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ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION of the LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this body is the Louisiana Baptist Convention, hereinafter referred to as "Convention."

ARTICLE II. DURATION

The duration of this Convention shall be in perpetuity.

ARTICLE III. NON-PROFIT CORPORATION

The Convention is a nonprofit corporation organized under the Louisiana Non-Profit Corporation Act, LSA-R.S. 12:201 et seq. and shall have all of the powers, duties, authorizations and responsibilities as provided therein. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Convention shall neither have nor exercise any power, nor engage directly or indirectly in any activity that would invalidate its status as an organization exempt from federal income tax and described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, or the corresponding provision or provisions of any subsequent United States Internal Revenue law or laws.

ARTICLE IV. PURPOSE

Section 1. The purpose of this Convention is to provide means through which Louisiana Baptist churches and members can cooperate in bringing persons to God throughout the world.

Section 2. The Convention will assist churches and associations in the Christ-appointed tasks: to worship God, to proclaim the Gospel, to teach, to nurture Christians, to establish and strengthen churches, and to minister in Christ's name.

Section 3. This Convention desires to carry its programs forward in fraternal concert with other Baptist groups. This Convention will never exercise authority of any type over such groups.

Section 4. This Convention recognizes the Southern Baptist Convention as the primary instrument used by Baptists to further the cause of Christ on a worldwide basis. The Convention pledges its loyalty and support to the purposes served by the Southern Baptist Convention.

Section 5. This Convention will do all its work in accord with the principle that the Bible is the inspired, inerrant, and infallible Word of God, and is sufficient for all faith and practice, and is truth without any mixture of error in every area of which it speaks (Matthew 22:29).

ARTICLE V. REGISTERED OFFICE

The registered office of the Convention shall be located at 1250 MacArthur Drive, Alexandria, Louisiana. The location of the Convention may be changed by an affirmative vote of a two-thirds (2/3) majority of the messengers of the Convention present and voting.

ARTICLE VI. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. This Convention shall be composed of messengers who are members in good standing of Baptist churches cooperating (defined below) with the Convention.

Section 2. This Convention shall be organized on a non-stock basis having messengers as its only members.

Section 3. Each cooperating Baptist church having fifty (50) members, or less, shall be entitled to one (1) messenger; and an additional messenger for each additional fifty (50) members; however, no church shall be entitled to more than fifteen (15) messengers.

Section 4. Messengers shall be certified by their churches to the Convention, but the Convention shall be the final judge of the election and qualifications of its messengers.

Section 5. A cooperating church with the Louisiana Baptist Convention 1) is of like faith and order with Southern Baptists as expressed in the Baptist Faith and Message of the Southern Baptist Convention, 2) is sympathetic to the purposes and work of the Convention, 3) contributes to the work of Southern Baptists through the Cooperative Program or the work of Louisiana Baptists through contribution to the Louisiana Baptist Convention for its use in state programs and agencies and 4) has applied for membership in the local association and, upon recommendation by the LBC Committee on Credentials, has been approved to send messengers to the Convention.

Section 6. Any church which has taken action affirming, approving or endorsing the practice of homosexuality shall not be considered as cooperating with this Convention. Such actions include but are not limited to the licensure or ordination of homosexuals, marriage or blessing of homosexual relationships, and endorsing homosexuality as an acceptable lifestyle.

ARTICLE VII. TRUSTEES

Section 1. The Convention's management is vested in its Board of Trustees for the execution of legal documents as required by law in effectuation of direction given by and only with the prior approval of the messengers. The Board of Trustees and the Convention shall only act at the direction of and with the prior approval of the messengers. The messengers may delegate authority to officers or committees who shall be accountable to the messengers as provided in the Convention's Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws. The Trustees shall have no authority or powers except those explicitly granted to them by these Articles of Incorporation or in the Convention's By-laws.

Section 2. The members of the Board of Trustees of the Convention shall be the Convention President, First Vice President, Second Vice President and the Secretary-Treasurer.

ARTICLE VIII. OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Convention shall be a president, a first vice president and a second vice president. The office of secretary-treasurer shall be filled ex officio by the executive director of the Executive Board of the Convention.

Section 2. Officers shall be chosen annually from messengers in attendance at the Convention. Nominations shall be from the floor. Election shall be by ballot except when there is a single nominee for an office. In the latter case the president shall instruct the secretary to cast a unanimous ballot for the nominee.1

Section 3. Officers shall serve for one (1) year and hold office until their successors are elected and qualified; however, no officers may serve more than two (2) complete successive terms in the same office. Terms of office shall commence at final adjournment of the Convention in session at the time of their election and terminate at final adjournment of the succeeding regular session of the Convention. In case of death, disability of, or other cause making necessary the retirement of the president, the vice presidents shall succeed in order. The Executive Board shall determine when an office is vacant due to the disability of an incumbent. Section 4. The president shall preside over all deliberations of the Convention and shall perform such other duties as may be customary to the position or as determined in the bylaws or by resolution, and shall, by his election, become an ex officio member of all Convention committees and boards. He shall continue as ex officio member of the Executive Board for one full year immediately following tenure as president of the Convention unless elected to fill a vacancy in the regular membership of the Executive Board.

Section 5. The vice presidents may, in the absence of the president or when requested by the president, preside over the Convention and shall perform such other duties as may be provided in the bylaws or resolutions or as requested by the president.

Section 6. The executive director shall keep accurate and faithful minutes of all sessions of the Convention. He shall cause these to be published in suitable form in the Annual of the Convention together with such other information as the Convention or the Executive Board of the Convention deems necessary and proper.

1 Expectations of Louisiana Baptist Convention Officers

1. A vital personal relationship with Jesus Christ that includes public and private devotions and holy living.

ARTICLE IX. COMMITTEES AND BOARDS OF THE CONVENTION

Section 1. The plan of organization for standing committees and permanent boards of the Convention shall be as established in the bylaws of the Convention.

Section 2. Special committees shall serve for one (1) year or less as provided in the resolutions creating such committees.

Section 3. The members of all standing committees (except the Committee on Committees) and the permanent boards of the Convention shall be elected by the Convention. New members on all boards and committees who fill vacancies developing after annual Convention and before the month of May shall be elected by the Executive Board upon recommendation of the Convention Committee on Nominations or Committee on Committees.

Section 4. The president of the Convention shall appoint the members and the chairman and vice chairman of the Committee on Committees.

Section 5. Boards shall report annually to the Convention in the manner specified by the Executive Board of the Convention unless the Convention itself directs otherwise.

Section 6. Each committee and board of this Convention shall supply the executive director with an official copy of its charter or other legal evidence authorizing its establishment and a copy of its bylaws, as well as copies of the official minutes of their regular and special meetings. The executive director shall maintain these in such fashion that they are readily available to all Louisiana Baptists at the Convention offices of the Executive Board of the Convention.

ARTICLE X. THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE CONVENTION

Section 1. The Executive Board of the Convention shall serve as the Convention ad interim, as the Convention's principle advisory committee on total programs, and as the Convention's

The Louisiana Baptist Convention has been blessed across the decades with men who have provided excellent leadership in their elected roles as convention officers. A number of qualities have characterized these leaders and form an example and a description of the kind of leaders Louisiana Baptists ought to seek in the future, especially for the highest offices:

A belief in the authority and inerrancy of the Bible and agreement with the Convention's confession of faith which is the Baptist Faith and Message 2000.

^{3.} A desire to see people come to faith in Christ, and an active participation in personal and congregational evangelism.

^{4.} A commitment to cooperative missions, especially mission endeavors of Louisiana and Southern Baptists as evidenced by strong congregational support of the Cooperative Program.

^{5.} A giftedness and experience in leadership that includes the ability to inspire confidence, build consensus, solve problems, and conduct the work of Louisiana Baptists in an orderly and effective manner. (Approved by messengers, LBC, 165th Annual Meeting, 11/13/12))

operating board for the Convention-sponsored general programs and programs not specifically assigned elsewhere.

Section 2. The Executive Board shall consist of one (1) member from each association having a minimum of seven churches with an aggregate church membership of at least one thousand, plus one (1) additional board member from each association having as many as ten thousand (10,000) church members, and an additional board member for each additional five thousand (5,000) church members of such associations; provided, however, that not more than seven (7) members from any one association shall serve simultaneously as members of the Executive Board.

Section 3. The terms of elected Executive Board members shall run for three (3) years. No member may serve continuously for more than two (2) complete successive terms. No member shall be eligible to serve another term until an interval equal to the number of years served shall have elapsed.

Section 4. The membership of any Executive Board member shall be declared vacant if he ceases to be affiliated with a church that is a member of the association from which he was elected.

Section 5. The Convention shall annually elect members to fill all vacancies on the Executive Board.

Section 6. The elected officers of the Executive Board of the Convention shall consist of a president and a vice president chosen annually by the membership of the Executive Board. They shall have the duties customarily associated with such positions. The board itself shall elect an executive director for an indefinite term. The executive director shall be ex officio member of the board and serve as its secretary.

Section 7. The Executive Board itself shall determine its time of meeting, organization and method of proceeding subject to these articles and the Convention's bylaws.

Section 8. The Executive Board of the Convention shall report annually to the Convention concerning the total Convention program, the operating programs entrusted to the board, and such other matters as the board deems necessary and proper.

Section 9. The Executive Board of the Convention shall recommend annually to the Convention the appropriation or allocation of undesignated financial resources of the Convention.

Section 10. The Executive Board of the Convention shall serve as the general corporate authority of this Convention. No activity supported by and subject to the will of this Convention shall seek incorporated status in Louisiana or elsewhere without the express approval of this Convention or the Executive Board of this Convention.

ARTICLE XI. THE DENOMINATIONAL PAPER

The Baptist Message shall be the official paper of this Convention.

ARTICLE XII. MEETINGS

Section 1. The Convention shall meet in regular session in the week following the second Sunday in November unless unusual circumstances should require a change. In such a case, date, time and place shall be determined by the Executive Board.

Section 2. Only the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention is authorized to call a special meeting of the Convention and only upon giving churches cooperating with the Convention at least thirty (30) days written notice of the date, place and time of said special meeting which meeting can only be held within the state of Louisiana.

ARTICLE XIII. EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

In the event of an emergency declared as provided in this article, the following procedures shall control the operations, finances, officers, meetings, and purposes of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. until such time as the emergency is terminated. When the emergency has been terminated, then in that event, all provisions of the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. which were last in effect prior to the emergency shall again

take effect until such time as another emergency may be declared, if any, as provided in this article. These emergency provisions and procedures are as follows:

1."Emergency" means any occasion or instance for which, in the determination of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. by a majority vote of those present and voting, that the usual and customary conduct of business by the Convention must be curtailed or suspended because it is not feasible to comply with applicable provisions of the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. due to the existence of an emergency which may endanger lives, health, property, and/or safety, may increase the threat to lives, health, property and/or safety, and/or conditions are such that it is not possible to conduct the usual and customary business of the Convention in a manner provided by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Convention.

2. In the event that the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. cannot meet to consider an emergency declaration or termination, then the last elected officers of the Convention and the Executive Committee of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., may jointly declare an emergency which invokes the provisions of this Article XII and/or terminate a previously declared emergence.

3. In the event that the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. or, in its absence, the officers of the Convention and the Executive Committee of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist

Convention, Inc. cannot meet to declare an emergency, then the Executive Director of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention may declare an emergency which invokes the provisions of this Article.

4. In the event that an emergency is declared invoking the provisions of this Article as provided in paragraphs 1, 2 or 3 above, then all Convention officers, Convention committee members, and board members of Convention agencies and members of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. shall continue in office until such time as the emergency declaration is terminated and his/her successor is duly elected as provided by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc.

5. In the event that an emergency is declared invoking the provisions of this Article as provided in paragraphs 1, 2 or 3 above, then all budgets, financial expenditures and operations authorized and last approved by the Convention prior to the emergency declaration shall remain in force and effect until such time as the emergency declaration is terminated and new budget, operational, and financial programs are duly adopted by the Convention as provided by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc.

6. In the event that an emergency has been properly declared, then all meetings of the Convention Messengers whether Annual or otherwise shall be suspended until such time as the emergency declaration is properly terminated and Messengers are able to meet and conduct business as provided by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc.

7. All meetings of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., officers of the Convention and the Executive Committee of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. may be held in any manner whether in person, by telephone, electronically or otherwise during the period an emergency has been properly declared and/or to consider whether to declare an emergency or terminate an emergency declaration.

8. In the event that an emergency has been properly declared, The Louisiana Baptist Message shall remain the official publication of the Convention. However, the Baptist Message may be published in any manner possible whether by print, by hand, electronically or any other method feasible during the emergency declaration. If the Baptist Message cannot be published in any manner, then any reasonable method of communication to Convention Messengers, cooperating churches, officers, or other necessary persons or organizations may be used.

9.An emergency declaration may be terminated by the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., jointly by officers of the Convention and the Executive Committee of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. by a majority vote of those present and voting, or by the Executive Director of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. in the same order and manner as provided by paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 of this Article at such time as the conditions creating the emergency as defined in paragraph 1 above no longer exists.

10. Any provision of the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. in conflict with this ARTICLE XIII during the period that an emergency has been properly declared and has not been terminated, shall be suspended until such time as the declaration of emergency has been properly terminated.

ARTICLE XIV. INDEMNIFICATION

To the maximum extent permitted or required by LSA-R.S. 12:227 as it now exists or as it may be amended in the future, the Convention shall indemnify and advance expenses to persons indemnified in §227 for amounts such persons pay directly. The Convention shall not indemnify or advance expenses to such persons for any amount paid by a third party pursuant to a plan or contract of insurance.

ARTICLE XVI. AGENT FOR SERVICE

The first agent for service of process for the Convention shall be Dr. David E. Hankins. The Board of Trustees may from time to time as it shall determine in its discretion change the agent for service of process for the Convention without the necessity of approval by the messengers.

ARTICLE XVII. CONSTRUCTION

All references in these Articles of Incorporation to statutes, regulations, or other sources of legal authority shall refer to the authorities cited, or their successors, as they may be amended from time to time.

ARTICLE XVIII. AMENDMENTS

These articles may be amended at any annual meeting session of the Convention, or at a special session convoked specifically for this purpose, by two-thirds of the messengers present and voting, provided:

Section 1. Proposed amendments originating on the floor of the Convention were submitted in writing at the previous session of the Convention, published in full in the Annual and referred to the Executive Board of the Convention for study and recommendation.

Section 2. Proposed amendments originating in the Executive Board of the Convention are posted to the LBC website and published in one (1) issue of the *Baptist Message* (print edition or digital edition) no later than fifteen (15) days before the meeting of the Convention.

BYLAWS of the LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION

ARTICLE I. PARLIAMENTARY LAW AND CUSTOM

Section 1. *Robert's Rules of Order* shall be recognized as the standard authority to guide the Convention on questions of parliamentary law and custom.

Section 2. One-fourth of the messengers enrolled shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business by the Convention. The minutes of the Convention shall indicate that a quorum was present for all business sessions.

Section 3. No persons addressing the Convention may speak more than twice on the same subject without unanimous consent.

Section 4. The president is charged at all times with the maintenance of decorum and order.

Section 5. All proposed resolutions coming before the Convention shall, prior to consideration by the Convention, be referred to the Committee on Resolutions without debate.

Section 6. All matters of business not scheduled on the agenda shall, prior to consideration by the Convention, be referred to the Committee on Order of Business without debate.

Section 7. The Convention shall express its official position only through its constitution, bylaws, and resolutions. The acceptance of a report shall not, in the absence of implementing resolutions, be construed as authorizing action by Convention committees, boards, and agencies.

ARTICLE II. PERMANENT PLAN OF ORGANIZATION OF THE CONVENTION AND ITS COMMITTEES AND BOARDS

Permanent organization of the Convention shall be as follows:

1. Standing Committees:

(1) Committee on Committees

(2) Committee on Nominations

- (3) Committee on Order of Business
- (4) Committee on Credentials
- (5) Committee on Resolutions
- (6) Committee on Moral and Social Concerns

2. Boards of Trustees for:

- (1) Louisiana College
- (2) Louisiana Baptist Children's Home
- (3) Louisiana Baptist Foundation
- (4) The Baptist Message

3. Executive Board of the Convention

ARTICLE III. COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF COMMITTEES AND BOARD

Section 1. The composition and duties of boards of trustees of agencies and institutions of this Convention shall be clearly set forth in the Convention resolutions authorizing their establishment and included subsequently in appropriate form in their respective corporate charters. All corporate charters and amendments thereto shall be expressly approved by the Convention or by the Executive Board of the Convention.

Section 2. The Committee on Committees shall be composed of nine (9) members one-third of whom shall be appointed each year by the president. This Committee shall nominate to the Convention the membership of all other committees of the Convention and shall nominate or appoint the membership of special committees as instructed by the Convention. The Committee shall also nominate

for election the chairman and vice chairman of all Convention committees. Vacancies occurring during the year may be filled by recommendation from this Committee to the Executive Board and may be approved by the Board in any of its regular or special meetings or by mail poll of the Board.

Section 3. **The Committee on Nominations** shall be composed of fifteen (15) members. It shall nominate to the Convention all members of boards of the Convention, including the Executive Board of the Convention. Vacancies on boards occurring prior to the May Executive Board meeting may be filled by recommendation from this Committee to the Executive Board. Vacancies occurring after the May meeting shall be left vacant until the Convention in November.

Section 4. **The Committee on Order of Business** shall be composed of seven (7) members and the person designated to plan the Convention music. It shall present to the opening session of the Convention for adoption a recommended agenda for the Convention sessions. The committee shall recommend to the Convention the preacher and music leader for the Convention meeting one year hence. The committee also may tentatively enlist Bible study leader and major speakers for Conventions scheduled up to three years in advance. The Committee shall be responsible for recommending to the Convention the host, the meeting hall or church, and the dates for the Convention meeting two years hence and, if feasible, for three years hence.

The Committee on Order of Business shall provide periods of time during the convention for the introduction of all matters requiring a vote not scheduled on the agenda, and, when introduced (unless the Convention then gives it unanimous consent for its immediate consideration) shall fix times for the consideration of the same. All such matters of business shall be introduced to the Convention during the time scheduled for Introduction of Business. No such matters of business may be introduced in the last session.

Section 5. **The Committee on Credentials** shall be composed of seven (7) members. It shall supervise the registration and accreditation of messengers to the Convention, and shall manage the application process for congregations desiring to become a cooperating church with the Louisiana Baptist Convention and qualified to send messengers for the first time. It shall recommend to the Convention, when necessary, the disaffiliation of any Louisiana Baptist Convention church that no longer complies with the Convention's definition of a cooperating church. It shall recommend action to the Convention concerning disputes as to status of persons as messengers.

Section 6. **The Committee on Resolutions** shall be composed of seven (7) members and three (3) ex officio members (including the Executive Board president) from the Executive Board of the Convention. The Committee shall be responsible for initiating, reviewing, commenting on, and recommending Convention action on all resolutions. In order to facilitate thorough consideration and to expedite the Committee's work, all proposed resolutions shall:

- 1. Be submitted to the Committee for review and consideration no more than ninety (90) days, but no later than fifteen (15) days, prior to the next LBC annual meeting.
- 2. Be addressed to the Committee on Resolutions in care of the Communications Team of the Louisiana Baptist Convention at its registered or e-mail address (electronic copies are preferred),
- 3. Be typewritten, titled, and dated,
- 4. Be accompanied by a letter from a church qualified to send a messenger to the annual meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention certifying that the person submitting the resolution is a member in good standing, and
- 5. Include complete contact information for both the person submitting it, and his or her church.

No person may submit more than three resolutions per year. The Committee on Resolutions shall prepare and submit to each annual meeting of the Convention only such resolutions the Committee recommends for adoption. Such resolutions may be based upon proposals received by the Committee or may originate with the Committee. Only resolutions recommended by the Committee may be considered by the Convention, except the Convention may, by a 2/3 vote, consider any other resolution properly submitted to the Committee.

Section 7. The Committee on Moral and Social Concerns shall be composed of fifteen members. The president of the Convention, the president of the Executive Board, and the editor of the *Baptist Message* shall be ex officio members. The Committee shall identify, study, provide information, and recommend actions on moral and social concerns which need to be of particular concern to Louisiana Baptists. The Committee shall also be authorized to speak publicly and/or conduct campaigns to influence the outcome of current issues on which the Executive Board or the Convention have taken an official position. The Committee may use resource persons and/ or organizations in matters of common concern.

Section 8. The Executive Director of the Executive Board of the Convention shall serve ex officio as a member and as secretary of all standing committees of the Convention; however, he may be assisted in this task by members of the Executive Board staff.

Section 9. The financial transactions of all standing and special committees of the Convention shall be conducted only in accordance with policies and procedures established by the Executive Board of the Convention. The Executive Board shall retain exclusive authority over the custody and disbursement of all funds made available for expenses of committees of the Convention and the Convention itself.

Section 10. Trustees of corporate boards established under authority of the Convention shall be responsible for initiating charter amendments whenever such action is necessary to make charter provisions consistent with actions of the Convention.

Section 11. A report of all meetings of boards of the Convention shall be published in The *Baptist Message* (print edition or digital edition) as soon as possible after the meeting with the understanding that specifics concerning financial conditions and personnel relations must often be confidential for the welfare of the institutions and their employees and may be reported in only general terms.

Section 12. Baptist Faith and Message adopted by the Convention on 11/12/02.

ARTICLE IV. MEMBERSHIP OF COMMITTEES AND BOARDS

Section 1. The Convention affirms its adherence to the policy of periodic rotation of the membership of its committees and boards.

Section 2. The terms of members of boards shall be established as three (3) years. No member elected or appointed for a full term shall be eligible for more than two (2) complete successive terms on the same board. No member elected to serve as much as two (2) years of an unexpired term of any board shall be eligible for more than one (1) successive full term of three (3) years on the same board. A member shall be ineligible to serve on that board until an interval equal to the number of years served on that board shall have elapsed. A person shall not serve in more than one elected or appointed position at a time, unless authorized by the constitution and bylaws. Upon the expiration of the term of any member of a board or committee, no person who is a member of the same church as the person whose term is expiring may serve on that same board or committee until one year following the expiration of the serving member's term.

Membership on all boards and committees collectively shall in all cases be limited to the pastor and up to two (2) other members from any church at any one time. Existing board or committee members who move to a church without an eligible vacancy, shall be rendered ineligible to serve. Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary, a pastor who resigns his pastorate may continue to serve on the board or committee to which he was elected, provided that the church where he holds membership has an eligible vacancy. No more than one member of the same church may serve on the same board or committee. The terms of members of committees shall be established as three (3) years. No member elected or appointed for a full term or elected to fill an unexpired term shall be eligible to succeed himself until an interval equal to the number of years served on that committee shall have elapsed.

Section 3. As far as practicable, one-third of the membership of each committee or board shall be elected annually.

Section 4. At least one-fourth of the membership of each board shall live outside the association in which the institution is located, and an effort shall be made to have representatives from various areas of the state.

Section 5. All persons regularly elected by the Convention to agencies and boards shall be elected or selected in any convention session except the last session.

Section 6. Each board of the Convention shall organize and elect its own officers under its own rules and regulations. The president of the Convention shall appoint the chairman and vice chairman of the Committee on Committees. That committee shall nominate the chairman and vice chairman of all committees that it nominates to the Convention. Each committee may elect for itself such other officers as it may need.

Section 7. The initial meeting of newly authorized committees shall be called together during or following the Convention by the chairman in conjunction with the secretary of the committee and at such meeting the necessary officers shall be elected.

Section 8. Newly elected members for the first time to standing committees and boards of the Convention shall not be eligible for office within their respective committees or boards prior to the conclusion of one year's service with the committee or board. Ex officio members of standing committees or permanent boards of the Convention shall not hold office on such committees or boards unless specifically authorized to do so by the constitution of the Convention or these bylaws.

Section 9. Officers of committees and boards of this Convention shall be elected annually.

Section 10. No salaried employee of this Convention and its boards and committees shall be eligible for election as a voting member of boards or committees of this Convention except as provided in the constitution of the Convention or these bylaws.

Section 11. Boards and committees of this Convention may appoint persons other than members to subcommittees and advisory committees provided such persons shall serve only in an advisory capacity and shall never be permitted to vote at meetings of the authorizing committee or board.

ARTICLE V. INCLUSIONS OF THE CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS OF THE CONVENTION AND THE BYLAWS OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD IN THE ANNUAL OF THE CONVENTION

The directory of the Convention shall include the constitution and bylaws of the Convention and the bylaws of the Executive Board of the Convention in each edition of the Convention's Annual.

ARTICLE VI. AVOIDANCE OF ILLEGAL ACTION

No action of the Convention shall be construed as authorizing its committees or boards to take any action that may be contrary to law.

ARTICLE VII. AMENDMENT OF BYLAWS

These bylaws may be amended at any regular session of the Convention by affirmative vote of two-thirds of the messengers present and voting. Amendments sponsored by the Executive Board shall be posted to the LBC website and published in one (1) issue of the *Baptist Message* (print edition or digital edition) no later than fifteen (15) days before the meeting of the Convention.

BUSINESS AND FINANCIAL PLAN OF LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION

I. Preliminary Provisions

Each agency and institution of the Convention shall submit to the Business and Finance Committee of the Executive Board (1) an itemized estimate of its receipts for the next fiscal year, and (2) an itemized estimate of its expenditures for the next fiscal year.

The Executive Board shall recommend to the Convention a budget based on an analysis of the aforementioned data, which budget shall include allocations to agencies and institutions.

"Agencies" shall include the *Baptist Message*, Louisiana Baptist Foundation, and the Executive Board. "Institutions" shall include Louisiana Baptist Children's Home, and Louisiana College.

The Budget and Financial Data Query Form shall include itemized estimates of receipts and expenditures for a three-year period, past, present and projected, as indicated in the report form.

II. Fiscal Periods

Except where agreement otherwise is effected between an agency or institution and the Executive Board, the financial affairs of the Convention and all agencies or institutions owned, operated and controlled by the Louisiana Baptist Convention, shall be operated on the calendar year.

III. Disbursement of Monetary Funds

The executive director shall disburse all monies in accordance with the provisions of the Convention budget. Exceptions to this must have Convention approval.

Each agency or institution of the Convention is hereby instructed and ordered to keep all trust funds and/or designated gifts (for they are trust funds) sacred to the trust or the designation involved, and that they be kept separate from all other funds of such agency or institution.

Disbursement of Cooperative Program and Designated funds will be made immediately after closing of the books and in no event shall they be made later than the 10th of each month.

Inasmuch as each church is an autonomous body it has the inherent right, as is of course true with each individual, to make designations as desired. When a designated gift is received at the Baptist Building Business Office it shall be recorded and the gift will be forwarded forthwith to the designated object or person. An exception is that any gift received by any Louisiana Baptist Convention entity from a church that affirms, approves, or endorses homosexual behavior shall be returned to the donor. The acceptance and disbursement of any gifts shall not be construed as endorsement or agreement with the beliefs and practices of the donor.

Allocations for agencies and institutions from the Cooperative Program shall be determined on the basis of church gifts to the Cooperative Program and church designations the previous year and on the basis of needs and requirements of institutions and agencies as evaluated by the Business and Finance Committee and the Executive Board with recommended allocations to be voted by the Convention each year.

In the event that Cooperative Program receipts are less than the budget, distribution of funds to the respective agencies and institutions will be made on the basis of budget percentage of actual receipts.

IV. Special Solicitations

Any special campaigns for funds by an agency or institution owned, controlled, or supported by the Convention, must first secure the endorsement and approval of the Executive Board and the Convention. This is not to be construed as prohibiting any agency or institution from approaching individuals or corporations for gifts, it being understood that such approach to an individual or corporation is to be made only by personal contact or personal correspondence.

V. Capital Investments and Liabilities

Without the approval of the Convention or Executive Board, no liability or indebtedness exceeding \$100,000 or 2% of a Convention entity's annual operating budget (whichever is greater), shall be incurred by a Convention entity other than those that can be repaid from anticipated receipts for operating purposes and/or capital needs within a period of three years from the date such obligations were incurred. A report on all entity indebtedness shall be made to the Executive Board annually.

VI. Emergency Reserves

Each agency and institution of this Convention shall set up a reserve for contingencies to provide for deficits that may occur either through decreased receipts or through emergencies.

The goal shall be that all agencies/institutions move immediately to accumulate funds in their operating reserve to 30 days operation within a long-term goal of at least three months.

VII. Financial Reports

Each agency and institution of the Convention shall close its books and accounts, and have them audited by a Certified Public Accountant as of the close of its fiscal year, and in turn shall forward two copies of its audit to the executive director as soon as available. These audits are to be studied by the Business and Finance Committee of the Executive Board, and shall include the following:

- 1) Balance Sheet
- 2) Analysis of surplus accounts
- 3) Income and expense
- 4) Classified list of investments by fund and type of investment
- 5) Receipts:
 - (a) Cooperative receipts
 - (b) Designated receipts
 - (c) Other income

Each agency and institution shall submit a report on the Budget and Financial Data form on or before June 1 of each year. A balance sheet of the financial condition after May 31 and prior to September 1 of the current year shall be submitted for publication in the current *Book of Reports* and Annual.

VIII. Handling of Funds

All persons who handle funds or securities for any agency or institution shall be adequately bonded. Discretion shall be exercised in the handling of all securities, deeds, notes and other valuable records (legal documents), and there must always be express authority from the proper source for such handling.

IX. Additional Agencies and Institutions

No new agency or institution shall be authorized by this Convention except after thorough study and presentation to the Convention for favorable action in two succeeding annual meetings.

X. Business Procedure

Each agency and institution of the Louisiana Baptist Convention as a normal operating policy shall refrain from entering any business transaction with a trustee or employee, or a business enterprise in which a trustee or employee has an interest. An exception to this policy may be made, at the discretion of the board of trustees, in any case wherein it appears that a commodity or service at the discretion of the board, is found to be in the best interest of the agency or institution. Competitive bids should be taken if practicable. In any case being considered for exception, the extent of the trustees' or employees' interest shall be disclosed to the entire board.

XI. Professional Services

The Executive Board at its discretion may employ an auditor to study the audited report with the auditors of the agencies and institutions in the light of Convention instructions.

The Executive Board at its discretion may employ an engineer or architect to study proposed capital projects or maintenance of present capital assets.

XII. Amendments

This Business and Financial Plan may be altered by two-thirds of the messengers present and voting at any time except during the last session (of the Convention), provided that recommended changes shall have been presented to the Executive Board and published in the *Baptist Message* (print edition or digital edition) at least one month in advance of the Convention.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION

ARTICLE I.

The name of this corporation shall be THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, and under this name it shall have authority to sue and be sued; to have and to make a corporate seal; to own property both real and personal, and to receive the same by purchase, gift or any other process known to the law, to borrow money in its corporate name and to mortgage and hypothecate its property to secure the same, and generally to do, and to perform all acts necessary for the purposes for which it is created.

The corporate existence of this corporation shall be in perpetuity, unless sooner dissolved by a two-thirds vote of this corporation, which vote shall be taken not less than six months after receiving instructions to that effect in writing from the LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION.

ARTICLE II.

The objects and purposes of this corporation shall be to foster Missions, at home and abroad, Christian Education and Benevolences, to promote and give direction to the work of the Louisiana Baptist Convention in these fields of service, through its several institutions and departments of service, necessary to the accomplishment of its objects and purposes, and to promote harmony of feeling and concert of action in adopting and carrying into operation such measures as may promote the Redeemer's Kingdom in Louisiana and in the regions beyond. It shall have power and authority to do all things necessary to carry out the objects and purposes for which it is organized.

ARTICLE III.

The Executive Board shall consist of one (1) member from each association, having a minimum of seven churches with an aggregate church membership of at least one thousand, plus one (1) additional board member from each association having as many as ten thousand (10,000) church members, and an additional board member for each additional five thousand (5,000) church members of such associations; provided, however that not more than seven (7) members from any one association shall serve simultaneously as members of the Executive Board.

The terms of elected board members shall run for three (3) years. No member may serve continuously for more than two (2) complete successive terms. No member shall be eligible to serve another term until an interval equal to the number of years served shall have elapsed.

The membership of any board member shall be declared vacant if he ceases to be affiliated with a church that is a member of the association from which he was elected.

The Convention shall annually elect members to fill all vacancies in the board.

The qualifications, term of office and criteria for selection of persons to serve as a member of the Executive Board of this corporation shall be in conformity with *Article X. The Executive Board of the Convention* contained in the Articles of Incorporation of the Louisiana Baptist Convention and *Article IV. Membership of Committees And Boards* contained in the Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention and any future amendments thereto. In addition to vacancies described in the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, the death or resignation of a member of the Executive Board shall automatically and immediately cause that office to become vacant without the necessity of any further action. Any other vacancy in the office of member of the Executive Board of this corporation for any reason deemed sufficient by the member shall only be declared by a two-thirds majority affirmative vote of the messengers to the Louisiana Baptist Convention and only after the affirmative recommendation of the Convention Committee on Nominations has been published in the *BAPTIST MESSAGE*

(print edition or digital edition) not less than twice in the thirty days immediately preceding the meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE IV.

The elected officers of the Executive Board of the Convention shall consist of a president and a vice president chosen annually by the membership of the Executive Board. They shall have the duties customarily associated with such positions. The board itself shall elect an executive director for an indefinite term. The executive director shall be ex officio member of the board and serve as its secretary.

The first officers of this corporation shall be as follows to wit: George W. Bolton, President; H. A. Sumrell, Vice-President; H. H. Webb, Recording Secretary; W. N. Johnson, Corresponding Secretary; B. F. Thompson, Treasurer; and H. H. Webb, Auditor, who shall hold office until their successors are elected.

ARTICLE V.

This corporation shall have the authority to adopt such rules and bylaws, not contrary to law, or the provisions of this charter, as it deems proper, and to appoint all necessary committees to carry out the purposes for which this corporation was organized.

ARTICLE VI.

The domicile of this corporation shall be at Alexandria, Rapides Parish, Louisiana, and the service of all legal process shall be made at the domicile of the corporation, upon the President, or in his absence upon the Vice President, or in the absence of both of these, upon the Executive Director/Secretary, and otherwise according to law.

ARTICLE VII.

This corporation shall not issue any stock certificates, and the private property of the members of this corporation shall not be held liable for any of the debts of the corporation, nor shall any mere formality in the drawing of this charter have the effect of rendering it null.

ARTICLE VIII.

The Articles of Incorporation may only be amended with the approval of two-thirds majority of the Executive Board and the approval of two-thirds majority of the membership at the annual meeting, six months notice having been given prior to the annual convention to the President of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, and also notice of the proposed amendments having been published in the *Baptist Message* (print edition or digital edition) for three consecutive weeks preceding the annual meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE IX.

This Corporation shall be organized on a non-stock membership basis. The sole member of this corporation shall be the Louisiana Baptist Convention, a nonprofit, Louisiana Corporation domiciled in Alexandria, Louisiana. Except as otherwise provided in these Articles of Incorporation or by applicable law requiring a greater number of votes other than a simple majority for approval of any action by the member, any matter requiring a vote of the member of this corporation shall be adopted by a majority of messengers who are present and voting as is provided by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Articles of Incorporation. Each messenger shall have one vote.

ARTICLE X.

The annual meeting of the member of this corporation shall take place contemporaneously with the annual meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention without the necessity of giving notice to the member of said meeting. Any special meeting of the member of this corporation may only be called as provided in *Article XII Meetings* of the Louisiana Baptist Convention's Articles of Incorporation and shall only be held at the same places, dates and times as the Louisiana Baptist Convention determines in accordance with its Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws. Notice of any special meeting of the member of this corporation shall be published in the *BAPTIST MESSAGE* (print edition) not less than twice in thirty days immediately preceding the meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE XI.

Before any dissolution or merger of this corporation, transfer or sale of substantially all of this corporation's assets and/or the formation of other corporations, limited liability companies or other forms of doing business by this corporation may be implemented, the proposed action shall be approved by the member by a two-thirds affirmative vote of the messengers present and voting and only after the resolution authorizing the action has been published in the *BAPTIST MESSAGE* (print edition or digital edition) not less than twice in the thirty days immediately preceding the meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE XII.

1."Emergency" means any occasion or instance for which, in the determination of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. by a majority vote of those present and voting, that the usual and customary conduct of business by the Executive Board must be curtailed or suspended because it is not feasible to comply with applicable provisions of the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the Executive Board due to the existence of an emergency which may endanger lives, health, property, and/or safety, may increase the threat to lives, health, property and/or safety, and/or conditions are such that it is not possible to conduct the usual and customary business of the Executive Board in a manner provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the Executive Board.

2. In the event that the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. cannot meet to consider an emergency declaration or termination, then the Executive Director of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., may declare an emergency which invokes the provisions of this Article and/or terminate a previously declared emergency.

3. In the event that an emergency is declared invoking the provisions of this Article as provided in paragraphs 1 or 2 above, then all Executive Board officers, Executive Board committee members, and Executive Board members shall continue in office until such time as the emergency declaration is terminated and his/her successor is duly elected as provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC.

4. In the event that an emergency is declared invoking the provisions of this Article as provided in paragraphs 1 or 2 above, then all budgets, financial expenditures and operations authorized and last approved by the Executive Board prior to the emergency declaration shall remain in force and effect until such time as the emergency declaration is terminated and new budget, operational, and financial programs are duly adopted by the Executive Board as provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC.

5. In the event that an emergency has been properly declared, then all meetings of the Executive Board shall be suspended until such time as the emergency declaration is properly terminated and board members of the Executive Board are able to meet and conduct business as provided by the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC.

6. In the event that a special meeting of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention may be safely and is reasonably necessary, then such meeting may be held with reasonable notice to the Executive Board members in any manner whether in person, by telephone, electronically, or otherwise during the time an emergency has been properly declared and/or to consider whether to declare or terminate an emergency.

7. In the event that an emergency has been properly declared, the *BAPTIST MESSAGE* shall remain the official publication of the Executive Board. However, the *BAPTIST MESSAGE* may be published in any manner possible whether by print, by hand, electronically or any other method feasible during the emergency declaration. If the *BAPTIST MESSAGE* cannot be published in any manner, then any reasonable method of communication to Executive Board members, officers, or other necessary persons or organizations may be used.

8. An emergency declaration may be terminated by the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc., or by the Executive Director of the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Inc. in the same order and manner as provided by paragraphs 1 or 2 of this Article at such time as the conditions creating the emergency as defined in paragraph 1 above no longer exist.

9. Any provision of the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION and BYLAWS of the EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC. in conflict with ARTICLE XII during the period that an emergency has been properly declared and has not been terminated, shall be suspended until such time as the declaration of emergency has been properly terminated.

BYLAWS

of the

EXECUTIVE BOARD

of the

LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION

ARTICLE I. GENERAL FUNCTIONS

Section 1. It is the function of the Executive Board to perform such duties and responsibilities as may be authorized by the Louisiana Baptist Convention, including serving as the Convention ad interim, serving as the Convention's principal adviser on total program, and administering programs entrusted to it by the Convention or not expressly assigned to another board or committee by the Convention. The Executive Board shall, by resolution, enumerate its specific duties and responsibilities under these general delegations of responsibility by the Convention.

Section 2. Duties and responsibilities of this board as set forth in the constitution and bylaws of the Convention shall be construed as incorporated in these bylaws. The board shall at no time authorize action contrary to instructions of the Convention.

ARTICLE II. PERMANENT PLAN OF ORGANIZATION OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

Section 1. The plan of organization of the Executive Board, its committees and staff, shall be as follows:

1. The elected officers of the Executive Board of the Convention shall consist of a president and a vice president chosen annually by the membership of the Executive Board at the Pre-Convention Board meeting. They shall have the duties customarily associated with such positions. The board itself shall elect an executive director for an indefinite time. The executive director shall be an ex officio member of the board and serve as its secretary.

2. Standing committees of the Executive Board

- (1) Nominating Committee
- (2) Administrative Committee
- (3) Business and Finance Committee
- (4) Executive Committee
- (5) Missions Support Committee
- (6) Properties Committee
- 3. Subsidiary of the Executive Board: Church Site Corporation

ARTICLE III. MEETINGS

Section 1. The Executive Board shall hold regular meetings in May, September, and immediately prior to the convening of the annual Convention. The May meeting shall be on the first Tuesday. The September meeting shall be on the last Tuesday. Should unusual circumstances require a change in the meeting dates, the Executive Committee may recommend such a change for approval by the board at a regular meeting or by means of a mail poll. The board may, by resolution, hold such other meetings as it deems necessary and desirable.

Section 2. The Executive Committee of the board may, for reasons that seem to it good and proper, call the board to special meetings.

Section 3. Fifty-one percent (51%) of the elected membership of the board shall constitute a quorum for the conduct of business. The minutes shall always indicate the presence of a quorum at the openings of any business session.

Section 4. Notification of or an explanation of absence from meetings of the board should be given by members to the chairman or secretary.

ARTICLE IV. COMPOSITION, DUTIES, AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1. Committees authorized in Article II of these bylaws shall be primarily advisory in nature. The Executive Board may, however, delegate responsibility to a committee to act in the name of the board for specifically defined purposes.

Section 2. Committee members shall serve for three year terms with one-third of the membership rotating annually.

Section 3. No member may serve on more than two (2) standing committees, except the Executive Committee, simultaneously.

Section 4. The president of the board shall be an ex officio member of all committees, subcommittees and advisory committees. He shall hold no elective committee position. A committee chairman shall also be an ex officio member of subcommittees and advisory committees created and authorized by and for the committee.

Section 5. The executive director of the board shall serve ex officio as a member and as secretary of each committee. He may, however, appoint assistant secretaries from the Executive Board staff to assist him in the discharge of secretarial duties.

Section 6. All standing committees, except the Executive Committee and the Nominating Committee, shall consist of fifteen (15) or more elected members subject to the discretion of the board.

Section 7. Each committee shall be responsible for reporting to the Executive Board at each regular board meeting and for formulating its respective portion of the board's annual report to the Convention.

Section 8. All committees shall be of equal status with each committee reporting directly to the Executive Board; however, this shall not be construed as barring the submission by the Administrative Committee of requests for unallocated funds directly to the Business and Finance Committee or forbidding in any way cooperation among committees on common problems.

Section 9. The committees, themselves, shall determine the time, place, and frequency of their meetings unless the Executive Board directs otherwise.

Section 10. The executive director will maintain minutes of all official meetings of the board and its committees. These shall be available at the Executive Offices of the Executive Board.

Section 11. Standing committees of this board are authorized to create and utilize such subcommittees or advisory committees as may be necessary to the proper performance of their duties. A list of all such subcommittees or advisory committees and their membership shall be submitted to, and included in, the official minutes of the Executive Board. Persons other than elected members of the Executive Board may be utilized by the committee to render qualified service as advisory, nonvoting members on subcommittees and advisory committees.

Section 12. The **Nominating Committee** shall consist of nine (9) members appointed by the president of the Executive Board. One-third of the committee shall be appointed annually, subsequent to the meeting of the Convention but prior to the September meeting of the Executive Board. The Nominating Committee shall recommend assignment of Executive Board members to other standing committees of the board and shall also recommend officers for these committees.

Section 13. The responsibilities of the **Business and Finance Committee** shall be to advise and assist the Executive Board in recommending both long-range and short-range goals for the Convention; in recommending the allocations of undesignated resources of the Convention to its respective agencies and institutions; and in recommending and appraising the financial policies and practices of the Convention and of its agencies and institutions.

Section 14. The **Administrative Committee's** principal function shall be to advise and assist the Executive Board in carrying out the program assigned by the Convention to the board for administration. The committee shall recommend plans of organization and general policies to the Executive Board for approval and shall itself review and approve administrative policies and actions as appropriate. The executive director shall report to the Executive Board through this committee. In the event of a vacancy in this position, this committee shall be the channel through which a successor shall be recommended to the Executive Board. The committee shall review and approve the budget proposals of the executive director concerning Executive Board programs and shall recommend to the Business and Finance Committee any desired allocation of undesignated funds. The committee shall also serve the Executive Board by having cognizance of such administrative problems as the board itself may have, including financial and administrative matters relating to standing and special committees of the Convention.

Section 15. The **Missions Support Committee** shall review and approve funds for mission budget supplements, church loans, and special requests from missions for financial assistance.

Section 16. The **Properties Committee** shall study and recommend property acquisition, sale, or lease, study and recommend insurance coverage on properties owned or leased by Executive Board, and study and recommend major building project(s) or renovation.

Section 17. The **Executive Committee** shall consist of the President and Vice President of the Executive Board, who shall serve as chairman and vice chairman respectively of the Executive Committee, plus the chairmen of the other five standing committees of the board. The Executive Committee's sole responsibility shall be to advise and assist the Executive board in carrying out its function as the convention ad interim to the extent this function is specifically delegated by the Convention. The committee shall not in any instance serve as a substitute for, or insert its judgment in lieu of that of the other standing committees of the board; nor shall it review of appraise the work of the other committees unless expressly so directed by the Executive Board. The Executive Board and the duty of conducting the Executive Director's Annual Performance Review and recommending any adjustment to the Executive Director's compensation and benefits.

Section 18. The Executive Board may by resolution define more specifically the duties and responsibilities of its committees; provided, however, that duties and responsibilities contained in these bylaws shall be changed only through amendment of these bylaws.

ARTICLE V. THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR-TREASURER

Section 1. The executive director shall serve as the chief executive officer of the staff of the Executive Board. He shall be responsible for providing executive direction and leadership to all programs assigned to the Executive Board. The Administrative Committee shall determine in writing the specific responsibilities of the executive director; however, the committee itself shall not assume any executive or administrative functions.

Section 2. The executive director shall serve as the principal professional adviser and principal staff assistant to the Executive Board and all of its committees. In performing this function, the executive director is expected and directed to utilize all talents available to the Convention to the end that the Executive Board may be provided with the best possible assistance and advice.

Section 3. The executive director shall approve the employment of all Executive Board personnel. The employment procedures shall be in accordance with policies of the Executive Board.

Section 4. The executive director shall maintain on a current basis a policy manual and an organization manual that reflect the principal policies of the Convention and its general plan of organization. The manuals shall also include the principal policies and general plan of the organization of the Executive Board.

Section 5. When the office of the Executive Director becomes vacant, a successor shall be

elected by the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention. The name of the successor shall be recommended to the Board by a Search Committee comprised of the members of the Executive Committee and the Nominating Committee of the Board. The Search Committee shall be convened by the President of the Board upon the vacancy in the office or upon the notice by the Executive Director to vacate the office. The Search Committee will elect its own chairman, and once convened, will serve until the election of an Executive Director. However, the Executive Board, with proper notice and a two-thirds affirmative vote, may fill the office of the Executive Director at any meeting of the board without a recommendation from the Search Committee.

ARTICLE VI. AMENDMENTS

These bylaws may be amended at any meeting of the Executive Board provided:

1. Committee-sponsored amendments are announced at the preceding meeting of the board or published in the *Baptist Message* (print edition or digital edition) at least one month in advance of the board meeting at which they are considered.

2. Amendments from the floor are proposed at one meeting and acted upon at the next meeting.

3. Amendments to carry must receive a two-thirds vote of those present and voting.

LOUISIANA BAPTIST CONVENTION CHURCH SITE PLAN

I. PREAMBLE

That Louisiana Baptist Convention has been involved with churches and associations in the starting of new churches since its organization in 1848. The leaders of the Convention have been aware for some time that there was a need for some organization that could act promptly and efficiently in the matter of acquiring new church sites for developing new churches and missions. Accordingly, the following plan has been developed after thorough and open discussions of the matter by related staff persons, appropriate committees and subcommittees of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board, qualified lay persons in the fields of real estate, business, finance, and new churches.

II. ORGANIZATION

Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation

The Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation is a wholly-owned, non-profit, subsidiary corporation of the Executive Board, Louisiana Baptist Convention.

Purpose

The purpose shall be to assist Louisiana churches, associations, and the Louisiana Baptist Convention in the acquisitions of church sites for new Louisiana Baptist churches. The Church Site Corporation may purchase, receive, and otherwise acquire real and personal property for the establishment of new churches and missions, and to assist churches and associations related to the Louisiana Baptist Convention in acquiring real and personal property for the establishment of new churches and missions.

Membership and Participation

1. The membership of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board.

2. The Board of Directors of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be elected by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board upon recommendation of the Nominating Committee of the Executive Board.

3. Participation in the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be open to all persons interested in the development of new churches and missions in Louisiana.

- (1) Participation shall be by donation of a share(s) of donation.
- (2) Donor of a share or more shall be entitled to receive:
 - a. A donation share certificate stating the number of shares donated. These shares may be donated in the name of the donor, a family member, some other person or a memorial to a deceased person.
 - b. A quarterly newsletter presenting the status, actions, and plans of the Church Site Corporation.
 - c. A copy of the annual financial statement of the Church Site Corporation.

4. Relationship to Louisiana Baptist Convention Business and Financial Plan.

The Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall conduct its business, activities, programs, and projects subject to the Louisiana Baptist Convention Business and Financial Plan.

III. FUNDING

Sources of Capital Funds

1. Capital funds for the corpus of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be obtained by the receipt of donations for donation shares by individuals, churches, associations, businesses, foundations, and others interested in the development of new churches. The Church Site Corporation shall have the power to receive donation shares in the amount of 50,000 shares at \$25.00 per share initially. Subsequently, after the initial 50,000 shares have been donated, approval for additional shares must be secured from the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board.

2. The Church Site Corporation shall be responsible for administering the Mission Land Fund of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board. The corpus of the Mission Land Fund is to be transferred to the Church Site Corporation upon its activation on January 1, 1980. The Church Site Corporation shall have the responsibility of establishing policies and guidelines for this fund.

3. The Church Site Corporation shall be empowered by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board to borrow money provided the Church Site Corporation can repay any and all loans with its own sources and does not require repayment of loans from Executive Board funds.

4. The Church Site Corporation may use its earnings from interest income, profits from property dealings, gifts, bequests and donations, unless otherwise specified by the donor, to increase the corpus of the Corporation.

Sources of Grant Funds

1. The Church Site Corporation may seek and receive gifts, bequests, and donations of certain monies or real or personal properties to be used as grants to churches and associations to assist in the acquisition of new church sites.

2. The Corporation may request and receive allocations for its grant program from the Georgia Barnette State Mission Offering.

3. The Corporation may request and receive allocations from the Louisiana Baptist Convention Cooperative Program Budget to be used in its grant program.

4. The Corporation may use the earnings from its interest income, profits from property dealings, gifts, bequests, and donations, unless otherwise specified by the donor, for its grant program.

IV. GUIDELINES

Name

The name of this plan shall be the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Plan and the name of the organization shall be the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation. **Responsibility**

The Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall be responsible to plan and conduct the affairs of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Plan as adopted by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board and the Louisiana Baptist Convention and as revised from time to time by the Executive Board.

Nomination and Election of Board of Directors

The Church Site Corporation shall consist of nine (9) members elected by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board upon recommendation of the Executive Board Nominating Committee, and four (4) ex officio members.

1. The Board of Directors shall be composed of nine (9) elected members and four (4) ex officio members as follows:

a. Six (6) mission-minded persons (usually lay persons) experienced in finance, business or real estate, representing different areas of Louisiana.

b. Three (3) mission-minded church staff members with experience in real estate and new churches, if possible.

c. Four (4) ex officio members, the Louisiana Baptist Convention president, the chairman of the Executive Board, the chairman of the Missions Support Committee and the Executive Director.

2. Nominations to be developed in accordance with the procedures of the Executive Board.

3. The elected members of the Board of Directors shall serve for three years, and be eligible to serve a second three-year term. (In the beginning some members should be elected for three, four, and five-year terms in order to establish the rotation system.)

Officers

The officers of the Corporation shall consist of a president, vice president, and recording secretary. The recording secretary shall be the Executive Director of the Louisiana Baptist Convention or his designate.

The general counsel for the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board shall serve as legal advisor of the Corporation.

Meetings of the Board of Directors

The meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held in the Baptist Building, Alexandria, or in such place as may be designated by the Board of Directors or its officers. The Board of Directors shall meet at least twice each year, and as often as necessary to carry on the business of the Corporation. The President shall have the authority to call a meeting of the Board of Directors when it is deemed expedient to do so.

A majority of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Duties of the Board of Directors

The Board shall meet at stated times for the purpose of conducting the affairs of the Corporation. It shall also be the responsibility of the Board to make or have made certain studies of population and other data to establish trends and needs for new churches. The Board shall make decisions related to acquiring new church sites based upon demographic data, land surveys, appraisals, zoning, evidence of good title, legal description of the property, participation of local forces in the financing of the project, maintenance of the property, program evaluation, priority of the new work, available funds or other such information that the Board may require.

It is anticipated that the field work and studies shall be done by appropriate staff members of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board whose program assignments relate to new churches.

The Board shall also make regular reports of its work and actions to the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board.

Authority of the Board of Directors

1. The Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation shall have authority under its own charter to purchase, subdivide, sell, lease, rent, exchange, donate, and finance the purchase and/or sale of real and personal property to be used for purposes consistent with its stated program.

2. The Corporation shall have the authority to loan, or make grants to churches and associations related to the Louisiana Baptist Convention, so long as it does not diminish its corpus funds; terms of the loans and grants shall be established by the Board of Directors of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Church Site Corporation.

3. It shall be the duty and responsibility of the Corporation to actively seek out priority and strategic church sites in all areas of Louisiana.

4. The Corporation shall discuss and utilize the services of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board and staff persons of the Executive Board assigned to work with the development of new churches.

5. All properties purchased by the Church Site Corporation shall be held in the name of the Corporation.

Working Arrangements

1. The Board of Directors shall work with appropriate program leaders on the staff of the Executive Board in carrying out this work. It shall also be responsible to work with local churches and associations in the acquisition of new church sites. If it is not feasible to work with local Baptist leaders, the Board may proceed as necessary.

2. Any properties given to the Louisiana Baptist Convention through the Church Site Corporation shall be given without restrictions, except as agreed upon by the Board of Directors.

3. A local Baptist Church cooperating with the Louisiana Baptist Convention and the local association shall have the responsibility of sponsoring each new mission. It will be the normal procedure for the Board of Directors to have in hand a plan for each new church site, before it is purchased.

4. When new church sites are conveyed to sponsoring churches, certain stipulations shall be made to the church by the Board of Directors as follows:

a. The sponsoring church may not change the agreed upon financial plan for development without first consulting the Board of Directors.

b. The sponsoring church shall inform the mission church of the financial contributions made by the Church Site Corporation, the association and the sponsoring church in the acquisition of the property.

c. It shall be the sponsoring church's responsibility to enter into an agreement with its mission and the Louisiana Baptist Convention whereby any monies given or granted by the Corporation will be returned should such mission, or mission and sponsoring church, or mission after it is constituted as a church, disassociates itself from the Louisiana Baptist Convention. A recommended instrument shall be provided by the Church Site Corporation.

5. The Business Division office of the Louisiana Baptist Convention will be responsible to provide accounting and other business services to the Church Site Corporation.

Revisions

The provision of this document may be revised or amended by the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board at any regular or special meeting of the Executive Board, acting on the recommendation of appropriate committees of the Executive Board.

BAPTIST FAITH AND MESSAGE Adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, June 14, 2000

The 1999 session of the Southern Baptist Convention, meeting in Atlanta, Georgia, adopted the following motion addressed to the President of the Convention:

"I move that in your capacity as Southern Baptist Convention chairman, you appoint a blue ribbon committee to review the *Baptist Faith and Message* statement with the responsibility to report and bring any recommendations to this meeting next June in Orlando."

President Paige Patterson appointed the committee as follows: Max Barnett (OK), Steve Gaines (AL), Susie Hawkins (TX), Rudy A. Hernandez (TX), Charles S. Kelley, Jr. (LA), Heather King (IN), Richard D. Land (TN), Fred Luter (LA), R. Albert Mohler, Jr. (KY), T. C. Pinckney (VA), Nelson Price (GA), Adrian Rogers (TN), Roger Spradlin (CA), Simon Tsoi (AZ), Jerry Vines (FL). Adrian Rogers (TN) was appointed chairman.

Your committee thus constituted begs leave to present its report as follows:

Baptists are a people of deep beliefs and cherished doctrines. Throughout our history we have been a confessional people, adopting statements of faith as a witness to our beliefs and a pledge of our faithfulness to the doctrines revealed in Holy Scripture.

Our confessions of faith are rooted in historical precedent, as the church in every age has been called upon to define and defend its beliefs. Each generation of Christians bears the responsibility of guarding the treasury of truth that has been entrusted to us [2 Timothy 1:14]. Facing a new century, Southern Baptists must meet the demands and duties of the present hour.

New challenges to faith appear in every age. A pervasive anti-supernaturalism in the culture was answered by Southern Baptists in 1925, when the *Baptist Faith and Message* was first adopted by this Convention. In 1963, Southern Baptists responded to assaults upon the authority and truthfulness of the Bible by adopting revisions to the *Baptist Faith and Message*. The Convention added an article on "The Family" in 1998, thus answering cultural confusion with the clear teachings of Scripture. Now, faced with a culture hostile to the very notion of truth, this generation of Baptists must claim anew the eternal truths of the Christian faith.

Your committee respects and celebrates the heritage of the *Baptist Faith and Message*, and affirms the decision of the Convention in 1925 to adopt the *New Hampshire Confession of Faith*, "revised at certain points and with some additional articles growing out of certain needs" We also respect the important contributions of the 1925 and 1963 editions of the *Baptist Faith and Message*.

With the 1963 committee, we have been guided in our work by the 1925 "statement of the historic Baptist conception of the nature and function of confessions of faith in our religious and denominational life" It is, therefore, quoted in full as a part of this report to the Convention:

(1) That they constitute a consensus of opinion of some Baptist body, large or small, for the general instruction and guidance of our own people and others concerning those articles of the Christian faith which are most surely held among us. They are not intended to add anything to the simple conditions of salvation revealed in the New Testament, viz., repentance toward God and faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord.

(2) That we do not regard them as complete statements of our faith, having any quality of finality or infallibility. As in the past so in the future, Baptists should hold themselves free to revise their statements of faith as may seem to them wise and expedient at any time.

(3) That any group of Baptists, large or small, have the inherent right to draw up for themselves and publish to the world a confession of their faith whenever they may think it advisable to do so. (4) That the sole authority for faith and practice among Baptists is the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments. Confessions are only guides in interpretation, having no authority over the conscience.

(5) That they are statements of religious convictions, drawn from the Scriptures, and are not to be used to hamper freedom of thought or investigation in other realms of life.

Baptists cherish and defend religious liberty, and deny the right of any secular or religious authority to impose a confession of faith upon a church or body of churches. We honor the principles of soul competency and the priesthood of believers, affirming together both our liberty in Christ and our accountability to each other under the Word of God.

Baptist churches, associations, and general bodies have adopted confessions of faith as a witness to the world, and as instruments of doctrinal accountability. We are not embarrassed to state before the world that these are doctrines we hold precious and as essential to the Baptist tradition of faith and practice.

As a committee, we have been charged to address the "certain needs" of our own generation. In an age increasingly hostile to Christian truth, our challenge is to express the truth as revealed in Scripture, and to bear witness to Jesus Christ, who is "*the Way, the Truth, and the Life.*"

The 1963 committee rightly sought to identify and affirm "certain definite doctrines that Baptists believe, cherish, and with which they have been and are now closely identified." Our living faith is established upon eternal truths. "Thus this generation of Southern Baptists is in historic succession of intent and purpose as it endeavors to state for its time and theological climate those articles of the Christian faith which are most surely held among us."

It is the purpose of this statement of faith and message to set forth certain teachings which we believe.

THE BAPTIST FAITH & MESSAGE

I. THE SCRIPTURES

The Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is God's revelation of Himself to man. It is a perfect treasure of divine instruction. It has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth, without any mixture of error, for its matter. Therefore, all Scripture is totally true and trustworthy. It reveals the principles by which God judges us, and therefore is, and will remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and religious opinions should be tried. All Scripture is a testimony to Christ, who is Himself the focus of divine revelation.

III. MAN

Man is the special creation of God, made in His own image. He created them male and female as the crowning work of His creation. The gift of gender is thus part of the goodness of God's creation. IV. SALVATION

Salvation involves the redemption of the whole man, and is offered freely to all who accept Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour, who by His own blood obtained eternal redemption for the believer. In its broadest sense salvation includes regeneration, justification, sanctification, and glorification. There is no salvation apart from personal faith in Jesus Christ as Lord.

A. Regeneration, or the new birth, is a work of God's grace whereby believers become new creatures in Christ Jesus. It is a change of heart wrought by the Holy Spirit through conviction of sin, to which the sinner responds in repentance toward God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. Repentance and faith are inseparable experiences of grace.

Repentance is a genuine turning from sin toward God. Faith is the acceptance of Jesus Christ and commitment of the entire personality to Him as Lord and Saviour.

B. Justification is God's gracious and full acquittal upon principles of His righteousness of all sinners who repent and believe in Christ. Justification brings the believer unto a relationship of peace and favor with God.

C. Sanctification is the experience, beginning in regeneration, by which the believer is set apart to God's purposes, and is enabled to progress toward moral and spiritual maturity through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit dwelling in him. Growth in grace should continue throughout the regenerate person's life.

D. Glorification is the culmination of salvation and is the final blessed and abiding state of the redeemed.

V. GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE

Election is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates, justifies, sanctifies, and glorifies sinners. It is consistent with the free agency of man, and comprehends all the means in connection with the end. It is the glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, and is infinitely wise, holy, and unchangeable. It excludes boasting and promotes humility.

All true believers endure to the end. Those whom God has accepted in Christ, and sanctified by His Spirit, will never fall away from the state of grace, but shall persevere to the end. Believers may fall into sin through neglect and temptation, whereby they grieve the Spirit, impair their graces and comforts, and bring reproach on the cause of Christ and temporal judgments on themselves; yet they shall be kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

VI. THE CHURCH

A New Testament church of the Lord Jesus Christ is an autonomous local congregation of baptized believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; observing the two ordinances of Christ, governed by His laws, exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word, and seeking to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth. Each congregation operates under the Lordship of Christ through democratic processes. In such a congregation each member is responsible and accountable to Christ as Lord. Its scriptural officers are pastors and deacons. While both men and women are gifted for service in the church, the office of pastor is limited to men as qualified by Scripture.

The New Testament speaks also of the church as the Body of Christ which includes all of the redeemed of all the ages, believers from every tribe, and tongue, and people, and nation.

VII. BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. It is an act of obedience symbolizing the believer's faith in a crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, the believer's death to sin, the burial of the old life, and the resurrection to walk in newness of life in Christ Jesus. It is a testimony to his faith in the final resurrection of the dead. Being a church ordinance, it is prerequisite to the privileges of church membership and to the Lord's Supper.

The Lord's Supper is a symbolic act of obedience whereby members of the church, through partaking of the bread and the fruit of the vine, memorialize the death of the Redeemer and anticipate His second coming.

VIII. THE LORD'S DAY

The first day of the week is the Lord's Day. It is a Christian institution for regular observance. It commemorates the resurrection of Christ from the dead and should include exercises of worship and spiritual devotion, both public and private. Activities on the Lord's Day should be commensurate with the Christian's conscience under the Lordship of Jesus Christ.

IX. THE KINGDOM

The Kingdom of God includes both His general sovereignty over the universe and His particular kingship over men who willfully acknowledge Him as King. Particularly the Kingdom is the realm of salvation into which men enter by trustful, childlike commitment to Jesus Christ. Christians ought to pray and to labor that the Kingdom may come and God's will be done on earth. The full consummation of the Kingdom awaits the return of Jesus Christ and the end of this age.

X. LAST THINGS

God, in His own time and in His own way, will bring the world to its appropriate end. According to His promise, Jesus Christ will return personally and visibly in glory to the earth; the dead will be raised; and Christ will judge all men in righteousness. The unrighteous will be consigned to Hell, the place of everlasting punishment. The righteous in their resurrected and glorified bodies will receive their reward and will dwell forever in Heaven with the Lord.

XI. EVANGELISM AND MISSIONS

It is the duty and privilege of every follower of Christ and of every church of the Lord Jesus Christ to endeavor to make disciples of all nations. The new birth of man's spirit by God's Holy Spirit means the birth of love for others. Missionary effort on the part of all rests thus upon a spiritual necessity of the regenerate life, and is expressly and repeatedly commanded in the teachings of Christ. The Lord Jesus Christ has commanded the preaching of the gospel to all nations. It is the duty of every child of God to seek constantly to win the lost to Christ by verbal witness undergirded by a Christian lifestyle, and by other methods in harmony with the gospel of Christ.

XII. EDUCATION

Christianity is the faith of enlightenment and intelligence. In Jesus Christ abide all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge. All sound learning is, therefore, a part of our Christian heritage. The new birth opens all human faculties and creates a thirst for knowledge. Moreover, the cause of education in the Kingdom of Christ is co-ordinate with the causes of missions and general benevolence, and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches. An adequate system of Christian education is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people.

In Christian education there should be a proper balance between academic freedom and academic responsibility. Freedom in any orderly relationship of human life is always limited and never absolute. The freedom of a teacher in a Christian school, college, or seminary is limited by the pre-eminence of Jesus Christ, by the authoritative nature of the Scriptures, and by the distinct purpose for which the school exists.

XIII. STEWARDSHIP

God is the source of all blessings, temporal and spiritual; all that we have and are we owe to Him. Christians have a spiritual debtorship to the whole world, a holy trusteeship in the gospel, and a binding stewardship in their possessions. They are therefore under obligation to serve Him with their time, talents, and material possessions; and should recognize all these as entrusted to them to use for the glory of God and for helping others. According to the Scriptures, Christians should contribute of their means cheerfully, regularly, systematically, proportionately, and liberally for the advancement of the Redeemer's cause on earth.

XIV. COOPERATION

Christ's people should, as occasion requires, organize such associations and conventions as may best secure cooperation for the great objects of the Kingdom of God. Such organizations have no authority over one another or over the churches. They are voluntary and advisory bodies designed to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of our people in the most effective manner. Members of New Testament churches should cooperate with one another in carrying forward the missionary, educational, and benevolent ministries for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Christian unity in the New Testament sense is spiritual harmony and voluntary cooperation for common ends by various groups of Christ's people. Cooperation is desirable between the various Christian denominations, when the end to be attained is itself justified, and when such cooperation involves no violation of conscience or compromise of loyalty to Christ and His Word as revealed in the New Testament.

XV. THE CHRISTIAN AND THE SOCIAL ORDER

All Christians are under obligation to seek to make the will of Christ supreme in our own lives and in human society. Means and methods used for the improvement of society and the establishment of righteousness among men can be truly and permanently helpful only when they are rooted in the regeneration of the individual by the saving grace of God in Jesus Christ. In the spirit of Christ, Christians should oppose racism, every form of greed, selfishness, and vice, and all forms of sexual immorality, including adultery, homosexuality, and pornography. We should work to provide for the orphaned, the needy, the abused, the aged, the helpless, and the sick. We should speak on behalf of the unborn and contend for the sanctity of all human life from conception to natural death. Every Christian should seek to bring industry, government, and society as a whole under the sway of the principles of righteousness, truth, and brotherly love. In order to promote these ends Christians should be ready to work with all men of good will in any good cause, always being careful to act in the spirit of love without compromising their loyalty to Christ and His truth.

XVI. PEACE AND WAR

It is the duty of Christians to seek peace with all men on principles of righteousness. In accordance with the spirit and teachings of Christ they should do all in their power to put an end to war.

The true remedy for the war spirit is the gospel of our Lord. The supreme need of the world is the acceptance of His teachings in all the affairs of men and nations, and the practical application of His law of love. Christian people throughout the world should pray for the reign of the Prince of Peace.

XVII. RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

God alone is Lord of the conscience, and He has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to His Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to every church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Civil government being ordained of God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to the civil power to carry on its work. The gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its ends. The state has no right to impose penalties for religious opinions of any kind. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal, and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

XVIII. THE FAMILY

God has ordained the family as the foundational institution of human society. It is composed of persons related to one another by marriage, blood, or adoption.

Marriage is the uniting of one man and one woman in covenant commitment for a lifetime. It is God's unique gift to reveal the union between Christ and His church and to provide for the man and the woman in marriage the framework for intimate companionship, the channel of sexual expression according to biblical standards, and the means for procreation of the human race.

The husband and wife are of equal worth before God, since both are created in God's image. The marriage relationship models the way God relates to His people. A husband is to love his wife as Christ loved the church. He has the God-given responsibility to provide for, to protect, and to lead his family. A wife is to submit herself graciously to the servant leadership of her husband even as the church willingly submits to the headship of Christ. She, being in the image of God as is her husband and thus equal to him, has the God-given responsibility to respect her husband and to serve as his helper in managing the household and nurturing the next generation.

Children, from the moment of conception, are a blessing and heritage from the Lord. Parents are to demonstrate to their children God's pattern for marriage. Parents are to teach their children spiritual and moral values and to lead them, through consistent lifestyle example and loving discipline, to make choices based on biblical truth. Children are to honor and obey their parents.

CHURCH-STATE RELATIONS

OUR HISTORIC CONCEPT OF RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

Democracy itself is rooted in the assumption that man is capable of making the choices needed for governance of his own life and his social institutions. This assumption is based in turn on the Christian concept that man is essentially a spiritual being; and only through the responses of his spiritual nature can he relate himself to God and thus rise above his animal limitations. But only one who is free can make a genuine response to God. Religious freedom is, therefore, antecedent to the creation of civil and political freedom, which constitutes the nature of democracy.

Historically, Baptists have been aggressive advocates of absolute freedom of conscience for all men. In England and Colonial America they led in formulating the concept of church-state separation. The power of government then was arbitrary and absolute, backed by an established church, the two often working in collusion to give mutual support to each other. The established church forced its doctrine and modes of worship upon all, with government lending use of its power to punish dissenters. Thus protected and supported, the established church itself was a strong political force. When joined to protect and expand their mutual vested interests, the two constituted a powerful political combine, perpetuating their power through forcing conformity in worship and stamping out dissent.

Baptists believed that this denied to man the right to live as God had willed that he live, a free and self-determining being. It destroyed an individual's liberty of the spirit, freedom of conscience, right of choice - in short, all that made a man a man, according to the Baptist conception. It was in the context of these experiences that Baptists evolved their unique conception of complete separation of the two in their respective operations.

During the evolution of the separation concept their focus of concern was always to protect the individual, Baptist or not, in the free exercise of his religious conscience, always, of course, within the context of the Christian concept of life dedicated to ministering to and serving the needs of people - whether family, neighbor or stranger. Just so on the present issue. Louisiana Baptists recognize, as Jesus indicated to Peter on the mountain top, that their place is down there in the valley where the people are - teaching, healing, serving. We are free, not to enjoy release from the demands of life, but to carry out the work of our Lord on the streets of life where men work, learn, and suffer.

GUIDELINES

This committee was appointed essentially "to recommend guidelines for policy implementation" concerning institutional use of governmental funds. In actuality, the Louisiana Baptist Convention has by its practice already adopted a general policy of selective participation in government programs, wherever it was felt there was no impingement on the institution's independence. It is the element of "selectivity" in this policy that makes it essential, for the guidance of all concerned - the Convention officers and the trustees and administrators of the institution. Out of its deliberations, the committee has identified certain statements of general principle which appear to offer valid guidelines for those responsible for institutional decision making.

First: The Institution Should Identify and Clarify Its Basic Purposes.

Through continuing study and open discussion, the administrators, staff, and representatives of the governing board should develop a clear-cut understanding of the basic nature and purposes of the institution. This should be reduced to writing and circulated regularly among all related in any way with the institution.

This study should become an ongoing process of constant re-evaluation in light of our constantly changing social and technological demands. To provide leadership for this is a function of the executive officer.

Second: Any Assistance That Creates a Limitation on or Diversion From These Purposes Should Not Be Permitted.

Once the institutional staff and its constituency are clear in their concept of the institution's nature and primary purposes, all limitations or diversions, financial or otherwise, should be avoided.

Third: Acceptance of Government Grants.

No grant to the institution from any government agency shall be accepted. A grant shall be construed to be any transfer of funds or property for which the institution does not give adequate consideration.

Fourth: The Institution Must Retain Its Own Integrity In the Matter of Control.

In considering whether to seek or accept funds of any type, the institution must determine whether any part of the agreement provides for governmental control of the institution's affairs - except for normal accounting procedure for the shared funds.

The institution must retain the right to determine what religious activities will be held on the premises. The Trustees of the institution and their staff must have freedom to operate in accordance with principles and policies inherent in good programs and not on the expediency of politics.

Fifth: Participation Relationships Must be Voluntary, With Clear-Cut Terminal Arrangements.

In participating in government programs, the relationship should be voluntary on both sides, with either party able to terminate the agreement when it appears desirable. The agreement should indicate clearly the point at which the participating institution has fulfilled its obligation in the contract.

Sixth: The Institution Must Not Become Dependent on These Funds for Program Operation.

The trustees should not permit acceptance of funds in any area of program to such an extent that the institution becomes so dependent on outside funds that it would suffer unduly if they were discontinued.

Seventh: The Institution Must Protect the Integrity of Its Basic Programs.

The trustees must guard against any tendency on the part of the institution to become so involved with government programs that the institutional programs begin to grow around the emphasis on this public phase of its work to the neglect of its private sector.

Eighth: The Institution Must Not Accept Funds That Relate to Teaching of Religion.

The trustees should not accept any governmental funds that might in any way come to influence the way in which religion is taught or the word of God spread in the institution.

Ninth: The Institution's Trustees Should Have a Large Degree of Freedom in Decision-making In These Operational Matters.

After the Convention has adopted a definite statement of policy guidelines, it should give the institutional trustees a large degree of freedom, within the guidelines, to formulate programs and make decisions affecting the ongoing program in this area as in others. With appropriate reporting through the established channels, the trustees will keep the Convention informed on their program decisions. Only so can the Convention and the trustees perform their respective roles with integrity.

The proper function of the Convention is to establish over-all policy directions. That of the trustees and their administrators is to develop and implement programs for the individual institutions within the framework of these established policy statements.

The Committee on Nominations and the Committee on Committees reports will be first presented and then followed by nominations from the floor, if any. Then the Committee reports shall be voted on for adoption by the Convention. If the Committee reports are adopted as presented, then the vote on persons nominated from the floor becomes moot. That a time for questions be provided following the reports of convention entities and the Executive Board. These standing rules are printed on page 31 in the Book of Reports.

- 12. David Goza called for the Introduction of Motions.
- 13. Terry Young, messenger, Airline, Shreveport presented the following motions:
 - I move that Southern Baptists of Louisiana use prayer, more funding, and student recruiting to reaffirm our dedication to and partnership with Louisiana Christian University.
 - I move that Louisiana Baptists establish a day of prayer for Louisiana Christian University on the first Sunday in February.
 - I move that Louisiana Baptists encourage each of our churches to set up a special annual offering for the next three years to be collected on the day of prayer for Louisiana Christian University.
- 14. Hance Dilbeck, President, GuideStone Financial Resources, Dallas, Texas, led in the first Bible Study using Psalm 78:70-72 as his text.
- 15. LBC First Vice President, messenger, Fairview, Coushatta, Matt Endris, assumed the chair and announced there are 491 messengers registered as of 9:12 a.m.
- 16. Matt Endris called for nominations for Louisiana Baptist Convention President.
- 17. Tommy Middleton, messenger, Jefferson, Baton Rouge, nominated David Goza, pastor, Jefferson, Baton Rouge, as LBC President.
- 18. Matt Endris called for other nominations. There were no other nominees.
- In compliance with Article VIII, Section 2, of the LBC Constitution, LBC Secretary/ Treasurer, Steve Horn, cast a unanimous ballot for David Goza as President of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.
- 20. Matt Endris declared David Goza as president elect.
- 21. Executive Board President, Tim Williams, pastor, Williams Boulevard, Kenner, presented the following recommendation from the Executive Board and directed messengers to review the complete Executive Board report on pages 10-11 in the *Book of Reports*: *That the Louisiana Baptist Convention meeting in Shreveport, Louisiana, November 12, 2024, adopt the 2025 Cooperative Program Allocation Budget of \$17,380,808 as printed on page 12 in the Book of Reports.*

- 23. David Goza called for questions regarding the Executive Board report.
- 24. Committee on Nominations Chairman, Leo Miller, messenger, First, Denham Springs, presented the Committee on Nominations Report as printed on pages 27-30 in the *Book of Reports* and moved the adoption of the report.
- 25. David Goza called for additional nominations. There were none.
- 26. David Goza called for the question, and the motion carried.
- 27. Committee on Committees Chairman, Cody Albritton, messenger, North Monroe, Monroe, presented the Committee on Committees Report as printed on pages 25-26 in the *Book of Reports* and moved the adoption of the report.

- 28. David Goza called for additional nominations. There were none.
- 29. David Goza called for the question, and the motion carried.
- 30. David Goza called for nominations for LBC First Vice President.
- 31. Jack Bell, messenger, Fairview, Coushatta, nominated Matt Endris, pastor, Fairview, Coushatta, as LBC First Vice President.
- 32. David Goza called for other nominations. There were no other nominees.
- 33. In compliance with Article VIII, Section 2, of the LBC Constitution, LBC Secretary/Treasurer, Steve Horn, cast a unanimous ballot for Matt Endris as LBC First Vice President of the Louisiana Baptist Convention.
- 34. David Goza declared Matt Endris as LBC First Vice President elect.
- 35. Executive Editor of the *Baptist Message*, Will Hall, presented the *Baptist Message* report. Dr. Hall directed messengers to the printed report on pages 38-40 in the *Book of Reports*. Dr. Hall stated that the *Baptist Message* worked diligently the past year to report on Louisiana Baptist events around the state. He stated that the Office of Public Policy worked closely with baptist senators and legislators to pass legislature that impacts Louisiana Baptists.
- 36. David Goza called for questions regarding the Baptist Message report.
- 37. Carl Gulde, messenger, Mt. Nebo, Jena, asked if the Ten Commandments can officially be placed in the classroom and Dr. Hall responded that only five parishes are prohibited from posting at this time because of a lawsuit. Signs can be placed in all other classrooms across the state.
- 38. Committee on Moral and Social Concerns Chairman, Chad Gilbert, messenger, First, New Orleans, presented the Committee on Moral and Social Concerns Report as printed on pages 36-37 in the *Book of Reports*. He stated messengers should celebrate the efforts of the Louisiana Baptists Office of Public Policy in legislature.
- 39. Executive Director Steve Horn began his report with expressing appreciation to Dr. Chuck Pourciau and his team and members for their graciousness in hosting the Annual Meeting. Dr. Horn presented his report focusing on four key areas of our partnership as Louisiana Baptists. 1) Connect – Instead of a theme for Annual Meeting as in past years, we have adopted a title for the Annual Meeting of "Connect" and we will continue to use this title in the years to come which defines the very purpose of our annual gathering. 2) Cooperate – The strength of our relationship as well as the strength of our impact is the willingness of very different churches to cooperate with one another for the sake of God's kingdom. 3) Commission - Our Commission is simple and has been handed down to us by our Lord as the Great Commission (Matthew 28:19-20). Dr. Horn announced the 3:16 Sunday scheduled for March 16 and challenged that every Louisiana Baptist pastor preach from John 3:16 on that Sunday. 4) Commitment – Dr. Horn stated that our personal commitment to the Lord is the most important. Our devotion in the past does not guarantee our devotion for today. Our devotion today does not guarantee our devotion for the future. We must walk daily with the Lord. He concluded his report by thanking messengers for attending Connect 2024. He asked them to take his challenge back to their communities and churches and lead them to connect better, cooperate more fully, be on fire for the Great Commission, and pay attention to their own personal commitment to the Lord.
- 40. David Goza called for a 10-minute break at 10:12 a.m.
- 41. David Goza called the session back to order at 10:22 a.m.
- 42. David Goza called for the Introduction of Motions.
- 43. Lewis Richerson, messenger, Woodlawn, Baton Rouge, presented the following motion: *I move to amend the Articles of Incorporation of the LBC, Article VI, section 5, and add point 5 to read "affirms the office of pastor to be limited to men, not only to the titles of senior pastor or lead pastor, but to any role designated by the noun, 'pastor.'"*
- 44. Tyler Hennessee led in special music.

- 45. Matthew James, Vice President of Enrollment at New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, New Orleans, preached the Convention Sermon using Acts 11:19 as his text.
- 46. Glen Harrigill, pastor, Riverside, Vidalia, led in the benediction, and session one adjourned at 11:25 a.m.

Session Two

- 47. President David Goza called the second session of the 177th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention to order at 1:45 p.m. A quorum was present.
- 48. Tyler Hennessee led in a time of praise and worship.
- 49. Tim Williams, pastor, Williams Boulevard, Kenner, led in the opening prayer.
- 50. Committee on Order of Business Chairman, Ronnie McLellan, presented a report from the committee:

Terry Young, messenger, Airline, Shreveport, presented three motions. The committee believes that motion one is more of a resolution than a motion. After speaking with Terry, he decided to withdraw his motion. Motion two has been scheduled for debate at 3:40 p.m., and motion three has been referred to the Executive Board. Lewis Richerson, messenger, Woodlawn, Baton Rouge, presented a motion to amend Article, VI, section 5, of the LBC Articles of Incorporation. For those who were not in the hall during the morning session, when the motion was presented, Dr. Horn informed the messengers that a paragraph had been inadvertently omitted from the LBC Articles of Incorporation as printed in the Book of Reports. The following paragraph was omitted: LBC Articles of Incorporation – ARTICLE XVIII. AMENDMENTS These articles may be amended at any annual meeting session of the Convention, or at a special session convoked specially for this purpose, by two-thirds of the messengers present and voting, provided: Section 1. Proposed amendments originating on the floor of the Convention were submitted in writing at the previous session the Convention, published in full in the Annual and referred to the Executive Board of the Convention for study and recommendation. Therefore, the committee has referred this motion to the Executive Board for further deliberation and consideration and to report back to the messengers at the 2025 Annual Meeting.

- 60. David Goza called for a raised ballot vote on the motion presented by Brian Gunter to bring out the resolution submitted by him to the Committee on Resolutions and the motion failed.
- 61. David Goza called for the adoption of Resolutions 1-4 as printed on pages 32-35 in the *Book of Reports*, and the motion was adopted.
- 62. LBC First Vice President, Matt Endris, assumed the chair.
- 63. Tyler Hennessee led in a time of praise and worship.
- 64. David Goza presented the President's Address using Titus 2:11-13 as his text.
- 65. President David Goza assumed the chair following his address.

- 66. Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries Executive Director, Perry Hancock, presented a report. Dr. Hancock stated that as a result of all the effort and investment in the Children's Home, needs are being met, lives are being changed, and people are being saved. Hancock stated that the Children's Home is celebrating 125 years of ministry in 2025 and invited messengers to come and visit the Children's Home during the anniversary year. He thanked messengers for their continued support of the Cooperative Program.
- 67. David Goza called for questions regarding the Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries report.
- 68. David Goza called for nominations for LBC Second Vice President.

- 72. David Goza declared Craig James as LBC Second Vice President elect.
- 73. Louisiana Baptist Foundation Executive Director, Jeff Steed, presented the Louisiana Baptist Foundation report. Dr. Steed highlighted and shared a brief overview of his current staff. He updated messengers on the LBF Vision 200, and the services provided by the Foundation. Dr. Steed concluded his report by stating that the Louisiana Baptist Foundation is celebrating 80 years of ministry.
- 74. David Goza called for questions regarding the Louisiana Baptist Foundation report.
- 75. David Goza called for a time of Miscellaneous Business and reminded messengers of the rules regarding the debate of motions.
- 76. David Goza read the motion submitted by Terry Young, messenger, Airline, Shreveport: *I move that Louisiana Baptists establish a day of prayer for Louisiana Christian University on the first Sunday in February.*
- 77. Terry Young, messenger, Airline, Shreveport, spoke for the motion.
- 78. Tommy Kiker, messenger East Leesville, Leesville, and president of the Louisiana Christian University board of trustees, also affirmed the motion.
- 79. David Goza called for a raised ballot vote, and the motion was adopted.
- 80. Louisiana Christian University Acting President, David Jeffreys, presented the Louisiana Christian University Report. Dr. Jeffreys expressed appreciation to the messengers for their support during this interim time between presidents. He provided highlights of activities as well as the ministry opportunities on campus. Dr. Jeffreys thanked the messengers for their continued support of the Cooperative Program. He concluded his report with a video presentation.
- 81. David Goza asked Terry Young, messenger, Airline, Shreveport, to lead in prayer for Louisiana Christian University and the President's Search Committee.
- 82. David Goza called for questions regarding the Louisiana Christian University report.
- 83. David Goza recognized outgoing LBC Second Vice President, Geovany Gomez, LaVina, Kenner, and presented him with a plaque.
- 84. David Goza recognized newly elected officers, LBC First Vice President, Matt Endris, Fairview, Coushatta and LBC Second Vice President, Craig James, Atlanta, Verda.
- 85. Steve Horn recognized and congratulated LBC President, David Goza, upon his re-election as LBC President.
- 86. Matt Endris, messenger, Fairview, Coushatta, led in the benediction.
- 87. President David Goza adjourned the 177th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention at 4:16 p.m.

BUSINESS AND INFORMATION SERVICES TEAM Dale D. Lingenfelter, Director

The Business and Information Services Team serves as a support group for all the work of the LBC State Missions Services. The team provides expertise in the areas of financial accounting, information technology, facilities maintenance, office services, and human resources as well as providing hosting and program services for conferences and camps through Tall Timbers. Our goal is to enhance and support the work of all LBC Teams, so they accomplish the missions and ministry goals of the Convention.

In addition to coordinating the Annual Church Profile (ACP) process for the state, Shana Johnson serves as **Information Services** Support Manager and is responsible for the overall information technical support systems of the Convention and provides assistance to several state entities that are housed within the Baptist Building. In cooperation with other SBC state conventions and national SBC entities, Information Services has been instrumental in developing an online database of all SBC congregations and leadership. This program has become the national database for all SBC congregations and all SBC entities, both state and national. The database consists of all information collected through the ACP each year, as well as information directly communicated to the office. All information is retained to maintain historical, statistical, and leadership information for each reporting congregation. Through her team's effort along with assistance from the entire State Mission Services Staff, ACP reporting of all Louisiana Baptist congregations maintains an above average reporting percentage within the SBC network of congregations.

The LBC **Accounting Team** provides competent tax and accounting information to Louisiana Baptist churches. In addition to supporting the finances of State Missions Services, we assist with questions on Budgeting, Accounting, Payroll Taxes, and Church Accounting issues. We are here to help you! Our contact information can be found on the LBC website. In addition, consistent with prior years, the Louisiana Baptist Convention received an excellent review on our Annual Audit Report.

Tall Timbers is continuing to strive to provide a quality retreat and camp facility that honors the Lord, and desires individuals to experience life change through the power of the gospel. Tall Timbers has many things to celebrate, including a record number of guests, along with several new hires. Brandon Penton was named Director in February, and Lisa Broussard was named Associate Director a few months later in May. The camp is also celebrating the completion of its pool project that started back in 2023.

The Business and Information Services Team considers all its various areas of support work as ministry unto the Lord. We count it a privilege to serve our Lord by serving our colleagues and Louisiana Baptists in the work of reaching Louisiana for Christ and strengthening our churches.

BAPTIST COLLEGIATE MINISTRY Mark Robinson, Director

BCM continues to facilitate a culture of evangelism on our college campuses. Students are being trained to share their faith with family and classmates each week of the year. This coming fall we will observe ENGAGE 24, a statewide evangelistic emphasis on October 22, 2024. Campuses will have 24-hour intensive programming, gospel appointments, prayer tables, and worship events focusing on responding to the Gospel. We will also focus on leading students to discover their call to serve the Lord at the Geaux24 conference October 4-5 at Calvary Baptist Church in Alexandria. Over 200 students from 7 campuses across the state served on mission to Mexico last December. This has become a consistent part of the GOLA missions program. EVANGELISM AND CHURCH GROWTH TEAM Keith Manuel, Director

This past year's Evangelism Conference was hosted by Temple, Ruston and focused on a culture of evangelism. Next year ECON will be January 27-28, 2025, at First, Covington.

Sean Keith is your Sunday School, Church Administration, and Revitalization Strategist. Jefferson, Baton Rouge hosted last year's ReGroup and included a Spanish language track with an attendance of approximately 550. In addition, 300 people received small group training around the state. Lee Myers serves as your Youth Strategist. The Youth Evangelism Celebration (YEC) ministered to over 5,300 youth and adults. Summer camps at Tall Timbers saw an attendance of 1,364 teens gathering for worship, equipping, and fun. Over 104 students made decisions for the Lord, with 13 responding to a call to ministry. In addition to the spiritual decisions made at camps and YEC, students learned how to share their faith and returned home equipped to impact others with the Gospel. Over 6,600 students learned how to share their faith or personal testimony to share the Good News. We are praying for a great YEC, November 24-25, 2024, at the Rapides Coliseum in Alexandria.

Serving as your Children's Ministry Strategist is David Anderson. This year our children's camps at Tall Timbers had an attendance of over 1,194. We had 53 children make professions of faith and gave \$6,845 to missions. VBS trainings allowed approximately 300 hundred workers to learn how to lead their congregations through the most effective evangelistic outreach across the SBC. David also assists our churches with the State Bible Drill, Childhood Education Workshops, and a statewide retreat for Children's Ministers.

New to our staff as of July 1, 2024, is Kevin Ulmer who serves as your Evangelism Strategist. He will work in all areas of evangelism but especially in the areas of personal and church evangelism. He will also coordinate the Senior Adult Luncheon at ECON.

The Evangelism & Church Growth Team loves to serve you by training your leaders and church members in evangelism, discipleship, and age-group ministries. Please, contact us if we can assist you in any way.

MISSIONS AND MINISTRY TEAM James Jenkins, Director

Reaching Louisiana for Jesus is the primary goal of the Missions and Ministry Team of the Louisiana Baptist Convention. Strategists on our team all focus their attention on helping our churches build a culture of evangelism in Louisiana. Below you will find the reports from every area of our work.

Send Network Louisiana Lane Corley, James Jenkins, Carlos Schmidt, Jacob Crawford

The vision of Send Network is to reach 1% of North America's lost population through planting 11,000 new churches that each reach at least 125 people with the gospel over the next decade. For North America, that means reaching 2.75 million people.

For Louisiana, 1% of our lost population would mean reaching 29,000 people with the gospel. That means that there are at least 2.9 million people lost without Christ in our state. To achieve this goal through church planting, we are working to plant 231 new churches that each must reach 125 new people for Christ.

In the last year, we have seen 35 church planters endorsed through Send Network Louisiana and nine new church plants in which over 500 people came to faith in Christ.

We have also developed a Send Network Louisiana strategic prayer plan. Our goal is to mobilize churches to pray for a movement of God in our state and to see lostness impacted with the gospel of Jesus. We are currently hosting weekly online prayer gatherings and seek to multiply these prayer groups to each region of the state: Southeast, Southwest, Central, and North.

Church planting has helped Louisiana Baptists reach people groups including Anglo, African American, Vietnamese, Burmese, Chinese, Korean, Haitians, Eritrean, Arabic, Hispanic, and Portuguese.

Language Missions and Partnership Missions Carlos Schmidt

In partnership with Send Network Louisiana, three traditional Hispanic Church plants were started in New Orleans and one in Denham Springs. We are still working on two new Hispanic churches in New Orleans, one in Luling and one in Franklin, one Chinese church in Slidell, and a New Pilipino Church in Hammond.

In Language church development four Hispanic simple church evangelism trainings were conducted in the New Orleans area and two small group workshops were conducted, one in the North and one in the South.

Partnership Missions was instrumental in mobilizing a team of 14 people to Indonesia and collaborated on a DR Feeding team to Israel. Current partnerships still include Belarus, Brazil, Puerto Rico, Cape Bretton Island, Canada, Honduras, Yucatan Mexico, Indonesia, Senegal, London, Colombia, and Madrid.

Men's Ministries and Disaster Relief Stanley L. Statham

Since our last report, Louisiana has suffered two significant wildfires, multiple severe thunderstorms, and tornadoes across the state. North LA recorded the most tornado warnings in recorded history (67). We have deployed chainsaw teams, chaplains, quick response feeding units, asset protection, and shower trailers to various locations.

Since the last report, several churches (Shady Grove in Pitkin, FBC, Slidell, and the Bridge Church Fellowship in Breaux Bridge) have suffered damage from storms, with Beulah Baptist Church in Mansfield, LA, suffering catastrophic damage.

We have deployed DR teams to Texas multiple times. LA DR operated a major site in Huffman, TX, for two weeks to assist the community in recovering from flooding. We also deployed a team to Pennsylvania for flood recovery work. A feeding team served for two weeks in Hawaii, assisting with recovery work related to the wildfire there. Members of LA DR participated with Texans on Mission to feed soldiers in Israel.

The Disaster Relief Rebuild Ministry continues to grow. We currently focus on the Point Aux Chenes area, which is predominantly an American Indian tribe. Former IMB missionaries continue to serve as our on-site coordinators, coordinating volunteer rebuild teams. Working with multiple partners, we have completed the construction of two homes.

We have also completed several homeowner site demolition and clean-up and many home repair projects in Pointe aux Chenes and surrounding communities. The first two home dedications will take place on August 29, 2024, on the 3rd anniversary of Hurricane Ida and the 1-year anniversary of beginning the first new home construction. We are evaluating and planning to begin church property rebuilding project(s) in 2025.

Compassion Ministries Stanley L. Statham

Compassion Ministry seeks to 1) Meet needs, 2) Build Trust, 3) Share the Gospel, and 4) Connect people to the local church. Compassion ministry opens doors for evangelism through such strategies as ESL (English as a Second Language), Christmas Backpack Ministry, Drug Recovery, chaplain ministry, and food pantries.

We continue to develop a team of Association Compassion Missionaries (ACM) in several associations across the state. Each ACM is tasked to lead and start new compassion ministries.

Since our last report, we are working to expand the chaplain ministry by engaging pastors and laypeople in one of the seven disciplines recognized by NAMB. In the regular 2024 session, the LA State Legislature

passed Senate Bill 123, allowing LA schools to employ or accept volunteer chaplains to support programs for students, teachers, and parents. The local school board must approve chaplains. The LBC Compassion Relief Ministry is developing a strategy to train school chaplains and assist in placing them in schools.

In August of each year, the SBC sets aside the last Sunday of the month to promote the Global Hunger Fund. LA Compassion Relief promotes this offering through the LA / Global Hunger Fund. The LBC receives twenty cents of each dollar donated, and these funds help support food banks and feeding ministries across Louisiana. The remaining eighty percent of the funds go to support Send Relief and the important ministry they engage in globally.

Volunteer Mobilization and Mission Builders Mark Morelock & Mark Jelks

The Louisiana Baptists Mission Builder program has had a great year serving the churches of our state. We continue to prioritize our focus on serving mission churches to achieve their goal of obtaining a permanent place of worship to strengthen their discipleship efforts and to better serve and evangelize their communities.

In addition to our building projects, we have served many churches this year through consultations and assisting them in the planning phases of their building growth projects as they seek to expand their Kingdom impact.

We have had the pleasure of hosting volunteer groups from all around our state and from other parts of the country as they partner with Louisiana Baptist churches to achieve their construction goals.

The Mission Builder team was pleased to achieve three certificates of occupancy for projects this year which included two stand-alone structures and a storefront worship center. Please be in prayer for these churches as they are taking the next steps to better seek the lost and support cooperative missions and ministries.

Your Mission Builder team is looking forward to another great year of service to our Louisiana Baptists partners. Thank you for your continued support through volunteerism and the Georgia Barnette Louisiana Missions Offering to make the Mission Builder program a success!

Women's Missions and Ministry Christine Gill

The Women's Missions and Ministry (WMM) Team continued to lead Louisiana Baptist women to serve and minister throughout our state.

Embrace, the annual WMM conference for all Louisiana Baptist women, was held in April 2024 at FBC New Orleans. During the conference, we celebrated 125 years of WMU in Louisiana! Leadership from 43 churches participated in the celebration.

WMM led Louisiana Baptist women to donate and pack over six-hundred gift boxes for incarcerated women in 2023. In 2024, WMM will hold one packing day in September on the campus of Louisiana Christian University. Our goal this year is to provide at least 600 boxes. WMM volunteers will distribute these giftboxes to the inmates at The Louisiana Correctional Institute for Women (LCIW) on September 27.

Ministers' Wives Retreat, a weekend of renewal and appreciation for our ministers' wives in the state, took place in October 2023 at Tall Timbers.

Louisiana Baptist churches remained generous in their giving for 2023. In fact, the Georgia Barnette Louisiana Missions Offering receipts were the second highest in the history of the offering! Our prayer is to be joined by more mission giving churches in 2024.

Children and Youth Mission Education Erin Jones

This year has been a great year for Children and Youth Mission Education. We held our first annual Teen Girls Retreat at Clara Springs Camp and Conference Center in Pelican, Louisiana, in March 2024 with 236 middle and high-school-aged girls in attendance.

Two Mission Jamborees (M-JAM) took place in 2024. M-JAM North was hosted by McClendon Baptist Church in West Monroe with around 180 in attendance. M-JAM South was hosted by First Community Antioch Baptist Church in Lutcher with around 65 in attendance. North and South M-JAM events will be held again in 2025.

Children's Mission Camp and Mini MAC in July 2024 had over 600 children in attendance with 28 different churches represented between the two camps. We had 265 in attendance for Children's Mission Camp and 357 in attendance for Mini MAC. This makes a total of 622 in attendance for both camps. We had 30 staff not included in that number. We collected \$1,645.09 towards GBO. Five decisions were made to follow Christ and more seeds were planted.

Pastoral Leadership Ministry Team Ray Swift, Director

Psalm 3:3-4 has been my theme since I came to the convention in 2021. "But you, Lord, are a shield around me, my glory, and the one who lifts up my head. I cry aloud to the Lord, and he answers me from his holy mountain."

As I continue my fourth year here at the convention, I have been able to better define my purpose as to LOVE, LISTEN, LEAD, and LIFT UP Louisiana Baptist pastors and churches.

Believing more so today that healthy pastors produce healthy churches, I will continue to intentionally focus on pastor wellness: emotional, financial, physical, relational, and spiritual. With that focus the Lord is showing me two specific avenues/paths to make this happen. 1) Helping Louisiana Baptist pastors have a good start in their call and in their church; 2) Helping Louisiana Baptist pastors stay true to their call and to stay longer at their church as God leads so.

Last year the Lord blessed in so many ways through the events that we were able to host. We had great attendance and sweet participation in each of these. I am looking forward to continuing several of these events and even adding new ones in the year to come.

- **Resume Services:** <u>www.goservela.org</u> This website helps pastors review ministry opportunities and gives churches the opportunity of posting a ministry position.
- **Pastor Search Committee training:** guides churches through a deliberate process and helps churches select the right candidate.
- **Deacon Training:** the New Testament ministry of the Deacon is a needed

component for the pastor and church.

- New Pastor/Wife fellowship: introduction to the State Missions Services Staff, the convention entities, and the Louisiana Baptist Convention building, for fellowship with other pastors and wives.
- Church Administration Resources: a Louisiana Baptist website devoted to numerous forms, articles and information related to all matters of church budget/finances, security, polices, committees, and staff.

These resources are provided to help pastors stay longer:

- **Pastor Appreciation month October:** we all need encouragement from time to time, and October helps us show love and appreciation to all our pastors.
- **Pause Retreat:** weekend for pastors and wives at Tall Timbers Conference Center. A wonderful time of worship, teaching, and fellowship.
- Shepherd's Rest: sabbatical for pastors to get away to refresh and renew.
- **Granberry Counseling:** we are blessed and privileged to partner with the wonderful staff and counselors at Louisiana Baptist Children's Home & Family Ministers for this service.
- **Church Conflict Summit:** 18% left a church due to church conflict; 13% for burnout, 12% poor fit with church. Conflict can be managed and dealt with Biblically.
- Sexual Abuse Response Council (SARC) continues to provide new and updated resources to churches and individuals for all matters related to Sexual Abuse. Information is available on our website www. louisianabaptists.org/resources.
- Singing Ministers & Singing Women: These volunteers gather each August to prepare for concerts in local churches, detention centers, youth intervention programs, and prisons. As they share their talents, they also share their faith. For more information visit LouisianaBaptists.org/pastors.

Louisiana Convention Programs - 62.87% of Total SBC and LBC Budget

- Louisiana Christian University......2,575,962 Louisiana Christian University, the only institution of higher education operated by Louisiana Baptists, engages in a program of providing instruction for candidates seeking undergraduate and graduate degrees. It receives support from the Cooperative Program, student fees, auxiliary enterprises, gifts and grants, dividends and interest, and special funding campaigns.

LOUISIANA BAPTIST MESSAGE Will Hall, Executive Editor

In 2024, we celebrated our 137th anniversary as the first cooperative ministry established by Louisiana Baptists, and it is a pleasure to report that the news looks good for our entity as we move toward the future:

-- The Baptist Message is on sound financial footing.

-- Operationally, we have the right team in place and have refined our processes to ensure best practices.

-- Moreover, our vision "to establish a fellowship with Louisiana Baptists as a partner in the Gospel in reaching the lost in our state, the nation and the world" remains relevant as does our mission "to equip Louisiana Baptists for life, work and ministry."

During this past year, we continued to focus our reporting on the Louisiana Baptist Convention's efforts to restore a culture of evangelism among our churches. Indeed, in June we broke the news that baptisms had surged more than 31 percent in the past year among Louisiana Baptists, to a new post-COVID high of 8,770 salvations! This was on top of the nearly 19 percent jump that was recorded in 2022 – meaning that Louisiana Baptists baptized 3,140 more new believers in 2023 than in 2021 (5,630).

In the near term we are committed to specific coverage about the church planting initiative, Send Network Louisiana, which was announced a year ago. We will provide ongoing updates about Louisiana Baptists' partnership with the SBC's North American Mission Board to see God's Kingdom expanded in Louisiana by one percent over the next decade. Researchers estimate that 62.4 percent of 4,648,794 Louisianans are lost (or, 2,789,276). If successful, 28,875 Louisianans will be added to the Kingdom through 231 new churches planted in the state by 2033 (based on each reaching 125 people with the Gospel). These salvations will be in addition to those recorded by already established Louisiana Baptist congregations.

Meanwhile, in the longer term, specifically the next 1-3 years, we will be developing and adding electronic products and services to complement our website and social media channels. We are conducting something of a "Nehemiah's Walk" this year and possibly into 2025 to get a better understanding of what is being offered on other platforms and what would be beneficial to our newspaper readers and online viewers.

Office of Public Policy

The Office of Public Policy worked with Louisiana Baptist lawmakers and other like-minded legislators to successfully champion key legislation relating to moral issues and social concerns:

-- Act 676, championed by Rep. Dodie Horton, a member with First Baptist Church, Haughton, is a first-in-the-nation requirement to restore, after about a 50-year absence, the Ten Commandments to every publicly funded classroom, kindergarten through college, in Louisiana. The displays are to be paid for by public donations, and proponents estimate that about \$100,000 in gifts are needed to outfit all Louisiana schools.

-- Act 293, authored by Sen. Mark Abraham, a member with Trinity Baptist Church, Lake Charles, allows "Each city, parish, or other local public school board" to "employ or accept as a volunteer a certified chaplain to provide support, services and programs for students, staff, and parents."

-- Horton and Rep. Raymond Crews, a member with First Baptist Church, Bossier City, successfully pushed through Acts 681 and 680, respectively. The first prohibits school employees from discussing LGBT matters during instructional time. The second, officially known as "The Given Name Act," requires schools to use an individual's legal name or a derivative of it and the pronouns that are consistent with a person's biological sex.

-- Rep. Kim Carver, a deacon with First Baptist Church, Covington, authored Act 656, which bans social media companies from collecting data that can used to target advertising at minors, and Act 216, which requires any individual who provides care for or services to a child in a voluntary or professional capacity "to be offered training on the statutory requirements and responsibility of reporting child abuse and neglect."

-- Act 436, authored by Rep. Roger Wilder, a member with Hebron Baptist Church, Denham Springs, requires facilities designated for biological females (dormitories, restrooms, changing rooms, domestic violence shelters, juvenile detention and correctional centers) to remain that way for the protection of girls and women from sexual assault, violence and harassment by biological males.

-- Sen. Stewart Cathey, a member with First Baptist Church, West Monroe, championed Act 586 to significantly strengthen penalties for human trafficking, with the harshest punishment for those who prey on minors for commercial sex. These more stringent sentencing requirements could figure prominently as deterrents to sex crimes early in 2025, when Super Bowl LIX comes to New Orleans. Sports championship events like it have been linked with surges in human trafficking for sexual activity.

-- Sen. Adam Bass, a member with Cypress Baptist Church, Benton, pushed through Act 398 to expand the use of "safe haven baby box" (a climatecontrolled, electronically monitored device that allows parents to anonymously surrender an "unwanted" newborn in a safe environment) to now include "any designated emergency care facility that is staffed continuously on a 24-hour basis, seven days a week, and 365 days a year" if it meets detailed requirements for qualified personnel on duty, constant monitoring of the baby box and essential equipment on hand to ensure the newborn's safety and health. The new law promises to rescue babies who otherwise might face abandonment in less ideal conditions.

Sen. Rick Edmonds, who retired as pastor of Calvary Baptist Church, Shreveport, and now serves as pastor of First Baptist Church, McComb, Mississippi, carried the banners for adoption and school choice during the 2024 legislative session:

-- Act 332 mandates that mothers who receive a "fetal abnormality" diagnosis for an unborn child must be informed about "resources, programs, and services for pregnant women and resources, programs, and services for infants and children born with disabilities" within 48 hours of such a diagnosis (to encourage and assist a mother and father to carry such a baby to term).

-- Act 515 creates an "Adoption Awareness Program" that will "encourage the formation and maintenance of two-parent families." The Department of Children and Family Services must hire a vendor to facilitate marketing, create a website, and provide a telephone or video hotline, with each promoting educational information about resources that encourage adoption.

-- Act 362 restricts adoption services in the state to "an adoption facilitator or an entity … licensed in La. to assist in the adoption of children." This restriction applies even "to advertise for adoption services." It also requires these individuals and organizations to be designated as mandatory reporters of abuse.

-- Act 334 authorizes "school choice options for parents, teachers, and pupils," by granting operational autonomy for "innovative kinds of independent public charter schools" from the control of city and parish school boards. However, these charter schools are still accountable for their academic results which will "be analyzed, considered, and repeated or replicated if appropriate."

-- Act 91 recenters the authority for a child to participate in the "Course Choice Program" from the local school superintendent or other governing authority of a school to the student with his or her parents to make such decisions "after consultation with the person designated by the governing authority of the school."

-- Act 1, "Louisiana Giving All True Opportunity to Rise (LA GATOR) Scholarship Program" provides for educational savings accounts to support parental choice in K-12 education. Essentially, state tax dollars for education will follow the student "whether the child's best opportunities are found at a public school, charter school, private school, home study program, or at a faith-based or religious school." The program also ensures students in non-traditional school settings may subsequently participate in the "Taylor Opportunity Program for Students" (TOPS) which provides funds for postsecondary education.

Meanwhile, the Office of Public Policy collaborated with conservative allies to protect the state from perilous legislation that would have endangered the unborn as well as negatively impacted the general population, including pro-abortion, anti-traditional marriage and recreational marijuana bills:

-- House Bill 98 would have deleted the Defense of Marriage Act from the Louisiana Constitution. However, we successfully argued in committee that DOMA should be kept on the books while social conservatives fight to overturn Obergefell v. Hodges, the U.S. Supreme Court ruling that legalized gay marriage.

-- HB 164 offered to narrow the abortion ban in Louisiana by creating exceptions for rape (which accounts for less than 1 percent of all abortions in the United States) and incest (about 0.5 percent of abortions). Groups like Planned Parenthood would have exploited these loopholes to advise all their clients to claim rape and incest, effectively ending the state's abortion ban. The bill died in committee.

-- HB 649 proposed a scheme to regulate recreational marijuana in case it was legalized. The bill was moved favorably out of committee but was defeated on the House floor (as a substitute bill, HB 978), with 58 against the measure and 36 in favor.

Although lawmakers handily killed this recreational pot bill, they rejected legislation that would have banned THC from hemp consumable products that are being pushed in convenience stores, local grocery markets and gas stations.

Importantly, the issue is not marijuana (cannabis, weed, pot) or hemp, but THC, which is the psychoactive element in both.

Moreover, the debate took place the week that news broke from sheriffs of various parishes about children being rushed to emergency rooms after eating THC candies shared with them by classmates (data indicates THC poisonings have soared 645 percent in the state).

In the end, most lawmakers bowed to the pressures from 1,500 hemp merchants who are seeing profits rocket from selling THC-laced edibles and drinks, and both chambers of the legislature eventually approved THC in hemp consumables (with some minor limits) via passage of HB 952.

Fortunately, conservatives in the U.S. Congress may come to Louisiana's rescue, with the House Agriculture Committee crafting a farm bill (Farm, Food, and National Security Act of 2024: H.R. 8467) that would "prohibit the commercial production, sale, and distribution of certain intoxicating hemp derivatives and products."

Church Self-Insurance Update

Louisiana Baptists have led the effort to establish a response to the church insurance crisis in our state, and major milestones have been achieved:

-- Act 259 was signed into law and authorizes the creation of the Louisiana Churches and Nonprofit Religious Organizations Self-Insured Fund.

-- Leaders of six faith communities have volunteered to serve on the governing board of the initial corporation (they will create the permanent corporation that will administrate the self-insurance program). They held their organizing meeting August 6 and voted to adopt Articles of Incorporation and to apply for nonprofit status with the Louisiana Secretary of State and the Internal revenue Service.

-- A state source for \$3 million of initial funding has been tentatively identified by Gov. Landry. This money will cover costs for catastrophic modeling and other steps needed to establish a premium schedule for participants. An estimated \$6 million of additional money will be needed to purchase the reinsurance policy for the first year of operations. The combined \$9 million of funding will be a one-time grant that will be replaced in future years by the ongoing premiums paid by participants.

-- The Risk Program Administrators, a subsidiary of Gallagher Risk Management (Monroe) continues to guide our efforts to bring this program online, with a projected start-up date in the second quarter of 2025.

LOUISIANA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME AND FAMILY MINISTRIES

Dr. Perry Hancock, President and CEO

In its 125th year of ministry Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries continued its mission of providing love, care, and hope in Christ for children and families in need. The Children's Home provided a positive Christian witness through its residential child and family care programs, foster care and adoption ministries, Granberry Counseling Centers, Minister Care Residential program, Women's Learning Center, Compassion for Kids, and Orphans Embrace.

The Children's Home provided ministry services for over 8,000 children, families, and individuals. Through its on-campus and off-campus residential programs, 126 children and homeless mothers were served. An additional 310 families received placement referral services.

Granberry Counseling Centers provided professional Christian counseling for 837 individuals. Through its Minister Care program, a partnership with the Louisiana Baptist Convention Pastoral Leadership division, Granberry provided counseling for 38 Louisiana Baptist minister families.

Women's Learning Center (formerly Christian Women's Job Corps) provided educational and vocational training for 47 women. The ministry maintained its adult education certification as an official HiSET training and testing site and offered Paraprofessional Education and Banking Services certificates. Each day, WLC staff lead the women in Bible study and prayer.

Through its Compassion for Kids ministry, the Children's Home served over 7,000 children and family members. Items provided include diapers, toys, backpacks, school supplies, food, and other life essentials. Hundreds of Bibles and 1,000s of gospel tracts were distributed.

The new Compassion Center opened late in the year. The 15,000 square foot facility houses the offices of Compassion for Kids and serves as a distribution facility that provides life essentials to partner churches and other compassion ministries. The goal of Compassion for Kids is to reach 25,000 - 30,000 children and families in need each year.

The Children's Home also shared God's love in word and deed through its international orphan care ministry, Orphans Embrace. Thirty-four children were served through Louisiana Reach Haiti. The ministry is sponsored by the Children's Home and several Louisiana Baptist churches.

Throughout the year the Children's Home celebrated its 125th Anniversary. The theme for the observance was A Legacy of Hope. Special events highlighted the impact Louisiana Baptists have made on the lives of children and families in need since 1899. In July a new Legacy Room was opened which features a ministry timeline and memorabilia.

Louisiana Baptist churches once again provided support for the Children's Home through the Cooperative Program and the Annual Children's Home Sunday Offering. Churches also met the needs of the children and families through the Fall Food Roundup, VBS offerings, and other special projects.

As a result of the support from our churches and the witness provided by the various ministries of the Home, many children and family members experienced the joy of salvation in Christ and were baptized in local churches. Many others made new commitments to the Lord. Thank you, Louisiana Baptists, for meeting needs and changing lives in Jesus' name through your Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries.

LOUISIANA BAPTIST FOUNDATION Dr Jeffrey Steed, Executive Director

Thank you, Louisiana Baptists, for partnership opportunities as we celebrate 80 years of ministry! We are grateful for God's blessings on the Louisiana Baptist Foundation. We ended 2023 with \$257 + million in assets under management, representing funds owned by Louisiana Baptist churches and other ministries and gifts primarily managed perpetually for Kingdom impact. Every dollar generated from these funds represents another dollar to advance the Kingdom by spreading the Gospel.

In 2023, the Foundation continued executing its LBF Vision200TM strategic plan that was initiated in 2020. We are driven to advance the Kingdom...one dollar at a time, one ministry at a time, one life at a time. The overall vision is to advance the Kingdom through the Foundation's ministry by \$200 million in twenty years or less. Specifically, the Foundation will benefit the Kingdom through (1) facilitating planned gifts beyond cash and (2) providing funds management and other services for ministries to enhance their impact. As of the end of 2023, the Foundation's current Kingdom-impact amount achieved is \$43+ million towards the 20-year goal of \$200 million. To accomplish this goal, the Foundation focuses on four objectives:

(1) Planned Giving:

- **A.** Providing educational content to churches to teach practical ways members can benefit their church beyond cash (Louisiana Legacy publication),
- **B.** Speaking in churches and other ministry organizations to educate constituents on being good stewards of their estates,
- **C.** Providing an online platform for giving non-cash gifts to churches and ministries (www.Giving-Gateway.net)
- **D.** Having comprehensive planned giving website content,
- E. Sending periodic communications to constituents,
- F. Providing confidential one-on-one meetings with prospective donors,
- G. Encouraging individuals to impact their family and the Kingdom through their estates,
- H. Facilitating the logistics of special gifts, and
- **I.** Providing every Louisiana Baptist the opportunity to obtain a free basic Will document when at least tithing her/his estate to a church and/or other ministries.

(2) Church/Ministry Services: The Foundation provides church-business-related services through ChurchBiz Central[™] to help churches and ministries increase their God-given funds. For example, the Short-Term Fund helps these organizations typically earn more on cash reserves and designated accounts than a bank. Other valuable services available include online giving and payroll services.

(3) Comprehensive Marketing Plan: The Foundation continues to have a comprehensive communication plan that utilizes multiple channels to focus on services that advance the Kingdom.

(4) Operations: The Foundation will continue to have a well-skilled and experienced staff that provides top-tier service to help organizations further enhance Kingdom-impact.

The Foundation continued toward its LBF Vision 200[™] in 2024 by implementing a promotional focused on celebrating 80 years of ministry. For each new account opened, the Foundation will donate an additional \$80 to the new account. For each new gift created, the Foundation will donate an additional \$80 toward the gift.

The Foundation is grateful to Louisiana Baptists for ministry partnerships around the state over the last 80 years. We look forward to the next 80 years for His glory!

COMMITTEE ON MORAL AND SOCIAL CONCERNS Chad Gilbert, Chairman

The Louisiana Baptist Convention Bylaws charge the Committee on Moral and Social Concerns to "identify, study, provide information, and recommend actions on moral and social concerns which need to be of particular concern to Louisiana Baptists" and we have done so this year with two resolutions which we submitted to the Committee on Resolutions, who has included our inputs among the consensus statements they will submit to messengers.

Additionally, the CMSC is "authorized to speak publicly and/or conduct campaigns to influence the outcome of current issues on which the Executive Board or the Convention have taken an official position." In this regard, we are moving forward to lead a combined effort among Louisiana Baptists, in coordination with Southern Baptists and government agencies, to address the anticipated increased human trafficking activity related to the upcoming National Football League's Super Bowl LIX slated to take place in New Orleans on February 9, 2025.

RECOMMENDED ACTIONS

During our fall meeting, August 27, we crafted "RESOLUTION: ON SUPPORT OF VOLUNTEER CHAPLAINS IN SCHOOLS" in response to the successful effort by state Sen. Mark Abraham, a faithful member of Trinity Baptist Church in Lake Charles, to pass legislation, S.B. 123, signed into law, Act 293, by Gov. Jeff Landry, which provides for "the employment or acceptance as a volunteer of a certified chaplain by public school boards."

This law permits school districts to hire or to allow volunteer certified chaplains, who have been cleared through state and federal databases, to serve in Louisiana's schools.

During committee hearings, Sen. Abraham testified that 15 states already were engaged in similar initiatives and that two other states had passed similar legislation, noting that "In these 30,000 schools, teen pregnancies are drastically down; suicides are zero; and it [chaplain program] has been helping with mental illness – not only for the students, but also for the teachers."

Already, the CMSC has been in contact with the Executive Board, and the Louisiana Baptist Disaster Relief team is incorporating the certification of volunteer school chaplains into its already existing chaplain certification program.

We also crafted "RESOLUTION: AGAINST HUMAN TRAFFICKING," which restates Louisiana Baptists' condemnation of human trafficking and urges churches as well as cooperative ministries to train to protect, rescue and restore victims of human trafficking, with particular emphasis on being prepared for a sex trafficking surge relating to Super Bowl LIX.

Additionally, this consensus statement challenges congregations to make that date a day of special prayer for the women and children trapped by the sex trade industry.

PUBLIC CAMPAIGN

Regarding our human trafficking resolution, as chairman of the Committee on Moral and Social Concerns, I convened a meeting, Monday, Nov. 11, to begin the process of energizing action among Louisiana Baptists, in coordination with Southern Baptists and government agencies, to combat human trafficking and to rescue and restore victims of increased sex slavery we expect as exploitation of Super Bowl LIX.

Our hope is to inform and equip congregations to recognize and respond to human trafficking to interdict this illegal activity. Likewise, we desire to provide rescued women and children safe spaces to be restored as well as to experience the love of Christ.

COMMITTEE ON CONVENTION ORDER OF BUSINESS Ronnie McLellan, Chairman

The Committee on Convention Order of Business met on March 21, 2024, at the LBC Baptist Building in Alexandria. This committee makes the following recommendations:

- 1. That the 2025 sermon be preached by Michael Wood, Senior Pastor, First Baptist Church, West Monroe, Louisiana.
- 2. That Tommy Middleton, member, Jefferson Baptist Church, Baton Rouge, Louisiana, serve as the Alternate Preacher for the 2025 Convention.
- 3. That Cullen McDaniel, minister of music, Jefferson Baptist Church, Baton Rouge, Louisiana, serve as the worship leader for the 2025 Convention.
- 4. That the venue for the 2026 Convention be Trinity Baptist Church, Lake Charles, Louisiana.

That the agenda for this 177th annual meeting of Louisiana Baptist Convention be adopted as printed in the program and that the following proposed Convention Standing Rules be adopted:

Convention Standing Rules

- 1. The President shall be allowed to make minor changes in the agenda as may be necessary.
- 2. Nominating speeches for officers shall be limited to three (3) minutes each.
- 3. Debate on matters coming before the convention shall be limited to two speakers **for** and two speakers **against** for a period of up to three minutes each.
- 4. Persons addressing the Convention shall state their name and church.
- 5. No person addressing the Convention may speak more than twice on the same subject without unanimous consent.
- 6. The reports of the Committee on Nominations and the Committee on Committees be presented, followed by nominations from the floor, if any. Then the Committee nominees shall be voted on for election by the Convention. If the Committee nominees are not elected, then the vote on persons nominated from the floor shall follow immediately.
- 7. That a time for questions be provided following the reports of convention entities and the Executive Board.

CONVENTION COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS Field Thigpen, Chairman

RESOLUTION 1: ON THE CENTENNIAL ANNIVERSARY OF THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

WHEREAS, The Louisiana Baptist Convention was established to "provide the means through which Louisiana Baptist churches and members can cooperate in bringing persons to God" within our state; and

WHEREAS, The Louisiana Baptist Convention "recognizes the Southern Baptist Convention as the primary instrument used by Baptists to further the cause of Christ on a worldwide basis"; and

WHEREAS, Louisiana Baptists have a special historical relationship with the Cooperative Program in that M.E. Dodd was a Louisiana Baptist pastor when he led the 1925 effort to establish the "Co-Operative Program of Southern Baptists," making it possible for churches to support the missionary, education, and benevolent work within their respective states while cooperating with churches from other states to reach the world; and

WHEREAS, In 2025 our Baptist fellowship of national entities, state conventions and local associations across the United States will celebrate the centennial anniversary of the Cooperative Program for how it has supported our global "partnership in the Gospel" (Philippians 1:5); now therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the messengers to the 177th session of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, meeting in Shreveport, Louisiana, November 12, 2024, express gratitude to God for His providential guidance in the creation of the Cooperative Program and for 100 years of His multiplied blessings through this primary channel of financial support for Baptist cooperative missions and ministries; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we celebrate each Louisiana Baptist congregation who, in addition to their own missions activities, supports the missions and ministries of the Louisiana Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention by generous giving through the Cooperative Program; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we affirm the Cooperative Program "as the most effective [financial] means of mobilizing our churches and extending our outreach"; and be it finally

RESOLVED, That we commit ourselves to the celebration and promotion of the Cooperative Program within our churches, associations, and entities during 2025 to honor God's favor to our cooperative missions and ministries through the Cooperative Program for the past 100 years.

RESOLUTION 2: ON SUPPORT OF VOLUNTEER CHAPLAINS IN SCHOOLS

WHEREAS, Children have been entrusted to parents by the Lord and represent our nation's future and our spiritual legacy; and

WHEREAS, God has given parents the responsibility for the upbringing and education of our children (Proverbs 22:6; Deuteronomy 6:6-7); and

WHEREAS, God has ordained the state to promote good and restrain evil, thereby cultivating the conditions necessary for the flourishing of children and families which are not defined by arbitrary or subjective moral claims, but by basic moral goods rooted in the character of God (1 Peter 2:14); and

WHEREAS, The state has established a public education system as one means for promoting the general welfare of the people, mandating school attendance, in general, for children between the ages of six and 18 years old; and

WHEREAS, Mandatory attendance establishes schools as mission and ministry fields (Matthew 28:18-20), providing opportunities to support and strengthen fellow followers (1 Thess. 5:11) as well as to allow God to make His appeal through us to the lost (2 Cor. 5:20); and

WHEREAS, Research shows that religious support has a positive effect on students by reducing suicides, alcohol use and drug use, as well as promoting higher self-esteem, academic achievement and educational attainment, while also improving adolescent mental health; and

WHEREAS, Sen. Mark Abraham, a faithful member of Trinity Baptist Church, Lake Charles, championed a bill to authorize schools to employ or otherwise accept as a volunteer a certified chaplain who has been vetted through state and federal databases; and

WHEREAS, He testified that 15 states already were engaged in similar initiatives and that two other states had passed similar legislation to begin soon, noting that "In these 30,000 schools, teen pregnancies are drastically down; suicides are zero; and it [chaplain program] has been helping with mental illness – not only for the students, but also for the teachers"; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the messengers to the 177th session of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, meeting in Shreveport, Louisiana, November 12, 2024, commend Sen. Abraham for his wisdom in pushing through the legislation process this authorization to voluntarily make available a crucial spiritual resource in our schools; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage our LBC Executive Board to include chaplaincy certification in the existing disaster relief chaplains training program to certify Louisiana Baptists to volunteer in this school chaplain program; and be it finally

RESOLVED, That we urge our congregations to support the voluntary chaplain program in their neighborhood schools along with other programs that give them access to share the love of Christ in these vital mission fields.

RESOLUTION 3: ON AWARENESS ABOUT HUMAN TRAFFICKING

WHEREAS, The Bible describes each individual as being created in the image of God (Genesis 1:26-27) and affirms the sanctity and dignity of all human life (Psalm 8:4–5); and

WHEREAS, God calls upon believers to speak up for those who cannot defend themselves (Proverbs 31:8–9); and

WHEREAS, Scripture condemns slave traders as ungodly and sinful (1 Timothy 1:8-10); and

WHEREAS, Despite having some of the strictest laws against forced labor and sexual exploitation in the nation, human trafficking in Louisiana has surged from "206 confirmed and prospective victims" in 2015 to "1,615 confirmed and suspected victims" in 2023, with a 57 percent increase in just the last year; and

WHEREAS, Eighty-six percent of the 2023 human trafficking victims were sex trafficked and 83 percent were juveniles; and

WHEREAS, The National Football League's Super Bowl LIX has been scheduled to be held February 9, 2025, in the Caesars Superdome of New Orleans; and

WHEREAS, There is evidence such sports championships attract human traffickers seeking to profit from sexual exploitation; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the messengers to the 177th session of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, meeting in Shreveport, Louisiana, November 12, 2024, restate our condemnation of human trafficking; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage our Louisiana Baptist congregations, especially those located along the I-10 and I-20 corridors and in metropolitan areas, to educate their congregants about the signs to recognize victims of sex slavery and forced labor; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we challenge Louisiana Baptists to make February 9, 2025, a day of special prayer emphasis for the protection, rescue and restoration of victims of human trafficking; and be it finally

RESOLVED, That we urge our state cooperative ministries to coordinate with national cooperative ministries as well as with state and federal law enforcement agencies to help rescue victims from human trafficking situations related to Super Bowl LIX such that these women and children see the love of Christ in action, hear the Gospel of salvation and seek hope in Him.

RESOLUTION 4: ON EXPRESSION OF APPRECIATION

WHEREAS, Many individuals and groups have had a part in planning, preparing and conducting the 177th annual meeting of our Louisiana Baptist Convention; and

WHEREAS, The messengers of this Convention desire to warmly recognize and express appreciation to the following:

Dr. Chuck Pourciau, pastor of Broadmoor Baptist Church, Shreveport, as well as the staff and the congregation, for their assistance with details and for providing the use of their facilities for this annual meeting; and

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
