terminated, shall be suspended until such time as the declaration of emergency has been properly terminated.

BYLAWS
of the
EXECUTIVE BOARD
of the
LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION

ARTICLE I. GENERAL FUNCTIONS

Section 1. It is the function of the Executive Board to perform such duties and responsibilities as may be authorized by the Louisiana Baptist Convention, including serving as the Convention ad interim, serving as the Convention's principal adviser on total program, and administering programs entrusted to it by the Convention or not expressly assigned to another board or committee by the Convention. The Executive Board shall, by resolution, enumerate its specific duties and responsibilities under these general delegations of responsibility by the Convention.

Section 2. Duties and responsibilities of this board as set forth in the constitution and bylaws of the Convention shall be construed as incorporated in these bylaws. The board shall at no time authorize action contrary to instructions of the Convention.

**ARTICLE II. PERMANENT PLAN OF ORGANIZATION
OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD**

Section 1. The plan of organization of the Executive Board, its committees and staff, shall be as follows:

1. The elected officers of the Executive Board of the Convention shall consist of a president and a vice president chosen annually by the membership of the Executive Board at the Pre-Convention Board meeting. They shall have the duties customarily associated with such positions. The board itself shall elect an executive director for an indefinite time. The executive director shall be an ex officio member of the board and serve as its secretary.

2. Standing committees of the Executive Board

- (1) Nominating Committee
- (2) Administrative Committee
- (3) Business and Finance Committee
- (4) Executive Committee
- (5) Missions Support Committee
- (6) Properties Committee

3. Subsidiary of the Executive Board: Church Site Corporation

ARTICLE III. MEETINGS

Section 1. The Executive Board shall hold regular meetings in May, September, and immediately prior to the convening of the annual Convention. The May meeting shall be on the first Tuesday. The September meeting shall be on the last Tuesday. Should unusual circumstances require a change in the meeting dates, the Executive Committee may recommend such a change for approval by the board at a regular meeting or by means of a mail poll. The board may, by resolution, hold such other meetings as it deems necessary and desirable.

Section 2. The Executive Committee of the board may, for reasons that seem to it good and proper, call the board to special meetings.

Section 3. Fifty-one percent (51%) of the elected membership of the board shall constitute a quorum for the conduct of business. The minutes shall always indicate the presence of a quorum at the openings of any business session.

Section 4. Notification of or an explanation of absence from meetings of the board should be given by members to the chairman or secretary.

ARTICLE IV. COMPOSITION, DUTIES, AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1. Committees authorized in Article II of these bylaws shall be primarily advisory in nature. The Executive Board may, however, delegate responsibility to a committee to act in the name of the board for specifically defined purposes.

Section 2. Committee members shall serve for three year terms with one-third of the membership rotating annually.

Section 3. No member may serve on more than two (2) standing committees, except the Executive Committee, simultaneously.

Section 4. The president of the board shall be an ex officio member of all committees, subcommittees and advisory committees. He shall hold no elective committee position. A committee chairman shall also be an ex officio member of subcommittees and advisory committees created and authorized by and for the committee.

Section 5. The executive director of the board shall serve ex officio as a member and as secretary of each committee. He may, however, appoint assistant secretaries from the Executive Board staff to assist him in the discharge of secretarial duties.

Section 6. All standing committees, except the Executive Committee and the Nominating Committee, shall consist of fifteen (15) or more elected members subject to the discretion of the board.

Section 7. Each committee shall be responsible for reporting to the Executive Board at each regular board meeting and for formulating its respective portion of the board's annual report to the Convention.

Section 8. All committees shall be of equal status with each committee reporting directly to the Executive Board; however, this shall not be construed as barring the submission by the Administrative Committee of requests for unallocated funds directly to the Business and Finance Committee or forbidding in any way cooperation among committees on common problems.

Section 9. The committees, themselves, shall determine the time, place, and frequency of their meetings unless the Executive Board directs otherwise.

Section 10. The executive director will maintain minutes of all official meetings of the board and its committees. These shall be available at the Executive Offices of the Executive Board.

Section 11. Standing committees of this board are authorized to create and utilize such subcommittees or advisory committees as may be necessary to the proper performance of their duties. A list of all such subcommittees or advisory committees and their membership shall be submitted to, and included in, the official minutes of the Executive Board. Persons other than elected members of the Executive Board may be utilized by the committee to render qualified service as advisory, nonvoting members on subcommittees and advisory committees.

Section 12. The **Nominating Committee** shall consist of nine (9) members appointed by the president of the Executive Board. One-third of the committee shall be appointed annually, subsequent to the meeting of the Convention but prior to the September meeting of the Executive Board. The Nominating Committee shall recommend assignment of Executive Board members to other standing committees of the board and shall also recommend officers for these committees.

Section 13. The responsibilities of the **Business and Finance Committee** shall be to advise and assist the Executive Board in recommending both long-range and short-range goals for the Convention; in recommending the allocations of undesigned resources of the Convention to its

respective agencies and institutions; and in recommending and appraising the financial policies and practices of the Convention and of its agencies and institutions.

Section 14. The **Administrative Committee's** principal function shall be to advise and assist the Executive Board in carrying out the program assigned by the Convention to the board for administration. The committee shall recommend plans of organization and general policies to the Executive Board for approval and shall itself review and approve administrative policies and actions as appropriate. The executive director shall report to the Executive Board through this committee. In the event of a vacancy in this position, this committee shall be the channel through which a successor shall be recommended to the Executive Board. The committee shall review and approve the budget proposals of the executive director concerning Executive Board programs and shall recommend to the Business and Finance Committee any desired allocation of undesignated funds. The committee shall also serve the Executive Board by having cognizance of such administrative problems as the board itself may have, including financial and administrative matters relating to standing and special committees of the Convention.

Section 15. The **Missions Support Committee** shall review and approve funds for mission budget supplements, church loans, and special requests from missions for financial assistance.

Section 16. The **Properties Committee** shall study and recommend property acquisition, sale, or lease, study and recommend insurance coverage on properties owned or leased by Executive Board, and study and recommend major building project(s) or renovation.

Section 17. The **Executive Committee** shall consist of the President and Vice President of the Executive Board, who shall serve as chairman and vice chairman respectively of the Executive Committee, plus the chairmen of the other five standing committees of the board. The Executive Committee's sole responsibility shall be to advise and assist the Executive board in carrying out its function as the convention ad interim to the extent this function is specifically delegated by the Convention. The committee shall not in any instance serve as a substitute for, or insert its judgment in lieu of that of the other standing committees of the board; nor shall it review or appraise the work of the other committees unless expressly so directed by the Executive Board. The Executive Committee shall have the duty of conducting the Executive Director's Annual Performance Review and recommending any adjustment to the Executive Director's compensation and benefits.

Section 18. The Executive Board may by resolution define more specifically the duties and responsibilities of its committees; provided, however, that duties and responsibilities contained in these bylaws shall be changed only through amendment of these bylaws.

ARTICLE V. THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR-TREASURER

Section 1. The executive director shall serve as the chief executive officer of the staff of the Executive Board. He shall be responsible for providing executive direction and leadership to all programs assigned to the Executive Board. The Administrative Committee shall determine in writing the specific responsibilities of the executive director; however, the committee itself shall not assume any executive or administrative functions.

Section 2. The executive director shall serve as the principal professional adviser and principal staff assistant to the Executive Board and all of its committees. In performing this function, the executive director is expected and directed to utilize all talents available to the Convention to the end that the Executive Board may be provided with the best possible assistance and advice.

Section 3. The executive director shall approve the employment of all Executive Board personnel. The employment procedures shall be in accordance with policies of the Executive Board.

Section 4. The executive director shall maintain on a current basis a policy manual and an organization manual that reflect the principal policies of the Convention and its general plan of organization. The manuals shall also include the principal policies and general plan of the organization of the Executive Board.

Section 5. When the office of the Executive Director becomes vacant, a successor shall be

elected by the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention. The name of the successor shall be recommended to the Board by a Search Committee comprised of the members of the Executive Committee and the Nominating Committee of the Board. The Search Committee shall be convened by the President of the Board upon the vacancy in the office or upon the notice by the Executive Director to vacate the office. The Search Committee will elect its own chairman, and once convened, will serve until the election of an Executive Director. However, the Executive Board, with proper notice and a two-thirds affirmative vote, may fill the office of the Executive Director at any meeting of the board without a recommendation from the Search Committee.

ARTICLE VI. AMENDMENTS

These bylaws may be amended at any meeting of the Executive Board provided:

1. Committee-sponsored amendments are announced at the preceding meeting of the board or published in the *Baptist Message* (print edition or digital edition) at least one month in advance of the board meeting at which they are considered.
2. Amendments from the floor are proposed at one meeting and acted upon at the next meeting.
3. Amendments to carry must receive a two-thirds vote of those present and voting.

LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION CHURCH SITE PLAN

I. PREAMBLE

That Louisiana Baptist Convention has been involved with churches and associations in the starting of new churches since its organization in 1848. The leaders of the Convention have been aware for some time that there was a need for some organization that could act promptly and efficiently in the matter of acquiring new church sites for developing new churches and missions. Accordingly, the following plan has been developed after thorough and open discussions of the matter by related staff persons, appropriate committees and subcommittees of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board, qualified lay persons in the fields of real estate, business, finance, and new churches.

II. ORGANIZATION

Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation

The Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation is a wholly-owned, non-profit, subsidiary corporation of the Executive Board, Louisiana Baptist Convention.

Purpose

The purpose shall be to assist Louisiana churches, associations, and the Louisiana Baptist Convention in the acquisitions of church sites for new Louisiana Baptist churches. The Church Site Corporation may purchase, receive, and otherwise acquire real and personal property for the establishment of new churches and missions, and to assist churches and associations related to the Louisiana Baptist Convention in acquiring real and personal property for the establishment of new churches and missions.

Membership and Participation

1. The membership of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board.

2. The Board of Directors of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be elected by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board upon recommendation of the Nominating Committee of the Executive Board.

3. Participation in the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be open to all persons interested in the development of new churches and missions in Louisiana.

(1) Participation shall be by donation of a share(s) of donation.

(2) Donor of a share or more shall be entitled to receive:

a. A donation share certificate stating the number of shares donated. These shares may be donated in the name of the donor, a family member, some other person or a memorial to a deceased person.

b. A quarterly newsletter presenting the status, actions, and plans of the Church Site Corporation.

c. A copy of the annual financial statement of the Church Site Corporation.

4. Relationship to Louisiana Baptist Convention Business and Financial Plan.

The Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall conduct its business, activities, programs, and projects subject to the Louisiana Baptist Convention Business and Financial Plan.

III. FUNDING

Sources of Capital Funds

1. Capital funds for the corpus of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be obtained by the receipt of donations for donation shares by individuals, churches, associations, businesses, foundations, and others interested in the development of new churches. The Church Site Corporation shall have the power to receive donation shares in the amount of 50,000 shares at \$25.00 per share initially. Subsequently, after the initial 50,000 shares have been donated, approval for additional shares must be secured from the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board.

2. The Church Site Corporation shall be responsible for administering the Mission Land Fund of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board. The corpus of the Mission Land Fund is to be transferred to the Church Site Corporation upon its activation on January 1, 1980. The Church Site Corporation shall have the responsibility of establishing policies and guidelines for this fund.

3. The Church Site Corporation shall be empowered by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board to borrow money provided the Church Site Corporation can repay any and all loans with its own sources and does not require repayment of loans from Executive Board funds.

4. The Church Site Corporation may use its earnings from interest income, profits from property dealings, gifts, bequests and donations, unless otherwise specified by the donor, to increase the corpus of the Corporation.

Sources of Grant Funds

1. The Church Site Corporation may seek and receive gifts, bequests, and donations of certain monies or real or personal properties to be used as grants to churches and associations to assist in the acquisition of new church sites.

2. The Corporation may request and receive allocations for its grant program from the Georgia Barnette State Mission Offering.

3. The Corporation may request and receive allocations from the Louisiana Baptist Convention Cooperative Program Budget to be used in its grant program.

4. The Corporation may use the earnings from its interest income, profits from property dealings, gifts, bequests, and donations, unless otherwise specified by the donor, for its grant program.

IV. GUIDELINES

Name

The name of this plan shall be the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Plan and the name of the organization shall be the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation.

Responsibility

The Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be responsible to plan and conduct the affairs of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Plan as adopted by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board and the Louisiana Baptist Convention and as revised from time to time by the Executive Board.

Nomination and Election of Board of Directors

The Church Site Corporation shall consist of nine (9) members elected by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board upon recommendation of the Executive Board Nominating Committee, and four (4) ex officio members.

1. The Board of Directors shall be composed of nine (9) elected members and four (4) ex officio members as follows:

a. Six (6) mission-minded persons (usually lay persons) experienced in finance, business or real estate, representing different areas of Louisiana.

b. Three (3) mission-minded church staff members with experience in real estate and new churches, if possible.

c. Four (4) ex officio members, the Louisiana Baptist Convention president, the chairman of the Executive Board, the chairman of the Missions Support Committee and the Executive Director.

2. Nominations to be developed in accordance with the procedures of the Executive Board.

3. The elected members of the Board of Directors shall serve for three years, and be eligible to serve a second three-year term. (In the beginning some members should be elected for three, four, and five-year terms in order to establish the rotation system.)

Officers

The officers of the Corporation shall consist of a president, vice president, and recording secretary. The recording secretary shall be the Executive Director of the Louisiana Baptist Convention or his designate.

The general counsel for the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board shall serve as legal advisor of the Corporation.

Meetings of the Board of Directors

The meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held in the Baptist Building, Alexandria, or in such place as may be designated by the Board of Directors or its officers. The Board of Directors shall meet at least twice each year, and as often as necessary to carry on the business of the Corporation. The President shall have the authority to call a meeting of the Board of Directors when it is deemed expedient to do so.

A majority of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Duties of the Board of Directors

The Board shall meet at stated times for the purpose of conducting the affairs of the Corporation. It shall also be the responsibility of the Board to make or have made certain studies of population and other data to establish trends and needs for new churches. The Board shall make decisions related to acquiring new church sites based upon demographic data, land surveys, appraisals, zoning, evidence of good title, legal description of the property, participation of local forces in the financing of the project, maintenance of the property, program evaluation, priority of the new work, available funds or other such information that the Board may require.

It is anticipated that the field work and studies shall be done by appropriate staff members of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board whose program assignments relate to new churches.

The Board shall also make regular reports of its work and actions to the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board.

Authority of the Board of Directors

1. The Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall have authority under its own charter to purchase, subdivide, sell, lease, rent, exchange, donate, and finance the purchase and/or sale of real and personal property to be used for purposes consistent with its stated program.

2. The Corporation shall have the authority to loan, or make grants to churches and associations related to the Louisiana Baptist Convention, so long as it does not diminish its corpus funds; terms of the loans and grants shall be established by the Board of Directors of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation.

3. It shall be the duty and responsibility of the Corporation to actively seek out priority and strategic church sites in all areas of Louisiana.

4. The Corporation shall discuss and utilize the services of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board and staff persons of the Executive Board assigned to work with the development of new churches.

5. All properties purchased by the Church Site Corporation shall be held in the name of the Corporation.

Working Arrangements

1. The Board of Directors shall work with appropriate program leaders on the staff of the Executive Board in carrying out this work. It shall also be responsible to work with local churches and associations in the acquisition of new church sites. If it is not feasible to work with local Baptist leaders, the Board may proceed as necessary.

2. Any properties given to the Louisiana Baptist Convention through the Church Site Corporation shall be given without restrictions, except as agreed upon by the Board of Directors.

3. A local Baptist Church cooperating with the Louisiana Baptist Convention and the local association shall have the responsibility of sponsoring each new mission. It will be the normal procedure for the Board of Directors to have in hand a plan for each new church site, before it is purchased.

4. When new church sites are conveyed to sponsoring churches, certain stipulations shall be made to the church by the Board of Directors as follows:

a. The sponsoring church may not change the agreed upon financial plan for development without first consulting the Board of Directors.

b. The sponsoring church shall inform the mission church of the financial contributions made by the Church Site Corporation, the association and the sponsoring church in the acquisition of the property.

c. It shall be the sponsoring church's responsibility to enter into an agreement with its mission and the Louisiana Baptist Convention whereby any monies given or granted by the Corporation will be returned should such mission, or mission and sponsoring church, or mission after it is constituted as a church, disassociates itself from the Louisiana Baptist Convention. A recommended instrument shall be provided by the Church Site Corporation.

5. The Business Division office of the Louisiana Baptist Convention will be responsible to provide accounting and other business services to the Church Site Corporation.

Revisions

The provision of this document may be revised or amended by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board at any regular or special meeting of the Executive Board, acting on the recommendation of appropriate committees of the Executive Board.

BAPTIST FAITH AND MESSAGE

Adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, June 14, 2000

The 1999 session of the Southern Baptist Convention, meeting in Atlanta, Georgia, adopted the following motion addressed to the President of the Convention:

“I move that in your capacity as Southern Baptist Convention chairman, you appoint a blue ribbon committee to review the *Baptist Faith and Message* statement with the responsibility to report and bring any recommendations to this meeting next June in Orlando.”

President Paige Patterson appointed the committee as follows: Max Barnett (OK), Steve Gaines (AL), Susie Hawkins (TX), Rudy A. Hernandez (TX), Charles S. Kelley, Jr. (LA), Heather King (IN), Richard D. Land (TN), Fred Luter (LA), R. Albert Mohler, Jr. (KY), T. C. Pinckney (VA), Nelson Price (GA), Adrian Rogers (TN), Roger Spradlin (CA), Simon Tsoi (AZ), Jerry Vines (FL). Adrian Rogers (TN) was appointed chairman.

Your committee thus constituted begs leave to present its report as follows:

Baptists are a people of deep beliefs and cherished doctrines. Throughout our history we have been a confessional people, adopting statements of faith as a witness to our beliefs and a pledge of our faithfulness to the doctrines revealed in Holy Scripture.

Our confessions of faith are rooted in historical precedent, as the church in every age has been called upon to define and defend its beliefs. Each generation of Christians bears the responsibility of guarding the treasury of truth that has been entrusted to us [2 Timothy 1:14]. Facing a new century, Southern Baptists must meet the demands and duties of the present hour.

New challenges to faith appear in every age. A pervasive anti-supernaturalism in the culture was answered by Southern Baptists in 1925, when the *Baptist Faith and Message* was first adopted by this Convention. In 1963, Southern Baptists responded to assaults upon the authority and truthfulness of the Bible by adopting revisions to the *Baptist Faith and Message*. The Convention added an article on “The Family” in 1998, thus answering cultural confusion with the clear teachings of Scripture. Now, faced with a culture hostile to the very notion of truth, this generation of Baptists must claim anew the eternal truths of the Christian faith.

Your committee respects and celebrates the heritage of the *Baptist Faith and Message*, and affirms the decision of the Convention in 1925 to adopt the *New Hampshire Confession of Faith*, “revised at certain points and with some additional articles growing out of certain needs” We also respect the important contributions of the 1925 and 1963 editions of the *Baptist Faith and Message*.

With the 1963 committee, we have been guided in our work by the 1925 “statement of the historic Baptist conception of the nature and function of confessions of faith in our religious and denominational life” It is, therefore, quoted in full as a part of this report to the Convention:

(1) That they constitute a consensus of opinion of some Baptist body, large or small, for the general instruction and guidance of our own people and others concerning those articles of the Christian faith which are most surely held among us. They are not intended to add anything to the simple conditions of salvation revealed in the New Testament, viz., repentance toward God and faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord.

(2) That we do not regard them as complete statements of our faith, having any quality of finality or infallibility. As in the past so in the future, Baptists should hold themselves free to revise their statements of faith as may seem to them wise and expedient at any time.

(3) That any group of Baptists, large or small, have the inherent right to draw up for themselves and publish to the world a confession of their faith whenever they may think it advisable to do so.

(4) That the sole authority for faith and practice among Baptists is the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments. Confessions are only guides in interpretation, having no authority over the conscience.

(5) That they are statements of religious convictions, drawn from the Scriptures, and are not to be used to hamper freedom of thought or investigation in other realms of life.

Baptists cherish and defend religious liberty, and deny the right of any secular or religious authority to impose a confession of faith upon a church or body of churches. We honor the principles of soul competency and the priesthood of believers, affirming together both our liberty in Christ and our accountability to each other under the Word of God.

Baptist churches, associations, and general bodies have adopted confessions of faith as a witness to the world, and as instruments of doctrinal accountability. We are not embarrassed to state before the world that these are doctrines we hold precious and as essential to the Baptist tradition of faith and practice.

As a committee, we have been charged to address the “certain needs” of our own generation. In an age increasingly hostile to Christian truth, our challenge is to express the truth as revealed in Scripture, and to bear witness to Jesus Christ, who is “*the Way, the Truth, and the Life.*”

The 1963 committee rightly sought to identify and affirm “certain definite doctrines that Baptists believe, cherish, and with which they have been and are now closely identified.” Our living faith is established upon eternal truths. “Thus this generation of Southern Baptists is in historic succession of intent and purpose as it endeavors to state for its time and theological climate those articles of the Christian faith which are most surely held among us.”

It is the purpose of this statement of faith and message to set forth certain teachings which we believe.

THE BAPTIST FAITH & MESSAGE

I. THE SCRIPTURES

The Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is God's revelation of Himself to man. It is a perfect treasure of divine instruction. It has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth, without any mixture of error, for its matter. Therefore, all Scripture is totally true and trustworthy. It reveals the principles by which God judges us, and therefore is, and will remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and religious opinions should be tried. All Scripture is a testimony to Christ, who is Himself the focus of divine revelation.

III. MAN

IV. SALVATION

Salvation involves the redemption of the whole man, and is offered freely to all who accept Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour, who by His own blood obtained eternal redemption for the believer. In its broadest sense salvation includes regeneration, justification, sanctification, and glorification. There is no salvation apart from personal faith in Jesus Christ as Lord.

A. Regeneration, or the new birth, is a work of God's grace whereby believers become new creatures in Christ Jesus. It is a change of heart wrought by the Holy Spirit through conviction of sin, to which the sinner responds in repentance toward God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. Repentance and faith are inseparable experiences of grace.

Repentance is a genuine turning from sin toward God. Faith is the acceptance of Jesus Christ and commitment of the entire personality to Him as Lord and Saviour.

B. Justification is God's gracious and full acquittal upon principles of His righteousness of all sinners who repent and believe in Christ. Justification brings the believer unto a relationship of peace and favor with God.

C. Sanctification is the experience, beginning in regeneration, by which the believer is set apart to God's purposes, and is enabled to progress toward moral and spiritual maturity through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit dwelling in him. Growth in grace should continue throughout the regenerate person's life.

D. Glorification is the culmination of salvation and is the final blessed and abiding state of the redeemed.

V. GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE

Election is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates, justifies, sanctifies, and glorifies sinners. It is consistent with the free agency of man, and comprehends all the means in connection with the end. It is the glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, and is infinitely wise, holy, and unchangeable. It excludes boasting and promotes humility.

All true believers endure to the end. Those whom God has accepted in Christ, and sanctified by His Spirit, will never fall away from the state of grace, but shall persevere to the end. Believers may fall into sin through neglect and temptation, whereby they grieve the Spirit, impair their graces and comforts, and bring reproach on the cause of Christ and temporal judgments on themselves; yet they shall be kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

VI. THE CHURCH

A New Testament church of the Lord Jesus Christ is an autonomous local congregation of baptized believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; observing the two ordinances of Christ, governed by His laws, exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word, and seeking to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth. Each congregation operates under the Lordship of Christ through democratic processes. In such a congregation each member is responsible and accountable to Christ as Lord. Its scriptural officers are pastors and deacons. While both men and women are gifted for service in the church, the office of pastor is limited to men as qualified by Scripture.

The New Testament speaks also of the church as the Body of Christ which includes all of the redeemed of all the ages, believers from every tribe, and tongue, and people, and nation.

VII. BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. It is an act of obedience symbolizing the believer's faith in a crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, the believer's death to sin, the burial of the old life, and the resurrection to walk in newness of life in Christ Jesus. It is a testimony to his faith in the final resurrection of the dead. Being a church ordinance, it is prerequisite to the privileges of church membership and to the Lord's Supper.

The Lord's Supper is a symbolic act of obedience whereby members of the church, through partaking of the bread and the fruit of the vine, memorialize the death of the Redeemer and anticipate His second coming.

VIII. THE LORD'S DAY

The first day of the week is the Lord's Day. It is a Christian institution for regular observance. It commemorates the resurrection of Christ from the dead and should include exercises of worship and spiritual devotion, both public and private. Activities on the Lord's Day should be commensurate with the Christian's conscience under the Lordship of Jesus Christ.

IX. THE KINGDOM

The Kingdom of God includes both His general sovereignty over the universe and His particular kingship over men who willfully acknowledge Him as King. Particularly the Kingdom is the realm of salvation into which men enter by trustful, childlike commitment to Jesus Christ. Christians ought to pray and to labor that the Kingdom may come and God's will be done on earth. The full consummation of the Kingdom awaits the return of Jesus Christ and the end of this age.

X. LAST THINGS

God, in His own time and in His own way, will bring the world to its appropriate end. According to His promise, Jesus Christ will return personally and visibly in glory to the earth; the dead will be raised; and Christ will judge all men in righteousness. The unrighteous will be

consigned to Hell, the place of everlasting punishment. The righteous in their resurrected and glorified bodies will receive their reward and will dwell forever in Heaven with the Lord.

XI. EVANGELISM AND MISSIONS

It is the duty and privilege of every follower of Christ and of every church of the Lord Jesus Christ to endeavor to make disciples of all nations. The new birth of man's spirit by God's Holy Spirit means the birth of love for others. Missionary effort on the part of all rests thus upon a spiritual necessity of the regenerate life, and is expressly and repeatedly commanded in the teachings of Christ. The Lord Jesus Christ has commanded the preaching of the gospel to all nations. It is the duty of every child of God to seek constantly to win the lost to Christ by verbal witness undergirded by a Christian lifestyle, and by other methods in harmony with the gospel of Christ.

XII. EDUCATION

Christianity is the faith of enlightenment and intelligence. In Jesus Christ abide all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge. All sound learning is, therefore, a part of our Christian heritage. The new birth opens all human faculties and creates a thirst for knowledge. Moreover, the cause of education in the Kingdom of Christ is co-ordinate with the causes of missions and general benevolence, and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches. An adequate system of Christian education is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people.

In Christian education there should be a proper balance between academic freedom and academic responsibility. Freedom in any orderly relationship of human life is always limited and never absolute. The freedom of a teacher in a Christian school, college, or seminary is limited by the pre-eminence of Jesus Christ, by the authoritative nature of the Scriptures, and by the distinct purpose for which the school exists.

XIII. STEWARDSHIP

God is the source of all blessings, temporal and spiritual; all that we have and are we owe to Him. Christians have a spiritual debtorship to the whole world, a holy trusteeship in the gospel, and a binding stewardship in their possessions. They are therefore under obligation to serve Him with their time, talents, and material possessions; and should recognize all these as entrusted to them to use for the glory of God and for helping others. According to the Scriptures, Christians

should contribute of their means cheerfully, regularly, systematically, proportionately, and liberally for the advancement of the Redeemer's cause on earth.

XIV. COOPERATION

Christ's people should, as occasion requires, organize such associations and conventions as may best secure cooperation for the great objects of the Kingdom of God. Such organizations have no authority over one another or over the churches. They are voluntary and advisory bodies designed to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of our people in the most effective manner. Members of New Testament churches should cooperate with one another in carrying forward the missionary, educational, and benevolent ministries for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Christian unity in the New Testament sense is spiritual harmony and voluntary cooperation for common ends by various groups of Christ's people. Cooperation is desirable between the various Christian denominations, when the end to be attained is itself justified, and when such cooperation involves no violation of conscience or compromise of loyalty to Christ and His Word as revealed in the New Testament.

XV. THE CHRISTIAN AND THE SOCIAL ORDER

All Christians are under obligation to seek to make the will of Christ supreme in our own lives and in human society. Means and methods used for the improvement of society and the establishment of righteousness among men can be truly and permanently helpful only when they are rooted in the regeneration of the individual by the saving grace of God in Jesus Christ. In the spirit of Christ, Christians should oppose racism, every form of greed, selfishness, and vice, and all forms of sexual immorality, including adultery, homosexuality, and pornography. We should work to provide for the orphaned, the needy, the abused, the aged, the helpless, and the sick. We should speak on behalf of the unborn and contend for the sanctity of all human life from conception to natural death. Every Christian should seek to bring industry, government, and society as a whole under the sway of the principles of righteousness, truth, and brotherly love. In order to promote these ends Christians should be ready to work with all men of good will in any good cause, always being careful to act in the spirit of love without compromising their loyalty to Christ and His truth.

XVI. PEACE AND WAR

It is the duty of Christians to seek peace with all men on principles of righteousness. In accordance with the spirit and teachings of Christ they should do all in their power to put an end to war.

The true remedy for the war spirit is the gospel of our Lord. The supreme need of the world is the acceptance of His teachings in all the affairs of men and nations, and the practical application of His law of love. Christian people throughout the world should pray for the reign of the Prince of Peace.

XVII. RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

God alone is Lord of the conscience, and He has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to His Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to every church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Civil government being ordained of God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to the civil power to carry on its work. The gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its ends. The state has no right to impose penalties for religious opinions of any kind. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal, and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

XVIII. THE FAMILY

God has ordained the family as the foundational institution of human society. It is composed of persons related to one another by marriage, blood, or adoption.

Marriage is the uniting of one man and one woman in covenant commitment for a lifetime. It is God's unique gift to reveal the union between Christ and His church and to provide for the man and the woman in marriage the framework for intimate companionship, the channel of sexual expression according to biblical standards, and the means for procreation of the human race.

The husband and wife are of equal worth before God, since both are created in God's image. The marriage relationship models the way God relates to His people. A husband is to love his wife as Christ loved the church. He has the God-given responsibility to provide for, to protect, and to lead his family. A wife is to submit herself graciously to the servant leadership of her husband even as the church willingly submits to the headship of Christ. She, being in the image of God as is her husband and thus equal to him, has the God-given responsibility to respect her husband and to serve as his helper in managing the household and nurturing the next generation.

Children, from the moment of conception, are a blessing and heritage from the Lord. Parents are to demonstrate to their children God's pattern for marriage. Parents are to teach their children spiritual and moral values and to lead them, through consistent lifestyle example and loving discipline, to make choices based on biblical truth. Children are to honor and obey their parents.

CHURCH-STATE RELATIONS

OUR HISTORIC CONCEPT OF RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

Democracy itself is rooted in the assumption that man is capable of making the choices needed for governance of his own life and his social institutions. This assumption is based in turn on the Christian concept that man is essentially a spiritual being; and only through the responses of his spiritual nature can he relate himself to God and thus rise above his animal limitations. But only one who is free can make a genuine response to God. Religious freedom is, therefore, antecedent to the creation of civil and political freedom, which constitutes the nature of democracy.

Historically, Baptists have been aggressive advocates of absolute freedom of conscience for all men. In England and Colonial America they led in formulating the concept of church-state separation. The power of government then was arbitrary and absolute, backed by an established church, the two often working in collusion to give mutual support to each other. The established church forced its doctrine and modes of worship upon all, with government lending use of its power to punish dissenters. Thus protected and supported, the established church itself was a strong political force. When joined to protect and expand their mutual vested interests, the two constituted a powerful political combine, perpetuating their power through forcing conformity in worship and stamping out dissent.

Baptists believed that this denied to man the right to live as God had willed that he live, a free and self-determining being. It destroyed an individual's liberty of the spirit, freedom of conscience, right of choice - in short, all that made a man a man, according to the Baptist conception. It was in the context of these experiences that Baptists evolved their unique conception of complete separation of the two in their respective operations.

During the evolution of the separation concept their focus of concern was always to protect the individual, Baptist or not, in the free exercise of his religious conscience, always, of course, within the context of the Christian concept of life dedicated to ministering to and serving the needs of people - whether family, neighbor or stranger. Just so on the present issue. Louisiana Baptists recognize, as Jesus indicated to Peter on the mountain top, that their place is down there in the valley where the people are - teaching, healing, serving. We are free, not to enjoy release from the demands of life, but to carry out the work of our Lord on the streets of life where men work, learn, and suffer.

GUIDELINES

This committee was appointed essentially "to recommend guidelines for policy implementation" concerning institutional use of governmental funds. In actuality, the Louisiana Baptist Convention has by its practice already adopted a general policy of selective participation in government programs, wherever it was felt there was no impingement on the institution's independence. It is the element of "selectivity" in this policy that makes it essential, for the guidance of all concerned - the Convention officers and the trustees and administrators of the institution. Out of its deliberations, the committee has identified certain statements of general principle which appear to offer valid guidelines for those responsible for institutional decision making.

First: The Institution Should Identify and Clarify Its Basic Purposes.

Through continuing study and open discussion, the administrators, staff, and representatives of the governing board should develop a clear-cut understanding of the basic nature and purposes of the institution. This should be reduced to writing and circulated regularly among all related in any way with the institution.

This study should become an ongoing process of constant re-evaluation in light of our constantly changing social and technological demands. To provide leadership for this is a function of the executive officer.

Second: Any Assistance That Creates a Limitation on or Diversion From These Purposes Should Not Be Permitted.

Once the institutional staff and its constituency are clear in their concept of the institution's nature and primary purposes, all limitations or diversions, financial or otherwise, should be avoided.

Third: Acceptance of Government Grants.

No grant to the institution from any government agency shall be accepted. A grant shall be construed to be any transfer of funds or property for which the institution does not give adequate consideration.

Fourth: The Institution Must Retain Its Own Integrity In the Matter of Control.

In considering whether to seek or accept funds of any type, the institution must determine whether any part of the agreement provides for governmental control of the institution's affairs - except for normal accounting procedure for the shared funds.

The institution must retain the right to determine what religious activities will be held on the premises. The Trustees of the institution and their staff must have freedom to operate in accordance with principles and policies inherent in good programs and not on the expediency of politics.

Fifth: Participation Relationships Must be Voluntary, With Clear-Cut Terminal Arrangements.

In participating in government programs, the relationship should be voluntary on both sides, with either party able to terminate the agreement when it appears desirable. The agreement should indicate clearly the point at which the participating institution has fulfilled its obligation in the contract.

Sixth: The Institution Must Not Become Dependent on These Funds for Program Operation.

The trustees should not permit acceptance of funds in any area of program to such an extent that the institution becomes so dependent on outside funds that it would suffer unduly if they were discontinued.

Seventh: The Institution Must Protect the Integrity of Its Basic Programs.

The trustees must guard against any tendency on the part of the institution to become so involved with government programs that the institutional programs begin to grow around the emphasis on this public phase of its work to the neglect of its private sector.

Eighth: The Institution Must Not Accept Funds That Relate to Teaching of Religion.

The trustees should not accept any governmental funds that might in any way come to influence the way in which religion is taught or the word of God spread in the institution.

Ninth: The Institution's Trustees Should Have a Large Degree of Freedom in Decision-making In These Operational Matters.

After the Convention has adopted a definite statement of policy guidelines, it should give the institutional trustees a large degree of freedom, within the guidelines, to formulate programs and make decisions affecting the ongoing program in this area as in others. With appropriate reporting through the established channels, the trustees will keep the Convention informed on their program decisions. Only so can the Convention and the trustees perform their respective roles with integrity.

The proper function of the Convention is to establish over-all policy directions. That of the trustees and their administrators is to develop and implement programs for the individual institutions within the framework of these established policy statements.

14. Jamie Dew, President, New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, led in the first Bible Study using Philippians 3:1-11 as his text.
15. Committee on Credentials Chairman, Jason Walsworth, announced 342 messengers registered as of 9:07 a.m.
16. Reggie Bridges called for nominations for Louisiana Baptist Convention President.
17. Tommy Middleton, messenger, Jefferson, Baton Rouge, nominated David Goza, pastor, Jefferson, Baton Rouge, as LBC President.
18. Reggie Bridges called for other nominations. There were no other nominees.
19. In compliance with Article VIII, Section 2, of the LBC Constitution, LBC Secretary/Treasurer, Steve Horn, cast a unanimous ballot for David Goza as President of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.

42. Former Executive Director, David Hankins, led in a time of prayer for Philip and Sandy Robertson.
43. Executive Director, Steve Horn began his report with a video promoting the 100th Anniversary of the Cooperative Program which will be celebrated at the SBC meeting in Dallas in 2025. He expressed appreciation to Pastor Fred Luter and the church for their graciousness in hosting the Annual Meeting. Dr. Horn further expressed appreciation to the State Missions Services staff for all their diligent work for the Annual Meeting and LBC President Reggie Bridges for his guidance in this meeting and throughout the year. He also recognized Stacy Morgan upon his retirement. Dr. Horn continued his report celebrating the 175th Anniversary of Louisiana Baptists and informing messengers of the church insurance crisis facing Louisiana Baptist churches. He stated that in times of crisis, we need to remind ourselves that there is a kingdom which cannot be shaken. Using Hebrews 12:25-29 as his text, he reminded messengers that we ought to be responding as recipients of a kingdom that can never be shaken. We should let our worship go up, let the word of God come in, and let our witness go out.

45. Fred Luter, pastor, Franklin Avenue, New Orleans, preached the Convention Sermon using Philippians 3:12-14 as his text.
46. James Pritchard, pastor, First, Lafayette, led in the benediction and session one adjourned at 11:32 a.m.

52. Louisiana Baptist Foundation Executive Director, Jeff Steed, presented the Louisiana Baptist Foundation report. Dr. Steed highlighted and shared a brief overview of his current staff. He updated messengers on the LBF Vision 200 and reported that \$31.6M since July 2020. Steed concluded his report with a video highlighting the services offered by the Louisiana Baptist Foundation.
53. Reggie Bridges called for questions regarding the Louisiana Baptist Foundation report.
54. Paul Watts, messenger, Emmanuel, Ruston, led in a time of special prayer for Ruston and the campus of Louisiana Tech in light of the recent violence on campus.
55. LBC First Vice President, Chad Gilbert, assumed the chair.
56. The Praise and Worship Team from Temple, Ruston, led in special music.
57. Reggie Bridges presented the President's Address using Hebrews 12:1-2 as his text.
58. President Reggie Bridges assumed the chair following his address.
59. Louisiana Christian University President, Rick Brewer, presented the Louisiana Christian University Report. Dr. Brewer reminded messengers of the mission and vision statements. Dr. Brewer announced the Next Gen Worship Collaborative for February 23-24, 2024, to be held on the campus of LCU. He also announced the next college preview day for March 9, 2024, and encouraged messengers to send and bring students.

BUSINESS AND INFORMATION SERVICES TEAM

Dale D. Lingenfelter, Director

The Business and Information Services Team serves as a support group for all the work of the LBC State Missions Services. The team provides expertise in the areas of financial accounting, information technology, facilities maintenance, office services, and human resources as well as providing hosting and program services for conferences and camps through Tall Timbers. Our goal is to enhance and support the work of all LBC Teams, so they accomplish the missions and ministry goals of the Convention.

In addition to coordinating the Annual Church Profile (ACP) process for the state, Shana Johnson serves as **Information Services** Support Manager and is responsible for the overall information technical support systems of the Convention and provides assistance to several state entities that are housed within the Baptist Building. In cooperation with other SBC state conventions and national SBC entities, Information Services has been instrumental in developing an online database of all SBC congregations and leadership. This program has become the national database for all SBC congregations and all SBC entities, both state and national. The database consists of all information collected through the ACP each year, as well as information directly communicated to the office. All information is retained to maintain historical, statistical, and leadership information for each reporting congregation. Through her team’s effort along with assistance from the entire State Mission Services Staff, ACP reporting of all Louisiana Baptist congregations maintains an above average reporting percentage within the SBC network of congregations.

The LBC **Accounting Team** provides competent tax and accounting information to Louisiana Baptist churches. In addition to supporting the finances of State Missions Services, we assist with questions on Budgeting, Accounting, Payroll Taxes, and Church Accounting issues. We are here to help you! Our contact information can be found on the LBC website. In addition, consistent with prior years, the Louisiana Baptist Convention received an excellent review on our Annual Audit Report.

Tall Timbers finished 2022 having bounced back fully since the 2020 pandemic. The summer of 2022 was record-breaking in camper attendance and in spiritual decisions made by campers. The properties committee of the Executive Board approved plans for a new swimming pool which will be built after summer of 2023, replacing the existing pool, which was an original structure from the time the campground opened. We have seen an increase in adult church retreats, largely thought to be a result of renovations to Lee Lodge hotel rooms. We anticipate more needs in the future for our increasing number of guests as God continues to move in the lives of those at Tall Timbers.

The Business and Information Services Team considers all its various areas of support work as ministry unto the Lord. We count it a privilege to serve our Lord by serving our colleagues and Louisiana Baptists in the work of reaching Louisiana for Christ and strengthening our churches.

BAPTIST COLLEGIATE MINISTRY

Mark Robinson, Director

This year we have emphasized “calling out the called” by identifying, training, and mobilizing college students that have heard the call of the Lord to serve Him in vocational ministry. This includes training students in leadership skills, evangelism, missions, and preaching. While reaching over 35,000 Louisiana college students through BCM, 1,532 students were involved in intentional discipleship training last year with 249 students leading groups. We had 615 students who served on mission, and 484 were in leadership training. From these, 101 of them have recognized the call to serve in vocational ministry. You can direct your young leaders to a website we have designed to help them navigate their way through the process of training and identifying a place of service. Go to www.calledtoministry.org.

Fifty student Baptist Collegiate Ministry ambassadors from campuses across the state served at the 2023 Southern Baptist Convention as registration representatives, ushers, and greeters. There was a universally positive response from the students. They enjoyed seeing the inner workings of the election process and exhibitors. One student made a profession of faith in Christ through relationships he made there, and two young men were called to ministry.

Our GOLA VBS program has expanded to involve five one-week VBS teams and one six-week team serving in Louisiana. The Wyoming VBS/Camp team served this summer all over the state and did very well inspiring a request from the Montana Baptist convention for another team that will serve there next summer. The teams served 37 churches seeing 40 first professions of faith in Christ.

Finally, BCM is championing a ministry that helps churches mobilize students from their youth group that are exploring the possibility of serving as missionaries to their high school campus. This effort has been crafted by youth and college leaders with extensive experience from across the nation. You can look into this by going to www.studentmissionary.com.

COMMUNICATIONS TEAM

Who are we talking to?

Communication is crucial for every aspect of life. Communication becomes more effective when it considers the intended audience. So, who you're talking to will shape the type and frequency of your communication.

The Communications Team focuses on two audiences. The internal audience and the external audience. The internal audience includes the various teams that comprise Louisiana Baptists (State Missions Services) and the churches. Specific platforms and tools are utilized that will hopefully connect with these audiences.

In 2022, some of the communication tools we utilized to connect with our internal audiences included email, social media, websites, videos, and targeted print pieces. Below is a quick summary:

- We sent e-newsletters to over 9,000 subscribers each week.
- We generated 539 Facebook posts resulting in a reach of 914,000 people.
- There were 118 Instagram posts that reached an additional 161,000 people.
- Twitter continues to be popular with more than 3,900 followers of @LaBaptists.
- LouisianaBaptists.org experienced over 246,000 page views and just under 5,000 downloads.
- We designed over 130 print projects that were either mailed or distributed during events.
- Over 110 new web/event pages were created for churches to learn about and sign up for upcoming events and opportunities.
- Seventy promotional videos and promotional spots were also produced to undergird these opportunities.

The Lord has blessed Louisiana Baptists with godly and talented team members who make all the above possible. Join me in giving thanks for Gavin Stevens, our Art Director and Webmaster, Steven Haney, our Production Manager, Kristina Henry, our Production Coordinator, Stacy Morgan, our Associate for Cooperative Program and Stewardship, and Leanne Treme, our Administrative Assistant.

Our second audience is the external audience. These are people who do not attend anyone's church. Some might refer to them as the "nones." We believe we have a divine charge to communicate God's good news to people we may never meet or may never attend a Louisiana Baptist Church. They are headed for a Christless eternity separated from God. Only God's truth can set them free and change their eternal destination.

Our current communication strategy for this audience is Here for You. This multi-platform, multi-media approach strives to creatively and consistently seed God's truth into the hearts and homes of people across our state. In 2022, here is how God used you to accomplish this charge:

- Over 90% of TV households were touched during the weeks the commercials aired on broadcast TV.
- An average of 110,000 people were reached monthly via social media.
- Streaming services reached an average of over 53,000 people every month.
- There were over 6,400 views of the online Gospel presentation.
- 884 people indicated a decision for Christ via our partnership with the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association.

We are grateful for the seeds of God's truth being scattered. God promises some of the seeds will find good soil and produce a robust harvest. Join me in praying for laborers to gather what God has prepared. Jesus said the harvest is plentiful, but He never said it would be delivered. It has to be gathered.

Louisiana Baptists, we're scattering the seed. Let's complete the task by going out and gathering the promised harvest.

EVANGELISM AND CHURCH GROWTH TEAM

Keith Manuel, Director

This past year's Evangelism Conference hosted by First, West Monroe focused on personal evangelism. Next year ECON will be January 22-23, 2024. Our host is Temple, Ruston, and we will focus on missional evangelism.

Sean Keith is your Sunday School, Discipleship, and Revitalization Strategist. First, Lafayette hosted last year's ReGroup and included a Spanish language track with an attendance of approximately 400. In addition, 300 people received small group training around the state. Fresh Start, our strategy for helping churches that need some form of revitalization, continues to connect with Pastors and churches. ReGroup was held at Jefferson, Baton Rouge, August 12, 2023. In 2024, ReGroup's locations are First, Moss Bluff, August 24, 2024, and Cypress, Benton, August 10, 2024.

Your Adult Ministries and Church Administration Strategist is Jeff Ingram. He coordinated the Senior Adult luncheon at ECON, which included over 400 participants. He also led meetings across the state for the Louisiana Association of Baptist Ministry Assistants, January Bible Study Previews, and the Bi-Vocational Ministers' Banquet. His work in Church Administration is mainly in consultations with churches/associations that cover the following areas: Pastor/Staff Salary Breakdowns; IRS Compliance; Best Practices for Church Finance Committees; Church/Associational By-Laws; Code of Ethics for Ministerial Staff; Church Staff Job Descriptions; and Sexual Harassment & Abuse.

Brandon Lewis serves as your Youth Consultant through YEC of 2024. The Youth Evangelism Celebration (YEC) ministered to over 5,300 youth and adults. Over 830 students made spiritual decisions. Summer camps at Tall Timbers saw an attendance of approximately 1,200 teens gathering for worship, equipping, and fun. Over 175 students made decisions for the Lord, with 20 responding to a call to ministry. In addition to the spiritual decisions made at camps and YEC, students learned how to share their faith and returned home equipped to impact others with the Gospel. Over 6,500 students learned how to share their faith or personal testimony to share the Good News. We are praying for a great YEC, November 19-20, 2023, at the Rapides Coliseum in Alexandria.

Serving as your Children's Ministry Strategist is David Anderson. This year our children's camps at Tall Timbers had an attendance of over 1,200. We had 120 children make professions of faith and gave \$10,000 to missions. VBS trainings allowed approximately 500 workers to learn how to lead their congregations through the most effective evangelistic outreach across the SBC. David also assists our churches with the State Bible Drill, Childhood Education Workshops, and a statewide retreat for Children's Ministers. The Evangelism & Church Growth Team loves to serve you by training your leaders and church members in evangelism, discipleship, administration, and age-group ministries. MISSIONS AND MINISTRY TEAM

James Jenkins, Director

Reaching Louisiana for Jesus is the primary goal of the Missions and Ministry Team of the Louisiana Baptist Convention. Church Planting, Compassion Ministries, Baptist Men/Disaster Relief, Women's Missions and Ministry, Mission Builders, and Partnership Missions all focusing their attention on helping our churches to build a culture of evangelism in Louisiana. Below you will find the reports from every area of our work.

Church Planting

Lane Corley, Carlos Schmidt, Jeff Cook

The Louisiana Baptist Executive Board voted in May 2023 to strengthen the state convention's relationship with the North American Mission Board's (NAMB) Send Network. As of August 1st, 2023, the state's church planting platform is now Send Network Louisiana. The convention joined 25 other state conventions and 32 Send Cities as part of the Send Network.

The vision of the Send Network is to see God's kingdom expand, over the next decade, through churches planting churches that will collectively evangelize and baptize at least one percent of the lost population of North America.

The Church Planting team is comprised of Lane Corley, our new SEND Network Louisiana Director, Carlos Schmidt, Language Church Planting and Partnership Missions Strategist, and Jeff Cook, Non-Traditional Church Planting Strategist.

Our church planting team entered the new SEND Network partnership with NAMB after successfully utilizing an associational strategy called 10-3-1 to plant 301 new congregations from 2010 to 2022. New congregations were planted in over 100 cities and towns. Over 16,000 people have found Christ in these churches, and today 10% of all worshippers in SBC churches in our state worship in a church planted or replanted since 2010.

Church planting has helped Louisiana Baptists to reach people groups including Anglo, African American, Vietnamese, Burmese, Chinese, Korean, Haitians, Eritrean, Arabic, Hispanic, and Portuguese.

Language Missions and Partnership Missions

Carlos Schmidt

In the past several years, we have used a simple church strategy in language church planting. In the past year, we conducted simple church training in Lafayette, Opelousas, and five separate locations in New Orleans with a total attendance of 320.

Our simple church trainings prepared volunteers for the Crossover event before SBC. The results of Hispanic Crossover were: 405 volunteers, 1,942 people served, 676 gospel conversations, eighty people trusted Christ, 1,761 meals served, and 110 volunteers served in construction projects. There are three new traditional Hispanic Church plants being started in the New Orleans areas of Lakeshore and Michaud; one replant in Algiers; and three Asian works, Chinese in Baton Rouge and Slidell, and a Vietnamese work in Plaquemine.

Partnership Missions was instrumental in mobilizing churches to Senegal, Colombia, Mexico, and Spain. Current partnerships still include Haiti, Belarus, Brazil, Puerto Rico, Piedras Negras, Mexico, Cape Bretton Island Canada, Yucatan Mexico, Indonesia, Senegal, London, Colombia, and Madrid. Louisiana Baptists also hosted a Hispanic Mobilization Conference at Tall Timbers with an attendance of 120 participants.

Compassion Ministries

Jeffrey Cook

Compassion Ministry seeks to: 1) Meet needs, 2) Build Trust, 3) Share the Gospel, and 4) Connect people to the local church. Compassion ministry is evangelism through such strategies as ESL (English as a Second Language), Christmas Backpack Ministry, Drug Recovery, and food pantries.

Jeff continues to develop his team of Association Compassion Missionaries (ACM) in several associations across the state. Each ACM is tasked to lead and start new compassion ministries.

One major Compassion Ministry goal is to have a multi-function Compassion led Non-Traditional Church Plant in every major city. We now have these types of churches started and sustained in New Orleans and Shreveport. We have added two Drug Recovery Ministries/Church Plants in both Gilbert and West Monroe, LA. Churches that are closing in rural areas are being replanted with compassion ministries and non-traditional church plants.

The Compassion Ministry web page is being revamped with a Compassion Ministry Readiness Tool, inspiring videos from compassion leaders and free how-to pages for starting Compassion Ministry.

In the past year, Jeff has led training for Police and Fire Chaplains, Lay Church Planting, and coaches for church planters.

Men's Ministries and Disaster Relief

Stanley Statham

Since our last report, Louisiana has suffered multiple severe thunderstorms and tornadoes in several areas of the state. We have deployed chainsaw teams, chaplains, our quick response feeding unit, and shower trailers to multiple locations. Additionally, LA DR deployed to Naples, FL last summer and joined with TBM (Texas Baptist Men) to run one of the major DR Sites for almost six weeks. The site included shower/laundry units, IMT (Incident Management Team), chainsaw teams, mud out teams, chaplains, and LA's largest feeding unit (Rolling Hills).

We are currently developing a training program for our DR Training leaders. The goal is to develop a "Training Cadre" equipped with the tools to provide the best training possible for our volunteers. We are expanding the training possibilities through online training, in-person training, and hybrid courses.

The Disaster Relief Rebuild Ministry continues to grow. We currently are focusing on the Point Aux Chenes area which is predominantly an American Indian tribe. Former IMB missionaries, Marvin and Debbie Savoie are serving as our on-site coordinators who coordinate volunteer rebuild teams. They are also building relationships in the community which has impacted Live Oak Baptist Church, an LBC church that has seen its first baptisms in four years.

Volunteer Mobilization and Mission Builders

Mark Morelock & Mark Jelks

This year has been another great year for the Louisiana Baptists Mission Builder program. We again had a great response of volunteers to assist with the labor of church building projects within our state.

We have hosted many volunteers in coordination with churches and their membership supporting and working alongside one another. We have seen three projects completed during this time, as well as three on-going projects which include one mission church project at 93% completion.

We recently broke ground on a new project and have another new mission church project scheduled to start this winter. In addition to the current project load, there are several mission church projects and church growth opportunities in the planning phases.

One of the highlights was the dedication of Immanuel Community Church in New Orleans in June. Although the project was filled with many challenges, the church is now operating in a vital location for reaching the city for Jesus. There had not been a church at this location since Hurricane Katrina, but now the neighborhood is welcoming a Louisiana Baptists presence once again.

We are looking forward to more project dedications and to another great year of service to our Louisiana Baptists partners. We are excited to continue supporting the advancement of the Gospel and Kingdom building through our Mission Builder program.

Women's Missions and Ministry

Christine Gill & Erin Jones

Women's Missions and Ministry (WMM) events are thriving in 2022-2023. We are excited to share how God is using Louisiana Baptist women to serve in and minister throughout our state.

Embrace, the annual WMM conference for all Louisiana Baptist women, was held in April 2023 at FBC Natchitoches, and 226 women attended. This event will be held in April 2024 at FBC New Orleans. **Embrace** 2024 will celebrate the 125th anniversary of WMU in Louisiana!

In June 2023, Louisiana WMM hosted National WMU for its annual **WMU Missions Adventure and Celebration**, which occurred in conjunction with the Southern Baptist Convention annual meeting in New Orleans.

Two **Women Who Lead** training events are scheduled in Northwest (Shreveport) and Eastern/BAGBR (Denham Springs) Associations before the end of 2023. Last year, **Women Who Lead** events trained women in District 8 (Natchitoches), Northeast (West Monroe), Northshore/Washington (Franklinton), and Cenla (Ball).

WMM led Louisiana Baptist women to donate and pack over five-hundred gift boxes for incarcerated women in 2022. The Louisiana Correctional Institute for Women (LCIW) is allowing visitors to distribute giftboxes within the prison this year.

Ministers' Wives Retreat, a weekend of renewal and appreciation for our ministers' wives in the state, took place in October 2022. The retreat for 2023 is scheduled for October 20-21 at Tall Timbers.

Louisiana Baptist churches remained generous in their giving for 2022. Our prayer is to be joined by more mission giving churches in 2023.

The WMM team welcomed Erin Jones as the new Children & Youth Mission Education Strategist in January 2023. Erin led our camp efforts in 2023 where there were 356 in attendance for Children's Mission Camp and 280 in attendance for Mini MAC bringing the total attendance to 636. This number represents 31 different churches. Ten decisions were made to follow Christ along with one student who feels the call into missions. Eighteen college age students from BCMs around the state were hired and served as staff helping lead Bible studies and the different camp activities. Over \$1,500 was collected for the Georgia Barnette Missions Offering.

PASTORAL LEADERSHIP MINISTRY TEAM

As I continue in my third year with the convention I continue to focus and learn better the reason the Lord brought me to Louisiana Baptists. Essentially, I see my purpose as to LOVE, LISTEN, LEAD, and LIFT UP Louisiana Baptist pastors and churches.

Believing more so today that healthy pastors produce healthy churches, I will continue to intentionally focus on pastor wellness: emotional, financial, physical, relational, and spiritual. With that focus the Lord is showing me two specific avenues/paths to make this happen. 1) Helping Louisiana Baptist pastors have a good start in their call and in their church; 2) Helping Louisiana Baptist pastors stay true to their call and to stay longer at their church as God leads so.

- > **Deacon Training:** the New Testament ministry of the Deacon is a needed component for the pastor and church.
- > **New Pastor/Wife fellowship:** introduction to the State Missions Services Staff, the convention entities, and the Louisiana Baptist Convention building, for fellowship with other pastors and wives.

These resources are provided to help pastors stay longer:

- > **Pastor Appreciation month – October:** we all need encouragement from time to time and October helps us show love and appreciation to all our pastors.
- > **Pause Retreat:** weekend for pastors/wives at Tall Timbers Conference Center. A wonderful time of worship, teaching, and fellowship.
- > **Shepherd's Rest:** sabbatical for pastors to get away to refresh and renew.
- > **Granberry Counseling:** we are blessed and privileged to partner with the wonderful staff and counselors at Louisiana Baptist Children's Home & Family Ministers for this service.
- > **Church Conflict Summit:** 18% left a church due to church conflict; 13% for burnout, 12% poor fit with church. Conflict can be managed and dealt with Biblically.

Sexual Abuse Response Council (SARC) continues to provide new and updated resources to churches and individuals for all matters related to Sexual Abuse. Information is available at our website www.louisianabaptists.org – resources.

Singing Ministers & Singing Women: These volunteers gather each August to prepare for concerts in local churches, detention centers, youth intervention programs, and prisons. As they share their talents, they also share their faith. For more information visit LouisianaBaptists.org/pastors.

Louisiana Convention Programs – 62.87% of Total SBC and LBC Budget

Baptist Message.....398,972

The *Baptist Message* is the news journal of the Louisiana Baptist Convention with an average distribution of 45,000 (approximately 30,000 subscriptions). Its support is derived from subscriptions by churches and individuals, the Cooperative Program, and advertising.

Louisiana Baptist Children’s Home.....400,374

The Children’s Home exists to provide a program of Christian childcare. The goal is to equip each child with the life skills needed to make his/her contribution to society as an effective Christian citizen. LBCH receives support from gifts and grants, revenues from assets, designations from churches and church groups, the children’s home offering each spring, and the Cooperative Program..

Louisiana Baptist Foundation.....212,251

The Foundation is responsible for receiving, managing, and administering funds and properties on behalf of the Convention and its causes. It receives support from investments and the Cooperative Program.

Louisiana Christian University.....2,679,672

Louisiana Christian University, the only institution of higher education operated by Louisiana Baptists, engages in a program of providing instruction for candidates seeking undergraduate and graduate degrees. It receives support from the Cooperative Program, student fees, auxiliary enterprises, gifts and grants, dividends and interest, and special funding campaigns.

Convention Operating and State Mission Services.....7,675,985

This allocation provides resources for state missions and ministries as well as Convention operations. The Mission Services funding supports all of the Louisiana Baptists ministry teams that serve Louisiana Baptist churches. Missions and ministries include, but are not limited to, special projects, Baptist Collegiate Ministries, accounting, stewardship and Cooperative Program promotion resources, Sunday School/Discipleship, age-graded ministries, Disaster Relief ministries, Tall Timbers Conference Center, church administration, church planting, evangelism equipping, women’s missions and ministries, media outreach, and Convention operations.

LOUISIANA BAPTIST MESSAGE

Will Hall, Executive Editor

In 2023, Louisiana Baptists are celebrating 175 years of sharing the Gospel in the state, the nation and beyond. Meanwhile, the *Baptist Message* is celebrating 136 years as a partner in the harvest with Louisiana Baptists as the first entity of the Convention.

We continue to remain committed to reporting the Good News that defines the cooperative missions and ministries of Louisiana Baptists. Likewise, we are dedicated to telling the stories of congregations and individuals that offer to inspire and equip others.

In March, the *Baptist Message* had the good fortune to interview former Vice President Mike Pence, and we shared about this key Christian leader's prayerful search for a "clear sense of our calling" about the 2024 presidential campaign.

This summer, we had the special opportunity to work with the other 41 members of the Association of State Baptist Publications to provide coverage of the Southern Baptist Convention Annual Meeting, which was held in New Orleans.

We specifically helped coordinate coverage of the several related evangelistic initiatives that preceded the business meeting, including Crossover and the Serve Tour. Combined, these two major soul-winning initiatives fell short of the ambitious goal of 2,023 salvation decisions. But together, the two outreach initiatives recorded 336 souls won because of a weekend of block parties, door-to-door witnessing, prayer walks, compassion projects and other evangelistic efforts by 1,300 volunteers from 21 states. We helped Southern Baptists see the many changed lives among the 12,180 persons who were touched by this cooperative outreach, and the potential for even more spiritual miracles because of the 3,487 Gospel conversations that took place.

Our *Baptist Message* team published a special edition for the 2023 SBC Annual Meeting, highlighting the living legacy of soul-winning in our state with features about:

- Joseph Willis, who swam the Mississippi on the back of the mule to carry the Gospel to Louisiana;
- Georgia Barnette, who for 25 years urged Louisiana Baptists to engage in missions and ministries to reach our state;
- M.E. Dodd (FBC Shreveport), who was the catalyst behind the development of the Cooperative Program for the SBC and who personally baptized 7,000 converts to the faith; and
- Billy Graham's several crusades in the state, including on the campus of Louisiana College when he was a candidate for president of the school.

Importantly, the special edition also featured the pastors, evangelists, church planters and others who continue to keep alive this rich heritage of soul winning today.

During the May meeting of Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board, Executive Director Steve Horn announced the launch of the Send Network Louisiana church planting partnership with the North American Mission Board. The joint effort, which went into effect Aug. 1, will provide:

- four years of monthly supplements for Send Network church plants;
- five years of Send Network Planter Care (the North American Mission Board church planter spiritual and emotional care system);
- access to NAMB start-up grants and a year of free health insurance; and
- a \$1,000 retirement benefit through GuideStone for planters and their families.

Importantly, the emphasis of the church planting effort will be evangelism. Specifically, the goal will be to expand God's Kingdom in Louisiana by one percent through 2030, translating into 28,841 baptisms or about 125 new believers for each of 231 new churches.

The *Baptist Message* will prioritize coverage of this joint effort and how the partnership benefits church planting efforts in our state, as well as the progress of other elements of soul winning that will be put into place as Horn seeks to renew a "culture of evangelism" among Louisiana Baptists.

Finally, the *Baptist Message* is in a positive financial position, with our strong ad revenues and Cooperative Program support in 2023 supplemented by a \$51,000 Employee Retention Credit tax refund from the Internal Revenue Service.

OFFICE OF PUBLIC POLICY

Louisiana Baptists were highly successful in shaping the culture of our state through the work of the Office of Public Policy.

Messengers to the 2022 LBC Annual Meeting adopted four resolutions which addressed various moral issues and social concerns, and each of these were translated into public policies of the state. Additionally, the Office of Public Policy responded rapidly to two quickly developing issues, including the insurance crisis for churches across the state as well as a statewide ballot issue to

protect religious liberty.

Rep. Dodie Horton, a member with the First Baptist Church in Haughton, joined by Rep. Valerie Hodges as co-sponsor, championed House Resolution 14, which put into policy “RESOLUTION 1: ON THANKING GOD FOR THE SUPREME COURT’S PRO-LIFE RULING IN DOBBS V. JACKSON.” Consequently, each June will be recognized as “Sanctity of Preborn Life Month” in Louisiana.

House Bill 648, authored by Rep. Gabe Firment, a deacon with the First Baptist Church in Pollock was shaped in large part by “RESOLUTION 2: ON PROTECTING CHILDREN FROM PERMANENT HARM OF SEX CHANGE SURGERIES AND DRUGS.” Also known as the “Stop Harming Our Kids Act,” the legislation specifically prohibits doctors and therapists from performing sex change surgeries and prescribing puberty blockers and cross-sex hormones simply to change a child’s appearance from his or her biological sex. Additionally, the bill, which now will become law, Jan. 1, 2024, allows children victimized in this way to file a lawsuit up to the age of 30.

Sen. Beth Mizell, the president pro tempore of the Senate and a member with the First Baptist Church in Franklinton, shepherded Senate Resolution 96 through the legislative process to create a task force “to study acute and long-term adverse health events related to medical marijuana.” This aligns with “RESOLUTION 3: ON PROTECTING LOUISIANA’S YOUTH FROM THE HARMS OF MARIJUANA.”

Based on “RESOLUTION 4: ON A CHRISTIAN RESPONSE TO THOSE EXPERIENCING MENTAL, EMOTIONAL, RELATIONAL AND ADDICTION ISSUES,” HR71, drafted by Rep. Laurie Schlegel, establishes a subcommittee within the House Committee on Health and Welfare “to study the mental health crisis plaguing the citizens of Louisiana and the resources available to assist individuals with a mental health diagnosis in this state.” Already there have been three meetings of this panel (August, September and October).

In March, Steve Horn, executive director of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, reached out to the Office of Public Policy to share that churches were contacting the state missions office about insurance notices of nonrenewal and soaring premiums due to the four hurricanes of 2021-22. Church Mutual announced it was withdrawing from Louisiana below the I-10 corridor, and then out of the state altogether. Meanwhile, premiums with another major insurer soared, and a third company has been severely selective in what churches it picked up from among those congregations dropped by other companies.

Sen. Robert Mills, a member with the First Baptist Church in Bossier City, with co-sponsor Sen. Katrina Jackson, pushed through Senate Bill 147 which establishes a church self-insurance program. So, legal authority is in place to begin the program. However, the one-time seed money needed to set up the program was deleted from the budget bill, HB1. The Office of Public Policy is working with state and national leaders, as well as other possible sources, to find the necessary funds to get the authorized program up and running. The program will then be sustained via the premiums paid by churches and other faith-based organizations that join the cooperative, officially known as the “Louisiana Churches and Nonprofit Religious Organizations Self-Insured Fund.”

In the meantime, efforts have begun to collect church data to facilitate the creation of a statewide profile of property values and risks that will aid in the process of launching actual insurance coverage for churches who choose to participate. Once the information is compiled, catastrophic modeling will be completed to determine variables that will provide a framework for setting premiums and other elements of the program design. Then churches will be invited to participate in the voluntary program.

Importantly, Sen. Mizell successfully shepherded SB63, a religious liberty initiative, through the legislative process. The measure was listed as “Amendment 2” on statewide ballots and was passed with more than 79 percent of the vote, Oct. 14, 2023. Louisiana Baptists spearheaded an email campaign in September and October, coordinating with other denominations in the state, to urge people of faith to “Vote ‘yes’ on Amendment 2 to protect the freedom to worship.” In fact, the 805,669 favorable votes garnered by Amendment 2 surpassed the totals for any other issue or candidate on the statewide ballot in 2023. Our constitution now will be amended to add Section 17 to Article XII, declaring that the freedom of worship “is worthy of the highest protection” and requiring state courts, at the minimum, to apply “strict scrutiny” when examining any “contrary” governmental action regarding the freedom to worship.

The practical impact will be that in future statewide emergencies, churches cannot be shut down while bars and casinos stay open.

Meanwhile, the Office of Public Policy collaborated with pro-life forces to defeat HB 598 (by Rep. Candace Newell) and HB 549 (by Rep. Cedric Glover) which would have modified state pro-life laws to allow exceptions for rape and incest. Three other similar bills were subsequently tabled or otherwise killed through the legislative process. Likewise, HB 40, sponsored by Rep. Delisha Boyd, which would have established special rights based on sexual orientation and gender identity was defeated in committee.

Finally, the Office of Public Policy gave the only testimony against three bills which would have legalized recreational marijuana or otherwise set the stage for legalization. All three, HB 17, HB 24 and HB 612, written by Rep. Newell, were soundly voted down during the first committee hearing for each.

LOUISIANA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME AND FAMILY MINISTRIES

Dr. Perry Hancock, President and CEO

In its 124th year of ministry Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries continued its mission of providing love, care, and hope in Christ for children and families in need. The Children's Home provided a positive Christian witness through its residential child and family care programs, foster care and adoption ministries, Granberry Counseling Centers, Minister Care Residential program, Women's Learning Center, Compassion for Kids, and Orphans Embrace.

The Children's Home provided ministry services for over 6,800 children, families, and individuals. Through its on-campus and off-campus residential programs, 120 children and 30 homeless mothers were served. An additional 264 families received placement referral services.

Granberry Counseling Centers provided professional Christian counseling for 861 individuals. Through its Minister Care program, a partnership with the Louisiana Baptist Convention Pastoral Leadership division, Granberry provided counseling for 41 Louisiana Baptist minister families.

Women's Learning Center (formerly Christian Women's Job Corps) provided educational and job skills training for 34 women and support services for 126 additional women. The ministry maintained its adult education certification as an official HiSET training and testing site. Additional certifications including Paraprofessional Education and Banking Services were added to the curriculum. Each day, WLC staff lead the students in Bible study and prayer.

Through its Compassion for Kids ministry, the Children's Home served over 5,400 economically challenged children and family members. During the SBC Serve Tour in New Orleans and a church event in Monroe, 20,880 ready-to-cook meals and a gospel witness were provided for over 5,000 individuals.

The Children's Home also shared God's love in word and deed through its international orphan care ministry, Orphans Embrace. Eighteen children were served through Louisiana Reach Haiti. During the year, the children's village was relocated from Croix-des-Bouquets to Cap-Haitien.

Trustees approved a major expansion of Compassion for Kids for 2024. The expansion includes the construction of a 15,000 square foot Compassion Center in Monroe. The center will meet local needs and will provide products to other compassion ministries throughout the state. The ministry could provide a gospel witness for as many as 25,000 people annually.

In January of 2024, the Children's Home will celebrate its 125th Anniversary. Special events are planned throughout the year to recognize the impact Louisiana Baptists have made on the lives of children and families in need.

Louisiana Baptist churches once again provided support for the Children's Home through the Cooperative Program and the Annual Children's Home Sunday Offering. Churches also met the needs of the children and families through the Fall Food Roundup, VBS offerings, and other special projects.

As a result of the support from our churches and the witness provided by the various ministries of the Home, many children and family members experienced the joy of salvation in Christ. Others made new commitments to the Lord. Thank you, Louisiana Baptists, for meeting needs and changing lives in Jesus' name through your Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries.

Thank you, Louisiana Baptists, for the opportunity to partner in ministry. God is continuing to bless your Louisiana Baptist Foundation, and we are grateful. We ended 2022 with over \$229 million in assets under management that represents funds owned by Louisiana Baptist churches and other ministries, as well as gifts perpetually managed for Kingdom-impact. Every dollar generated on these funds represents another dollar to advance the Kingdom by spreading the Gospel.

The Foundation continues to execute its LBF Vision200™ strategic plan as it seeks to partner with churches and other ministries. We are driven to advance the Kingdom...*one dollar at a time, one ministry at a time, one life at a time*. The overall vision of this plan is to specifically advance the Kingdom through the Foundation's ministry by \$200 million over the next twenty years or less. Specifically, the Foundation will benefit the Kingdom through (1) facilitating planned gifts (example: non-cash gifts, estate gifts, charitable gift annuities, endowments, donor-advised funds, and other special gifts beyond cash) and (2) serving churches and other ministries with funds management, as well as other services to enhance their impact. As of the end of 2022, the Foundation's current Kingdom-impact amount achieved is \$19.5+ million towards the 20-year goal of achieving the \$200 million impact level.

To accomplish the goal of \$200 million over the next 20 years or less, the Foundation is focusing on four overall objectives:

(1) Planned Giving: The following are provided for a comprehensive planned giving emphasis:

- A. Providing educational content to churches such as the *Louisiana Legacy* publication to provide members with practical ways they can benefit their church beyond cash,
- B. Speaking in churches and other ministry organizations to educate constituents on being good stewards related to their estates,
- C. Providing an online platform for giving non-cash gifts to churches and ministries (www.Giving-Gateway.net),
- D. Having robust and comprehensive planned giving website content,
- E. Sending periodic communications to constituents,
- F. Providing confidential one-on-one meetings with prospective donors on benefiting the Kingdom,
- G. Encouraging individuals to have an impact on their family through their estates while also impacting the Kingdom through their estates,
- H. Having the infrastructure in place to facilitate the logistics of special gifts, and
- I. Providing an opportunity for every Louisiana Baptist to obtain a free basic Will document when at least tithing his/her estate to a church and/or other ministry.

(2) Church/Ministry Services: The Foundation helps churches and other ministries earn more money on their God-given funds for the sake of having more money to fulfill ministry purposes and to impact lives with the Gospel. As an example, the Short-Term Fund helps ministries by allowing them to earn more on their cash reserves and designated accounts than they would at a typical bank. In 2022, additional church-business related services were added through our emphasis, ChurchBiz Central™, to add value to churches and other ministries. These additional services include accounting services, a computer support line, and online giving services.

(3) Comprehensive Marketing Plan: The Foundation continues to have a comprehensive communication plan that utilizes multiple communication channels and platforms that focus on the Foundation's services to help advance the Kingdom.

(4) Operations: The Foundation will continue to have a well-skilled and well-experienced staff that seeks to provide churches and ministries with top-tier service to help those organizations further enhance their impact on the Kingdom.

Part of our mission at LCU is to ensure we tackle the current issues in today's secular culture. Rather than shy away from controversial—and downright evil—bombarding our youth in popular media, in school classrooms, and even in some churches, we strive to engage students in learning how to respond and react based on God's word. Christians must be able to stand up to sin.

This year LCU hosted well-known speakers who addressed Critical Race Theory, if God is good then why does evil exist, abortion, same-sex attraction, and America's founding values. We will not waiver in our responsibility to uphold godly values and train tomorrow's leaders on biblical ideals.

Today's students are tomorrow's parents, pastors, physicians, teachers, and leaders in industry. We must prepare them well.

It's been an incredibly busy year in the Ray and Dorothy Young School of Business.

The Jonathan E. Martin MBA program was officially dedicated in the fall, and its first students graduated in the May 2023 commencement.

The first Maggie Martin Marketplace Leadership Summit was held in April with the founder of Auntie Anne Pretzels, Anne Beiler, as the keynote speaker.

A \$1.25 million gift from Ellis and Heather Fowler to create the Mary Martin Fowler Endowed Chair in the JEM MBA program will allow expanded teaching, research and scholarship by attracting world-class faculty. They have also established a scholarship fund to attract top-notch Louisiana students to stay in Louisiana to attend the MBA program.

In addition, the Young School of Business has partnered with the Ron Blue Institute. This gives LCU business students a significant marketplace leadership advantage, as it allows them access to all the intellectual property and wisdom from Blue's 50 years as the most-respected leader nationally in biblical financial management.

LCU has also announced a fifth graduate program to start in August 2023. The Master of Strategic Leadership (MSL) will be housed within the Young School of Business and offers the opportunity for students with any undergraduate degree the opportunity to become leaders in their particular fields. Our other four graduate programs are the Master of Business Administration (MBA), Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT), Master of Education (MEd), and the Master of Social Work (MSW).

Nineteen LCU alumni were recognized as top educators in Rapides Parish School District. All earned degrees or educational credentials at the university, and we couldn't be prouder of them and how they represent the wonderful education at LCU.

LCU has announced the launch of the Louisiana Christian Scholars Academy for fall 2023. LCSA will allow high school students to earn an associate of arts degree in general studies by

the time they complete high school, while being taught by our university faculty from a biblical perspective. This also provides significant cost savings for college.

In athletics, our varsity student-athletes attained a cumulative GPA for the year of 3.04. This is a remarkable achievement. But LCU is even prouder of these students for receiving the Red River Athletic Conference Sportsmanship Award for the second year in a row. Knowing our student-athletes and our coaching staff are sharing our mission and vision in their sportsmanship on and off the playing field gives me great joy.

We continue to improve facilities and landscaping across campus. The Hattie B. Strother Dining Hall has had a complete makeover with up-to-date furnishings as well as dining options to accommodate students with dietary restrictions.

In addition, a beautiful and solemn addition to campus, the Joshua D. Perry Prayer Garden will be dedicated Tuesday, October 2.

We are grateful for the support from over 3,200 individuals and organizations providing more than \$50 million in unrestricted and restricted support since 2015.

Thank you all for your continued financial and spiritual support for LCU—its students, faculty, and staff. We could not do it without you.

COMMITTEE ON MORAL AND SOCIAL CONCERNS

Chad Gilbert, Chairman

The Committee on Moral and Social Concerns is tasked by Louisiana Baptists to address public policy matters of particular concern to our community of faith. Moreover, we are urged to speak out and even conduct campaigns to influence the outcome of current issues on which the Executive Board or the Convention have taken an official position.

In that regard, the Committee has been active this year in addressing key moral issues, social concerns as well as religious liberty matters.

SPRING MEETING

On April 18 we met in conjunction with the legislative briefing for about 200 pastors co-hosted by the LBC Office of Public Policy and the Louisiana Family Forum. Our committee members had the opportunity to be introduced to key government leaders and to hear from candidates for state offices.

During our working lunch we received updates about past Louisiana Baptist initiatives as well as the public policy goals for 2023. In particular, we learned that a nearly seven-year effort to protect children from the harms of online pornography had impacted the nation.

Indeed, Pornhub, the world's largest pornography website, altered its landing page, Jan. 1, 2023, to require age verification for the very first time, and it had a note stating, "Louisiana law now requires us to put in place a process for verifying the age of users who connect to our site from Louisiana." This unprecedented action resulted from Act 440 (which passed in 2022) that allows parents of children exposed to online pornography to sue big tech companies that do not implement age verification.

That law grew out of other legislative efforts (2017, HCR100 declared pornography a public health hazard; 2019, SCR56 established a task force under the state attorney general's office to recommend legislation to protect children from pornography) that had their origins in a 2015 resolution that began with our committee and was adopted by messengers: "RESOLUTION 4: ON PROTECTING CHILDREN FROM PORNOGRAPHY."

We were first in the nation to successfully attack the porn industry this way, and now at least five other states have followed our lead to pass similar legislation to protect children from online pornography.

LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES

We also learned about the legislative priorities of the LBC Office of Public Policy (developed from four resolutions that originated with our committee and were adopted by messengers to the 2022 LBC Annual Meeting): (1) designate June as "Sanctity of Preborn Life Month" (in celebration of the 2022 pro-life Supreme Court victory in *Dobbs v. Jackson*); (2) ban the abuse of children via so-called "sex change" surgeries and drugs; (3) require the Louisiana Department of Health to collect empirical data about the harmful effects of marijuana on Louisiana's youth; and (4) set up a legislative task force to investigate the totality of care through governments, businesses, churches and other non-profits to ensure no individual with a mental, emotional, relational or addiction issue is ever without the help he or she needs.

FALL MEETING

During our August 15 meeting, the CMSC crafted and submitted three resolutions that were adopted with minor changes by the Committee on Resolutions and presented to you this year:

- RESOLUTION 1: ON PARENTAL RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES responds to attempts by liberal activists to undermine parental authority in raising a child according to the parents' values and traditions, as well as moral, ethical and religious beliefs.
- RESOLUTION 2: ON PROTECTING CHILDREN'S INNOCENCE seeks to prevent the exposure of children to drag queen shows and other attempts to diminish childhood innocence.
- RESOLUTION 3: ON PROTECTING THE UNDERAGED FROM THE HARMS OF ALCOHOL calls for commonsense legislation that bans anyone under the age of 21 from entering bars and similar establishments, which too easily give these underaged persons easy access to alcohol even though federal and state laws prevent them from purchasing or possessing it.

COMMITTEE ON CONVENTION ORDER OF BUSINESS

Ronnie McLellan, Chairman

The Committee on Convention Order of Business met on April 27, 2023, at the LBC Baptist Building in Alexandria. This committee makes the following recommendations:

1. That the 2024 sermon be preached by Matthew James, Vice President of Enrollment at New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, New Orleans, Louisiana.
2. That Michael Wood, senior pastor, First Baptist Church, West Monroe, Louisiana, serve as the Alternate Preacher for the 2024 Convention.
3. That the venue for the 2025 Convention be the Randolph Riverfront Center, Alexandria, Louisiana.

That the agenda for this 176th annual meeting of Louisiana Baptist Convention be adopted as printed in the program and that the following proposed Convention Standing Rules be adopted:

Convention Standing Rules

1. The President shall be allowed to make minor changes in the agenda as may be necessary.
2. Nominating speeches for officers shall be limited to three (3) minutes each.
3. Debate on matters coming before the convention shall be limited to two speakers **for** and two speakers **against** for a period of up to three minutes each.
4. Persons addressing the Convention shall state their name and church.
5. No person addressing the Convention may speak more than twice on the same subject without unanimous consent.
6. The reports of the Committee on Nominations and the Committee on Committees be presented, followed by nominations from the floor, if any. Then the Committee nominees shall be voted on for election by the Convention. If the Committee nominees are not elected, then the vote on persons nominated from the floor shall follow immediately.
7. That a time for questions be provided following the reports of convention entities and the Executive Board.

CONVENTION COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Tom Harrison, Chairman

RESOLUTION 1: ON PARENTAL RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

WHEREAS, Marriage is the first institution established by God, modeled after the relationship of Christ and His Church (Genesis 2:24; Ephesians 5:31-32), and fundamental to the family which is a key construct on earth (Genesis 1:28) and in Heaven (John 1:12; Romans 8:15, 29; Galatians 3:26, 4:6-7); and

WHEREAS, God has indicated the importance of the relationship between parents and their child, specifically highlighting this special bond in His first instructions to Israel on how to be a people of God (Exodus 20: 3-17); and

WHEREAS, The Bible calls for parents to pray for their child (2 Samuel 12:16; 1 Chronicle 29:16-19; Job 1:5); set an example for their child (Proverbs 20:7); provide their child with food, clothing, shelter and even an inheritance (1 Timothy 5:8; Proverbs 13:22); ensure the safety, supervision and control of their child (Proverbs 13:24; 22:6, 15; 23:13-14; 29:15; Ephesians 6:4; Colossians 3:21; Titus 2:1-5); and educate their child, especially spiritually (Deuteronomy 6:6-9; 11:18-21; John 4:15); and

WHEREAS, Louisiana law enumerates many of these biblical responsibilities in the Children’s Code, including the Preamble (CHC 101) which specifies in part “that the relationship between parent and child is preeminent in establishing and maintaining the well-being of the child; that parents have the responsibility for providing the basic necessities of life as well as love and affection to their children; that parents have the paramount right to raise their children in accordance with their own values and traditions; that parents should make the decisions regarding where and with whom the child shall reside, the educational, moral, ethical, and religious training of the child, the medical, psychiatric, surgical, and preventive health care of the child, and the discipline of the child”; and

WHEREAS, Certain agendas and ideologies are being advanced by institutions and individuals, thereby corrupting children’s views about the human condition and human sexuality (even to the point of secretly changing a child’s name and pronouns from those consistent with his or her biological sex); and

WHEREAS, Such activism usurps parental guidance about such matters and rejects biblical instruction on these issues; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the messengers to the 176th session of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, meeting in New Orleans, Louisiana, November 14, 2023, do affirm God’s design that the family be the fundamental unit of society for advancing His plan for the physical, emotional, intellectual and spiritual development of children; and be it further

RESOLVED, We submit to biblical instruction about the authority of parents and their accountability regarding the health and growth of their child; and be it further

RESOLVED, We reject attempts by some individuals and institutions to override parents in key areas of their child’s development; and be it further

RESOLVED, We acknowledge the Bible as the supreme authority about these issues; and be it further

RESOLVED, We urge Louisiana Baptists to protect and exercise their biblical and legal authority as parents; and be it finally

RESOLVED, We call on state and national lawmakers and other leaders to adopt legislation and approve public policies that uphold parents’ rights and responsibilities for their child, particularly with regard to teaching fundamental Christian concepts about the human condition and human sexuality.

RESOLUTION 2: ON PROTECTING CHILDREN’S INNOCENCE

WHEREAS, God created both man and woman in His image to glorify Himself (Genesis 1:26-27; Isaiah 43:7); and

WHEREAS, His design reflects two distinct and complementary sexes, male and female, to define the very biology of humanity (Genesis 1:26-27; Matthew 19:4; Mark 10:6); and

WHEREAS, The Bible forbids a woman from wearing “anything that pertains to a man” and declares “nor shall a man put on a woman’s garment,” condemning such behavior as “an abomination” (Deuteronomy 22:5); and

WHEREAS, There are social and cultural forces at work against biblical and scientific truths, confusing children about their biological identities and defying the nature of God’s creation; and

WHEREAS, Such sexual activism includes drag queen performances, and similar perversions of God’s natural order, in the presence of minors; and

WHEREAS, Louisiana laws ban obscene displays, performances, exhibitions, solicitations and enticements “in the

presence of an unmarried person under the age of seventeen years,” but do not specifically prohibit drag queen shows in the presence of such young people; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the messengers to the 176th session of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, meeting in New Orleans, Louisiana, November 14, 2023, do affirm God’s creation of male and female as the biological basis of human existence; and be it further

RESOLVED, We submit to His biblical guidance to condemn as “an abomination” the growing cultural phenomenon of transvestitism and the movement to normalize this deviancy among children; and be it further

RESOLVED, We call on Louisiana Baptists to work to protect children from such negative influences within their homes and local communities as well as the state and nation; and be it further

RESOLVED, We call on government officials and law enforcement agents at every level in Louisiana to enforce obscenity laws to the fullest extent, specifically to protect children’s innocence; and be it finally

RESOLVED, We urge state and national lawmakers and other leaders to adopt legislation and approve public policies that prevent children from being exposed to drag queens and other attempts at sexualization that diminish childhood innocence.

RESOLUTION 3: ON PROTECTING THE UNDERAGED FROM THE HARMS OF ALCOHOL

WHEREAS, Parents are instructed to intentionally and thoughtfully direct children for life, guiding them as carefully launched arrows (Psalm 127:4); and

WHEREAS, Underage drinking is a plague in Louisiana, with our high school students ranking first in the nation among their peers in the abuse of alcohol; and

WHEREAS, Such behavior extends to 34 percent of our high schoolers, a statewide average higher than any single school district in the nation; and

WHEREAS, The 1984 National Minimum Drinking Age Act prohibits “the purchase or public possession of any alcoholic beverage by a person who is less than twenty-one years of age”; and

WHEREAS, Louisiana law allows anyone as young as 18 years old to work in bars and to enter bars, but technically bans them from purchasing or possessing alcohol; and

WHEREAS, On average, 75 percent of high school seniors in the state are 18 years and another 13 percent are 19 years of age, meaning 88 percent of high school seniors are eligible to frequent bars; and

WHEREAS, Drunk driving is identified as a leading cause of death among teens, with National Highway Traffic Safety Administration statistics showing a quarter of fatal crashes involve underage drinking drivers; and

WHEREAS, Alcohol is involved in half of sexual assaults on college campuses, including 300 incidents reported at Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge last year; and

WHEREAS, Research published by the American Academy of Pediatrics shows “the stronger a state’s restrictions on alcohol overall, the lower the teen death toll”; and

WHEREAS, The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention data urges states to “strengthen enforcement of existing policies” and advocates for “zero tolerance laws” to combat underage drinking; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the messengers to the 176th session of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, meeting in New Orleans, Louisiana, November 14, 2023, condemn any lax attitude and approach to the scourge of underage drinking that is plaguing our state’s youth; and be it further

RESOLVED, We reject outright the undermining of the federal minimum drinking age of 21 years by such state actions as allowing underaged persons to enter bars while ostensibly prohibiting them to purchase or possess alcohol in such establishments; and be it further

RESOLVED, We urge parents and churches to instruct children and teens not to participate in debaucherous activities, warning them to avoid the dangers of drunkenness by abstaining from alcohol (Eph 5:8; Prov 23:20–21; Luke 21:34); and be it finally

RESOLVED, We appeal to lawmakers to protect those who are underaged from the harms of alcohol by passing commonsense legislation, such as preventing individuals under the age of 21 years from even entering bars and similar establishments, which too easily give them access to alcohol even with federal and state laws in place to prevent the purchase or possession of alcohol by those who are not of legal age.

RESOLUTION 4: ON THE LBC'S 175TH ANNIVERSARY

WHEREAS, Baptists have a remarkable history of dedication and commitment in carrying the Gospel to the people of Louisiana; and

WHEREAS, John Coulter, a faithful Baptist, departed the comfort of Kentucky to settle his family, circa 1797, in Fort Miro (now, Morehouse Parish) to become the first recorded Baptist in what is now the state of Louisiana; and

WHEREAS, Joseph Willis, a former Cherokee slave who swam the Mississippi River on the back of a mule to enter the religiously restricted territories of Louisiana, in 1804 preached in Vermilion (Lafayette) the first known Baptist sermon in Louisiana, west of the Mississippi River, and eight years later became the first resident Baptist pastor in the state; and

WHEREAS, The Half Moon Bluff Baptist Church, on the Bogue Chitto River in Washington Parish (east of the Mississippi River), was organized in 1812 and is recognized as the first Baptist congregation in what is now the state of Louisiana, and a month later the Bayou Chicot (Calvary) Baptist Church was founded in Ville Platte (west of the Mississippi River) as the second Baptist Church formed in the state, and remains active today; and

WHEREAS, In 1848, 13 Baptists meeting in Mount Lebanon organized the Baptist State Convention of North Louisiana with 65 ministers, 88 congregations and 3,650 members (changing names in 1853 to the "State Convention of Baptists in Louisiana," and in 1886 to the "Louisiana Baptist Convention"); and

WHEREAS, Today, the Louisiana Baptist Convention includes nearly 1,600 congregations with more than 425,000 baptized members; and

WHEREAS, During the 175 intervening years Louisiana Baptists baptized more than 1,325,000 new believers in the state, contributed more than \$900 million through the Cooperative Program and ministered directly -- or through the support of cooperative missions and ministries -- to the ends of the earth; and

WHEREAS, The tasks of "to seek and save that which is lost" (Luke 19:10) remain daunting challenges in the state with 40 percent of Louisiana adults declaring they have no relationship with Christ or His Church (Association of Religion Data Archives); now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the messengers to the 176th session of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, meeting in New Orleans, Louisiana, November 14, 2023, praise God for His favor on Louisiana Baptists these 175 years; and be it further

RESOLVED, We celebrate the many good works that He has graciously allowed Louisiana Baptists to be part of with Him in our state, the nation and around the world; and be it finally

RESOLVED, We commit to continue to seek where God is at work and to pursue His Great Commission to "make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all things that I have commanded you" (Matthew 28:18-20), but especially so in the unique mission field He has given us in the state of Louisiana.

RESOLUTION 5: ON EXPRESSION OF APPRECIATION

WHEREAS, Many individuals and groups have had a part in planning, preparing and conducting the 176th annual meeting of our Louisiana Baptist Convention; and

WHEREAS, The messengers of this Convention desire to warmly recognize and express appreciation to the following:

Dr. Fred Luter, pastor of Franklin Avenue Baptist Church, New Orleans, as well as the staff and the congregation, for their assistance with details and for providing the use of their facilities for this annual meeting; and

Dr. Reggie Bridges, Convention president, and pastor of Temple Baptist Church, Ruston, for his warm, gracious spirit in leading, speaking and listening to Louisiana Baptists this year, and his gentle firmness in moderating this annual meeting; and

Temple Baptist Church, Ruston, for their commitment to sharing the Gospel in our state by graciously supporting Dr. Bridges's leadership of all the churches of the Louisiana Baptist Convention this past year; and

Nate Jernigan, music director for this annual meeting, who serves as worship pastor with First Baptist Church, New Orleans, and assistant professor of music and worship with New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, for planning and coordinating the music, and the musicians and singers for their contribution of instrumental and vocal talents; and

Ronnie McLellan, chairman of the Committee on Order of Business, and pastor of First Baptist Church, Marrero, and the members of the Committee on Order of Business for planning this informative and inspirational annual meeting; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the messengers to the 176th Session of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, meeting in New Orleans, Louisiana, November 14, 2023, express to each of the above, and to all who contributed, our deepest heartfelt gratitude.

RESOLUTION 6: ON PREVENTING MAIL-ORDER ABORTIFACIENTS

WHEREAS, God intended for a child to be brought into this world through the intimacy between a husband and wife, and He ordained the husband and wife with the privilege and responsibility to rear a child, especially in the admonition of the Lord (Genesis 1:28; 2:24; Ephesians 5:31-32; 6:4); and

WHEREAS, Scripture reveals that all human life is created in the image of God, and therefore sacred to our Creator (Genesis 1:27; 9:6); and

WHEREAS, The Bible affirms that the preborn child is a person, bearing the image of God, from the moment of conception (Psalm 139:13–16; Luke 1:44); and

WHEREAS, The United States Supreme Court ruled in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women’s Health Organization* (2022) to overturn its harmful decisions in *Roe v. Wade* (1973) and *Planned Parenthood v. Casey* (1992); which, combined, led to more than 63,000,000 preborn lives lost during 49 years of flawed legal precedent; and

WHEREAS, Various Louisiana Legislatures, governors of Louisiana, and Louisiana citizens had worked tirelessly to enact laws to end abortion in our state once *Roe v. Wade* and *Planned Parenthood v. Casey* were overturned, including a ban of “criminal abortion by means of the use of an abortion-inducing drug without the prescribing physician being physically present”; and

WHEREAS, The U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit ruled in August 2023 against the ordering by mail of the abortion drug mifepristone because of no evidence it “could be used safely without being prescribed and dispensed in person”; and

WHEREAS, This decision underscores the government’s responsibility to protect citizens from harmful practices such as the negative health risks posed by chemical abortions; and

WHEREAS, The United States Postal Service has stated its commitment to “combating illegal drugs in the mail”; and

WHEREAS, The U.S. Department of Justice has previously indicted at least one major shipping company, Federal Express, for delivering illegal drugs from pharmacies; and

WHEREAS, The U.S. Congress passed the STOP Act in 2018 to combat the trafficking of illicit drugs; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the messengers to the 176th session of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, meeting in New Orleans, Louisiana, November 14, 2023, condemn the ordering by mail of chemical abortion drugs as an attempt to circumvent Louisiana laws against abortion; and be it further

RESOLVED, We urge the USPS, FEDEX and other shippers to commit to stopping the transportation of illegal chemical abortion drugs into Louisiana with the same resolve they employ to deter the shipment of illicit drugs into the country; and be it further

RESOLVED, We call on the DOJ and the state attorney general’s office to prosecute shippers of illegal chemical abortion drugs to our state, as well as pharmacies that knowingly sell illegal chemical abortion drugs to be used in Louisiana, and entities such as Planned Parenthood and Aid Access, who subvert Louisiana laws against abortion by giving access to illegal chemical abortion drugs for use in Louisiana; and be it finally

RESOLVED, We encourage federal and state lawmakers and public policy leaders to enact needed legislation and regulations to enable more aggressive prosecution of shippers, pharmacies and organizations that facilitate the violation of Louisiana laws against mail-order abortifacients.

RESOLUTION 7: ON CONGRATULATING U.S. CONGRESSMAN MIKE JOHNSON

WHEREAS, God “removes kings and raises up kings” and He “gives wisdom to the wise and knowledge to those who have understanding” (Daniel 2:21); and

WHEREAS, He appoints faithful leaders “for such a time as this” (Esther 4:14); and

WHEREAS, U.S. Congressman Mike Johnson has a remarkable record as a public servant, in Christian service and for legal excellence, especially on matters of faith; and

WHEREAS, This includes, while serving in the Louisiana legislature and the U.S. Congress, championing pro-life laws and policies, defending religious liberty, protecting children from the harms of transgender ideology, promoting the values of biblical marriage, launching a Christian ministry podcast with his wife Kelly, as well as successfully representing the Noah’s Ark theme park against attacks meant to halt its construction and the Louisiana State University chaplaincy program from charges it was unconstitutional; and

WHEREAS, He boldly proclaims his faith in God, declaring on a national television broadcast, “I am a Bible-believing Christian. . . . Go pick up a Bible off your shelf and read it – that’s my worldview. That’s what I believe and so I make no apologies for it”; and

WHEREAS, He and Kelly are faithful members of Cypress Baptist Church in Benton; and

WHEREAS, During the recent leadership crisis in the U.S. House of Representatives, his many favorable personal characteristics, considerable professional competencies and obvious authentic faith resulted in his election as the consensus choice as Speaker; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the messengers to the 176th session of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, meeting in New Orleans, Louisiana, November 14, 2023, congratulate Congressman Johnson on his election to this position of great responsibility for the country; and be it further

RESOLVED, We commend him for his courage to be salt and light for the Kingdom while serving in this important government role; and be it finally

RESOLVED, We commit to pray for his spiritual, physical, emotional and mental health and growth; for protection of his marriage and family; and for his wisdom and strength as he seeks to lead the nation and follow God.

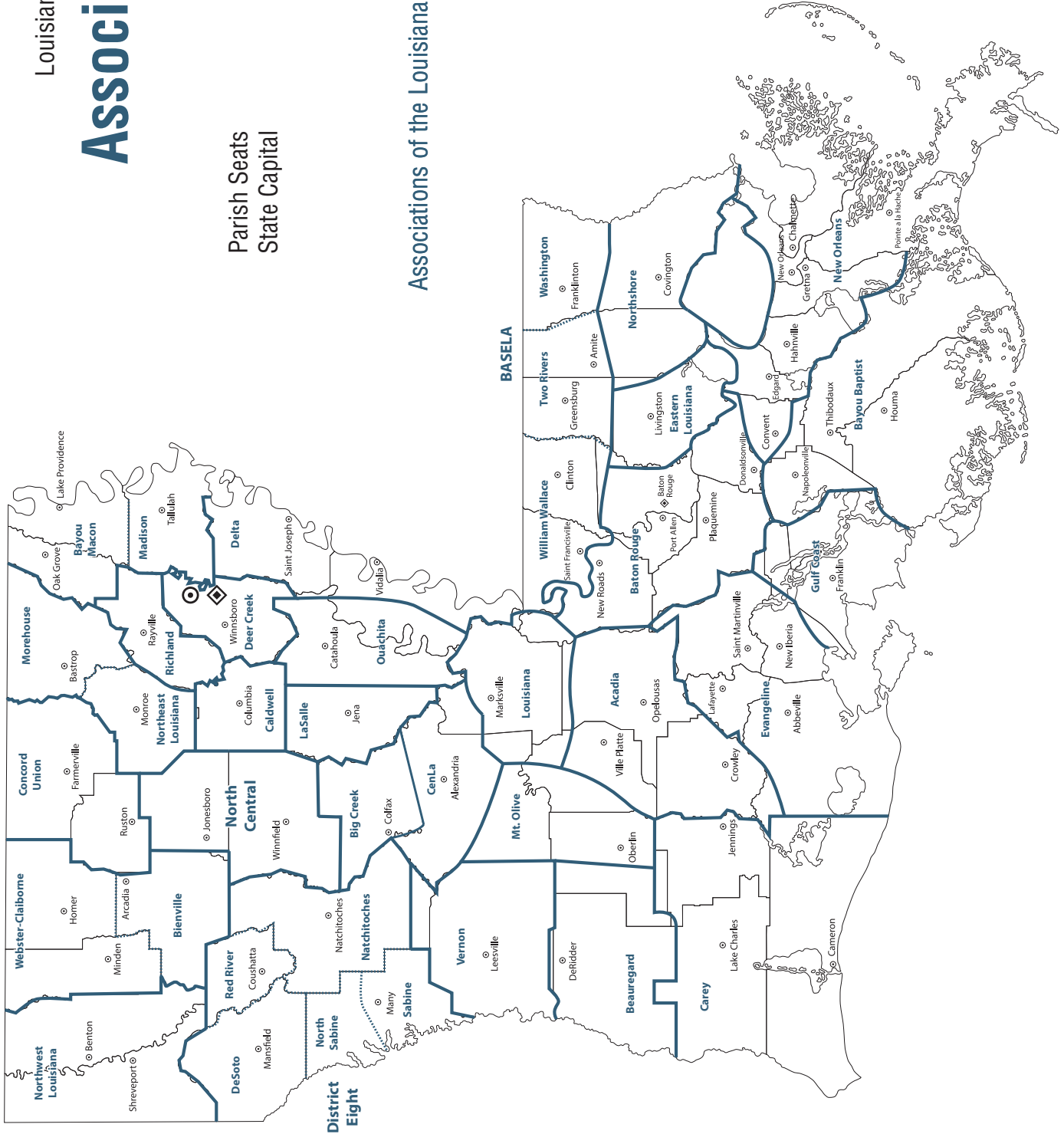
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Louisiana Baptist Convention Associational Map
